

# San Diego Bay Parade of Lights to bring holiday cheer to Bayfront Dec. 8 and 15

Continuing a long-standing San Diego tradition, the 42nd annual San Diego Bay Parade of Lights promises to dazzle bayfront crowds the evenings of Dec. 8 and 15.

Participants in this year's cherished holiday event will decorate their boats following the theme — "The Big Bay Toy Parade."

Presented by the San Diego Unified Port District, the San Diego Bay Parade of Lights brings more than 100,000 San Diego residents and visitors to the shores of San Diego Bay each December. The procession of about 80 lavishly decorated boats has become one of the most iconic holiday events of the region.

A wide variety of awards are presented to the best-dressed boats and those that best capture the event's theme. All participants receive a participant plaque and are invited to the awards dinner on Jan. 9, where a wide variety of prizes will be raffled off.

This year, the grand prize is a sevenday Caribbean cruise for two with Star Clippers, whose fleet includes three of the largest full-rigged sailing ships in the world, each with all of the activities and amenities of a private mega-yacht. Everyone who participates in both nights of the parade and passes both sets of judges will be eligible to win the Star Clippers cruise.

Beginning at 5:30 p.m. each night, the parade slowly navigates west from Shelter Island past Harbor Island, then south along the Embarcadero and Seaport Village before turning back north to pass the Ferry Landing in Coronado. The parade takes about two hours to pass any given point and there are many comfortable waterfront viewpoints along the route. A map of the route is

available on the event's website to make it easy to find your preferred viewing spot. Due to increased traffic and parking demand, observers are encouraged to plan ahead or take the trolley to the event.

For added insight into the participating boats, viewers can watch the parade from near the announcer's area, just north of the Maritime Museum on the Embarcadero. As each boat passes this viewing point, the announcer offers a brief history and description of the vessel

Panels of judges are stationed at two points along the parade route, at the Maritime Museum and on the docks at Peohe's restaurant in Coronado. Participating boats must pass both sets of judges to be eligible for prizes.

Boat owners interested in participating in this year's San Diego Bay Parade of Lights can submit the registration form and the \$40 entry fee online at www.sdparadeoflights.org. Participants can also download the form and submit payment and registration to the Bali Hai Restaurant at 2230 Shelter Island Drive.

#### OB kidnapping, rape trial set for next March

An Ocean Beach man charged with sexually assaulting two women will stand trial beginning March 3, a judge scheduled on Nov.

Richard Christopher Butts, 26, had been scheduled for trial on Dec. 13, but because the trial is expected to take 2-3 weeks, it was rescheduled due to the upcoming holidays.

Butts waived his right to have a speedy trial in San Diego Superior Court. He is charged with kidnapping both women with the intent to commit sexual assault. Both charges carry life terms if he is convicted.

He is also charged with rape,

forcible oral copulation and two counts of assault to commit rape. He was arrested March 24 after a young woman was assaulted in the early morning hours while she was walking on Long Branch Avenue.

She testified she was grabbed and dragged to a dark area between a garage and a fence. Two women who were dog sitting next door heard her screams and ran outside, causing the attacker to flee. They called 911 and he was arrested.

Police evidence technicians discovered a DNA match from the March 24 incident to an unsolved rape on Aug. 25, 2012. Butts was then charged with another rape and kidnapping and on Aug. 16. A judge ordered him to stand trial in both attacks.

He remains in jail on \$300,000 bail.

# Grattan convicted of first-degree murder

A Pacific Beach man who was convicted of first-degree murder of a Point Loma man will be sentenced Dec. 9 and will likely get 25 years to life in prison.

Shane Brian Grattan, 57, was convicted Nov. 6 by a jury, which deliberated only three hours in San Diego Superior Court in a trial that lasted several weeks. He will be sentenced by Judge Amalia Meza.

Darrin Joseph, 45, was found dead in some bushes at 4960 North Harbor Drive on Jan. 19, 2012. His wheelchair was found abandoned and grainy security camera footage showed a man coming from a van and pushing the wheelchair away. The man's face could not be seen.

Joseph's blood was found on the

van's steering wheel, a window, on a tuna can, a rake and on a jacket and one shoe that Grattan wore, said Deputy District Attorney Amy Maund.

Grattan's attorney, Brooke
LaFrance, told jurors it wasn't
unusual for the victim's DNA to be
in Grattan's van because he was
temporarily staying with Grattan at
the time. Grattan did not testify, but
LaFrance told jurors he was not
capable of murder, and suggested
other witnesses in the case may
have done it.

The trial began on Oct. 25. Grattan was arrested Feb. 8, 2012, in Pacific Beach and was living in his van at the time.

# Sewage spill prompts closures in beach areas

South Mission Beach and Dog Beach were among areas adjacent to the San Diego River mouth affected by a water contact closure issued by the county Department of Environmental Health following an estimated 22,500-gallon sewage spill reported Dec. 1.

The spill entered the San Diego River near Interstate 15, health officials reported.

City spokesman Arian Collins said the spill was believed to have been caused by "roots in the sewer line."

Signs warning of sewage-contaminated water will remain in place until samples indicate the ocean water is safe for recreational use.

#### Retired Rear Admiral cites changing trends in today's warfare; alarming spike in suicides for returning veterans

The changing face of the U.S. Armed Services was highlighted by a guest speaker for Veterans Appreciation Day at Torrey Pines (La Jolla) Rotary Club on Nov. 13 — with some very enlightening insight into the challenges of today's U.S. warriors

Navy Rear Adm. (Ret.) Leendert "Len" Hering, Sr. captured the attention of ser-

vice-club members many of them veterans themselves — as he shared details on littleknown facts about the changing demographics of the U.S. military.

"We've changed the dynamics of where we are as a nation," said Her- (RET.) LEENDERT 'LEN ing, who noted this is reflected in the

changing composition of the nation's military forces.

"Today, there are 21.2 million veterans out of 315 million Americans; 1.6 million are female, 1.8 million are younger than 35," Hering said.

"Less than 6 percent of the population of today's America has served and, of those, 600 to 1,000 are passing [away] every day."

Hering said those coming from military families have "a propensity to serve, which is significantly higher" than the general population.

The U.S. military is changing in other ways though, too, Hering said.

"There are fewer and fewer individu-

als who can meet the education stan- October 1954 proclaimed that Nov. 11 dards and skills required for the highly technical warfare of today," he said, adding the average annual income of veterans — about \$36,000 — is also significantly more than the average annual civilian wage of \$26,400.

A historian by nature, Hering urged Torrey Pines Rotary's veterans, and veterans everywhere, to "tell their stories."

"Who's going to really tell the stories of Iwo Jima, Bataan, the Battle of the Bulge, etc., to the folks who need to hear it — the 94 percent who have never served?" he asked.

With advances in medical technology, Hering said more combat soldiers who "previously would have been left on the battlefield as casualties," are surviving to return and rebuild their lives with disabilities.

"We have 3.6 million vets — more than 50 percent — who have serviceconnected disabilities," Hering said. "We have five times more amputees in this conflict [in Afghanistan] than any other conflict we've been in. Many more are being brought back into society, and the sad part is many of them are not recovering. Our suicide rate in the service today is at an all-time high. We lost more servicemen to suicide last year than we did in actual combat."

The roots of Veterans Day on Nov. 11 go back to the armistice signed between the allied nations and Germany in 1918 that ended World War I on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month" in the so-called "war to end all

Armistice Day didn't take on broader implications until former general and then-president Dwight D. Eisenhower in would henceforth become a day "to honor American veterans of all wars."

Veterans suffer higher proportionately than the rest of the population from many difficulties resulting from the transition from military to civilian life.

"Vets are three times more likely to be unemployed," said Hering. "Why? Why do we have more than 900 vets, our brothers in arms, homeless in the streets of San Diego? The nation which forgets its defenders will itself be forgotten."

Hering said Veterans Day is the nation's most mixed-up national holi-

"Memorial Day and Veterans Day are the most confused holidays in America," he said. "Most citizens do not truly understand the difference."

Hering said veterns, like those in the Torrey Pines Rotary Club, have a role to play in "how America moves forward and shapes what is Veterans Day."

What should Veterans Day mean?

"It's a time for the entire country to reflect on and celebrate veterans' achievements and service," Hering said, adding it's an especially poignant time for veterans to reflect on what they've achieved through their service because, "If vets don't do the reflecting — then the reflection is shallow."

Hering said there's a motto he, as a veteran, prizes: "Life, liberty and the pursuit of all those who threaten it. It's the home of the free because we are brave."

The son of an American sailor who spent most his adult life in the U.S. Navy, Hering said he has three sons, "an heir and two spares," whom he hopes will "carry on the charge."



# Fig Tree Café's fresh cuisine spreads delicious fare to Liberty Station

Fig Tree Café has taken root in Liberty Station, and its eclectic mix of architecture and California cuisine is flourishing in Point Loma.

"We call it rustic industrial," said restaurant co-owner Johan Engman of the ambiance of the third eatery in the local chain, which he established along with business partner Alberto Morreale in Pacific Beach in 2008.

Sitting underneath homemade artwork at the entrance of his Liberty Station restaurant at 2400 Historic Decatur Road, Suite 103, Engman notes, "We did pretty much all of it ourselves.'

Pointing to a framed piece made from two disassembled wine barrels, metal strips from which were used to create overhead chandeliers, Engman said, "We were trying to be a little creative," which is obvious looking around.

Chalkboards lining the interior of Liberty Station Fig Tree bear some of Engman's favorite sayings like, "Knowledge is knowing a tomato is a fruit. Wisdom is not putting it in a fruit salad."

"I love it here," said Engman of his retail space in a courtyard of the former Naval base, seating 40 people inside and 60 outside on the patio.

Engman said the former base's ongoing redevelopment is creating a "big buzz," attracting business for him. It doesn't hurt that there's lots of office space nearby, furnishing a nearly inexhaustible supply of hungry Fig Tree

"People don't realize there's close to 400,000 square feet of office space in Liberty Station," Engman said.

Engman is as grassroots as the name of his restaurant implies. He said he's

been in the restaurant biz all his life, working since his teens as a waiter and

"I opened my first restaurant when I was 27 on a shoestring budget using plastic chairs and tables," Engman said, noting his idea was to capitalize on breakfast and using creative décor and an equally inventive menu.

"We didn't want to do the greasy spoon thing," he said. "We wanted to do more high-quality food."

Engman said Fig Tree uses local food sources, like a family ranch in Ramona that supplies the restaurant's eggs.

"You can really taste the difference," he said, adding he's benefited "tenfold" from using local food sources.

Fig Tree is open 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. for breakfast, and for dinner from 4 to 10 p.m.

More than just the menu at the eatery changes for dinner.

"We like to think in the evening that we become more of a wine bar/sit-down restaurant," Engman said. "We have a good amount of eclectic, affordable wines coming from Spain and Argentina or elsewhere in South America."

Fig Tree's dinner menu is moderately priced.

"There's nothing over \$20," said Engman, noting the key to both his breakfast and dinner menus is adding that little extra culinary "twist."

"We have a breakfast item we call sushi with sautéed eggs and rice with man candy — thick-cut bacon marinated and baked in brown sugar," he said. "We've got a meat loaf hash."

Engman said Fig Tree also has a wide assortment of about 30 gluten-free items, including French toast, on the menu.

"It's important to be innovative and try

to stay ahead of the trends," he said. "Instead of stagnating, you always need to be reinventing yourself."

The restaurant's name came about in a surprising way.

"Our original location in Pacific Beach was surrounded by ficus trees, but I didn't feel Ficus Tree Café had a good ring to it," said Engman. "So I planted five or six fig trees and called it the Fig Tree Café."

The restaurant features daily specials. One recent weekday, the specials were New Zealand rack of lamb, pan-seared yellowtail and fresh fettuccini tossed with salmon and a cherry tomato cream sauce. Sunday brunch is the biggest meal, with lots of patrons coming in after


