Pot dispensary rules grow teeth

OB shops likely to be closed

Following a five-hour debate, the City Council voted 5-2 last week to pass a medical marijuana ordinance that limits dispensaries to light industrial zones, which means most of the current pot shops in Ocean Beach, Pacific Beach and downtown will have to close.

A final vote of the City Council is set for Tuesday.

Nearly 500 people attended the March 28 City Council session, which was devoted to the sole topic of a medical marijuana ordinance. The council voted to allow marijuana dispensaries in Mission Valley, Barrio Logan, Southeast San Diego, Otay Mesa and San Ysidro.

District 2 City Councilman Todd Gloria made the motion for the ordinance but conceded early in the discussion that the ordinance is "more restrictive than I would care for," a remark that drew applause.

Dispensaries cannot be within 600 feet of schools, parks, libraries, daycare centers or churches. Gloria changed the 1,000-foot restriction to 600 feet.

Dispensaries must also have a security system, be open 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. daily, obtain a conditional-use permit and be nonprofit. Patients will be allowed to possess a pound of pot if they have a medical marijuana state identification card and are allowed to grow 24 marijuana plants.

Several patients spoke about how marijuana increases appetite, especially for those with AIDS, and some said medical pot decreases pain. Rudy Reyes, who suffered burns over 70 percent of his body in the 2003 wildfires, said it worked for him.

Voting in favor were council President Tony Young, and councilmembers Kevin Faulconer, Sherri Lightner and Marti Emerald. David Alvarez was absent.

Councilmembers Carl DeMaio and Lorie Zapf voted against the stricter dispensary rules. DeMaio said the city's finances are in crisis and the cost of enforcing the ordinance is unknown. Zapf said she was disappointed colleges were not listed in the 600-foot restriction.

It is still illegal to transport marijuana.

Cause of fatal boat accident at Shelter Island probed

Police continue to investigate the deaths of two men — a father and son - who drowned March 28 when a 26foot sailboat capsized between Harbor Island and Shelter Island, said Marguerite Elicone, a spokeswoman for the Port of San Diego.

A 26-foot sailboat overturned near Shelter Island, killing two men. The cause of the capsizing remains under investigation and it is unclear whether the Harbor Police are viewing any criminal wrongdoing in connection with the accident.

Investigators with the Harbor Police are expected to deliver their report to the District Attorney's Office if they suspect anything illegal, Elicone said.

There are many theories about the cause of the boat's capsizing, including whether the boat, Nessie, had too many people on it for the choppy, windy conditions that day, Elicone said. However, nothing will be clear until investigators finish their probe, she said. A report may or may not conclude foul play or illegal activity, she said.

The sailboat was reportedly owned by a nonprofit company based in Indiana but the boat was driven down from Orange County and was not docked long-term at any local marinas, Elicone

Clayton, a senior who will be graduating next month, could not be reached for comment directly. The announcement of his resignation was made in chapel before the student body Friday.

On March 20, Clayton came out of the closet, saying, "Yes, the rumors are true ... I'm gay.'

Clayton made the announcement in front of about 340 people who had gathered at the "All God's Children" forum, a group in discussions on lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender

That forum lost a place to meet after John Denney, the conservative denomination's southern district superintendent, told Pastor Dee Kelley the group should not meet in the church again.

On Monday, Denney told The Beacon he initially approved the group to meet at the church, but later said his direction was in response "to concerns [that] the group meeting ... had become a 'homosexual advocacy' group, which would mean that Pastor Dee Kelley and First Church could be charged with hosting/sponsoring

a gathering that was in direct conflict with the teachings of the Church of the Nazarene."

Denney said the March 20 forum when Clayton said he was gay "served to validate that concern" of

the church. It was Kelley who told the forum March 20 "the church needs to be a

safe place to engage these topics." He told a reporter Sunday he still believes this.

The group had been meeting mostly at First Church for more than three years. Their last meeting Sunday drew 22 people. The campus has 2,400 enrolled students.

A group facilitator said the group would meet again, possibly in private homes.

Clayton has been accepted at Princeton Theological Seminary and plans to become a minister. He told the group March 20 he "probably won't be doing ministry in this denomination. My commitment is to be celibate while I'm here."

The university requires all students to abstain from sexual relations, alcohol and tobacco products. Gay students in the past were expelled, but some of them were able to transfer to

Motorcycle crash kills young serviceman

A makeshift memorial, placed at the corner of Cañon and Rosecrans streets marks the location of a motorcycle accident that took the life of 22-year-old serviceman Blake Martin on March 31.

According to San Diego police officer Rod Fischer, Martin apparently raced his Suzuki 1000 around two cars in an attempt to beat a yellow light when he slammed into a black Cadillac making a left turn. Martin was thrown over the car and onto the street. He was pronounced dead at the scene. The 64-year-old female driver of the Cadillac was taken to a hospital with cuts and bruises.

BASEBALL

With league play beginning this week, Point Loma High School's (PLHS) baseball team has compiled a 5-6 record in non-league and tournament play while one of their top pitchers already has more losses than he had for the entire 2010 season.

Looking only at junior Connor Baits' statistics, one would expect the 6-foot-5-inch righthander to be 3-0. He has endured, however, a lack of run support.

To date, Baits has compiled an excellent 1.75 earned-run average. Opponents are batting only .214 against him. He sports an outstanding walk-to-strikeout ratio of 3:20 and has completed all of his three starts. Despite these glittering numbers, Baits' record stands at 0-3. His team has scored only two total runs in support of Baits' efforts.

Baits, who was 9-2 last season, will be hoping for better production from Pointer hitters when he takes the mound as the Pointers go through league games.

Fellow starter Kellen Urbon was the beneficiary of a monster day at the plate by battery mate Campbell Wear in a recent City Tournament game. Wear nearly hit for the cycle with a single, double and tape-measure home run estimated at 420 feet as he racked up six RBIs in the 8-1 victory.

Max Sorenson pitched the final inning, and neither he nor Urbon issued a walk to the Conquistadors.

Urbon improved his record to 2-0, while Wear, the other starter, stands at 1-1

After several games were postponed by March rains, the Pointers were forced to play five straight days, putting a strain on the pitching staff.

By the fourth day, Sorenson made the start at home against a strong-hit-

ting Patrick Henry squad and left after one and a third innings with a 9-0 deficit. From there, the Pointers outscored the Patriots 8-2, but came up on the short end of an 11-8 final.

Andrew Huelga came on to pitch four and two-thirds innings of strong relief. First baseman Cody Harvey was summoned to close the game and pitched a perfect inning, even recording a strikeout. Baits drew cheers when he blasted a high pitch over the left field fence in the losing cause.

On the fifth day, Wear, Bates and Urbon shared pitching duties in a 6-0 loss to St. Augustine. The Pointers recorded six hits and an uncharacteristic four errors.

Wear's .344 batting average, 11 hits and three doubles leads the Pointers while Baits' 10 RBIs are tops.

League play will send the Pointers against each opponent in a two-game home-away series. Other Western League teams are Cathedral Catholic, La Jolla, Coronado, Mission Bay, Madison and University City (coached by PLHS football assistant Joe Radovich).

BOYS' VOLLEYBALL

First-year coach James Sakasegawa has the team off to a strong start. The Pointers stand at 7-2 and sit alone atop the Eastern League with a perfect 5-0 record.

Paulino Ramos-Padilla (101) and Nate George (82) lead the team in kills. Ramos-Padilla (19) and Reid Liechty (11) lead in aces, while Ramos Padilla (77) and Nathan Hoppe (76) have the most digs.

Thomas Penney (62) and George (43) are tops in blocks while Hoppe (133) and Ruben Diaz (73) have the most successfully received serves.

In five of the team's victories, opponents have failed to win a single set.

The Lady Pointers have a 6-4 record in the non-league portion of their schedule, with league play beginning next week.

The team's record includes victories of 15-1 (Orange Glen) and 18-5 (Mission Bay), with two victories by shutout. They have outscored opponents 61-19 to date.

Clayton told the forum he prayed to be straight for many years.

"Change me. Make me normal," Clayton said during the March 20 forum. "I prayed every evening. It didn't change me," he said, adding, "I no longer pray that prayer."

"Thanks be to God that he has made me gay. I am gay. I am Christian. I will continue to live in that manner," said Clayton, who received a standing ovation at the forum.

Days later, university President Bob Brower sent an e-mail to all students, saying they need to "treat each other with respect, kindness and grace, regardless of positions held."

His e-mail also said "the church continues to firmly hold the position that a homosexual lifestyle is contrary to the Scriptures ... all forms of sexual intimacy that occur outside the covenant of heterosexual marriage are sinful distortions of the holiness and beauty God intended for it."

The student newspaper, The Point Weekly, published an interview with Clayton on March 21, in which Clayton told administrators of his orientation. He also described frustration about "double standards," adding, "I never signed anything when I came into office or when I came into school that said I wouldn't be gay."



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BO-beau's completes transition from iconic Thee Bungalow

The original site of Thee Bungalow was built in the 1930s and once housed a bait-and-tackle shop, as well as Burger Bungalow. Ed Moore established Thee Bungalow in 1987, and David Cohn of the award-winning Cohn Restaurant Group purchased it in 2006.

Last August, Thee Bungalow closed for a unique transformation.

Cohn and Philippe Beltran, of Beltran Restaurant Concepts, worked closely on the project. They realized Thee Bungalow would be a great location for "something very special."

In December, BO-beau Kitchen + Bar opened its rustic doors. A playful abbreviation of "Bourgeois Bohemian," the restaurant is aptly named.

Beltran took special care with the décor, which included traveling to family homes in France and Spain for "authentic pieces that decorate the walls, add to the ambiance and are symbolic, sophisticated, warm and comfort-

Also in keeping with this concept is an antiqued print from Toulouse Lautrec's Moulin Rouge "Can-Can" series on the bar's ceiling and bathroom doors collaged with deconstructed pages from two French plays from the 1920s and 30s. The pièce de résistance, however, is the lyrical placement throughout the restaurant of the classic French love song "Je t'aime."

BO-beau's exudes a friendly atmosphere that encourages guests to interact with each other as well as the superb staff. Bartender Jean Paul said, "There is definitely a locals' focus, as most of the patrons are from Ocean Beach and Point Loma."

"Thee Bungalow was a formal special-event-style dining establishment," "We decided to focus on a more casual menu aimed toward sharing. There will be daily specials in addition to 'days of the week' specials posted on one of our chalkboards."

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
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

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




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Taste of Shelter Island poised to wow tastebuds, satiate visitors

Losing a pair of beloved pets isn't a pleasant experience. But the loss of guitarist Dave Humphries' cats Eden, 20, and Eve, 16, inspired him to take action. As a result, he launched "Humphries at Humphrey's," a concert benefiting the San Diego Humane Society and Second Chance Rescue for Dogs.

"Those cats brought us many years of joy," Humphries said. "This is a way to remember them, and hopefully help as many other animals as we can."

Eden's and Eve's passing and the search for a new feline friend helped cement the idea of an annual event to help animals in shelters. Now in its second year, the daytime event takes place on April 17 with a Beatles and a musical theme of the sixties. On hand will be host DJ Dave Mason of FM105.7 (The Walrus), with performances from Humphries and his group, the Beatles tribute group Help. They will be joined by Fab Moore, The Baja Bugs and indie

rockers Wendy Bailey & True Stories.

Humphries notes the importance of helping organizations like the Humane Society, particularly in tough economic times. He said the state of the economy is the secondary reason for this concert. Most owners know pets can be expen-

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

ing to give up pets. So, in addition to stray animals, more pets are also ending up in shelters. It's a sad state of affairs. We're just trying to help any which way we can."

Originally from Durham, England, Humphries relocated to San Diego in 1996, releasing four albums to date. A huge Beatles fan, he has worked with such luminaries as Gordon Waller (Peter & Gordon) and Tony Sheridan, even going so far as to name his new cat "Teddy Boy" after the Paul McCartney

According to Humphries, the choice of a Beatles-themed event is because the Fab Four was "the greatest group, ever." But he added that their music truly is universal.

"We're hoping that this is going to be one big party," Humphries said. "And the Beatles are a group whose music everybody knows, whether it's musicians who play it or the audience who sings along. We're raising money for a serious issue, but at this show we want to have fun."

Former Beat Farmers guitarist Joey Harris will be the special guest and will sit in with several of the day's performers. For him, being part of events like this is important.

"It's a way to stay socially active, helping people instead of just watching the news and complaining that things are wrong," Harris said. "It's important to try and help in a situation, roll up your sleeves and get involved. If I was a bricklayer, I could help build a school or something like that. But I'm a singer and guitarist, so I work with that."

While Humphries said he is happy with the outlook for the event, he's even happier with the support for worthy causes from the local music scene.

"It's amazing at how quick musicians in San Diego are to respond when the call goes out for help," said the amiable guitarist. "The amount of talent in this town is incredible. That so many are always glad to pitch in at this and other events is a wonderful thing."

It's possible there will be a third edition in 2012.

"It's too early to tell for sure," Humphries said. "That's a long time away, and there is still this year to get through," Humphries said. "But I'm afraid the need will be there.'

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
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


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
