San Diego's Jewish Film Festival has grown in scope and influence to become the nation's third largest after San Francisco and Boston.

This year the film festival will showcase 51 films, ranging from feature-length and short films to documentaries and animation from Feb. 10 to 21 at five cinemas in San Diego and North County.

Festival producer Sandra Kraus described the series as "the best cinema and independent films that you'll find in San Diego."

Film topics range from a Jewish man who discovers he has a different biological father who happens to be a pig farmer to Debbie Ford's self-help film on learning about the shadow that haunts and blesses one's life.

Opening night features an Israeli movie called "A Matter of Size" about a 340-pound man who finds a new calling for his girth while working as a dishwasher at a Japanese restaurant: sumo wrestling. (The film screens on Feb. 10 at 7 p.m. and Feb. 18 at 5 p.m. at the AMC La Jolla movie theater.)

Two decades ago, the San Diego Center for Jewish Culture launched the festival with four films at the Sherwood Auditorium at the Museum of Contemporary Art in La Jolla.

"I think films are sexy. And I've always thought that films appeal to a mass audience," festival founder Joyce Axelrod said.

An elderly woman who rode her bicycle to the event became the festival's first underwriter when she decided to dedicate a film to her husband. The

Torreys crush Chieftains in hoops contest

The La Jolla Country Day (LJCD) Torreys defeated the Clairemont Chieftains, 62-22, in a non-league basketball game at Country Day on Saturday, Jan. 30.

LJCD opened the contest by jumping out to a quick 8-1 lead behind the play of 6-foot-5 sophomore center Frankie Bamford. However, Cody Bermudes, a 5-foot-9 junior point guard, came right back and buried a 3-pointer to pull Clairemont to within three at 8-4.

"They can play with anyone," Torreys coach Ryan Meier said of the Chieftains. "But Frankie has been performing phenomenally for us."

The Hershfield brothers (Jake and Max) also performed well, combining for the last seven Country Day points of the quarter, giving LJCD a 15-6 edge at the end of the first period.

"We came out with some intensity," Meier said.

Clairemont seemed to be lacking intensity as the Torreys outscored them 22-7 in the second quarter to take a commanding 37-13 cushion into the locker room at halftime.

"We've been in desperate need of wins," Meier said. "They (Chieftains) are an athletic team, though."

After the intermission, Clairemont came out and showed some athleticism as baskets by Bermudes, 6-0 senior guard Marcus Darby and 6-7 forward Chris Bonner kept the margin from widening much. But the Chieftains still trailed by a titanic amount (46-20) at the end of the third quarter.

It was more of the same in the fourth quarter as Country Day continued to pour it on. In the final period, LJCD got field goals from Bamford, Max Hershfield, 6-4 junior Ryan Watt, 5-9 sophomore Kai Tuites, 5-10 sophomore Nick Schlossberg, and 6-1 junior Kevin Kuntz to seal the victory. The Torreys improved their record to 11-7, while Clairemont fell to 8-14.

Bamford led Country Day with a game-high 14 points and was followed in the scoring column by Watt (9 points), Schlossberg (3 points), Tuites (2 points), Kuntz (2 points), Jake Hershfield (13 points), Max Hershfield (11 points), 6-5 freshman Ziad Damonhoury (5 points) and 5-11 sophomore Jonathan Brewster (3 points).

Committee focuses on boxes, baskets

The plethora of news boxes scattered across the village continues to irk the Streetscape/Beautification Committee, which would like to see the newspapers condensed into one large dispenser and the trade magazines disappear. The committee met Jan. 25.

"I don't think the city should subsidize what is essentially a billboard on our streets," Glen Rasmussen said of the trade publications.

Rasmussen is president of the Streetscape/Beautification committee and a trustee of Promote La Jolla.

Last year, Promote La Jolla had earmarked \$6,000 to purchase a few of the community news racks as pilots to gauge community reaction to the bulky structures. That money is no longer in this year's budget, considering Promote La Jolla's financial missteps and investigation by the city. Still, the Streetscape/Beautification Committee plans to ask news vendors to voluntarily place their newspapers into a community news rack.

"We want to have a strategic place for legitimate newspapers and not have them be like tumbleweeds across the village," said Egon Kafka, a committee member.

Hanging baskets

The Street/Beautification Committee continues to hammer out details for replacing hanging baskets on lampposts.

The group has agreed the hanging baskets should conserve more water by using thicker pots and more drought-tolerant plants, and

should use recycled water if possible. Sidewalk planters are still being considered as an alternative or addition to the hanging baskets. The group agreed different-sized pots may be appropriate for certain locations, since the 24-inch pots hanging outside Hotel Parisi, for example, may be too large for the entire village. Promote La Jolla has earmarked \$25,000 to replace the hanging baskets in its budget through July. Each pot will cost approximately \$250 to replace and maintain for a year for a total cost of \$59,000. The committee will continue to finalize details before seeking bids.

The Streetscape/ Beautification Committee will next meet Monday, Feb. 22 at 5:30 p.m. at 1150 Silverado St. For information call (858) 454-1444. ■

La Jolla man pleads guilty to stabbing in PB

Agahan Alemdar, 23, of La Jolla, will be sentenced Feb. 10 after pleading guilty to stabbing a man he had an argument with in a courtyard of a Pacific Beach apartment complex. Alemdar faces a maximum four-year prison term in the Aug. 3, 2009, assault upon Nathaniel Thompkins, said Deputy District Attorney Steve Marquardt.

Alemdar stabbed Thompkins in the neck and Thompkins had to receive emergency surgery in a hospital.

The incident took place around 4 p.m. at an apartment building at 1038 Hornblend St. Alemdar drove off in a green BMW, but surrendered to San Diego Police the next day.

San Diego Superior Court Judge Howard Shore changed his \$100,000 bail to no bail following the guilty plea on Jan. 11.

Alemdar admitted to personally inflicting "great bodily injury" to the victim, Marquardt said. Alemdar remains in the George Bailey Detention Facility.

Snorkelers rescued off Shell Beach

Last weekend's high surf and strong rip currents sent lifeguards into the water to rescue two people snorkeling at Shell Beach in La Jolla and a surfer at Black's Beach on Jan. 31.

Lifeguards rescued the two snorkelers at Shell Beach, north of Children's Pool, after they were swept away by strong rip currents around 1:30 p.m., according to lifeguard Lt. Andy Lerum.

A seasonal lifeguard in his mid-20s was injured when his board hit him in the back while surfing at Black's Beach around 2:25 p.m.

Two La Jolla Shores lifeguards and a supervisor responded to the 911 call with a truck and Jetski, leaving two lifeguards to monitor La Jolla Shores, Lerum said.

Recent storms had washed away the access road, however, and the lifeguards had to run the last 300 yards to the injured surfer.

The fire department helicopter transported the surfer to Scripps Memorial

Hospital, where he was treated for a contusion but did not break any bones.

Peters picks Port position over CCC

Former District 1 City Councilman Scott Peters will not serve as an alternate for the California Coastal Commission, since the state Attorney General's Office informed Peters he could not simultaneously represent the San Diego Port Commission and the Coastal Commission.

"I wish to remain a member of the Port Commission, where I have important work on economic development and environmental protection in the San Diego region," Peters wrote in a Jan. 27 letter to the governor's office. "Accordingly, I regret that I must hereby decline my appointment as an alternate member of the Coastal Commission."

Coastal commissioner Khatchik Achadjian of San Luis Obispo had appointed Peters as her alternate. Peters

previously served on the Coastal Commission from 2002-'05.

Both positions are unpaid.

Holiday Inn, neighbors monitor illegal dumping

The empty lot next to the Holiday Inn on La Jolla Boulevard had become a dumping ground for someone's furniture. Except that this person — or persons — seems to have a never-ending supply of couches that continue to find their way to the Electric Avenue alleyway in the middle of the night. Couches were appearing two or three times per week for five years.

"It was an absolute abuse of the citizens of La Jolla," said Glen Rasmussen, president of the Streetscape/Beautification committee and a trustee of Promote La Jolla. "If couches were back there, the homeless would sleep on them."

The Streetscape/Beautification Committee, a joint committee of Promote La Jolla and the La Jolla Town Council, worked with neighbors and the Holiday Inn to periodically watch the lot for culprits. Meanwhile, Junk MD agreed to haul the discarded furniture away for free.

"Junk MD is the real hero," said Susan Knapp, general manager at the Holiday Inn. "They came and dumped it at no cost. They came three or four times in the past eight months."

Two months ago, a Holiday Inn manager caught two men dropping off some bar bells and a bench press. The men, in their 20s, drove away when the clerk asked if they had permission to leave the items. So far, no couches have appeared.

"Everyone is looking for a good spot to put their stuff and this seemed like a good place," said Holiday Inn manager Randy Abbley. ■

unnamed benefactress met Axelrod at a coffee shop five times to make small payments until she had funded the film.

"We asked them to stand at the next festival," Axelrod said. "Here are two lovely elderly people who are smiling from ear to ear and I just felt like I wanted to weep. I was just so touched by the humbled beginnings that we had."

Festival producer Sandra Kraus gives the *La Jolla Village News* the scoop:

What is the mission of the Jewish Film Festival?

"Our goal has always been to bring the Jewish culture to the San Diego community and to present it in such a way that it builds bridges and creates new relationships, and to show people that Jewish film can touch everyone's lives. It's not just if you're Jewish."

How long have you been the producer?

This is my fourth year as the producer of the festival, and I've been involved in the festival for seven years now.

The San Diego Jewish Film Festival has grown from three films and 100 viewers at its premiere 20 years ago to 51 films and thousands of viewers today. How?

"There's no doubt that it has everything to do with the support of the San Diego community and the people who have co-founded and chaired and worked on the film festival committee for the past 20 years. We have over 65 people who sit on the committee and more than 100 volunteers who help run the festival. Our founding chair, Joyce Axelrod, is still extremely involved with the festival. We've only had three festival chairs to date. The people who sit on the committee have stood by it for all these years so the consistency and support is there."

What are the criteria for selecting films?

"There needs to be some kind of Jewish content or implication in the film. Sometimes it's obvious that it's a film that takes place about the Holocaust or Israeli issues. Sometimes it's not as obvious. The film might be about a family living in New York City and the implications of a daughter marrying a non-Jewish man. Any films from Israel, we'll consider. If the filmmaker is Jewish but the film has no Jewish content, it's not eligible for the festival."

What does the future hold?

"We are reaching out into the North County coastal area. We have a new venue in La Costa. We're always trying to cross-promote within other non-Jewish organizations when we can, which is almost on every film. With the LGBT community, we have two films: 'Chicks in White Satin' and 'Off and Running.' For Latin films, there's 'La Camara Oscura' [based in Buenos Aires]. We're also working with the Asian film festival."

Baby & Me Movie: Moms and dads should pack their stroller and bring their babies to a screening of "Adam's Wall" on Feb. 15 at 11 a.m. "Adam's Wall" takes place in an ethnically diverse neighborhood in Montreal where a Jewish girl and Lebanese boy fall in love but must face the familial, generational and political barriers that separate them. The film screens at the David & Dorothea Garfield Theatre at 4126 Executive Drive. Tickets cost \$7.50.

Teen Screen Night: Teenagers 18 years and under are invited to a free pizza dinner and the screening of "Eli & Ben" on the festival's closing night, Feb. 21. Eli's father, Ben, is accused of taking bribes and is arrested. Eli believes his father is innocent but begins to discover the truth when questioned by the police.

Earlier in the week, LJCD defeated the visiting Santa Fe Christian Eagles, 46-43, in another non-league game on Jan. 27.

"Santa Fe Christian is an amazing team," Meier said. "They shoot the ball really well."

The Torreyes trailed by a score of 41-36 before rallying and closing the game with a 10-2 run to win it.

"We could've quit," Meier said. "But we sucked it up, played some defense and came away with a victory."

Bamford (24 points, 12 rebounds, eight blocked shots) finished two blocks shy of a triple-double. He was followed in the Country Day scoring column by Watt (9 points), Tuites (3 points), 6-1 junior Alex Perez (8 points) and 6-0 freshman Sage Burmeister (2 points). ■

What the hay? SDPD sells horses

Canines also trimmed as city tries to rein in budget

The San Diego Police Department's equestrian unit will no longer roam sprawling Balboa Park's canyons, walkways and streets. The team's members are being reined in by budget cuts after 15 years of service.

The cuts are part of a \$12.5 million trimming that includes the Harbor Police, some police automobiles, one-third of the canine unit and eventual layoffs of 84 office workers and investigators, according to assistant police chief Bob Kanaski.

Seven horses, trailers, tack and saddles were scheduled to be sold at an online auction that began Feb. 1, and will run through Feb. 10. Viewing of the horses is scheduled for today, Feb. 4, from 9 a.m. to noon. Pickup of horses sold is scheduled for Feb. 16-18 at the stables based in Balboa Park, according to a police press release.

"Average age of these horses is between nine and 12 years old," Kanaski said. "Horses can live from 25 to 35 years, so these are still juveniles. The buyer would get long usage with them."

"According to my sergeant, Bret Righthurst, we've had about 20 to 30 inquiries concerning the auction. The bidding should be pretty spirited."

Righthurst was once a member of the unit.

"We have used the horses at the beach and for crowd control. They've done a pretty good job for us but mostly for public relations rather than enforcement," he said. "Most agencies are cutting the mounted police enforcement units. Boston had one of the longest-running horse units and they're eliminating that."

Seven officers and one sergeant with the mounted unit will be placed on other duties.

The main focus during these changes is to ensure that there are enough officers out on the field, Kanaski said.

The police department cutback is part of Mayor Jerry Sanders' order to close an overall \$179 million city budget gap. Sanders formerly served as police chief.

The removal of the horse patrol represents a sav-

ing of \$282,000 when one considers specialty pay, food, the veterinarian, saddles, tack, trailers and cars.

As for the Harbor Patrol boats, Kanaski said they belong to the state of California.

In addition, 12 dogs have been retired from the canine unit.

"That leaves me with 21 full units," Kanaski said. "Right now I have six sergeants who have dogs."

The cost of an effective police dog service team is expensive. The typical costs include the purchase of the dog, vehicle, handlers' pay and training, and the daily expenses — food and veterinary care.

"We're doing everything to find a place for them, whether in retirement, to another agency or return to the vendor," Kanaski said. "They're not trained to be a regular family dog."

The dismissal of the workers is being negotiated with the Municipal Employees Assn.

The Central Division, which also covers downtown San Diego and Logan Heights, will assume law enforcement duties in Balboa Park. ■

Earthquakes and economic development

Every natural disaster, like the proverbial dark cloud, supposedly has a silver lining.

Images of the devastation visited on Haiti by the major earthquake that struck the island recently have prompted outpourings of heartfelt sympathy for the tens of thousands of people who lost their lives and promises of aid for those who miraculously survived.

But after grieving over the human toll, some commentators have pointed to the golden opportunity the tragedy supplies for jump-starting economic development in the hemisphere's poorest country.

Think of all the jobs that will be created in rebuilding Port-au-Prince's presidential palace, its port facilities and other infrastructure destroyed by nature's wrath! Money will pour in from the United States, China and Western Europe to succor the earthquake's victims and to finance repairs and new construction activity. Haiti will rise from the ashes and be lifted out of poverty. Or so the story goes.

Nothing could be further from the truth.

In a pamphlet titled "What Is Seen and What Is Not Seen," published in 1850, Frederic Bastiat tells the story of a young man caught breaking a pane of glass at a local bakery. Seeing the shattered glass on the sidewalk, passersby are in agreement: "It's an ill wind that blows no good. [But] such accidents keep industry going ... What would become of glaziers if no one ever broke a window?"

A glazier is called to replace the pane for a fee of, say, \$100, and goes home saying a silent prayer for juvenile delinquents. Seeing only this, the passersby are erroneously led to conclude that, because a job has been "created," breaking the window wasn't such a bad thing after all.

Yet what the passersby fail to see is that the baker has lost \$100. Because he has been forced to replace the broken window, he will not be able to spend that sum on anything else, such as a new apron, the flour needed to bake more bread or a promised bonus to his employees. The glazier is better off, but the baker is equally worse off. Before the boy appeared on the scene, the baker had both \$100 in the bank and a serviceable window; afterwards he has only a window.

Bastiat's story teaches that there is no benefit to society in general when property is destroyed, whether by young hooligans or by Mother Nature. Spending necessary to replace existing assets cannot be used to create new ones.

Its reconstruction financed largely by monies transferred from taxpayers living beyond the earthquake's reach, Haiti, like the glazier, will receive an injection of wealth. But, concluding that the world as a whole is better off commits the fallacy of the broken window. On the contrary, like the baker, donor nations are made worse off. Before the earthquake struck, the United States had the \$100 million it has committed to spend and Port-au-Prince was habitable; afterwards, we will have a rebuilt nation but not \$100 million.

Massive injections of new monies earmarked for relief and reconstruction also predictably lead to corruption and waste. Donors therefore can expect fewer benefits for Haiti than they thought they were paying for.

It is absurd to say that the earthquake will be good for Haiti's economy. If that were true, why did the world await natural disaster? If Haiti needed an economic boost, we should have carpet-bombed it years ago. The plain fact is that disasters make everyone permanently poorer by the values of the lives and property they destroy. Earthquakes have no silver linings.

Technology will help fight graffiti

Most residents work hard to maintain the beauty of their homes and neighborhoods and nothing can ruin a community's image faster than graffiti.

But graffiti is not just a quality of life issue. It is an expensive problem for cities and public agencies that have to spend money to erase graffiti; money that could be better spent on services for the public.

It is a threat to public safety. Graffiti is an open invitation to gangs and other criminals to invade a neighborhood and create havoc and damage. It's a sign that says, "Do crime here." It affects our local economy by scaring away businesses, or burdening businesses with unnecessary expenses to paint over graffiti.

Today, however, public officials around the region can arm our neighborhoods with a new weapon against graffiti — technology.

As a county supervisor, I have had the pleasure of encouraging an effort to implement a GPS-based system that can track and analyze graffiti and provide valuable information to law enforcement and prosecutors. I've asked the San Diego Association of Governments to make this a region-wide project.

A system, called Graffiti Tracker, was pioneered in Escondido. Public works crews use a GPS-enabled camera to take photos of graffiti, marking it with the date and time and exact location of the graffiti.

Because taggers often mark their work with monikers or other identifiers, the program can analyze graffiti to link it to the specific tagger who created it. That information is kept in a database that law enforcement investigators and prosecutors can search to determine patterns or particular geo-



graphic areas of that tagger.

This allows investigators to narrow down the location of a tagger. For example, in Escondido, Graffiti

Tracker showed that one tagger was responsible for a series of markings along a particular street on the way to a local school. That allowed investigators to zero in on a tagger who lived near the school. Last week, Escondido police announced that they had used Graffiti Tracker again to help arrest a tagger suspected of causing an estimated \$50,000 in damages.

Very simply, we're going to target the taggers.

Since taggers often hit more than one location, it gives prosecutors a bounty of information that they can use to issue multiple counts against a tagger. The more cases, the larger the restitution that prosecutors can seek in a court ruling for damages caused to a community.

For example, Escondido was awarded \$185,000 in restitution last year from taggers caught using the Graffiti Tracker system.

"Leveraging this technology to join more cases together means vandals are held accountable for the totality of their crimes," said District Attorney Bonnie Dumanis.

Criminal taggers don't confine themselves to one particular public jurisdiction. Some tag in neighboring cities and communities.

That's why taking a regional approach to graffiti is so critical. Adopting a singular technology

throughout the region at any given time can provide a greater wealth of information to law enforcement about taggers, and lower costs for all the participating agencies.

Currently, only three jurisdictions, Escondido, Oceanside and the County Sheriff's Department, use Graffiti Tracker. Sheriff Bill Gore made it operational in the unincorporated areas of the county and each of the nine contracted cities the Sheriff serves — Del Mar, Encinitas, Imperial Beach, Lemon Grove, Poway, San Marcos, Santee, Solana Beach and Vista.

District Attorney Bonnie Dumanis and I partnered to bring this program to the SANDAG Board of Directors, which voted recently to look into expanding such a system across the region.

The City of San Diego currently uses a different approach to graffiti abatement but I am hopeful they will become a vital participant in a regional, collaborative effort against graffiti.

As you can see, the benefits of a system like Graffiti Tracker are many. It frees up officers to spend more time on criminal investigations and that means more crimes will be solved. Vandals can be targeted to pay to clean up the damage they've caused. It reduces overall graffiti and can help law enforcement identify areas likely to be targeted for graffiti. It also provides additional benefits by giving agencies a database of information that they can use to apply for grant funding to eradicate blight.

I strongly encourage all the cities in the region, along with transportation and utility companies that also suffer graffiti damage, to join SANDAG's coordinated regional effort.

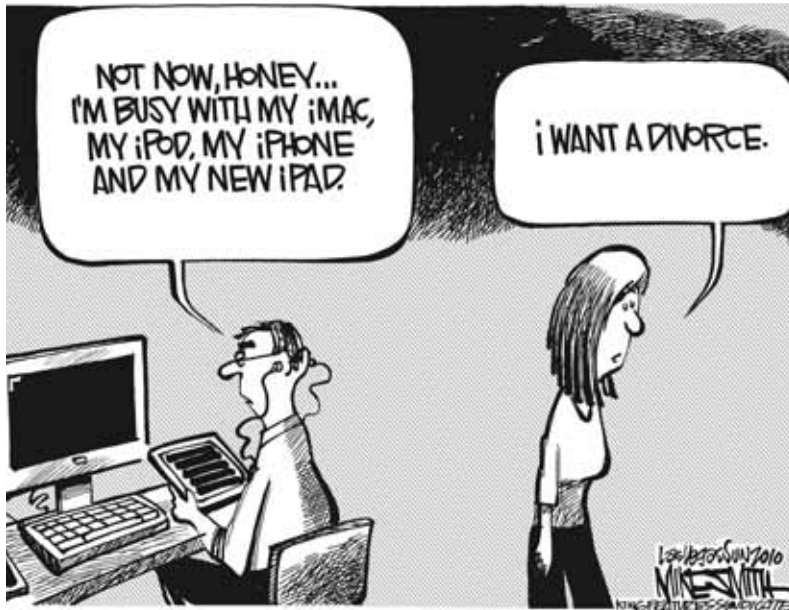
Make no mistake, graffiti is a scourge upon the community. A coordinated approach is our best weapon against graffiti. ■

Kind words from the critics

Starry, starry nights



January is traditionally the time for performing arts awards shows, not just on national TV but also here in our own area. Dustin Hoffman said, "A good review from the critics is just another stay of execution," while Eli Wallach quipped, "Having the critics praise you is like having the hangman say you've got a pretty neck." Such sentiments notwithstanding, our local drama critics compared notes and bestowed their commendations on dozens of theater folk for their outstanding accomplishments of 2009. They did this at not just one, but two awards shows in late January.

Theatre diva and drama critic Pat Launer attends plays almost as often as

most of us go to dinner. Her reviews are available on the Internet, and also on her Center Stage program every Friday and Saturday at 9 a.m. on KSDS 88.3 FM. She also appears monthly on KUSI TV (channel 51; cable 9). Since 1998, she's produced The Patté Awards for Theatre Excellence — because, she says, "Theater makers ain't chopped liver." This year's Patté Awards, held at the Westin Gaslamp Quarter, was the 13th annual — Pat called it her "Star Mitzvah." It was a glittery gala affair, starting with a reception and a seated dinner. The awards presentation and entertainment began with Pat taking the stage in an outfit worthy of The King and I. "Am I glad to be here with you tonight?" she asked. "Yes, Siam." She said the event would honor "the best of the best on San Diego stages," and it did. Dozens of awards were presented for outstanding achievement in numerous categories, and the Shiley Lifetime Achievement Award went to Robert Smyth and Deborah Gilmore Smyth for their participation in more than 100 productions over three decades. A scholarship, The Dea and Osborn Hurston Award for a Promising Young Theatremaker, was given to 16-year-old Alexis Montes. Short videos were shown, and throughout the evening, live entertainment was provided by groups of as many as 16 performers on stage. If you missed the event, or attended but want to see it all again, tune in to the Channel 4 San Diego TV broadcast at 8 p.m. on Feb. 12, or 7 p.m. on Feb. 13.

Not to be outdone, the San Diego Theatre Critics Circle (SDTCC) held their own event a week later at the Museum of Contemporary Art in La Jolla. The eighth annual Craig Noel Awards, named in honor of the beloved director whose career with the Old Globe Theatre spanned 72 years, lacked one important attendee: Mr. Noel himself, who, at the age of 94, is in failing health. The event, which honored the best San Diego stage work of 2009, began with a bustling reception featuring a fabulous food buffet. Later, in the Sherwood Auditorium, SDTCC presented 37 awards in 27 categories, including the new Outstanding Young Artist award, which went to Ian Brininstool. D. J. Sullivan received the Lifetime Achievement Award for decades of acting, teaching and directing local actors, and Darko Tresnjak was honored for his body of work in San Diego (particularly with the Globe's Summer Shakespeare Festival). Award recipients gave exuberant (and often humorous) acceptance speeches, and on-stage performing groups provided further entertainment.

Both of these awards events point out the vibrant vitality of theater in the San Diego area, and the depth of talent that is attracted to our stages. If you haven't been attending our local theaters, you're missing something truly wonderful!

San Diego Opera provides traditional 'La bohème'

Traditionalists will be pleased with San Diego Opera's (SDO) 10th production of Giacomo Puccini's 1896 operatic tragedy, "La bohème," which is performed upon John Conklin's familiar set, which is owned by SDO. The colorful 19th century artists and habitués of Café Momus are clad in Martin Pakledinaz's familiar costumes.

There is nothing here to surprise or dismay, not the company of exciting young American singers, not the conducting of Karen Keltner, the playing of San Diego Symphony or the staging of E. Loren Meeker in her company debut. What is surprising, however, is the singing of company debutant Piotr Beczala, who sings the tenor role of Rodolfo, which he has done abroad and at San Francisco Opera to great acclaim. It's one of those rare occasions when a legendary singer proves even more exciting than his reputation and press hoopla has promised. He is handsome and a good actor and collaborator in this piece, which requires a certain camaraderie to achieve its warmth.

Warm it is, full of bonhomie, love and lust in the first three acts, tragic

in the fourth. Rodolfo (Beczala), Marcello (Jeff Mattsey), Colline (Afred Walker) and Schaunard (Malcolm MacKenzie) are all artists, living in an unheated garret in 19th century Paris. Tuberculosis is rampant in the city due to squalid living conditions and poverty. Marcello's former flame, Musetta (Priti Gandhi) reenters his life, and Rodolfo falls in love with Mimi (Ellie Dehn), a seamstress who importunes him to light her candle. The joy of the opera is its amazingly beautiful score, especially for the tempestuous third act in which Mimi and Rodolfo reconcile while Marcello and Musetta noisily break up.

Dehn, an 11th-hour substitute for previously announced Anja Harteros, acquits herself well, displaying a lovely voice and natural acting ability. Her dynamic contrasts are exquisite. Her pairing with Beczala is thrilling throughout. Both have terrific top voices, his with extraordinary ease and beautiful quality, hers, possessed of a thrilling pianissimo.

The others are often thrilling as well. Gandhi, born in India and raised in Del Mar, is a UCSD gradu-

Pelican lives sometimes too brief

Flooding, downed trees, power outages. The recent series of storms have not only battered the land but the ocean and its dependents, too. California brown pelicans (*Pelecanus occidentalis californicus*) are some of the weather's casualties. Though seabird feathers provide insulation against cold and water, they are not completely waterproof, so pelicans must regularly return to roosting sites following a fishing foray to dry out and rest. Nonstop drenching prevents recovery. And finding food during these times is harder because their prey — sardines, mackerel, and especially anchovies — travel at greater depths to avoid turbulent surface conditions.

Add to this wretched water quality. Rainwater mixes with oil, grease and other contaminants, particularly from roadways, landscaping and agricultural areas, where it ends up in storm drains, travels downward to the coast and is flushed into the ocean. Because petroleum products float, pelican feathers become greasy, which affects their insulative properties. The result is many hypothermic, undernourished pelicans. Further, when pelicans groom themselves, they inadvertently consume the contaminants. Consequently, extended storm systems cut life short for many pelicans.

I interacted with a victim of such cir-

cumstance while strolling the boardwalk at La Jolla Shores during a lull in the storm action. The pelican was crouched on the ground amid the bushes below the hotel restaurant. After phoning the wonderful nonprofit organization Wildlife Assist, Marie Molloy, president and founder, met me at the end of Vallecitos Street to rescue the distressed bird. She felt under the wings for warmth. There was none. She picked up the bird. It was "light as a feather." The pelican was suffering from hypothermia and starvation. Marie transported the animal to SeaWorld for rehabilitation but the pelican died overnight. Since the storms, SeaWorld reports an upswing in receiving sick or injured pelicans, as has the International Bird Rescue Research Center in San Pedro. It's tough to see an animal suffer.

When birds first took flight 37 to 65 million years ago, some scientists say pelicans were there, and they haven't changed much since. The brown pelican, which exists solely in the Western Hemisphere, weighs up to 8 pounds, grows to just over 4 feet long and boasts a wingspan of more than 6 feet. Of the seven pelican species, only the brown hunts for fish by making spectacular, head-first kamikaze dives from as high as 60 feet, when scanning the ocean for schooling fish, which give themselves away by having reflective silvery scales. A pelican surfacing with an unsuspecting

fish trapped in its expandable pouch tilts its bill down to drain out water, then tosses its head back to swallow. What a contrast from other pelican species, which swim along like ducks, daintily dipping their heads to gulp down fish.

Take a look at the colony loafing cliffside off the Cove. Some sport dramatic plumage, indicating the breeding colors displayed by both males and females. Above the gray-brown body, the chest and head feathers shift from white to golden, the eyes, generally yellow-gray, turn blue, and skin surrounding the eyes

becomes bright pink. The otherwise pale throat pouch flares bright red, and the back of the standard-issue white neck turns a rich chestnut. Juvenile plumage is a muted brown above with a white belly. Breeding times are heavily dependent on the abundance or scarcity of food.

After some 40 million years of survival, the brown pelican nearly became extinct due to pesticide runoff contaminating the nearshore ocean environment. From ingestion by minute plankton, the poisons worked their way up the food chain to pelicans, the canaries in the coal mine. One pesticide, endrin, killed pelicans outright, and another, DDT, resulted in thin-shelled eggs that broke under the weight of incubating parents. Banning DDT and designating the birds as endangered on both state and federal lists was done in time to rescue the birds from the brink. Yet even now, 40 years later, low levels of DDT residues persist in the tissues of some birds and their eggshells. DDT can remain stable in the environment for

decades, because it is stored in body fat. During times of stress and malnutrition, like recent storm events, the fatty acid deposits may be broken down and metabolized, releasing the poisons into the bird's system. DDT is still in use around the world and remains a threat, not only to brown pelicans but also to other seabirds and birds of prey. As an aside, though DDT has diminished in the environment, it is still widely present and is used elsewhere around the world. The Environmental Protection Agency lists



the pesticide as a probable human carcinogen. Human and fish food for thought.

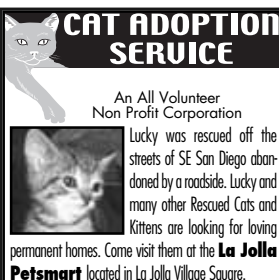

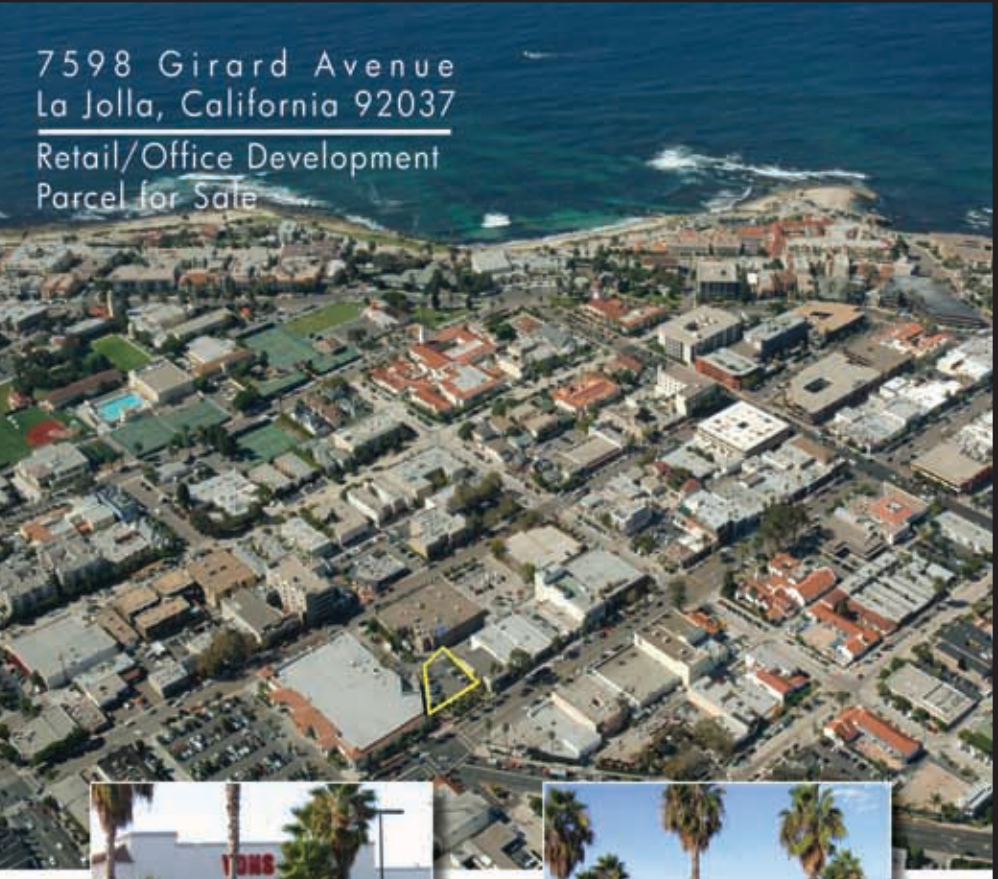
