Local dancers celebrate culture through meticulous movement

Susie Nguyen, ranked 15th in the world by ESPN for her salsa dancing, is less than five feet tall, but her vivacious personality, ambition and entrepreneurialism have made her dancing career a notable success. Nguyen, once a sales executive, quit her prosperous career four years ago to begin Ooh La La Dance Company, located in the La Jolla YMCA Firehouse at 7877 Herschel Ave.

"I wanted to bring dance to the La Jolla community and beyond," said Nguyen, a Bird Rock resident who teaches people of all ages and skill levels, often fusing vintage burlesque with modern Latin dance.

The daughter of conservative Vietnamese parents, Nguyen wasn't necessarily encouraged to pursue dancing during her youth.

"I started out as a cheerleader ... and a horrible dancer," said Nguyen. "But I kept with it. I helped put myself through college with scholarships for cheerleading and dance."

A graduate of San Diego State University, she

Planners to revisit appeal procedure

La Jolla CPA's credibility 'at stake' as
developer alleges open-meeting violations

The La Jolla Community Planning Association (LJCPA) is revisiting its appeal procedures in the face of a 30-day deadline issued by attorneys for developer Bob Whitney on March 2, who is asking the board to set aside an appeal of his proposed development in La Jolla Shores or face potential litigation.

Robin Madaffer, an attorney from Schwartz, Heidel, Sullivan, LLP in San Diego, wrote to the association charging that the LJCPA had violated the Brown Act in its actions relating to the Whitney project, a plan to build a dual residential/commercial building at 2202 and 2206 Avenida de la Playa.

Madaffer also sent a letter to the City of San Diego on Feb. 8 outlining the allegations.

The Brown Act, more formally the Ralph M. Brown Act, is a California law that defines how government agencies conduct business and is supposed to create transparency in public meetings.

Whitney's attorneys allege that the original appeal filed by the LJCPA in January was not properly approved in a meeting of the association, and that

even if it had been properly approved, it was to be ratified by the LJCPA at its regular meeting in February or be invalidated. However, the appeal did not come before the board again until its most recent meeting on March 3.

The issue came to a head on March 3 when board President Joe LaCava informed trustees of the two letters. LaCava said he has contacted the City Attorney's Office to seek advice on the Brown Act issue and find out if the LJCPA is liable.

City attorney spokeswoman Gina Coburn said the office was aware of the situation and that the City Planning and Community Investment Department, which oversees the planning groups, is investigating.

"When they have concluded their fact-finding, we will respond more formally to the letter," she said in an e-mail.

Nevertheless, the LJCPA plans to start examining its procedures at its next regular meeting on April 7. The association has also proposed the appointment of a committee to make recommendations for changes.

Chess King

Bishop's chess star, 13, named Life Master

Aler Krishnan helped teach her son Varun how to play chess because she wanted him to have the same fond memories that she had growing up of playing the game with family. She did not expect her son to become better at the game than she and her husband by the time he was seven years old.

The Bishop's School eighth-grader, who plays online every day and regularly at the San Diego Chess Club in Balboa Park, was recently named a Life Master by the United States Chess Federation (USCF). To receive such a title, a player must have played 300 USCF-rated tournament games with a rating of more than 2200.

The 13-year-old said he began to realize he was good at the game when he started to beat his parents and win tournaments. His love of video games and math became natural complements of each other, and he said it was the "calculations, tactics and strategy" that

ultimately attracted him to chess.

"It is fun to come up with winning combinations," he said.

Krishnan has a number of chess accolades under his belt. He won the American Open U2200 section last November and tied for second place in the International Master qualifier tournament in February. He has been selected to represent the U.S. team twice in the World Youth Chess Championships in Turkey and earned the Expert (Candidate Master) rating from the chess federation in 2008. When asked what tips he could offer to chess novices, Krishnan wisely quotes his coaches.

"Be patient and work hard," he said. "Chess is a video game with some thinking."

As accomplished as he is in the chess world, the game is still just that to Krishnan — a game. He would like to be an entrepreneur or a researcher some day, while still playing chess for fun. And though his success has only motivated him to "achieve more," he said he is still sometimes reminded that he is only human.

"Chess is a black and white game," he said. "Everybody wins and loses and I am no exception."

Planning board elects new trustees

The La Jolla Community Planning Association (LJCPA) voted for a new slate of trustees at its March 3 meeting, returning several incumbents to the board for another term.

There were 10 candidates running for eight seats. The winners are incumbents Joe LaCava, Jim Crisafi, Jim Fitzgerald, Orrin Gabsch, David Little and Ray Weiss. The new trustees

are Dan Allen and Cynthia Bond.

The LJCPA is a local planning group of unpaid volunteers who make non-binding recommendations to the city on development in La Jolla and have influence both on local developers and San Diego city planners.

District 1 City Councilwoman Sherri Lightner will swear in the winners on April 7, when LaCava will officially hand over his gavel to a new

president. Officers will be elected by the board.

"We had a really great slate of candidates. I want to thank everyone who came forward to run," said Trustee Mike Costello. "Where do we get such great people?"

LJCPA trustees serve three-year terms, although due to some personnel shuffling, Allen will serve two years and Bond only one year before they are up for re-election.

LJCPA winners:

Joe LaCava:

"La Jolla is a beautiful community, but it is also in a constant state of tension between preservation and the economic pressures for redevelopment. We have to work together to make sure that redevelopment is as good for the community as it is for the applicants and be assertive in improving our community's infrastructure and protecting its natural beauty."

Orrin Gabsch:

"I believe that as a longtime resident and business owner, I understand the issues and challenges we face as a community. I will continue to focus my energy on maintaining the integrity and beauty of our Village and community."

Jim Fitzgerald:

"La Jolla is a very special place that offers a unique quality of life and a village atmosphere for its residents, businesses and visitors. Maintaining this environment requires: 1) continually striking a fair and reasonable balance between the many legiti-

mate interests within the community; and 2) protecting and supporting the integrity of the processes and rules that govern La Jolla ... I believe that my record as a trustee demonstrates that I have consistently fulfilled these critical responsibilities to the CPA and the La Jolla community."

Tony Crisafi:

"I believe that any new design in La Jolla should be better than what is replaced. Design and implementation of new development should honestly respond to its environment and to the Community Plan."

David Little:

Little has said he is favor of preserving the two-story limit in the Planned District Ordinance, keeping the building height limit to 30 feet in the coastal zone and preserving the character of La Jolla as a very desirable place to live.

Ray Weiss:

"I care deeply about my community and about the kind of La Jolla

that we will leave for future generations. I am interested in continuing as a trustee of the CPA in order to have a positive influence on this future."

Editor's note: Although incumbent Ray Weiss technically resigned from the board last month, he was on the ballot at the meeting and was one of the top vote-getters. He will be awarded his seat back for another three-year term.

Cynthia Bond:

"Having attended almost all of the LJCPA meetings over the last 12 months, I appreciate the diligence of its members, their professionalism and commitment to maintaining a balance between development and preservation."

Dan Allen:

"I would put at the top of my priorities working toward preservation of a united La Jolla advocacy to the city, county and metropolitan government entities, where various community groups have separately argued in decision-making forums."

In case you weren't at this month's La Jolla Community Planning Association (LJCPA) on March 3, here's a roundup of what you missed:

• **Amendments to the LJCPA's bylaws were the subject of a special membership vote before the regular meeting started.** The amendments were unanimously approved. Board President Joe LaCava said the changes made to the bylaws were primarily "book-keeping exercises" and responses to changes in the committee structures and planning process at City Hall.

• **The Princess Street beach access issue,** which generated so much community interest when it was postponed at the February California Coastal Commission meeting in Chula Vista, could come back to the commission as soon as its June 15-17 meeting, which will be held in Marina Del Rey in Los Angeles.

• **After a heated discussion, the LJCPA voted to appeal the approval of the Palazzo condominium development at 2402 Torrey Pines Road.** Several opponents representing neighboring condo and homeowner associations questioned the traffic, density and character of the development and asked the CPA to move forward with the appeal. Architects of the project, Stephen Jones and W. Scott Ballard of JBA Associates, were on hand to answer questions, and said opponents were overestimating

traffic and density impacts. They did not make a presentation to the board.

• **The lot division at 6604 Muirlands was left alone by the LJCPA,** which decided not to appeal the Planning Commission approval of the project. A single-family home there will be demolished, the lot will be split in two and two new homes will be constructed. At least one resident voiced concerns about potential traffic on the narrow street and possible precedence for splitting lots in what has been traditionally a single-lot residential neighborhood. Trustees said they could not link a poorly-designed road to the development, and the architect said the project would not set precedent for lot splitting because the lot in question was in a very unique configuration that would meet the planning requirements for two individual lots.

• **Esther Viti, beautification chair of the La Jolla Town Council,** announced the next "Second Saturday Cleanup." However, the cleanups will now be every Saturday, which has necessitated some changes. For the next three months, cleanup volunteers will be concentrating on an area bounded by Girard Avenue, from Prospect to Pearl Streets. "That's the tree wells, flower beds, whatever needs to be done," she said. The sign-up table will be open from 9 a.m. to noon on Saturday at the Silver Store at 7909 Girard Ave. There would be refreshments available for volunteers. LaCava said there has been no wrongdoing by the board, but said there has been confusion about LJCPA rules and procedures, not only in regard to the Whitney project but other applicants as well.

"What's most important is our credibility and our integrity, and if there's a question about how we handle our votes, then there is no reason for us to be here," LaCava said.

In the case of the Whitney project, rules for appeals and their timing were revised in December. But there was a question of whether the old rules requiring appeal ratification at the next meeting or new rules that could omit that requirement were in effect.

Because of a parliamentary mistake, LaCava said, both sets of rules were technically on the books when the action was taken on the Whitney project.

This prompted Whitney's complaint that the board improperly changed the rules.

"You can't have a policy change without a public hearing," he said.

This has opened the question of what the board's role in project

approval really is.

"I take Mr. Whitney's point," said Trustee Devin Burstein at the March 3 meeting. "But at the same time, if you change the policy, then I don't understand why we have to address an old policy we voted to change."

Trustees said applicants have also voiced concern about first having to get approval from the traffic and transportation or development permit review committees, after which they essentially start all over again in front of the LJCPA, possibly having to return to one of those subcommittees.

It was also noted that the board has neither a staff attorney nor a parliamentarian, both of which might help the board to side-step potential procedural or legal problems like these.

"The credibility of this organization is at stake. We need to look at how we work with DPR," said Trustee Orrin Gabsch.

He said the board specifically needs to look at how it handles applicants who come before the LJCPA, then go to DPR and return to the LJCPA with a different plan.

The next regular meeting of the LJCPA is scheduled for April 7 at 7 p.m. at the La Jolla Recreation Center, located at 615 Prospect St.

Artistic director of the Northern California Korean Dance Association, Chung followed her children, both UCSD students, from San Francisco to La Jolla last year.

"I noticed that San Diego didn't have as many dance performances or activities," said Chung. "While searching online for opportunities, I found the Nations of San Diego International Dance Festival, and got in contact with them to audition."

The festival served as Chung's San Diego debut in January, where she performed a dance portraying a playful interaction between a shaman and a little girl's soul that refuses to go to heaven.

In 2006, Chung was nominated for an Isadora Duncan Dance Award, also known as the "Izzies," which honor Bay-area dance professionals. She has choreographed more than 48 works during her career, and said she is currently resting and working on choreography for her next performance.

La Jolla nail salon robber gets five years

A woman who tried to rob a La Jolla nail salon and succeeded in robbing another store hours earlier was sentenced March 4 to five years in state prison.

Probation was rejected for Soyla Bernice Gobert, 30, of Chula Vista, by San Diego Superior Court Judge Theodore Weathers. Gobert walked into Dan's Nails & Spa, located at 8008 Girard Ave., around 6:30 p.m. on Oct. 16 with an air rifle and ordered employees and customers to get down on the floor. She fled the store and was caught by four men who held her in the street until police arrived.

Gobert took \$250 in cash and new wallets and purses from a Coach Department store in Chula Vista hours earlier. She tied up workers with zip ties. Weathers said the Coach store's loss is \$24,143.50, and the stolen merchandise was never located.

"These crimes were planned and sophisticated. It appears almost out of the movies," said Weathers, noting that Gobert wore a blonde wig during both robberies, as well as a hoodie and baggy clothes.

Her attorney, Ian Pancer, asked the judge to send her to a treatment program. He said she has served in Iraq with the Navy and suffers from post-traumatic stress disorder.

Pancer said she repeatedly told the Coach victims she was sorry for tying them up. "She didn't intend to hurt anyone," he said, adding it was "out of character."

Deputy District Attorney David Uyar said "you know you are doing something wrong" if you repeatedly apologize. Uyar said Gobert locked the door of the nail salon upon entering, unlike at the Coach store, where customers continued to come inside. Gobert has no prior record.

La Jolla planners to appeal Whitney project again

The stage is set for another La Jolla Community Planning Association (LJCPA) appeal fight, as the board of trustees voted, amid some irregularities, to file an appeal of the Planning Commission's approval of the Whitney mixed-use development project at 2202 and 2206 Avenida de la Playa.

The project, which entails the demolition of current buildings and construction of residential and commercial space totaling three stories and 9,228 square feet (in addition to basement parking), has been in procedural contretemps since October 2009 when the LJCPA originally denied approval of the plan. The project was still approved, however, by both a hearing officer and the city's Planning Commission.

The City Council sent the project back to the Planning Commission, which re-approved it in January, prompting an LJCPA appeal that same month. However, LJCPA appeals are a two-part process, having to be both filed and ratified with a vote of the board.

Bob Whitney, speaking on behalf of his project at the LJCPA meeting on March 3, objected to the LJCPA's rules and said the filing of the appeal should be withdrawn since it was not followed up with ratification. The board argued that a change of rules in December had created some confusion regarding the appeals process.

Board President Joe LaCava took what he called "an irregular move" to address the confusion, asking the board to suspend the rules and take action on the appeal, which it did.


The City Council is set to hear the appeal at its March 29 meeting.

Support continued funding for cardiovascular disease/stroke research

Nearly 81 million U.S. adults suffer from cardiovascular diseases and stroke. That's one death every 38 seconds. The bright side of these sad statistics is that largely because of American Heart Association/American Stroke Association (AHA/ASA) and National Institutes of Health (NIH) funded research, deaths from cardio-

vascular diseases and stroke have dropped dramatically by 63 percent and 70 percent respectively in the last 30 years. Unfortunately, the innovations in cardiovascular disease treatment may come to a grinding halt as the 2011 continuing resolution passed by the U.S. House of Representatives cuts \$1.6 billion from the NIH budget.

Cardiovascular disease and stroke research compromise just 5 percent of the NIH budget, and the staggering cuts proposed will decimate future innovation in life-saving treatments. San Diego's economy will also be gravely impacted, as NIH funding has been significantly awarded in our local biotech community. Statistically, technological improvements in treating heart attacks are worth the costs, for every \$1 spent, the return on investment has been \$7. The AHA/ASA further estimates that eliminating deaths from heart disease would generate \$48 trillion in economic value from increased life expectancy.

NIH-supported research remains our best hope to stop America's No. 1 killer and keep our economy on track. As a young stroke survivor, I'm grateful for the research that saved my life and allowed me to be a productive member of society. I call on Senators Barbara Boxer and Dianne Feinstein to help the next generation have the same chance.

Simple exercise routines are key to longevity

help manage back and arthritis pain. There is nothing that visually ages you more than stooped shoulders and a crooked posture.

Endurance exercises

They boost your energy levels, prevent tiredness, oxygenate the entire body and burn excess calories, which in turn helps decrease excess fat.

Flexibility training

Among other benefits, it helps balance muscle groups that are overly exerted as a result of physical activity or bad posture. It improves performance and decreases the risk of injury, as well as muscle soreness.

Core exercises

They strengthen, support and stabilize your spine, pelvis and shoulders, while flattening abs too. If your core is strong, you'll look years younger.

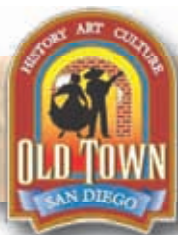

Centurion boys, Viking girls win CIF crowns

Bishop's women denied bid for second CIF title in three years

After a 1-1 tie in regulation and sudden death, the No.11-seeded University City High School (UCHS) Centurion mens soccer team outscored the No. 1-seeded St. Augustine Saints 3-2 in a shootout to win the CIF Division III title 4-3 in a game played at Westview High School on March 5.

With the win, the Centurions improve their record to 14-8-0. With the loss, the Saints fall to 14-4-5.

In other CIF Division III soccer playoff action at Westview High School March 5, the No.2-seeded La Jolla Lady Vikings also found themselves in a 1-1 tie with the No.1-seeded Cathedral Catholic

Lady Dons following regulation and overtime. Much like the UCHS mens team, La Jolla outscored Cathedral Catholic 3-1 on penalty kicks in clinching the championship by a score of 4-2.

Lady Dons senior Kendall Kraus scored off of an assist from fellow senior Jamie Schnieders to give Cathedral Catholic an early 1-0 cushion in the first half. However, Lady Viking senior captain. Callan Parra came right back less than a minute later, with her 18th goal this year.

The second half and sudden death were scoreless until Parra, junior Itzel Caro and sophomore Karly Zlatic all scored goals in the shootout for La Jolla. The teams tied in two meetings during the regular season.

With the win, the Lady Vikings improve their record to 14-4-3. With the loss, the Lady Dons fall to 15-7-4.

In women's CIF Division IV soccer playoff action, The No.1-seeded Bishop's School Lady Knights suffered a tough 1-0 shutout loss to the No. 2-seeded Coronado Lady Islanders at Cathedral Catholic High School in a game played last Saturday afternoon, March 5. Bishop's was bidding for its second title in three years.

With the win, Coronado improves its record to 12-6-4. With the loss, the Lady Knights fall to 13-4-0.

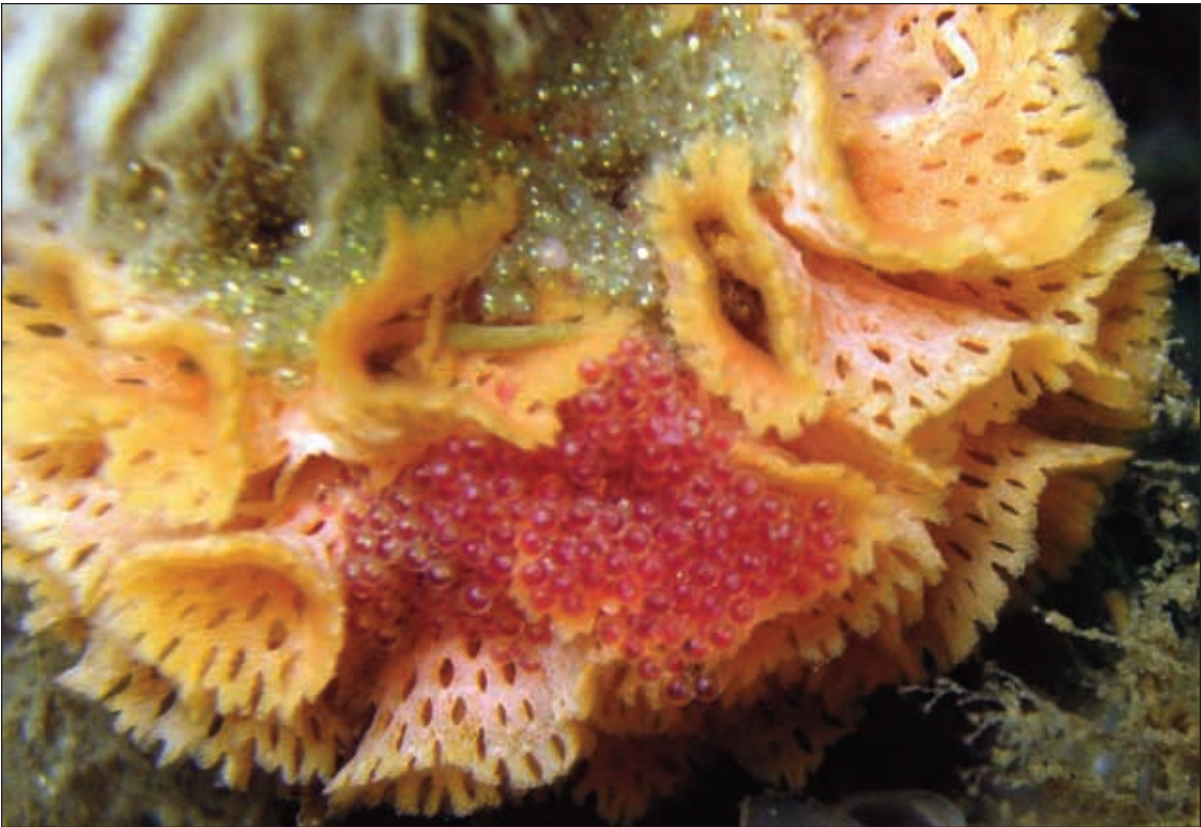

Humans can learn from piscine parenting

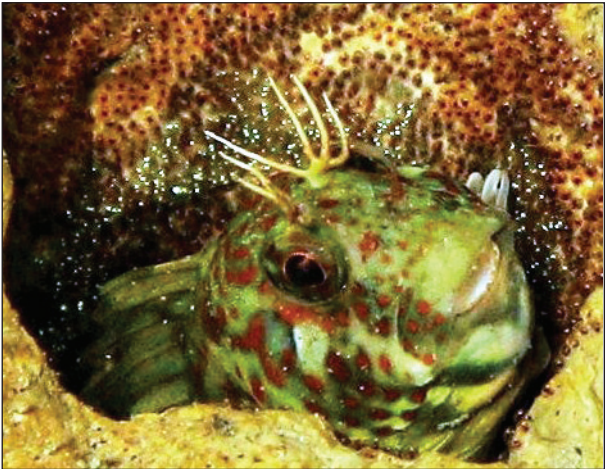

Some parents are super protective, some are marginally attentive and some are nowhere to be found. While humans may have specific views on what is good parenting, in the fish world, emotions and opinions have nothing to do with it. Some fish incubate eggs internally, some have live births, and then there are those that release eggs externally. Within this group, parenting also varies.

Broadcast spawning fish, like rockfish, release eggs and sperm in the water that disappear into the soup. Survival odds are based on sheer numbers of spawn. Then there are fish like schooling silversides such as sardines, mackerel, anchovies and smelts that deposit sticky eggs onto algae, like the giant kelp (Macrocystis pyrifera), or hard substrates like rock. After the brief spawning recess, parents return to their school without a backward glance. Having gypsy parents places the burden of survival solely on the unprotected brood stuck behind. To even out the playing field against predators, silverside roe develop and hatch as larvae within a few days.

At the other end of the parenting spectrum, fish such as painted greenlings (Oxylebius pictus), rockpool blennies (Hypsoblennius gilberti) and garibaldi (Hypsypops rubicundus) guard their deposited young until hatching, which generally takes a couple of weeks. Dads are sole caretakers. They are all conscientious, but garibaldi dads go the extra mile because they groom a nest for the season. After females deposit their eggs, he remains to defend his young from predators via verbal and physical displays.

The take-home message here is that, in the fish world, what defines a responsible parent is not necessarily the same as what is expected of human parents. I must say, though, from what I read in the news, some fish parents should be role models for humans.

La Jolla researchers making breakthroughs in aging, hair loss, Alzheimer’s

Regrowing hair: Salk researchers may have accidentally discovered a solution

Salk Institute researchers Jean Rivier and Catherine Rivier were investigating how stress affects gastrointestinal function when they may have found a chemical compound that induces hair growth by blocking a stress-related hormone associated with hair loss. The discovery came entirely by accident.

The team was originally studying brain-gut interactions and had been using mice that were genetically altered to overproduce a stress hormone called corticotrophin-releasing factor, or CRF. As these mice age, they lose hair and eventually become bald on their backs, making them visually distinct from their unaltered counterparts.

Researchers had developed a chemical compound called astressin-B, which blocks the action of CRF, and they created an animal model of chronic stress by altering the mice to overproduce CRF.

Researchers then injected the astressin-B into the bald mice to observe how its CRF-blocking ability affected gastrointestinal tract function. The initial injection had no effect, so the investigators continued the injections over five days.

Then they noticed something surprising — the bald mice regrew their hair.

Rivier and colleagues from The University of California, Los Angeles and the Oregon Health and Sciences University have filed for a patent on the compound and plan to set up a company to begin raising money for development and testing.

Scripps study points to liver, not brain, as origin of Alzheimer’s plaques

Unexpected results from a Scripps Research Institute and ModGene, LLC study could completely alter scientists’ ideas about Alzheimer’s disease — pointing to the liver instead of the brain as the source of the “amyloid” that deposits as brain plaques associated with this devastating condition. The findings could offer a relatively simple approach for Alzheimer’s prevention and treatment.

The study was published in the March 3 issue of *The Journal of Neuroscience Research*.

In the study, the scientists used a mouse model for Alzheimer’s disease to identify genes that influence the amount of amyloid that accumulates in the brain. They found three genes that protected mice from brain amyloid accumulation and deposition. For each gene, lower expression in the liver protected the mouse brain. One of the genes encodes presenilin — a cell membrane protein believed to contribute to the development of human Alzheimer’s.

Salk taps into interrupting the aging process

Substantial evidence suggests that lifespan is increased if an organism restricts its daily calorie intake, a regimen that some say works by simply making life seem longer. A team of scientists from La Jolla’s Salk Institute of Biological Studies has discovered a molecular switch flipped by hunger that could not only make longevity more appetizing, but also identify drug targets for patients with aging-related diseases like type II diabetes or cancer.

In the Feb. 17 issue of the journal *Nature*, researchers reported for the first time that deactivation of a protein called CRTC1 in roundworms increases their lifespan, most likely mediating the effects of calorie restriction.

Previously, researchers knew hunger promoted longevity by activating an enzyme called AMPK, which senses that food is scarce and pushes cells into a low energy state.

“We knew AMPK was a major energy sensor, but didn’t know what it was talking to,” said Andrew Dillin, Ph.D., one of two senior authors of the study. “Our goal was to understand the genetic circuitry that registered that response.”

They identified one protein called CRTC1 that is expressed at the same time and place as AMPK.

The team fed worms an inhibitory RNA engineered to deplete CRTC1, and in about 3 weeks they found those worms lived a whopping 40 percent longer, suggesting that AMPK retards aging by antagonizing CRTC1 activity. “What we have identified is a binary switch that turns the aging process on and off,” Dillin said.

Steve Schick and the noisy bouquet

With the orchestra and two diverse soloists, peripatetic La Jolla Symphony Music Director Steven Schick explores three concertos — by Bela Bartok, Sergei Prokofiev and Mark Applebaum — on March 12 and 13 at Mandeville Auditorium, University of California, San Diego (UCSD).

"I have a thing about concertos," he said. "How do I put it? They represent not just a musical sense of organization but a social order as well." Admittedly, finding the right equilibrium is not easy. "Too much flashy solo playing and a

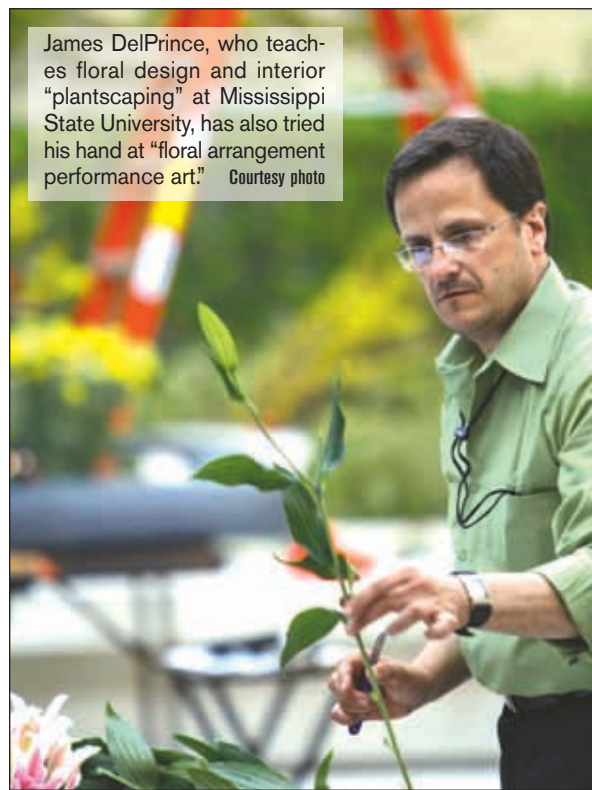
work degenerates into a shallow showpiece; too much heavy ensemble music and you've got the grace and allure of a lead balloon," Schick said.

He explains that both the concerto and the orchestra grew out of the democratic movement of the late 18th century and describes Bartok's Concerto for Orchestra as "a workers' paradise."

"You can't ask the featured artist to stand because that's the whole orchestra," he said.

Prokofiev's Concerto No. 2 for violin features special guest 16-year-old Carlsbad resident Hannah Cho, winner of the orchestra's 2009 Young Artist Competition. Of this work, Schick said, "If the orchestra represents a democracy, the soloist is the vestigial evidence of aristocracy."

While Bartok exemplifies democracy and Prokofiev the classical conversation between orchestra and soloist, Mark Applebaum's Concerto for Florist has to be the "anti-concerto" or the "uncontended sharing of space. I would like to say that this is the greatest concerto for florist ever writ-

ten. But it may not be. Who knows?"

Ornamental horticulturist James DelPrince, who teaches floral design and interior "plantscaping" at Mississippi State University, has been associated with Applebaum's work since its inception in 2000. In that version, DelPrince arranged flowers to improvised accompaniment. After percussionist Schick played percussion in a performance at Stanford University in May of 2009, he asked Applebaum to expand it to three movements for La Jolla Symphony. The accompanying score is now written out, as befits a work that is this year's Nee Commission (named in honor of the late music director Thomas Nee).

The soloist is still free to improvise because there is little coordination between the two entities: flowers and music. Schick compares the work of Merce Cunningham and John Cage: "There are some moments of synchronization,

but for the most part there is space enough for unrelated or diverse activities. The space is shared rather than contended. Everybody's happy."

Schick fans are happy to know that his recent appointment as director of San Francisco's Contemporary Music Players will not affect his relationship with red fish blue fish (UCSD's contemporary music ensemble), the university or La Jolla Symphony & Chorus. "I wouldn't trade those experiences away at all. That I had to stay was part of the conversation."

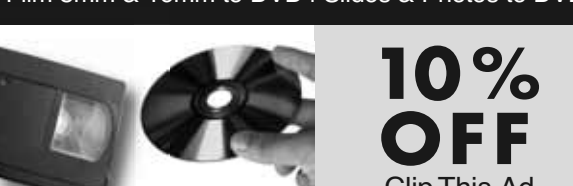
