10 years later, Chancellor's house finally becomes a home

The rechristened Audrey Geisel University House is completely rehabbed and serving the purpose for which it was intended as the abode of UC San Diego's chancellor outfitted to accommodate guests.

"It is an honor to live in Geisel House, which is much more than the Chancellor's home," said UC San Diego Chancellor Pradeep K. Khosla. "It's the university's house. I look forward to carrying on the tradition of hosting special events at the house for campus and community members, and creating new memories in the home with my family, friends and colleagues."

The entire cost of the University House Rehabilitation Project, estimated at \$10.5 million, was covered by gift funds, including major gifts from Audrey Geisel (\$3 million) and the Rik and Flo Henrikson Endowment Fund (\$5 million). Additionally, the UC Office of the President gifted \$1.5 million from the Searles Fund, an endowment used to fund general purposes of the university, which cannot be covered by state funds.

Located on 7 acres in La Jolla Farms, Geisel House had been closed since 2004 when it was deemed uninhabitable due to seismic and system deficiencies, including plumbing and electrical problems and the need for canyon edge slope stabilization.

Ione Stiegler, the La Jolla architect who designed Geisel House's retrofit,

previously described the undertaking as "a special task for an extraordinary structure in an exquisite location."

Stiegler said "re-creating" the dwelling was challenging.

"Chancellor [Robert] Dynes vacated the house 10 years ago and the La Jolla Historical Society was very active in getting the house nationally designated [as historical]," said Stiegler, noting the project changed originally from "demolishing the house and building an entirely new structure," to "a restoration, rehabilitation of the existing home."

Stiegler said the restoration project involved seismically retrofitting an unreinforced masonry building made with 2-foot-thick adobe walls.

"The ceiling and roof were not physically tied to the walls," Stiegler said. "Our project rectified that."

Restoring the Geisel House structure involved blending historic adobe with its thick, massive walls with modern-era architecture, Stiegler said

"The building needed to absorb seismic waves, so part of our project was to create beams and sheer walls, then tie them to a roof diaphragm that could absorb energy cross-shocks that come from the ground in an earthquake," she said.

Don Schmidt, vice chairman of the

La Jolla Historical Society's Preservation Committee, said the society worked on a committee in partnership with the university in devis-

ing a game plan for Geisel House's restoration. Crediting Pat Dahlberg with being the driving force initially in convincing authorities to preserve the chancellor's home, Schmidt said most everyone is happy with the end result.

"It's really spectacular," he said. "It's just an amazing example of pueblo revival architecture. Everyone's pleased. It's so beautiful. There's nothing else like it in Southern California."

Audrey Geisel, widow of author Theodor "Dr. Seuss" Geisel, has had a longstanding relationship with UC San Diego, donating more than 8,000 of her late husband's original drawings, sketches, books and other memorabilia to the university libraries. In 1995, the university's library was renamed Geisel Library in honor of Theodor Geisel, following a \$20 million gift from Audrey Geisel, Mrs. Geisel, who was recently awarded the prestigious UC San Diego Chancellor's Medal, has had a lasting impact on nearly every area of the ography and Health

Sciences, to student scholarship and fellowship support and the renovations of the Faculty Club.

The historic home was built by noted Santa Fe-based architect William Lumpkins for prominent early La Jolla developer William Black, for whom Black's Beach is named.

The 130-acre site at 9360 La Jolla Farms Road was bought by the UC sytem in 1967 for \$2.7 million to fulfill a UC policy requir-

MAN ADMITS TO BURGLAR-IZING JONES' HOME - An Inglewood man who previously denied burglarizing the La Jolla home of cookbook author Jeanne Jones abruptly pleaded guilty Jan. 15 and will be sentenced Feb. 25.

A maximum 6-year prison term awaits Leon Powell, Jr., 27, said Deputy District Attorney Jayln Wang. Powell pleaded guilty to residential burglary and admitted he broke into the home while it was inhabited.

Jones, 77, was home alone on Oct. 5 when two burglars broke into her bedroom and stole more than \$100,000 worth of jewels. Jones identified Powell as one of the burglars on Dec. 12 in the preliminary hearing in San Diego Superior Court.

The guilty plea came as somewhat of a surprise after Powell's attorney called defense witnesses at the preliminary hearing – a somewhat unusual move. One witness testified Powell was without a car during that time because it was in a repair shop.

Powell's DNA was found on the disconnected wires to Jones' video security system, but his lawyer suggested Powell had handled security cables in warehouses at least 17 times because he was employed in that industry.

Wang said her office recently forwarded evidence to the defense that Powell's cell phone signal was used to ping off cell towers in La Jolla the night of the burglary.

Most of the jewelry taken that night has still not been recovered, except for gems that were dropped by the burglars as they left. This is the third time Jones has been burglarized by jewel thieves. The first case involved the boyfriend of a former caretaker. In 2011, long sentences were handed down to four men involved in a home-invasion robbery.

Jones said she has put up her house for sale. Powell remains free on \$250,000 bond.

TORREY BANK ROBBER TO HAVE JAN. 22 HEARING – A man suspected of holding up a bank in the Torrey Highlands area faces a Jan. 22 preliminary hearing.

Victor Lamar Moore, 32, was charged with the Jan. 4 robbery of a U.S. Bank that was inside an Albertsons grocery store at 7895 Highland Village Place. He presented a demand note to the Peterson ordered to stand trial in La Jolla shooting spree By NEAL PUTNAM

Ron Fletcher and Steven Dowdy identified Hans Antone Petersen in court Jan. 13 as the man who shot them both in their own homes in La Jolla in the early morning hours of Sept. 18.

Petersen, 49, of University City, was ordered to stand trial for three counts of attempted murder, which also includes shots fired through a window that missed Lisa Dowdy. Petersen was also ordered to trial for burglary and shooting at an inhabited structure on Waverly

A new charge of brandishing a firearm in a threatening manner was added because of testimony from Dr. Mike Nielsen who said he was driving home from work at 5 a.m. and saw a man on Ravenswood Road in La Jolla lurking behind trees. Nielsen said he turned around and shined his headlights on the figure.

The man stepped out and pointed a gun at Nielsen, which prompt-

ed Nielsen to hit the gas and quickly leave. Nielsen said he later called 911 and told police what he saw.

San Diego Superior Court Judge Leo Valentine, Jr. said there was sufficient evidence shown to add the firearm-threat charge to the other charges and ordered a trial for Petersen. The defendant, a former biotech executive, pleaded not guilty to all charges at the end of the preliminary hearing.

A trial date was set for Sept. 15 and Petersen waived his right to have a speedy trial. Petersen remains in jail on \$5 million bail.

Petersen had two vodka drinks and two glasses of wine from 10 p.m. to midnight before the shooting, according to Jeanne Henry, a clinical psychologist in La Jolla, with whom Petersen was living at the time. She said he was intoxicated.

Dowdy, a cancer researcher and biologist, had done business with Petersen, but it reportedly ended badly. Dowdy was shot first around 3 a.m. through his bedroom window. Four bullets were lodged in a dresser, and Dowdy was wounded in his lower back.

"When the bullets stopped firing and I was concerned that he was

trying to reload, that's when I opened the curtains to look and see a little bit," said Dowdy. "I realized then this is not merely a robbery



Expected to be a free-for-all over a controversial Jewish community center, the Jan. 8 La Jolla Community Planning Association (LJCPA) meeting turned into a debate over what constitutes a basement and held a discussion of sea lion proliferation at La Jolla Cove.

The advisory group's Jan. 8 headline item, discussion of the draft environmental impact report for Hillel Center for Jewish Life proposed across from UCSD, was trailed until February. A representative for Hillel, the largest Jewish campus organization in the world, complained the group had only learned that day its EIR was on the agenda, noting it was unprepared to comment, adding there was "nothing new to report." Public review on the project's environmental document has been extended until Feb. 11.

This is the second go-round for the proposed Jewish student center, originally proposed in 2000 on a triangular-shaped remnant of land (Site 659) that neighbors insist should be kept as an open-space buffer separating the university and the adjoining single-family subdivision.

Hillel's revamped plans have cut the size of its proposed building in half, breaking up its bulk into three separate buildings and adding an open-space park for community benefit.

Hillel is asking for a street vacation, a site development permit and a use permit for its administrative office at 8976 Cliffridge Ave.

Though the project has been downscaled, some strong public opposition remains, with neighbors contending the center doesn't belong in their neighborhood.

Also on Jan. 8, LJCPA voted 13-3-1 against recommending a proposed mixed-use, commercial retail-residential development at 7610 Girard Ave.

Developers are seeking permitting to build eight condo units and one 5,125-square-foot commercial condo unit on a currently vacant 0.27-acre site near the Vons shopping center.

The proposed development is in a zone where the La Jolla Planned District Ordinance (PDO) does not allow three stories. Developers contend their plans constitute two stories of development above a basement with subterranean parking.

Architect Paul Benton, who heads an LJCPA subcommittee that reviewed the mixed-use project, gave a slideshow presentation detailing why some people believe the project constitutes three stories rather than two.

From the audience, La Jollan Sally Miller questioned the project's viability.

"Why are you constructing a subterranean place when they've proven to be a failure?" she asked.

"Whether you call it a basement, a ground floor or a catacomb, it doesn't make a difference," said LJCPA trustee Jim Fitzgerald. "It's a

CIVICREPORT >> La Jolla Town Council, Jan. 9 By DAVE SCHWAB

The La Jolla Town Council (LJTC) heard about youth gangs and heard a report from a local Realtor about the Jewel's static real-estate market at its January meeting.

Joyce Abrams, commissioner of the San Diego Gang Prevention and Intervention Commission, gave the council and audience members a short survey quizzing them on their knowledge of youth gang issues preceding a brief presentation.

A District 1 City Council appointee, Abrams works collaboratively with city staffers who "deal directly with gangs and indirectly with neighbors to get rid of them."

"We invite you to share your opinions on this neighborhood survey," said Abrams, adding it will be used to "develop strategies in a collaborative effort between various agencies working with gang-related issues to help us recommend an initiative to the City Council to combat the impact of gang violence in our city."

At the end of the meeting, Charles Schevker of Berkshire Hathaway HomeServices spoke about a recent slowdown in La Jolla home sales.

"In August of 2013, 83 homes were sold and that has progressively gone down month to month to 41 in December, a reduction of 16.6 percent," Schevker said. "Since demand has gone down, it is a good thing that the supply has gone down as well."

Schevker produced graphs showing a 15.8 percent price increase in La Jolla homes between January and August 2013.

"Since then, prices have flattened out, only going up 1 or 2 percent, which indicates the

market has slowed down," Schevker said, adding he foresees some price reductions in the next couple of months.

"This isn't gloom and doom," Schevker said. "The real-estate market is dynamic and we hope it will achieve a center of gravity as it levels off and then we'll see opportunities in the second and third quarters for the market to strengthen itself and begin moving forward again."

In other action:

· A Bird Rock resident complained there have been two recent shootings in or near the La Jolla Biltmore Motel.

"It's a problem and it makes me afraid," she said. LJTC chairwoman Cindy Greatrex suggested she contact the Bird Rock Community Council (BRCC) and appear at that group's next meeting in February to discuss the sit-

Repositioning itself financially and strategically for 2014, the La Jolla Village Merchants Association (LJVMA) in January supported efforts to resolve the sea lion stench problem at La Jolla Cove and vowed redoubled efforts to collect delinquent business-license taxes, while reconsidering its list of merchantsponsored events.

"We owe a duty to merchants of La Jolla to promote them, make their chances for success better by removing foreign obstacles to their success," said Mark Krasner of the law firm of Blanchard, Krasner & French during discussion of the group's possible support for an ongoing lawsuit by local merchants to spur the city to act in cleaning up the Cove sea lion mess.

Noting there were alternatives the merchant group could take with the suit, including not getting involved and lending financial support, Krasner suggested the group join the suit as a nonprofit for a nominal \$1 cost. The group voted overwhelmingly in favor of that suggestion.

"This (sea lion) mess is manmade," said LJVMA chair Claude-Anthony Marengo. "This is an imbalance of nature caused by man plugging holes in the sea wall and sand filling up the swimming

Trustee Claudette Berwin called the issue "very serious."

"Our mission statement is to encourage a friendly environment," she said.

Berwin pointed out time is running out to do something about foul Cove odors ahead of upcoming community events — the Farmers Insurance Open at the end

but this is someone trying to assassinate me."

Fletcher is a Mission Beach realestate agent and Petersen's brotherin-law, although his sister is in the process of divorcing Petersen after 12 years of marriage.

Fletcher said he was taking a shower around 6:30 a.m. and heard a crash and knocking on the bathroom door. His two daughters were home, and Fletcher said he was puzzled. He was stunned to see Petersen with a gun when he opened the door.

Fletcher said he closed and locked the door, and he heard Petersen say, "I'm going to (expletive) kill you!" Fletcher said Petersen shot through the bathroom door, narrowly missing him and Petersen demanded he open his safe.

"I was not going to reason with him. He looked so angry," said Fletcher. "I reopened the door and grabbed the gun with my left hand."

"When I grabbed the gun, he fired and he shot me in the stomach. I was in shock. I was fighting for my life," said Fletcher, who said he was able to wrestle the gun out of Petersen's hand. "I had the gun and I pointed it and him and tried to shoot him."

Fletcher said the gun jammed at that point, and he grabbed a cell phone and called 911. He said he yelled for his daughters to also call 911. Petersen grabbed the phone and tried to smash it, Fletcher said.

Deputy District Attorney Amy Maund played footage of Fletcher's home security camera system, which showed a man identified as Petersen breaking a glass door with an object at 6:38 a.m. and walking through the door of the Cottontail Lane home.

"He was screaming things at me. It was gibberish. I don't know what he was talking about. He was cursing at me," said Fletcher. "I was in extreme pain."

On the video, Petersen was seen ranting and pointing his index finger at Fletcher as he sat on his couch with the jammed gun. The video then showed two San Diego police officers ordering Petersen to put his hands in the air, and Fletcher threw the gun on the floor.

Fletcher told the judge Petersen had visited him at his Mission Beach office and Petersen was angry. He said both he and his sister felt threatened.

Henry testified she met Petersen at a party and he has lived with her for the past 8 ½ months. She testified she did not hear Petersen make any threats, but said he was depressed.

Henry said Petersen was up late that night answering emails on his computer and appeared agitated. Henry said she went to bed and noticed at 3:55 a.m. that he left and that his blue BMW was gone. She said she has since visited him in jail.

Timothy Ellis of La Jolla testified he heard a gunshot and "angry yelling" outside his window that woke him up. He looked outside and identified Petersen with what he said looked like either a gun or a drill in his hand. Ellis said Petersen asked for Fletcher, but Ellis told him Fletcher didn't live there.

Petersen has no prior record and previously served as CEO of several firms in the past. If he is convicted of all charges, he faces three life terms in prison.

teller at 1:40 p.m. and fled.

A San Diego police officer spotted a vehicle that fit the description of the getaway car and pulled it over on Interstate 5. Inside the car with Moore was money obtained from the bank, said a prosecutor.

Moore pleaded not guilty Jan. 8 before San Diego Superior Court Judge David Szumowski, who set bail at \$50,000. The prosecutor said police are investigating another bank robbery that may have been committed by Moore. He remains in custody.

Adrenaline highs

I have my own theory about why some people retire happily and others get depressed or ill upon retirement, about why some people drive fast and like roller-coaster rides and horror movies, and others—like me—absolutely refuse to see anything violent and frightening and have always avoided scary rides in amusement parks.

It has to do with an addiction to "highs." People with generally low levels of adrenaline need a boost to feel alive, while people whose levels are usually high quickly become anxious when over-stimulated.

I'm of the latter category. Even a scary book makes my heart beat faster, and I get so uncomfortable in suspenseful movies that I want to leave. The feeling of being frightened is deeply unpleasant — I do all I can to avoid being in such situations.

My granddaughter, on the other hand, loves to be scared. She thinks it's fun. A large number of people must agree, considering how many movies are made just to raise adrenaline levels. Steven Spielberg said in an interview that during a preview of "Jaws," he saw someone leave as the shark was swallowing a man and thought: "It's a flop." Then he saw the person throw up and return, and he thought: "It's a blockbuster."

Addictions to emotional highs are not very different from addictions to alcohol or drugs. Without the stimulation, one feels low key, empty or depressed.

Some people can only work under pressure — deadlines are motivators. I'm always several columns ahead, and I handed in reports early in college. Deadlines make me anxious. I can work under pressure if I have to, but I hate the feeling it generates.

Why do people continue working at a hard and fast pace when they could retire and don't need the money? A newly retired friend of mine recently said to me, "I miss the challenge. I miss risk taking, I miss having the control."





Yoga offers a workout for the mind and body

Yoga lovers have lots of studios in La Jolla from which to choose, including La Jolla Yoga Center.

"We just passed our four-year anniversary and have more than 60 classes with lots of different teachers with different backgrounds and styles," said Helen Cloots, yoga center manager/teacher.

"It's our variety," answered Cloots, when asked what separates La Jolla Yoga Center from the rest. "Most other studios do more specialized styles. We're generalists, though we do have experts in certain individual styles. We do have a little bit of something for everyone."

Cloots said the clientele at La Jolla Yoga Center is as varied as the instruction.


"Everyone comes for something different, for what works for them," she said.

Cloots said older patrons come for some of the more gentle, relaxed, meditative classes, while younger patrons who "want to get a good workout" are drawn by the more physically challenging classes.

"The nice thing is, depending on the day, you can come in and do both — or just one," said Cloots, noting the studio caters to lots of locals but has an extensive mailing list of some 5,000 clients from all over, many of whom she said "come in for special workshops and teachers that they like."

Amanda Bowman, a member and volunteer, talked about what she felt makes La Jolla Yoga Center special.

"It's a great community, almost like a support group," Bowman said. "It's kind of a self-



stress reducer.

"The breathing exercises are especially ben-

fine breatning exercises are especially beneficial," she said. "You feel this new energy. You can deal with whatever problems come your way."

Stress reduction is among the many practical benefits of practicing yoga.

"It's about relieving stress, building strength and flexibility, not only physically but mentally," said Cloots. "People are here just as much or more for the mental benefits as they are for the physical."

Yoga is also good for those recuperating from surgery or injury.

"We've had people come in here and say, 'I just had my hip replaced and the doctor said yoga would be good for me,'" said Bowman.

"We're also open to beginners. We have some options they can jump into and start to learn."

On a recent weekday afternoon, studio member Jule Ruggles, just exiting from a yoga session, explained why he was drawn to the discipline.

"My whole thing is to develop my core because of back issues," Ruggles said, adding La Jolla Yoga Center is his place to do that because "it's a great studio with great instructors and the price is right."

Reenacting a typical hour-long yoga session, Cloots said, "You're going to start together on mats seated or lying down, and first there will be a moment of centering where

the teacher is going to bring everyone's awareness to the same place in their body and breadth, kind of tune in. Then there will be movements to start some stretching and hold the breadth. Then you move into poses, starting slowing building up to the more challenging poses. Then you are back down to the more relaxing poses. The last 10 minutes is with your eyes closed where you just let yourself be what we refer to as 'rest and digest.'"

Another advantage of La Jolla Yoga Center is the depth — and unpredictibility — of its instructors.

"With our teachers it's different every time," Cloots said. "You don't know that this pose is going to come next. So it kind of keeps you more present."



Little miracles



Dr. Sean Daneshmand is a perinatologist (a high-risk obstetrician), and has devoted his medical career to dealing with difficult pregnancies. He saw families' lives turned upside down by the challenge of caring for premature or sick newborns requiring long stays in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) before becoming healthy enough to be taken home. Parents had to deal with the uncertainties of worrisome prognoses during problematic pregnancies, accompanied in many cases by severe financial hardships. All this inspired Dr. Daneshmand to form Miracle Babies in 2009.

His organization provides support and financial assistance to families with newborns in the NICU, and works to enhance the well being of women, children and entire families through education, prevention and specialized medical care. Miracle Babies considers every child born a miracle, but knows that some require extra help as they begin their lives.

What happens when we disrespect the curb appeal of our homes – and community

What are we allowing to happen to our Village?

Metaphorically, if we were to think of the entire Village of La Jolla as our family home, how would we and how would visitors rate our curb appeal? I think that, as we live in a specific place for any length of time, we may not notice the small decrements in its appearance. Take a look at your own homes and decide for yourself whether conditions have declined somewhat.

How much value is lost by a declining curb appeal? This is not something that can easily be quantified, but for anyone owning a home or business in the area, this should be an increasing con-

I guess I had not really given this much thought, simply because my mindset is that La Jolla is the most fantastic place to live. Beginning about two years ago and since, as we walk to and from points in the Village, the number of overheard conversations regarding the now-infamous odors and the dirty condition of our streets and sidewalks has been increasing dramatically. This is very disturbing, especially when we speak with visitors who claim they have no future plans to return because of declining conditions. There is a saying that goes something like this: "A happy customer will only tell three people, but an unhappy customer will complain to 10." So, imagine the wide impact that negative criticism could have on La Jolla.

No, we are not representing the tourism bureau. However, since our business is selling houses, we are keenly aware of outsiders' views and opinions that may ultimately affect values and pricing.

Not long ago, one of our clients who had purchased a high-value coastal property in the Village commented about how he would like to organize a campaign to clean up our image.

At first I thought his idea was ridiculous and that a campaign to clean up would likely meet with resistance in the form of activists

wanting to protect the civil rights of cigarette butts, liability waivers, rules, restrictions and other "cannot do's," as do many such endeavors. Now, I curse him because every time I go anywhere in the Village my eyes are

drawn downward and all I seem to notice is the sidewalks dotted with black marks of spit-out chewing gum, streets cluttered with cigarette butts and loose debris, and overflowing trash cans. Not to mention the misaligned and cracked sidewalks and the patchwork of mismatched sidewalk patterns. Disagree with me? Try it yourselves — just look down during a 5-minute walk on Prospect or Girard.

I can't help but wonder why many business owners seem not to take the initiative to clean up in front of their establishments. After all, going back to the housing metaphor, if the Village was your home, would you not keep it maintained and clean? If you were to consider selling your home, would you not expect better results by having clean curb appeal? If a restaurant, for example, had as much noticeable griminess on the inside as on the outside, would people still eat there?

So, let's not walk away from the

question without some serious consideration. How much resale value might be forfeited because of our declining curb appeal, how much in business revenues might be forfeited due to fewer visitors or those who can't stomach eating a meal while smelling foul odors? If we want to people to come inside our home for a longer look, shouldn't we make the outside more inviting?

Because curb appeal is so subjective, statistics are not readily available and if they were, they might not be reliable. A recent real-estate article appearing in a trade publication suggested that 63 percent of people who drive by a for-sale house elect not to go inside because of the negative curb appeal. If this statistic is reasonable, then how many people might be driving by our metaphoric Village of La Jolla home and not stopping in for a closer look?

of January and the Concours D'Elegance car show in spring – to ensure they are not adversely affected.

Outgoing president Phil Coller was lauded at the meeting for his commitment to launching the business group and getting it off on the right foot. Coller remarked that lots of La Jolla business operators "don't pay their business license taxes," a situation he said needs to be rectified.

Coller also called upon merchants to change the downtown Village's image.

"There is a very big misperception by people who do not live in La Jolla that La Jolla has no parking, traffic is horrendous and there's better shopping elsewhere," Coller said. "We have to

make plans to engage that market, make sure they understand there are special things La Jolla offers [like] an upbeat shopping experience with its art and eclectic merchants that are here."

Coller also called upon more merchants to become active in the LJVMA, noting the organization is only as strong as the commitment of its individual mem-

At a later special meeting continuing its strategy discussion, the LJVMA debated scaling back or discontinuing Haute La Jolla Nights, an event with live music and merchant discounts to promote the downtown Village that has met with limited success.

The LJVMA opted to postpone discussion of its 2014-15 fiscal year budget beginning mid-year to give members more time to receive and digest financial infor-

Another friend, a recently retired CEO, said, "Who am I if I'm not a manager, if I'm not in charge, if I don't have the opportunity to make important decisions?

What these persons miss, besides their job identities and the daily adventure that work provides, is being looked up to by colleagues and staff, being someone who matters, feeling responsible and being challenged.

Interestingly enough, stress addiction can be harmful to some, leading to heart attacks — but not to all. For some, the release of adrenaline in the blood stream might increase resistance to disease through the production of lymphocytes.

In other words, stress may be bad for some individuals but good

for others. They thrive living in the fast lane, getting high on violent video games and extreme sports. People addicted to adrenaline seek ways to get these surges and when deprived of them become irritable or depressed.

I get a "high" when I see a good performance in a theater or have a particularly stimulating conversation, and that's enough for me.

Seeing a destructive storm on television, hearing someone else's bad news or a dramatic story also provide a small kick, which explain people's preoccupation with sensational trials and sex scandals.

After all, what is "having a good time" but a "high"?

Stress is negative when people have little control over their work. Low-level employees with heavy job demands are at the highest risk of heart disease. The workers with least control over their jobs were five times as likely to develop coro-

nary heart disease as were those with the most control.

Job control involves two factors: the ability to make one's own decisions and the capacity to use a range of skills.

If psychological strain cannot be translated into action, then the cardiovascular system is adversely affected. Even talking to someone about one's stress is an action that can be helpful.

Being in control and being needed are highs. So how to get that high in other ways is what must be found.

What gives you a high? How much of it do you need and with what intensity? Being aware of one's needs for adrenaline highs is already half the battle in seeking what one must have to feel alive. This will give you control over your behaviors and not let you fall prey to unconscious motivations and needs.

three-story building in an area that does not permit three stories."

In other action, community activist Mike Costello, a skin diver, gave a slideshow presentation discussing the life cycle of sea lions showing how the pinniped population has mushroomed over the past 40 or 50 years in and around La Iolla Cove.

Costello's photos showed oncebrown rocks now heavily whitewashed with pinniped and bird waste. He suggested a letter be sent to the city by the advisory group advocating that a comprehensive study be done of La Jolla's beaches and rocky shores.

LJCPA trustee Ray Weiss, a Scripps Institution professor, warned such a study would "have holes in it and not be scientific."

LJCPA vice chairman Joe LaCava said he didn't see much to be gained by writing another letter to the city.

"Let's not get bogged down in the seal wars," LaCava said. "We need to find a permanent solution to the stench at La Jolla Cove that does not result in any other La Jolla beaches being compromised."




