\$3.5M facelift in the works for Tom Ham's

Tom Ham's Lighthouse — a longstanding fixture on the westernmost point of Harbor Island — has literally been a beacon of bright light along the waterfront for mariners and diners alike for the last 40 vears. When Tom Ham first purchased the property, Coast Guard regulations mandated that a beacon illuminate that point on the manmade penin-

Through collaboration with the Coast Guard and with a little ingenuity from Ham's architect, Beacon No. 9 was incorporated into the design of the restaurant itself, and an easement was granted to the Coast Guard for the maintenance and operation of the still-functioning lighthouse.

Now, more than four decades later, Tom Ham's daughter, Susan Baumann, husband Larry and their three ty adult sons — Andy, Tommy and Grant — will modernize major features of the 1971 bayfront restaurant with \$3.5 million in renovations to its interior dining spaces, banquet rooms and exterior facades.

From the outside, Harbor Island passersby will see walls knocked down to accommodate expansive windows and a new outdoor dining patio above the water, drastic

changes to the interior dining area that will include an 18seat bar and adjacent cocktail lounge with panoramic views of the bay and cityscape, as well as the creation of a new wedding court in a semisecluded corner of the proper-

"We did a renovation about 10 years ago, but we were only closed for about a month. It was never seen in the public's eye as a major renovation. There wasn't enough change. It was more of an update than a remodel," said youngest son Andy. "This is a major renovation, and it's definitely about time. We're getting close to our lease end with the port, so if

Noisy, but beautifully exotic wild parrots call San Diego home

The flocks of large, green-and-red birds around San Diego may seem unusual, but they're a part of the beach culture now. They're wild parrots.

Though the parrots are not native to San Diego, or California as a whole, they've been here for a while and are likely here to stay.

According to The California Parrot Project, migrate, but stay in San Diego year-round. from tropical trees and shrubs planted in urban and residential areas in such communities as Ocean Beach, Point Loma, Pacific Beach and La Jolla.

Karen Straus, coordinator of the San Diego Bird Festival, hosted by the San Diego Audubon Society, said the birds do not

the birds survive on seeds, fruit and nectar They have established communal roosts around the county that they return to each night. During the day, the birds will fly out to a variety of food sources, depending on the time of year.

The theft of \$3,000 worth of guitars and accessories overnight from a Point Loma High School arts facility has left two young, dedicated musicians saddened and disappointed.

Eddy Allen and Shawn Gardner were rehearsing the evening of Feb. 21 with the school Jazz Band for an upcoming performance in the campus' Larry Zeiger Performing Arts Center. At the conclusion of the session, the boys were told by a staff member they could leave their equipment overnight.

The next morning, however, the instruments were gone, leaving Allen and Gardner wondering how their property could have been taken from the apparently locked facili-

Allen is the lead singer in two bands — Revoltage, and 140 Yards — and Gardner is a bassist for the groups.

The young musicians said they just want their instruments back.

"These guitars were special to us. As artists, that's how we speak," Allen said. "The Strato- for upcoming performances.

caster was my guitar. It was the one I felt I could express myself on. Shawn and I are both disappointed that someone would take things with such sentimental value."







you make capital improvements on the building, you get a lease extension."

For a \$3.5 million investment and about four months of construction, Tom Ham's gets another 40 years on its lease.

And in the next 40 years, the familyrun business will carry on the restaurant's legacy with the myriad strengths of the entire family, including Susan and Larry's sons who — until recently were pursuing careers in fields like engineering, law and medicine.

"We need to have that family feel in there. Everyone who comes to Bali Hai [also run by the Baumanns] knows Larry, my father. Everybody's met Larry and that's been a big part of the business is to see the same face when you walk in the door, so it's time to have family over there," said Andy. "Unfortunately, my grandfather died a year after he bought the place, so we haven't really had family there, but now we kind of have an

"Putting together the artifacts ties in the whole theme. Those are the things that are important to us," said Andy. "The architect can design the whole thing, but you have to have those little touches at the end that really tie it all in."

Among Tom Ham's Lighthouse's many maritime artifacts are maps of San Diego Bay dating back to 1890, a genuine fog belt from a lighthouse in Massachusetts and a few leftover ship pieces from San Diego's maritime museum.

The most striking nautical fixture in the restaurant, however, is prominently displayed near the main entrance in the form of a fully operational beacon warning bay sailors of nearby land.


The lighthouse, too, is getting a modern makeover, with the Coast Guard's recent replacement of its old halogen lens to a cleaner, more energy-efficient LED

"The Coast Guard came out last week and changed the light out just like they did at the Point Loma Lighthouse. It's pretty impressive," said Andy. "It's a bright light, and it's a lot smaller than the other one. The old lens was big and it would put out more of a glow. This one is very distinct and sends out more of a

The upgrades to both the lighthouse lens and building renovation are in line with a certain ongoing trend throughout Point Loma, with many improvements at other businesses in the area also under way.

"You can see that everybody is getting Ham's penchant for authentic collectato the end of their leases. there are trees in the Lindo Lake Park area that are a good food source for them," Straus said. "So, at certain times of the year, they'll be out at Lindo Lake, but they're probably roosting back here [in the beach communities]."

She said the parrots have already made an appearance flying overhead at this year's bird festival, and they've caused some excitement at festivals in the past.

"At the bird festival three years ago, they landed in the trees," Straus said. "All our guests were running out of the workshops and running down to see the parrots right here at the festival."

While there is no single explanation as to how the birds got here, Straus said there are two main theories, both of which may be true.


One is that the parrots came to California as pets.

"People like to have birds, especially parrots, as pets," Straus said. "But sometimes, maybe there's a behavior problem with the bird or maybe [the owners] are moving and they can't take the bird with them, so the birds are simply released into the wild or the birds may escape into the wild."

According to The California Parrot Project, hundreds of released and escaped parrots throughout the state over time have led to the wild, breeding populations today.

The other theory, Straus said, is that parrots native to northern Mexico came to California in search of a suitable habitat as areas of Mexico became deforest-

Whatever the reason, the exotic birds have established themselves as a colorful addition to more than 500 species of


birds found throughout San Diego Coun-

Bank robber pleads to multiple heists

A Point Loma bank robber will be sentenced March 19 after admitting he placed gadgets that he claimed were bombs at several banks.

Roberto Amado Sepulveda, 24, pleaded guilty to all charges. The judge said he would impose up to a maximum sentence of five years and eight months in state prison, according to court records.

Sepulveda admitted to holding up the America West Bank on Rosecrans Street on Nov. 21 and to placing a device before two tellers there. He also admitted to holding up a Chase Bank branch and the Navy Federal Credit Union, both in Impe-

A credit union teller put a tracking device in with the cash and police arrested Sepulveda at an Imperial Beach home where he had been staying. Most of that money was recovered.

The devices Sepulveda left at all the banks were not bombs and no one was

Faux bomber released from custody

A man who made a false bomb threat at Robb Field in Ocean Beach was released from jail Feb. 25 after credit for time served. He will be allowed to live with family in Wyoming on three years' probation.

The bizarre incident took place July 20 when Kreighton John Kilgore, 28, told a woman he put a bomb in her mailbox and he told a responding police officer he had a bomb. He pleaded guilty to interfering with an officer from his duty because of the bomb threat.

San Diego Superior Court Judge Laura Halgren barred Kilgore from returning to within two blocks of Robb Field and to stay away from the woman. Kilgore said his home is in Jackson, Wyo., and probation officials are working to transfer Kilgore to be on probation in Wyoming, according to court records.

Halgren credited Kilgore for 371 days spent in jail, including months Kilgore spent in a state mental hospital after he was initially declared mentally incompetent to stand trial.

No explosives were found and Halgren dismissed charges of making a criminal threat, battery upon an officer and making a false bomb threat. The judge recommended psychiatric and substance-abuse treatment.

Police captain's son gets public service in assaults

A San Diego police captain's son has been ordered to perform 50 days of public work service after pleading guilty to three misdemeanor counts of battery on women in Pacific Beach whom he groped while drunk.

Alex Tyler Guaderrama, 23, will be wearing a device that monitors alcohol use while on terms of three years' probation. His driver license was suspended for 30 days and he was fined on Feb. 11.

Guaderrama, who moved to Alpine, will have to apply for a restricted driver license that would permit driving to and from work, according to Gina Coburn, spokeswoman for the San Diego City Attorney's Office. He will wear the secure continuous remote alcohol monitor (SCRAM) while on probation, she said.

Guaderrama admitted to assaulting two women outside a taco shop around 1 a.m. on Aug. 21 at 1190 Garnet Ave. A third woman was struck in the face. He also pleaded guilty to misdemeanor vandalism involving \$400 in damages to a car window of two victims who fled.

His father is Capt. Manny Guaderrama, and the department denied any favorable treatment to his son in the investigation for charges that were filed six weeks later.

The younger Guaderrama could return to court after completion of 25 days of public service and have the next 25 days converted to volunteer work at a nonprofit organization.

Prosecutor resigns after ticket-fixing fiasco

A jury has convicted a prosecutor of conspiracy to obstruct justice and two other misdemeanors in a Pacific Beach the District Attorney's Office on Feb. 19.

The resignation of Allison Worden, 37, will take effect on Feb. 28, said Steve Walker, a spokesperson for District Attorney Bonnie Dumanis. Worden was an experienced prosecutor for 10 years and handled murder and robbery cases.

Because the convictions are misdemeanors, they may not affect her license to practice law, but Worden might have trouble finding employment elsewhere as a prosecutor. She had been on paid leave of absence.

Her attorney, former District Attorney

Paul Pfingst, won a delay Feb. 20 in her sentencing and it was set for March 8 before San Diego Superior Court Judge Louis Hanoian. She remains free on her own recognizance.

Worden, who was charged under her married name of Allison Debow, could get up to a year in jail, but it is more likely she would get community service with probation. It would be a security problem for a prosecutor to be sent to any jail.

The incident began on May 28, 2011 in the 4600 block of Cass Street when a police officer pulled over a car driven by another prosecutor, Amy Maund, and discovered that Worden, a passenger, wasn't wearing a seat belt.

The officer issued two tickets to both women, and Worden called Sgt. Kevin Friedman, a supervisor in the traffic department. Friedman apparently destroyed the tickets and later pleaded no contest to destruction of a traffic citation before it was filed in court.

Friedman, 49, was ordered to perform 40 hours of volunteer work, and placed on two years probation with a \$500 fine. He also resigned from the police depart-

Worden testified "the cop didn't act appropriately" during the traffic stop and said she only called Friedman to complain about the officer, denying asking him to destroy the tickets.

Man to stand trial for bank robberies

A Mission Bay man has been ordered to stand trial for allegedly robbing two Pacific Beach banks in 2010 that are linked to him via DNA in a hat he left

A June 13 trial date was set for Bryan Whaley Leasure, 50, who pleaded not guilty to the charges following a preliminary hearing in San Diego Superior Court. He was arrested Jan. 16.

Leasure's DNA is on file because he was convicted of five robberies in federal court in Arizona in 2000. That means Leasure could get 25 years for each bank robbery as part of the "third strike" law.

Two tellers who were robbed identified Leasure in court as the man who robbed them. A Bank of America branch and a Wells Fargo branch in Pacific Beach were robbed on July 12, 2010 and Aug. 13, 2010.

Leasure remains in custody on \$150,000 bail.

Bank robber handed one-year sentence

A robber who held up a Pacific Beach bank on New Year's Eve has been sentenced to one year in jail and his projected release date is May 31, according to the sheriff's officials.

James Arthur McWatters, 36, of San Diego, received credit for serving 44 days in jail on Feb. 14. The sheriff's department has discretion to release inmates after they serve half their sentence.

San Diego Superior Court Judge Frederick Maguirre placed McWatters on three years' probation and fined him over

McWatters held up a Wells Fargo Bank branch that was inside the Ralph's grocery store at 4315 Mission Blvd. It occurred at 12:30 p.m. and he made off with \$3,200 in cash.

"Nobody was hurt, fortunately," said Maguirre, who told McWatters he was lucky the case was not prosecuted in federal court.

 $McWatters\ pleaded\ guilty\ just\ 15\ days$ after the robbery, and a charge of making a criminal threat was dropped. He was arrested Jan. 1 in Oceanside.

Soccer squad ends post-season run

The Point Loma High boys' soccer team was eliminated from the Div. II CIF playoffs on Feb. 23 in a dramatic and physical game that left Pointer players with broken hearts and aching muscles.

The seventh-seeded PLHS squad battled second-seed host Westview to a 1-1 tie in regulation play and the two sides were anticipating a penalty-kick shootout with less than a minute remaining in a 15-minute sudden death overtime period.

But that shootout never happened.

As Westview moved the ball into position near the Pointer goal, Wolverine senior forward Justin Kitts took advantage of a split-second opportunity and drilled a shot from the right side of Pointer goalie Evan Melone that found its way into the left side of the goal netting for a "golden goal" and the win.

Ironically, it was the only goal scored by Westview all night, after a rare "own goal" by the Pointers.

Wolverine players began a celebration while many of the devastated Pointers stood in stunned silence as the realization of what had just occurred struck them.

In a heartbeat, after 95 minutes of intense action, Pointer players saw their dreams vaporize, and many broke down, tears mixing with perspiration in the cold night air. Many had difficulty hiding their emotions as the two teams passed at midfield in the customary post-game handshake.

Earlier, the Pointers got off to a quick

It took only two minutes for them to take a 1-0 lead after a 5:30 p.m. start under the lights.

(nine goals, 14 assists) was taken down by a brutal tackle during the Pointers' first foray into Wolverine territory. While fans called for a yellow card or whistle, senior Miguel Alcantar found the ball on his foot directly in front of Westview goalie Erik Huston and poked a shot into the net.

But moments later, as a Pointer defender attempted to head the ball back to keeper Melone, the pass sailed higher than anticipated over the keeper's head and into the net for a rare

That 1-1 score remained for 91 Leading Pointer scorer Devan Patane minutes of intense play until the over-

time game-winner.

Pointer head coach Elliott Savitz praised his players after the game.

"I'm really proud of our seniors," he said. "They gave everything they had and left it all on the field tonight."

Savitz concluded, "I don't think (Westview) is a better side than us, but in soccer, sometimes there is a little bit of luck that makes the difference."







Therapy for Alzheimer's **Patients Improves Life**

Even though there is not yet a cure for Alzheimer's disease, researchers have been looking into therapies that can improve a person's quality of life, possibly lessen some of their symptoms and help them function

Notepad Computers - These same lightweight touchscreen computers, with puzzles, games and apps, are being used to exercise the person's mind, help them improve their dexterity and even help remind them of things. The games help the person feel that they've accomplished a task and are successful.

Bright Lights - A study that was published in the Journal of the AMA found that either intensive light therapy or UV light therapy has helped a person with memory issues have better cognition and helps improve mood. It may be especially helpful with sundowning behavior.

Art – This is increasingly being seen at museums around the country, where there are programs for people with Alzheimer's to view and create art. The result of this therapy lasts well past the therapy session.

"Comfort Food" - It is being researched hat letting the person have that extra piece of pie or that nighttime drink makes the person more content and peaceful. This could cause them to need less medication.

Tell a Story - Having the Alzheimer's patient in a group, looking at pictures and making up a story about that picture helps the person be creative, as well as helping them socialize.

Plant protein for health

There are many reasons to consider a vegetarian diet. Reducing or eliminating meat from your diet, especially factoryfarmed meat that's widely available in supermarkets, not only lowers your risk of some chronic disease, it's healthy for the planet, too. A 2006 United Nations report found that the meat industry produces more greenhouse gases than all vehicles combined. But, what about protein you might ask.

All plant foods are lower in one or another essential amino acids-the building blocks of protein—than animal food sources. To remedy this, combine whole grains and legumes in the same day's meal plan (not necessarily the same meal). The amino acid combo in those foods is the reason rice and beans, for example, are such important protein sources for vegetarians. "Any whole grain

like quinoa, corn, whole wheat, buckwheat, brown rice, plus a legume like pinto, lentils, black beans, and garbanzos is perfect," explains spokeswoman Cristine Gerbstadt, MD, RD. "Think of hummus and whole wheat pita, whole wheat pasta and red beans, brown rice and curried lentils, peanut butter on multi whole grain bread." If you're looking to lose weight, aim for three 1/2-cup servings of whole grain products a day. If you're super active, you may want to eat six servings a day.



Making book on the past: OB group seeks memorabilia

It was a piece of local history fit for Hollywood, so Hollywood made a movie out of it. "The Rainmaker," a 1956 film starring Burt Lancaster, centered on Charlie Hatfield's groundbreaking efforts in something called pluviculture, or chemically altering clouds to fuel precipitation. The real-life San Diego of 1916 was one of Hatfield's more noteworthy customers and little did anyone know that City Council would get far more than it bargained for when it hired him.

What started out as an attempt to fill parched Morena Dam exploded into cascading rain over most of January that knocked out phone service, broke two levees, eventually claimed around 20 lives and hit the Ocean Beach area particularly hard. San Diego was fit to be tied, refusing Hatfield his fee (\$1,000 per inch of water), over which he would sue the city for the next 22 years.

On either side of the squabble, Ocean Beach has carved its unique niche in local history, boasting the snowlike swath of foam that enveloped its shoreline on the Christmas of 1940, the Days of Fun events that kept thousands of families ny the 240 photos. occupied in the 1950s and '60s, the Collier Park antiwar melee in 1971 and even

a "cure" for tuberculosis one visitor experienced as early as 1905. The neighborhood is a crazy-quilt of the best and worst of San Diego - and the Ocean Beach Historical Society seeks your help in design-

Arcadia Publishing, a publisher of locales, is commissioning the society to compile a pictorial anthology on Ocean Beach. The Mt. Pleasant. S.C. firm has churned out work on local lighthouses, aircraft, Coronado, Central Park, legendary residents of more than 50 legendary towns and even one on The Beach Boys. Kathy Blavatt, Ocean Beach resident and historical society member, is appealing to the public for any materials on the neighborhood's past even as she sings Arcadia's praises.

"They're really neat books," Blavatt said. "And ours, because we own the rights to the archives, we have them available. We also keep the archives for Point Loma. We could do the book now, but we thing anybody has about OB, on older place. families who've lived here a long time, the weather, the migration to OB from 1913 to 1916. Wonderland (Amusement Park). old buildings no longer standing, old cottages, fishing pictures, anything on (residences along) False Bay (now known as Mission Bay), where Robb Field is now. There are so many things that I think people don't think of as donating, but so many of them are very important in keeping the neighborhood alive and preserving its character."

The historian in Blavatt fuels her activist bent. The Palo Alto native's been an Ocean Beach resident since 1965, taking the community's roily history in stride – but the lessons hit home nine years ago, when she discovered a picture of her grandmother and great-grandmother books on the histories of American cruising Ocean Beach in a 1924 Model T. Community involvement took over from there, with Blavatt suddenly becoming one of 17 contesting for a City Council seat vacated in 2005 in connection with an alleged scheme to repeal the city's "no touch" strip club laws.

"It took me several years to recover from that election," Blavatt said. "I didn't like all the things going on. There was a lot of development being proposed, and some of the stuff with NTC [the former Naval Training Center] was becoming a big baitand-switch, and SeaWorld was expanding. I went to a lot of council meetings and felt the power of the developers in this town. It just was disheartening."

But there's more to San Diego than its want to give ourselves the best chance at City Council, which can never dispel the best photos, so we're asking for any- Ocean Beach's impenetrable sense of

> "The feel for history has remained part of the public process in Ocean Beach," Blavatt said. "You have the Christmas parade. You have the chili cook-off [every June]. You have the Town Council. You have the [merchants'] MainStreet Association. You have the activist groups. You have the People's food co-op. It's such a part of the background and history.

> "People do care about the community, and they're active," she said. "As much as the merchants might fight with the

activists, I think in their hearts they all 1970s," Blavatt said, recalling that people know and love this community and are moved rocks and sand and tried to tip over trying to do their best for it. Right now, the groups are getting along pretty well. Everybody wants the homegrown businesses here."

Blavatt added that the nonprofit, 14member historical society board oversees more than 300 members, up from under 200 a few years ago. She emphasizes that many of those are younger men and women whose maverick take on life echoes that of an older Ocean Beach.

"There'd be a yacht basin here if it weren't for the people who stopped the yacht basin from coming in in the

the cranes in the protest. Nothing wrong with a little nonviolent civil disobedience now and again, Blavatt said.

"That's OB," she said. "Anything can happen here. You say 'That's OB,' and that's the answer to everything. You can't say that about other places."

You couldn't say it in 1938, either, when the fallout from Hatfield's stunt was finally laid to rest. It was then that the courts declared the rain an act of God. absolving everybody of blame and leaving one future historian scratching her head.

"It's so typical of San Diego," Blavatt

said. "They gave him the liability, saying he caused the rain, and we weren't going to pay him because he couldn't shut it

But one neighborhood would reinvent itself in time, just as it's done whenever necessary over its 126-year history. Meanwhile, the book project is more than a tribute to a locale. It is the locale, with its bouquets, its brickbats and its quirky, singular

That's OB.
