Wounded PLHS alum makes impressive strides in rehab

Organizers are putting the final touches on another fundraiser for shooting victim Will Barton as the 20-year-old continues to make strides in his recovery.

Barton, a 2010 graduate of Point Loma High School, was shot three times in the head in the early hours of Oct. 29 as he walked to his father's Mission Hills home after finishing a late shift working at a Hillcrest restaurant.

The shooter, a wanted criminal, was killed by San Diego police during an Oct. 31 shootout in Barrio Logan.

Barton's fighting spirit has been a major factor as he clung to life for several weeks in a Scripps Mercy Hospital intensive-care unit before being sent to a rehabilitation facility in Encinitas for intensive physical therapy.

Improvement comes with each waking day for Barton

With the dawn of every new day, Will Barton continues to amaze the medical staff and his family with advancements in his recovery.

When paramedics rushed Barton to Scripps Mercy Hospital early on the morning of Oct. 29, they figured his life was over. Shot three times in the head and suffering from a massive loss of blood, the situation was dire.

But Barton continues to prove the naysayers wrong.

From the moment they first saw their son in the intensive-care unit of Scripps Mercy Hospital, father Will Barton and mother Marie Naiera knew their son was a fighter.

Milestones in Barton's recovery, as taken from notes in a journal, kept mainly by Najera:

ullet Nov. 4 (while in intensive care): "Will was responding to his family

by blinking his eyes on command, and has been able to move his head and exhibit some facial expressions."

• Nov. 7: "Doctors are planning on removing his ventilator today. His fever has broken."

• Nov. 10: "Will's feeding tube has been removed from his mouth and relocated to his tummy."

• Nov. 11: "Doctors removed the ventilator machine last night as Will is breathing on his own now.'

• Nov: 13: "Will has been moved to a room with a view on the tenth floor (no more ICU).'

• **Nov. 14:** "(Will) did 15 minutes of physical therapy. He was wiped out after that."

• Nov. 19: "He moved his right foot and toes for me yesterday. This was a first, and an amazing start to his recovery."

Bike advocate gears up for a new year of road-sharing efforts in Ocean Beach

San Diego's stunning beach communities or climbed the hills in its distinct neighborhoods know the satisfaction of cruising around in the open air, viewing unobstructed sights and hearing the raw sounds of the city without the barrier of glass and steel that exists from within the confines of a motor vehicle.

San Diego County Bicycle Coalition's recent "Advocate of the Year," Nicole Burgess, hopes to share that very experience with more San Diegans by lobbying for bike- and pedestrian-friendly infrastructure and inspiring a bike culture among San Diego's youth to promote the next generation of cyclists within the city.

Through her work with the San Diego Bicycle Coalition, Bike SD and SAN-DAG's Bike/Ped Working Group, she ultimately hopes to help transform San Diego into a world-class bicycling city that encourages everyday riding for all. their beautiful earth that they get to

Those who have biked around any of said Burgess. "You get to just be out and I'm hoping that they will." there in the fresh air, and it's exciting and fun. I believe in living in your small communities. I think any community where you live and go to school should be a beautiful place to ride."

> With that mantra in mind, the Ocean Beach resident began her grassroots bike-advocacy efforts from within the boundaries of her own community.

> Three years ago, for example, Burgess started a bike train for students to Dana Middle School, starting with just her eldest daughter and a few of her neighbors. Over time, that number has grown to around 15 students, accompanied by a couple other parent chaperones who have volunteered their time to ensure the children get to their respective schools safely.

"I'm trying to advocate at the schools because the youth are my leaders," Burgess said. "It's their environment. It's

By tailoring her message to today s youth, she also hopes some teens will bypass investing in a car when they turn 16 because they have experienced the firsthand benefits of biking, particularly in light of the high death toll in adolescents and teens from motor vehicle acci-

"We have 35,000 deaths a year just from cars," she said. "You can be in a car and be taken out by a semi every day, but we don't avoid that car. We think it's safe. It's the same thing on a bike — I'm at risk out there. Any day could be my last, but the amount of accidents that happen in a car far exceed those on a bike, where you're going at a much slower speed."

To ensure the safety of bikers and pedestrians on San Diego's automobilecentric roadways, Burgess also helped found the San Diego City Council Dis-

trict 2 Bicycle-Pedestrian Working Group, which lobbies the city for infrastructure repairs and innovative solutions to transform communities spanning from downtown to Mission Bay into a

more bicycle-friendly district.

OB cell-phone robber set to be sentenced

The sentencing of an Ocean Beach man for robbing two 14-year-olds of their cell phones at knifepoint has been rescheduled for Jan. 22.

Gibran Torres Perez, 19, was on probation at the time of the robbery for a stabbing on Newport Avenue that was linked to him earlier in 2012.

Perez could get up to four years in prison under a plea agreement he made with San Diego Superior Court Judge Dwayne Moring, according to court records. It's possible he could get probation with a one-year jail term.

The robberies were committed on Oct. 29 and he sold both cell phones before he was arrested on Oct. 31. Perez was on probation for an April 14, 2012 incident in which a 20-year-old man was stabbed with

some type of metal tool. Perez pleaded guilty to felony assault in that earlier incident, in which he exchanged harsh words with the victim on Newport Avenue near Bacon Street.

The victim suffered injuries to his neck, hands and head.

Perez was sentenced to 180 days in jail and fined nearly \$500 in that incident. His probation has since been revoked. He could receive more jail time for violating probation, but records indicate the judge may impose only a concurrent sentence for the violation.

The earlier incident occurred when Perez had been drinking, according to court records. He was ordered not to drink alcohol for three vears on probation.

He remains in custody without bail.

OB's thrift-store shopping trend continues to catch fire

Thrift-store business probably has never has been greater than in this stagnant economy. But regardless of their job status or income, Ocean Beach thrift regulars just know that there are bargains to be had in the second-hand stores.

Even at 12, Zoe Wilcox is eagerly scouting bargains at Thrift Trader on Newport Avenue. With a \$20 gift certificate she received for her birthday, she's searching for five items.

At Thrift Trader, almost all clothing goes for \$5.99, or four items for \$20. Currently, there's a sale, allowing Wilcox to purchase five things for her birthday.

Shopping at thrift stores "is cheap and cool," said Wilcox. "You can find a bunch of good stuff here and sometimes you can hit the jackpot."

The preteen says she doesn't even have to worry about keeping up with the other kids. The current big name in cool clothes for teens, she says, is Abercrombie "and they have it here."

Employee De Andalio says business is brisk. The company has a second thrift, called 2 Dollar Thrill, on the same block. There also are Thrift Traders in North Park and Pacific Beach.

The stores buy, sell and trade — customers sell their gently used items for 50 cents or trade two for one. There's even a voucher with no expiration if cus-



KGB DJ and businessman Zedaker, a Point Loman with a zest for life



Accused Midway rapist held on \$3M bail

Bail has been set at \$3 million for a suspect accused of raping a maid in a Sports Arena Boulevard hotel room in

A preliminary hearing has been set for Friday, Jan. 11 in San Diego Superior Court for Christopher R. Stevens, 44, who is charged in the Dec. 21 attack at the Wyndham Garden Hotel in Point

Stevens has pleaded not guilty to seven charges, which include three rape counts, penetration with an object, making a criminal threat, false imprisonment and felony assault.

If convicted, Stevens faces several hundred years in prison because he has convictions for two robberies, auto theft, burglary and felony evasion of police, according to court records. He qualifies for the third-strike law.

Stevens was arraigned Dec. 28. He was arrested by police on Dec. 24 at another hotel. He remains in custody. — Neal Putnam

one of the finest places to ride," she said. "Pacific Beach is a prime example. It has all that bay and it's so packed. People are all coming to Mission Beach to ride. It's saying we want it. We have the weather, and we can have classone facilities connecting our communities."

In addition to spearheading the effort to get share-the-road ("sharrow") signs on local roadways — which Burgess says are a useful, but temporary fix — she has also pinpointed much-needed repairs at specific sites within the beach communities, like the three blocks on Nimitz Boulevard between Oliphant and Evergreen streets, which were lined in late December with new buffered bike lanes, thanks to her efforts.

"The bike culture city is here. I can see that the momentum is here," Burgess said. "In Portland, in the five to eight years they did all their infrastructure in the 1990s, what they spent on that was equivalent to one mile of highway construction. This is San Diego. We have beautiful weather. If Portland can do it, we should be able to increase our mode share to 20 percent."

communities and boost their local economies, Burgess also envisions a bigger picture for the future of biking in San Diego.

"The city of San Diego is monstrous, and I personally think we need an advisory group for each district," Burgess said. "My pitch would be to have a bike coordinator for each district in San Diego where they're working together really implementing what can be done out there. We have thousands of bikers riding this coastline everyday. We need innovative stuff. We have so much money that goes into planning and prioritizing projects. We need to focus on what the community wants and what the community is ready for."

With many more infrastructure projects to check off her list in the coming year, San Diego will undoubtedly see much more of Burgess in the future. In the meantime, she said, one of the best ways to advocate for the bike movement on an individual level is to simply get on a bike.

"Enjoy your community in 2013 and explore San Diego by bike," she said

- Nov. 26: "(Will) has passed his swallow test, and has been cleared to eat ice chips. He can now speak just like himself, as his trach(eotomy) has been reduced in size."
- Nov. 27: "Will has moved to an acute-care facility in Hillcrest. He is breathing on his own. He is doing more than any doctor anticipated. He is trying to work up to three hours of physical therapy before he moves to another facility that specializes in his type of recovery."
- Nov. 30: "Will's trach(eotomy) has been removed completely, and he had pancakes and eggs for breakfast today! We are so proud of our boy! Much more physical therapy is still needed to get him

moving again."

- **Dec. 3:** "Will is healing so very fast. He is able to lift his right leg and some of his right shoulder. Sunday was the first time in over a month that we heard Will laugh. He was extremely happy and thankful for everything and everyone in his life. I am amazed by his healing powers and his will to carry on day in and day out."
- **Dec. 4:** "Will met with his speech therapist. She is giving him much harder tasks now that she knows him. Will is slowly starting to move his left leg. He still gets dizzy when they stand him up."
- **Dec. 5:** "Now (Will) is actually moving the whole leg up off the bed about three inches. Hopefully soon he will be able to walk. I am so excited for him!"
- **Dec. 13:** "Will is in (Scripps) Encinitas Rehabilitation Hospital. If you would like to visit, the doctors suggest coming

after 3:30 p.m. He will be done with all of his (many hours of) therapies by then."

- Dec. 18: "(Will) has started a more intense PT today. They had him in a machine that helps him to stand up. He is doing a great job of staying positive. I am amazed by his strength and will power."
- **Dec. 20:** "After a month and a few weeks, Will finally got to take a shower."
- Dec. 26: "Will is starting to move the left side of his body. It's not very pretty and it's very shaky but he can almost touch his mouth with his hand."
- Jan. 2: "Will has started to use his left hand to feed himself. He does require help, but it is so satisfying to him."
- Jan. 5: "The hospital is loading up their van and taking Will to Swami's (Beach for an hour)."

has come, just as it had in 2004, when Ziter assumed his current post. Built in 1941, the former seat of classroom instruction for thousands of Navy recruits at the former Naval Training Center (NTC) has also hosted a few weekend movies and shows headlining wartime luminaries like Bob Hope and

A renovated Luce is an idea whose time

Nat "King" Cole. The former NTC San Diego base, where the venue is located, opened in 1916 and was decommissioned and handed over to the city in 1997, with groundbreaking for new development taking place in 2001. The Luce, on the west side of Truxton

Road north of Dewey Road, is 20,000 square feet in area and has 1,800 seats, which at first blush seems more than ample for an anchor performance venue — but several logistical concerns impede renovation. There's no lobby space; the wall-to-wall seating is too deep, the stage is too small and too high; acoustics are marginal and restrooms are lacking and

A wave of public hearings and poten- lion. tial tenant input on the facility's best use have also weighed into the mix, which helped result in a Del Mar firm's 2008 feasibility study. The research was conducted at a cost of \$65,000.

"We concluded that we'd like to accommodate local dance theater and a number of film festivals around the city," Ziter said, pointing to activities like several ethnic fêtes and the area's popular 48-Hour Film Project, wherein competing groups write, produce and showcase movies from scratch over two days.

"We'd like three theaters within the existing facility, with 250 to 450 seats for two of them," he said.

The remaining stage would be a blackbox affair, with a customizable seating plan. Mall-type walkways would abut the theaters to the sides with a main lobby in the middle of the floor.

But four and a half years have passed

since the feasibility study's conclusion and Ziter weighed in when asked if he thought the lag was acceptable.

"Not really," Ziter said. "You have to remember that 2008 was the start of the Great Recession. When you're operating 27 buildings [on 28 acres], that becomes problematic. And we also lost the [city] redevelopment agency as a partner.'

On Feb. 1, the San Diego Redevelopment Agency was dissolved, as were all state redevelopment agencies in a move to cut California's budget deficit. The local unit was an original planner of NTC with developer The Corky McMillin Cos.

And in a private sector pressed for cash, the foundation's plans for the Luce have suffered drastically.

"This is not like Balboa Park," Ziter said, "where the city (as park owner) is responsible for maintenance and new projects. The [NTC] Foundation has to raise the money for the auditorium by itself, and the recession slowed things down in terms of donations. Resources are spread thin, and it's going to cost \$15 million to \$18 million to renovate the Luce the way we'll want it according to the study findings."

The expected total cost of the renovations at Liberty Station is \$100 mil-

Projects this size have a way of Ireinventing] themselves," Ziter said. "Look at the California Center for the Arts [in Escondido], which seems to be turning around now. Look at ECPAC," the languishing East County Performing Arts Center, which the El Cajon City Council has taken another look at and may be edging toward renovating after many years of heated debate on its future.

And look at Luce Auditorium, which temporarily has fallen victim to unforeseen political and fiscal circumstances. While Friday Night Liberty is a lively, colorful spectacle for and among community patrons, it's consigned to a life of its own as a lumbering economy and an administrative detour hold sway over the auditorium's intermediate future.

Record books were rewritten this month at Golden Gymnasium, and although it was Grand Canyon coming away with a 63-49 win over the Point Loma Nazarene University Sea Lions, PLNU senior forward Andrea Campbell set new school and Pacific West Conference marks in blocks with 12.

Campbell matched the previous conference record of nine in the first half, before finishing with 12 rejections. Those blocks marks also eclipsed her own previous school record of 11, which she set against Bethany Lutheran her sophomore season.

Campbell helped lead a valiant effort by the Sea Lions (4-6, 2-2 PacWest) to hang with the 'Lopes (12-4, 4-1 PacWest). Callie Rhoads led all scorers with 17 points as she connected on 5-of-9 shots from 3-point range. Savannah Erskine also reached double-figures with 13 points. The junior guard led the team with six rebounds and four assists, to go along with three treys. PLNU's advantage from outside kept them in the contest but eventually the size of the 'Lopes prevailed.

Point Loma was set to take to the road for a PacWest conference game against Azusa Pacific on Jan. 8.

There is not much difference in looking at the recent box score between the Point Loma Sea Lions and Grand Canyon University (GCU) 'Lopes. Both teams made 18 baskets, both were nearly even on turnovers and rebounding but it was the 'Lopes ability to connect on 10 3-point baskets that earned them the 63-51 victory.

This was the 13th straight win for GCU which improved to 14-2 on the season and remained a perfect 4-0 in Pacific West Conference play. The loss drops PLNU to 3-8 (0-4 PacWest).

"Turlock came out with a lot of energy and put us on our heels. They played very well," said Susi, the Sockers captain who posted his fifth four-point game of the season. "Good teams get wins even when they don't play their best, and we did that."

San Diego responded with a renewed defensive energy in the second half, limiting the Express to no shots on goal

"This looks like a team we may face in the playoffs," said San Diego head coach Phil Salvagio. "There were some nerves at halftime, but we came out with great determination in the third quarter and got the win."

Despite allowing their highest goal total of the season, the Sockers extended a remarkable defensive streak, holding their opponent under double-digit goals for the 31st straight game.





Community rallies for seriously injured PLHS player

Members of the PLHS community and Peninsula residents are rallying to help the family of a school athlete who suffered serious leg injuries during the annual homecoming football game this past season.

Senior running back Johnny Maes, a fast and powerful runner — despite his 5-foot-6-inch, 155-pound frame — was making his 64th carry of the season. As he was tackled and driven out of bounds, Maes was clearly in excruciating pain as trainers and medical staff rushed to his side.

While most knee injuries involve tearing only the anterior cruciate ligament (ACL), Maes additionally tore his lateral collateral ligament (LCL) and posterior cruciate ligament (PCL), in addition to a complete dislocation of the knee joint and nerve damage in his leg all the way down to his foot.

Maes has already undergone several painful — and very costly — surgeries. He has returned, in a wheelchair, to his PLHS classes.

A bank account has been established for donations to help the Maes family deal with the financial hardships of their son's medical costs. Only members of the Maes family have access to the account.
