Council backs seal presence at Pool

In an effort to end more than five years of litigation, controversy and fees at La Jolla's Children's Pool, San Diego City Council members voted 7-1 Feb. 17 to send legislation to Sacramento that would give the city power to add the term "marine mammal habitat" to the list of uses included in a 1931 California tidelands grant.

Seal advocates and pro-beach activists poured into Tuesday's council meeting, offering their opinions before the council voted to pass a resolution that would end years of battling over use of uses as may be incident to, or

the Children's Pool.

"The City Attorney's Office recommended to the council that the council approve the resolution," said San Diego Deputy City Attorney George Schaefer. "We did our legal research and we have concluded that the legislature has the authority to amend the trust to add the use.

Pool, was among several areas the state gave to the city for certain uses in a 1931 state grant, including "public park, bathing pool for children, parkway, highway, playground and recreational purposes, and to such other

convenient for the full enjoyment of, such purposes," the statutes stated, adding the right to fish off the waters. According to Schaefer, council members inserted a clarification into the resolution allowing the council discretion regarding Children's Pool uses.

The council intends to add Casa Beach, or the Children's marine mammal viewing to the list of uses, which would settle ongoing state and federal cases regarding the area and its intended use while keeping the Children's Pool's current uses intact, Schaefer said.



Jury awards firefighters \$5,000 each

After three days of deliberations. a jury on Tuesday found four firefighters were subjected to sexual harassment after being forced to drive a fire truck in the Lesbian/Gay/Bisexual/Transgender (LGBT) Parade in 2007 in Hillcrest and they were awarded damages of \$5,000 each.

The total award came to \$34,300 to all four men, who all testified they felt uncomfortable and filed a lawsuit against the city. A previous jury deadlocked last October when they could not get nine votes on the question of whether the men were subjected to sexual harassment by parade spectators.

Their attorney, Charles LiMandri, told reporters "the amount itself is not important" and called it a victory. However, LiMandri has paid for the cost of both lawsuits Chad Allison was awarded \$100 in retrial. ■

Deputy City Attorney Don Shanahan said his office would appeal the verdict, even though, in his words, "the damages are extremely low." Deputy City Attorney Kristin Zlotnik said, "The policy was changed before they filed the lawsuit."

Fire Chief Tracy Jarman testified at both trials and said she met with the four firefighters days after the parade. Jarman testified she and the department changed the policy the next week by only having volunteers ride in future LGBT parades.

John Ghiotto was awarded other damages of \$14,200 for past and future lost earnings because he testified he was transferred to another fire station where he no longer works as a paramedic.

those times] because there's high tide hitting the sea wall and taking it out to the ocean."

Chasan researched affected areas — extending from south La Jolla to Bird Rock — where, although city crews removed garbage cans, beachgoers continued to toss rubbish. Other local officials agreed with Chasan. Some said they were seeking solutions before summertime rolls around, bringing thousands of tourists to La Jolla's beaches.

"We're trying to figure out what our options are," La Jolla Town Council President Darcy Ashley said. "The town council isn't committed to anything, and I haven't presented anything to the commu-

Ashley said she spoke to Chasan and told her the council was in the fact-finding stages but was interested in purchasing Big Belly solar trashcans.

Chasan learned residents needed to purchase replacement containers and then search for a trash pick-up service, she said. So, \$14,000, according to Chasan. Chasan contacted La Jolla's business improvement district, Promote La Jolla (PLJ).

Newly elected PLJ President Rick Wildman told Chasan the group would extend its contract. covering trash pickup for about six of the 14 missing garbage cans two at the foot and two at the coastal access points off Marine Street and two at the foot of Sea Lane, Chasan said.

Wildman said PLJ would help Chasan, allowing residents to "piggyback" on their trash service.

"PLJ worked the figures," Wildman said. "We can add the additional pickups to the garbage route with no net cost to La Jolla."

"The solution with PLJ is a good abridging solution," Chasan said. "It's \$5,000 for three times a week pickup.'

While Wildman and PLJ helped solve part of La Jolla's trash problem, eight more cans near Bird Rock would need pickup, according to Chasan.

The PLJ contract will cover probably six of the 14 cans. PLJ can only extend their contract in Costa," Chasan said.

Ashley said the town council has been investigating garbage solutions with PLJ, mainly purchasing Big Belly Solar trashcans.

Rick Wildman and I were trying to learn more about it, what it is and what's involved in it," Ashley said. "The most exciting thing about it is it's exciting green technology that reduces the number of collections and prevents seagulls from getting into the trash.'

According to Chasan, area residents' home owners association researched trash service. So, Chasan said she contacted state their region — not to Camino de la officials regarding a grant that would replace the containers with

"I have been looking into a grant from the State of California,' Chasan said, adding that the state grant application process opens March 1. "Solar garbage cans are completely seagull proof...They meet the criteria for EPA reductions and they meet grant criteria."

Chasan plans on applying for about 30 solar garbage cans which would replace about half and give half to the city on standby, in addition to funding trash pickup, she said.

"The requirement from the grant is to prove that you can prevent garbage from going down the storm drain," Chasan said.

According to Chasan, starting March 1, she will apply to the State of California Department of Conservation grant to Increase Recycling and Reduce Trash Buildup in Storm Drains.

'A grant is a win-win," Chasan said. "Next year, PLJ can't afford

Chasan said her next step would be to start the permit process, asking La Jolla Parks and Beaches to issue permits for the receptacles.

"Eventually, yes, we'll have to ask for a permit since they're on the coastline," Chasan said.

"The really terrific news is the ability of the town council and Promote La Jolla to work together on this," Ashley said.

JROTC marksmanship takes a hit Cheers, jeers greet school board's vote

The Junior Reserve Offi-Training Corps (JROTC) marksmanship program ended last week for Mission Bay High, Point Loma High and students across the school district.

College and high school student demonstrators waved signs both celebrating and decrying JRTOC rifle ranges on campus, lining the hallways and grassy area of the Eugene Brucker Education Center during a contentious San Diego Unified School District board meeting Tuesday, Feb. 10.

Board members voted 3-2 in support of parent and student demonstrators' efforts to remove air-pellet guns from campus in light of recent off-campus shootings involving high school students.

Board President Shelia Jackson and board member Katherine Nakamura voted to keep the JROTC marksmanship program open. Board members John de Beck, John Lee Evans and Richard Barrera voted to close the firing ranges, effectively ending the marksmanship portion of the program.

During the meeting, board members praised students' peaceful ed about 100 Lincoln High School students, community organizers and parents.

Lt. Col. Brian Josten, Mission Bay High's JROTC instructor, said his students were disappointed with the school board's decision.

"What did the demonstrators gain?" Josten said. "I sure know what we've lost, but what was gained?"

Mission Bay High Principal Cheryl Seelos said a lot of hard work and requests from students brought the Marine Corps JROTC marksmanship program to Mission Bay High about a year ago. Debate swirled over the program and potential conflicts with the San Diego Unified District's "zero tolerance" policy regarding weapons on campus.

"It's a collegiate sport and has nothing to do with killing people on the street," Seelos said. "We're going to fight this [school board decision]."

The air rifles use 177caliber pellets that are slightly bigger than the more common BB used in most air pistols, JROTC officials said.

An estimated \$65,000 set aside for the program as an elective requiring helps pay for staffing. The Marine Corps pays for the rest of the Mission Bay

demonstration that includ- High program, including the cost of rifles and safety equipment, Seelos said.

Despite getting rid of the rifles and ranges, the rest of the program remains intact. School district board members voted to allow the program to fulfill physical education graduation requirements, along with the school's marching band program.

Point Loma High School Principal Barbara Samilson said her school was caught off guard by the school board's vote on the marksmanship training.

"We were definitely taken by surprise," Samilson wrote in an e-mail. "[JROTC marksmanship] teaches self-discipline, the value of hard work and practice and the value of working as team."

Representatives of Education Not Arms Coalition said at the meeting that the JROTC in high schools acts as a military recruiting tool. They said students were often encouraged to join the JROTC at schools throughout the district.

Seelos said students are not "tracked" into the Mission Bay program and that the school offers the course parents' permission.

UC planning group to hold annual election in March

The University Community Planning Group (UCPG) will hold its annual elections March 10 in an effort to fill six vacant positions on the board, including three resident seats and three business seats.

Voting members Petr Krysl, UCPG Chair Linda Colley and secretary Patricia Wilson representing UC residents — will run for re-election during the March meeting, along with voting members George Lattimer, Harry Walker and Deryl Adderson representing UC businesses.

Colley has served on UCPG since 2003, but resident Dayna Hydrick will run against the chair for the group's R-1 seat.

Colley said she has lived in UC the past 41 years, served as Curie Elementary School's PTA president, graduated from University of California, San Diego with a teaching degree and is a licensed insurance broker.

This is my third term as chair," Colley said, adding that she's served on the UCPG board since 2003. "I've led many discussions in this room on controversial topics...and I'm concerned with safety issues, fire stations, the FBA — I'm concerned with water, or lack of water, and with open

"We also got opinions from the California Attorney General and the State Lands Commission," Schaefer said. "Both came to the same conclusion: that the state legislature has the authority to amend the trust, and we did present those letters to the council.

But Paul Kennerson, attorney representing swimmer Valerie O'Sullivan in a 2004 lawsuit against the city, said the state of California agreed to be bound by the previous state judgment.

"Where is the city's honor to undergo five years of litigation with

a litigant that has been utterly successful and then pull the rug out from underneath them?" Kennerson said. "If the council thinks the troubles are over — it is not."

Bryan Pease, the Animal Protection and Rescue League's (APRL) SealWatch attorney, and others began lobbying state Sen. Christine Kehoe months ago, asking the senate to introduce a new bill amending the 1931 tidelands grant that conveyed Casa Beach from the state to the city. Kehoe said she would back the legislation but wanted a local resolution first. Pease said the solution would be simple, adding three words to the state grant. But council members concluded Tuesday that sending a

more complex resolution to Kehoe's office would be beneficial.

"They want the Legislature to give the council discretion," Schae-

District 1 City Councilmember Sherri Lightner did not return calls prior to press time. Lightner told council members she had concerns about the language of the council's resolution, and she voted alone against sending the resolution to the state. Kehoe must create and adopt a senate bill before Feb. 27, according to Pease.

Rich Jahnkow, a coordinator for the Project on Youth and Non-Military Opportunities, said having air rifles on campus sends the wrong message to students.

"[Students and parents] felt it was inconsistent with the philosophy of the district to try to encourage students to not think about using violence to solve problems," Jahnkow said. "So they felt that these [ranges] did not belong."

Former Mission Bay High School student Zulema Torres, 33, joined several students and parents from the Education Not Arms Coalition at the school board meeting. The coalition represents Latino and education groups, including the Association of Raza Educators and local high school chapters of the Movimiento Estudiantil Chicano de Aztlan (MEChA), a student political group.

"Many parents send their children to school...so they could get an education, not so they can learn to shoot weapons," Torres said.

College students also joined the debate face to face outside the school board meeting.

California College Republicans representative Matthew Donnellan, 21, rallied alongside former and current high school student supporters of the JRTOC program and said that those against the program are misinformed.

"The JROTC shapes students to be leaders. It's safe and supervised," Donnellan said.

Former San Diego State University MEChA President Luis Fuentes, 25, said high school should be a place to learn and "not train students to shoot" weapons.

About 81 students enrolled in the Mission Bay High School Marine Corps JROTC program last year, according to Josten. The entire district had an estimated 2,000 cadets last vear.

The JROTC program's 80-year history in San Diego schools show an impeccable safety record, Josten said, with zero accidents reported during its time at Mission Bay High.

The school district has had the JROTC program in high schools since 1919. San Diego High School was the first school to offer the pro-

Mission Bay High had an Army JROTC before officials moved the program to Madison High in 1962.

Dead whale found drifting off La Jolla

Lifeguards towed in the carcass of a 45-foot dead whale drifting a mile away from Boomer Beach in La Jolla on Saturday, Feb. 14.

Lifeguards towed the whale, believed to be either a fin or sei. to Fiesta Island where NOAA experts swiped blubber and skin samples for DNA tests to help determine the species. The thoroughly rotted whale carcass was then loaded onto a truck and towed to the Miramar Landfill on Sunday morning.

"It's either one of those two species," said Joe Cordaro, a wildlife biologist for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). "They're very similar in appearance but the animal had decomposed."

The whale had been slashed but it's unclear whether the injury was from a ship's propeller or from another animal, like a shark or scavenging birds, he said.

"We'll probably never determine that," said Cordaro, who estimated that the whale had been dead two weeks or more.

An average of seven dead gray whales are found floating along the California coast each year, not uncommon since the species annually migrates south. But only two or three whales of other whale species are discovered dead along the state coast each year, Cordaro said. In total, seven types of whales populate the California coastal waters, including the blue whale, gray whale, humpback whale, fin whale, sei whale, sperm whale and the rare Bryde's whale.

Turning the city into new county is a viable option

ecently, City Councilman Ben Hueso proposed the concept of consolidating city and county government and functions into one entity, like San Francisco does. The *San Diego Union-Tribune* has come out opposed to this idea.

Hueso is right and wrong. The *U-T* is wrong and right. The answer is less than Hueso's current vision but a much greater vision than the *U-T* has shown.

Predictably, the county board of supervisors isn't receptive to the idea. I imagine the 17 other cities in the county would be concerned about losing local control and would initially oppose such a measure if they were asked to participate.

There is another approach, however. Why not explore the possibility of the city of San Diego becoming California's newest — the 59th — county? Let San Diego County and the other 17 cities carry on — or invite some of those cities to join the new county if it makes fiscal sense.

Currently, San Diego County receives 38 cents back on each dollar of property tax we send to Sacramento. The county keeps some and each municipality gets some. The state average is 47 cents returned on the dollar. Los Angeles and San Francisco get better than that based on the percentage they received under a formula conceived pre-Prop 13. San Diego County suffers, and has done so for years, because we have traditionally been very fiscally prudent.

Would a new county be able to negotiate a better deal or distribute more of the city of San Diego's dollars back into the city (theoretically a new county) limits? If the answer is even a tepid maybe, then Mayor Jerry Sanders and the City Council would be derelict in their duties if they failed to investigate their options.

The county does perform some functions within the city, but, presumably, a new county would get funds for those same county functions and offset those costs. The big stumbling block could be prisons. Likely a new county would have to contract out jail services. Happily, we have a county jail in downtown already. Interestingly, if the new county was set up to contract out jail

services, it might be able to solicit bids from the current county, Orange County and maybe elsewhere — competition might beget further savings.

Would the new county be big enough, by acreage or population? The answer to both questions is yes. The city of San Diego has more than 1.2 million people. That would rank as the 16th most populous of the 58 counties in California. At 324 square miles, the new county would be nearly four times larger than San Francisco and be the sixth county with fewer than 600 square miles.

Conversely, the remaining county would be very large and have a greater population if only San Diego city splits off.

Should the city go it alone? A logical argument can be made for two counties where just San Diego County is now. Would Chula Vista, National City (Ron Morrison will kneejerk "no"), Imperial Beach and Coronado most logically be served by a proposed new county? Probably. Do the socioeconomics and distance from downtown of Encinitas, Carlsbad, San Marcos, Solana Beach, Santee, Oceanside, Vista, Escondido and Poway call for alignment with the existing, but restructured, county? Probably.

What about El Cajon, La Mesa and Lemon Grove? The latter two share lots of common boundary with San Diego but "feel" (not very scientific I know) like they should be with El Cajon in a restructured county. Finally, Del Mar presents good arguments either way. We need dialogue.

I would strongly encourage Councilmember Hueso, Mayor Sanders and the rest of the City Council to investigate creating a new city/county. Then the San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG), an existing third party with the expertise to investigate what a new county might be comprised of, could offer the forum for a dialogue to devise a plan best suited for our region. SANDAG is made up of representatives of all the potentially impacted incorporated cities and the county already.

District's budget 'miracle' unrealistic

Sixty million dollars is a lot of money. Since payroll is 80 percent of a school district's budget, the current 2010 shortfall for San Diego city schools amounts to \$48 million in lost jobs.

I have made a proposal that would preserve all of the jobs. But action is required now. So far, I am speaking to myself.

Picking away at the deficit remains the current board majority's attempt to balance a budget. The newly elected group is hanging their hat on bits and pieces of the immense total. If one ignores the \$48 million, as they seem to be doing, you are dealing with books and supplies, water, heat and electricity.

These overhead items are not easily cut, and tinkering around the margin may save a few million, but doing that is like sticking one's head in the sand to avoid danger.

The net effect of inaction is poorly considered massive cuts or a negative certification by the county superintendent.

The negative certification will increase the costs of Proposition S bonds, and can require appointment of a district czar to oversee the operations of the school system. Then the board will not have any decisions to make, because the new district czar will have the power to decide on his/her own.

To put this 2009-10 financial shortfall in perspective, the \$48 million amounts to the beginning salaries of 1,000 teachers. That represents about one-sixth of the teaching staff. Ignoring it is a total lack of fiscal competency.

The miracle expected by the board majority includes federal bailouts; stealing the required district 2 percent reserve of \$20 million (\$60 milion minus \$20 million equals \$40 million — thus 80 percent = \$32 million in salaries); and the use of other funds with "flexibility!"

We are about to lose massive numbers of enriching programs, increase class sizes and risk financial ruin because of the new board majority's unwillingness to see the realities facing this district.

The furlough of workdays I proposed can save up to \$80 million over two years and would preserve valuable programs and eliminate layoffs.

Drastic as it seems, the plan, if implemented this year, along with the examination of other savings, would preserve the board's ability to guide the district through the current minefield and keep class sizes at the present level.

I have yet to have seen any proposal that can offer the advantages and savings that the furlough plan would provide.

Melody? You bet: SDO's 'Don Quixote' subtle, affecting

Opera companions make suggestions. At the interval, mine remarked he hadn't heard any catchy tunes and maybe that's why Jules Massenet's "Don Quixote" hadn't been performed at San Diego Opera for 40 years. I hummed a few tunes for him and asked, "Didn't you get those?" Then I suggested that if he'd heard "Don Quixote" as many times as "Tosca" over the past 40 years the tunes would be familiar favorites. As we walked up the hill to the car after the performance, he too was singing "Quixote" melodies.

The primary reason for mounting a new production of "Don Quixote" is one's leading man. Singing the title role for the first time on this side of the Atlantic, Italian bass Ferruccio Furlanetto is a knockout, both dramatically and vocally. As an aside, his legs are as shapely as those of Feodor Chaliapin, who originated the role at Monte Carlo Opera Feb. 19. 1910.

Set in the Spanish countryside, the work is in fact filled with gorgeous tunes that wind their ways throughout the entire masterfully orchestrated score (conducted by Karen Keltner), whether the Knight Errant is singing of his lady love Dulcinea (mezzo-soprano Denyce Graves) or challenging windmills with his not-so-brave companion, Sancho Panza (fabulous Argentine bass-baritone Eduardo Chama). It's enough to send one into paroxysms of joy if

one has the slightest gift for melodic imprint, that set of brain functions that makes Mozart so enjoyable: his works are satisfyingly predictable and repetitive. Our brains — or at least mine love familiarity, which arrives when melody imprints on one's gray matter.

Henri Cain's libretto is deeply humane and quietly humorous. Panza is an inept helper who means well and is devoted to his master. We do not laugh at the deluded old man who goes on a quest and mistakes windmills for monsters.

We adore him for his peculiarities and purposefulness. When

Quixote is captured and beaten by brigands and tied to scenic designer Ralph Funicello's bleak, "Godot"-like tree, he prays, "Seigneur, recois mon ame (Oh, lord, receive my soul)." Then Quixote's bonds fall away and the chief bandit (Herve Blanquart) remarks on the divine fire in Quixote's face, and all kneel for the knight's blessing. It's one of opera's most beautiful moments.

From the awestruck bandits Quixote recovers Dulcinea's stolen necklace and hopes that fulfilling her charge will win her heart. In this telling, the woman is not a common strumpet, merely a small-town Dolly Levi, who sings of being older and single and the odd, nameless longing that sets in to insist there is a different kind of love. She's rather like the Marschallin in "Der Rosenkavalier," but not nearly so worldly or wise.

Weary of their attentions, Dulcinea is wooed by at least four semi-serious, semi-comic suitors (Joel Sorensen, Brian Register, Laura Portune and Rebecca Skaar) who sing delightfully. One wonders from whence Dulcinea's obvious largesse comes, especially when she sends one suitor off for "comfort" in another's arms. Hmm.

Throughout her performance, Graves sinks to vocal coarseness when employing her chest voice, giving it an unpleasant edge not in keeping with her character, unless of course Dulcinea is a bawd. This is more likely bad vocal technique than dramatic

interpretation, and it is offputting in what could be so lovely a performance. After only a moment's serious consideration of Quixote's marriage proposal, Dulcinea laughingly rebukes him, "Me marier, Moi!" ("What? Me marry?"). When Quixote crumples visibly, she regrets her cruelty, but the damage is done. The Knight has drained out of him, leaving only a worn shell of a man who forsakes his lance.

Few operas are so affecting and subtle. Massenet made a unique marriage of music and drama in five scenes. Furlanetto and Chama are an extraordinary pair — opera singers that act convincingly and poignantly,

understanding fully, as director Ian Campbell does, that quiet moments and still acting can break one's heart more readily than overblown emoting. Only hearts of stone will remain unaffected by the men's bond and by their poignant parting, during which Quixote imparts to Panza the island he promised him. It's truly great theater.

Do not miss this visually arresting, magnificently performed opera. Only two performances remain: 8 p.m. Friday, Feb. 20, and 2 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 22 at the Civic Theatre, 202 C St. For tickets and information, visit www.sdopera.com or call (619) 533-7000. ■

Time for celebration with Lyric Opera

The imagination and creativity must have been there all along, hidden under a bushel basket even after Lyric Opera of San Diego's move to the Birch North Park Theatre. To celebrate two anniversaries this month — the organization's 30th and the theater's 80th — Lyric Opera trots out a concept and knocks itself

The past consisted most usually of staid productions of Gilbert and Sullivan in the D'Oyly Carte tradition and ho-hum production of musicals, light opera and opera. Forget all that. Apparently the company has marshaled its own and newer forces to establish a new tradition, and it's high time.

General Director Leon Natker fields two one-act operettas, one the world premiere of "Rumpelstiltskin" and the other Gilbert and Sullivan's "Trial by Jury." He double casts them, hires a new young conductor, brings back an amazing talent that he exploits to the max, and imposes similar styles on each work. The gamble pays off in terms of enjoyment, visual and aural. It's an evening of amusement and amazement with little ham-handedness and much of formerly absent subtlety.

"Rumpelstiltskin" credit is due to composer Nicolas Reveles for his tongue-in-cheek explorations of musical theater and operatic styles; to artistic director J. Sherwood Montgomery for his clever adaptation of and lyrics for the grim Grimm fairy tale; and to

their graves. Whoopee to that! Reveles sends up everything and everybody from the British music hall tradition to Sondheim and Lapine's Grand Guignolish "Sweeney Todd" and to Mozart's "The Magic Flute" (or is that Leo Delibes' "Lakme"?). Then he throws in a parody of Piazzolla and a slight whiff of "Side Show."

Tenor Enrique Toral returns to play Rumpelstiltskin and Edwin, the Defendant, in "Trial by Jury." His performance as Rumpelstiltskin is downright scary, and as Edwin he is redolent of Johnny Depp in "Sweeney Todd" the film, down to his attire (costumes and makeup throughout by brilliant Pam Stompoly-Ericson) and the white streak in his hair. He also

embodies mannerisms of Charlie Chaplin's Little Tramp. Not only this, but the lad has a gorgeous voice (he'd be a great Pirelli, hint,

Lisa Archibeque also returns to grace both productions with her lovely soprano, excellent diction and saucy ingénue acting style. Identical twins and sopranos, Shelly Hart Breneman and Shauna Hart Ostrom are chirpy, operatic birds in "Rumpelstiltskin" and hysterically garbed Bridesmaids in the Gilbert and Sullivan romp, which is tuneful and filled with all we love about those works, which in themselves are parodies of all things serious.

Imbued with the spirit of these goings on, the choristers adopted character, make up and wild wigs to go along with all else. The jurists' manipulation of their 12 chairs is a choreographed marvel that ends with the simultaneous kerplop of 12 butts into their seats.

The shows are rife with such subtleties and delights, providing complementary enjoyment that one hopes will fill company coffers and attract musical theater lovers of all ages.

Remaining performances take place at 7:30 p.m. Thursday and Saturday, Feb. 19 and 21, and 2:30 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 22 at Birch North Park Theatre, University Avenue and 29th St., San Diego. 



Two local scholastic wrestling teams have battled hard despite not pinning down winning records.

At La Jolla High, head coach Ryan Lennard's team has had a tough season this year, never being able to fill a full lineup for dual meets.

"We had huge potential this season, but multiple injuries led to an inconsistent lineup," Lennard remarked. "We went 1-5 in dual meet competition this year, giving up an average of 18 points in forfeits every dual. It is always very frustrating knowing that you will be starting out with a huge points deficit to overcome. In March, UC will be traveling to Fresno for the Frosh/Soph/Kids State Championship. This April, UC's Junior Centurions will be competing in the World Championships in Reno for the first time.

UC's Kids Club is currently ranked second in the county to Poway.

"I'd like to thank the administration at UC for all the support," Needham added. ■





swiped a taste. What a creamy delight it was, topped with toasted, shredded parsnip.

Although it was on the starter menu as well, I chose the grilled octopus, so delightful I took some of it home to sample the next day, and it was even better the second time. It was a complex layering of flavors with an unexpected "pop" of heat from the shishite peppers crossed with the smokiness of green olives. I love octopus any style, from sashimi to dipped in wasabi to the grilled baby octopus I enjoyed in a little café in Santorini, so bring it on.

Never one to leave things alone, and urged by Paul to sample

away, my next was the hiramasa sashimi, thinly shaved white fish with fennel, lemon jam and sorrel. The best way I can describe it is to compare it to the Jewish version of wine and onion herring, which I adore. Paul's sashimi has its own version of pickled onions, and it is scrumptious.

I still had room to sample some more, so I chose the big-eye tuna, featuring yuzu, trout roe and a topping of crispy duck skin. You know the saying, "I could have eaten the whole thing"? Indeed I did — you can see it in the photos before I attacked it.

My companion, who obviously has a smaller appetite, opted for a sample of cured meat, selecting bresaola, a beef, and smoked duck, which to my palate seemed more like a ham. But I'm not

complaining. For my part, I chose molassesseared elk, delivered perfectly rare with a little slice of Cuban sweet potato, a spoonful of Swiss chard done with shallots and garlic and blackberry compote to add sweetness to the elk. It was wonderful!

Still to come was the

seafood stew, normally done with monkfish, lobster, shrimp and mussels and such an array of flavors that I took some of the broth home to try to track them down. Undoubtedly I missed some, but there was saffron, lemongrass, tiny bay leaves and Thai basil, I

believe. Even if I got the ingredi-

ents wrong, the chef got the fla-

vors right.

What more can I say except that if you want a special treat, go to Kitchen 1540 at L'Auberge in Del Mar, right on the main drag. Call them at (858) 259-1515. You'll be glad you did. ■

Padre 'dads' look to spring with high hopes

The Padres' rebuilding philosophy in becoming a contending team is to draft well and develop players through a productive farm system. Few, if any, will be free agents.

General manager Kevin Towers, speaking at a Feb. 12 Hall of Champions Sports at Lunch event, said it is the desire of the new management team to go in that direction.

Manager Bud Black, also appearing, assured the audience that this year's team will be a vast improvement over last year's 63-99 disappointment.

"We spent more money than we ever had in the amateur draft," Towers said. "Last year we had as strong a signing class than anyone in baseball. We spent \$5 to \$6 million in international signings.

"The free agency market is hurting because of the economy. The players who are in arbitration right now are in better shape."

Towers agreed that it was the desire of the new ownership team to stress building a strong farm system to reach its goal. John Moorad, who heads the syndicate that is buying the team, will move in as the CEO, replacing Sandy Alderson. It's a position he previously held with the Arizona Diamondbacks.

The Padres will audition 21 of their leading minor leaguers when they join the 40-man Spring Camp roster. Among those being showcased will be hard-throwing pitchers Wade LeBlanc, Josh Geer and Cesar Ramos.

Towers and Black pinned last year's problem on a bullpen that

could not deliver between starter and closer.

"Our middle relievers let us down," Towers said.

With eight to 10 fighting for five spots, he feels that problem will be shored up. However, the Trevor Hoffman "closer" gong will have to be replaced this year by a Bell — Heath Bell.

Towers said that trimming the budget closer to \$40 million was the primary reason for letting Hoffman and Khalil Greene go. A big chunk remains since the deal with the Chicago Cubs for pitching ace Jake Peavy fell through.

The current payroll is believed to be \$44 million, with eight players guaranteed \$32 million. Some of the other 17 may be bordering on the major league minimum of \$400,000. Instead, Peavy will resume his No. 1 starting assign-

ment, followed by Chris Young.

"Third, fourth and fifth spots will be determined by the end of spring," Black said.

"There are expectations every year," Towers added. "But look what happened at Tampa Bay. It's hard to pick a favorite in the Western Division since everyone is loading up on pitching.

"Overall, we have to stay healthy, have less strikeouts, more contact players, steal some bases and do some drag bunting."

Black regards the acquisition of utility man Curt Floyd from Tampa Bay as a big plus.

"He has post-season experience (with the Mets and Rays) and could be the team leader we didn't have last year," he said.

The third through fifth starters will be determined following spring drills.

Towers said it's going to be different without Trevor out there.

"Bell is a little more of a crazy animal...and doesn't lack confidence," he said. "He feels he can take off as Trevor did."


guard in "The Reader." I feel she is much more real than Meryl Streep as the nun in "Doubt" with that phony Brooklyn accent. But Streep has been nominated a million times and the acting community may reward her for her

Best Actor for me is a toss-up. I select Mickey Rourke for not only a sensational performance in The Wrestler" but for pulling off the greatest comeback of any star in recent memory. Frank Langella did a sterling job capturing the subtleties of Richard Nixon in "Frost/Nixon." I loved Sean Penn in "Milk." But I think the Academy may lean toward Brad ("Benjamin Button") Pitt. On the other hand, they love comebacks and Rourke has that sewn up.

Best Supporting Actor goes hands down to the late **Heath** Ledger in "The Dark Knight." He created such an original, interesting, curious character that he deserves it for his creativity. I thought newcomer Michael Shannon was incredible in "Revolutionary Road" and loved Josh Brolin in "Milk."

Best Supporting Actress should go to the heartbreaking performance of Viola Davis in "Doubt." On screen for eight minutes, she does no less a good job than Beatrice Straight in "Network" and Judi Dench in "Shakespeare In Love" for their oh-sobrief Oscar-winning parts.

winter months. The area's diverse environment of ocean, desert, mountains and lakes provides a wide array of habitats for bird species. Of the 750 bird species in America, 500 reside in San Diego County — that includes the highest number of rare or endangered species in the country.

The county is also a flyaway for migrating birds. In the winter, birds from as far away as Alaska and Canada will journey through San Diego County on their way to the warmer climates of the Amer-

Bird author, illustrator and expert David Allen Sibley is the keynote speaker who will discuss the challenges of creating a field guide to birds. In an interview with the San Diego Audubon Society, Sibley said the fact that birds can fly enthralls him.

"Since they move so effortlessly and quickly in and out of view, you never know what you'll find when you go for a walk," Sibley said. "Sometimes you'll be able to watch it for minutes, or sometimes just get a fleeting glimpse."

Sibley named some of his top favorite birds: warblers for their bright colors and indicating the arrival of spring; owls for their mystery; ravens for their character; and gulls for their endless identification challenges.
