Mystery swirls in death of OB man at Humboldt pot farm

What's known for certain is that former Ocean Beach resident Garret Rodriguez left for what has been dubbed "Murder Mountain" by outsiders in Humboldt County several months ago to become a marijuana farmer.

What is also known is that Rodriguez, 29, never returned.

Rodriguez's body was discovered at the end of November, his remains recovered from a rural gravesite fol-

lowing a tip from an anonymous source.

How and why Rodriguez perished remains a mystery, said officials.

On Nov. 30 at about 5 p.m., the Humboldt County Sheriff's Office received a call from a citizen who told deputies where to search for a possible grave. On Dec. 1 about 7 a.m., Humboldt County sheriff's detectives went to the location near Jewitt Ranch Road, where they unearthed human

New year's laws: from teen texting to electronic license plates, 2014 ushers in change

With the new year comes a raft of new laws — more than 800 of them in California — that will impact motorists and bicyclists, employers and employees, retailers and consumers throughout San Diego.

The following are some of the highlights of new laws that took effect on Jan. 1, unless otherwise noted.

TRANSPORTATION

• **Bicycle-passing distance (AB 1371)** — Known as the Three Feet for Safety Act, a vehicle driver passing a bicycle that is traveling in the same direction must maintain a distance of no less than three feet between any part of the vehicle and any part of the bicycle or rider. When three feet is not possible, the motor vehicles are required to slow to a "reasonable and prudent speed" and pass only if there's no danger to the bicyclist. Failing to do so can incur a fine, regardless of whether a collision results. This law will take effect Sept. 16.



• **Clean-air vehicle decals/HOV stickers (AB 266, SB 286)** — These laws extend sunset dates to Jan. 1, 2019 for single-occupant, low-emission and zero-emission vehicles to operate in high-occupancy vehicle lanes (HOV).

• **DMV vehicle registration pilot program (SB 806)** — This law authorizes the DMV to establish a pilot program to evaluate the use of alternatives to the current stickers, tabs, license plates and registration cards, but will be subject to certain requirements. It will also enable the DMV to experiment with electronic license plates, as well as facilitate the department's ability to explore cost-effective alternatives to California's traditional metal license plate, plastic-coated reg-



istration stickers and paper registration cards.

• **Registration and vehicle transfers between family members (AB 443)** — This law prohibits the transfer of vehicle ownership to a relative or a revocable living trust until the transferee pays all parking or toll-violation fines and penalties reported to the DMV.

• **Search warrants: statute of limitations teen drivers (SB 194)** — This law will prohibit anyone under 18 years of age from reading or sending texts while driving, even if the electronic device used is hands-free.



• **AMBER Alert expansion (AB 535)** — This law requires law enforcement to request activation of the AMBER Alerts after receiving a report that a child has been abducted by anyone, including a custodial parent or guardian, who may cause serious bodily injury or death to the child.

• **Hit and run: statute of limitations (AB 184)** — This law extends the statute of limitations for hit-and-run collisions from which death or permanent, serious injury resulted. A criminal complaint may be filed within three years of the offense, or one year after the person was initially identified by law enforcement as a suspect in the commission of the offense, which ever comes later, but in no case more than six years after the offense.

• **Search warrants: chemical tests (SB 717)** — This amendment to current law authorizes the issuance of a search warrant to draw blood from



a person in a reasonable, medically approved manner, to show that the

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Planners abandon appeal for Peeling hillside subdivision

The Peninsula Community Planning Board (PCPB) voted 5-4-1 not to appeal a recent city Planning Commission approval for a permit for the Peeling hilltop subdivision.

The advisory group had voted unanimously in October to appeal the project, which some feel is out of character with the neighborhood, lacks sufficient emergency-vehicle access and poses an environmental threat to the unstable Sunset Cliffs.

At its December meeting, the PCPB also heard a presentation from High Tech

High, a charter school specializing in math, science and engineering in Liberty Station in Point Loma, on its plans to redevelop a building on its campus into an elementary school.

Additionally, the group granted a three-year time extension for a proposed mixed-use development on Voltaire Street.

The Peeling project calls for subdividing an existing one-acre site into five new lots, as well as construction of three new single-family homes at 3340 and 3328 Harbor View Drive.

Developer Mark Peeling defended his project, claiming it meets all applicable zoning conditions and codes.

"I'm asking reconsideration of your vote," Peeling said, noting he'd sent a long letter to the advisory group detailing his project's purported benefits.

Peeling asked how many planning board members had actually walked the project site. Most said they had.

Several of Peeling's neighbors near the proposed redevelopment site turned out to the meeting to share their belief that it wasn't Peeling or his project itself they opposed, but rather its proposed placement.

"There's nothing but sandstone up there and the hill has been sloughing off," said neighbor Ann Walker. "There's no room for fire trucks to come up there with cars blocking the way. It's a big problem. Building houses up there is going to make the problem worse."

"It's fill-dirt on top of sandstone," said neighbor Frank O'Dwyer. "We don't want

anybody to be injured."

In answer to audience questions, Peeling said he planned to put in a retaining wall and secure the hillside with deep-driven pylons.

"It will be better than what's up there now," he said.

Responding to neighbors' preference that he build two houses on site instead of three, Peeling said, "I'm leaning toward doing that, but I can't promise I'm going to do that."

Meanwhile, Paul Dooley of High Tech High filled planners in on school redevelopment.

He said plans are in the works to convert a building that was once a Navy fitness center at the former Naval Training Center for new use as a K-5 elementary school, with a maximum of 460 students and 75 onsite parking spaces that are slated to open in the fall of 2015.

"The building itself will block sounds from the children's play area," he said. "There will be a crossing guard at the school during drop-off and pick-up times," Dooley said, adding ample public parking is located nearby, much of it in park space near the school.

Claude-Anthony Marengo of Marengo Morton Architects in La Jolla gave a brief presentation asking for a three-year time extension involving a proposed mixed-use project with apartments above street-level commercial use, with enclosed parking at 3903-3911 Voltaire St. near Sunshine Liquor.

"The site is for sale and we're waiting to see what's going to happen to the project with the new owners," Marengo said.

He also said there is ample parking for the proposed redevelopment.

The PCPB voted 8-1-1 in favor of granting a time extension for the project.

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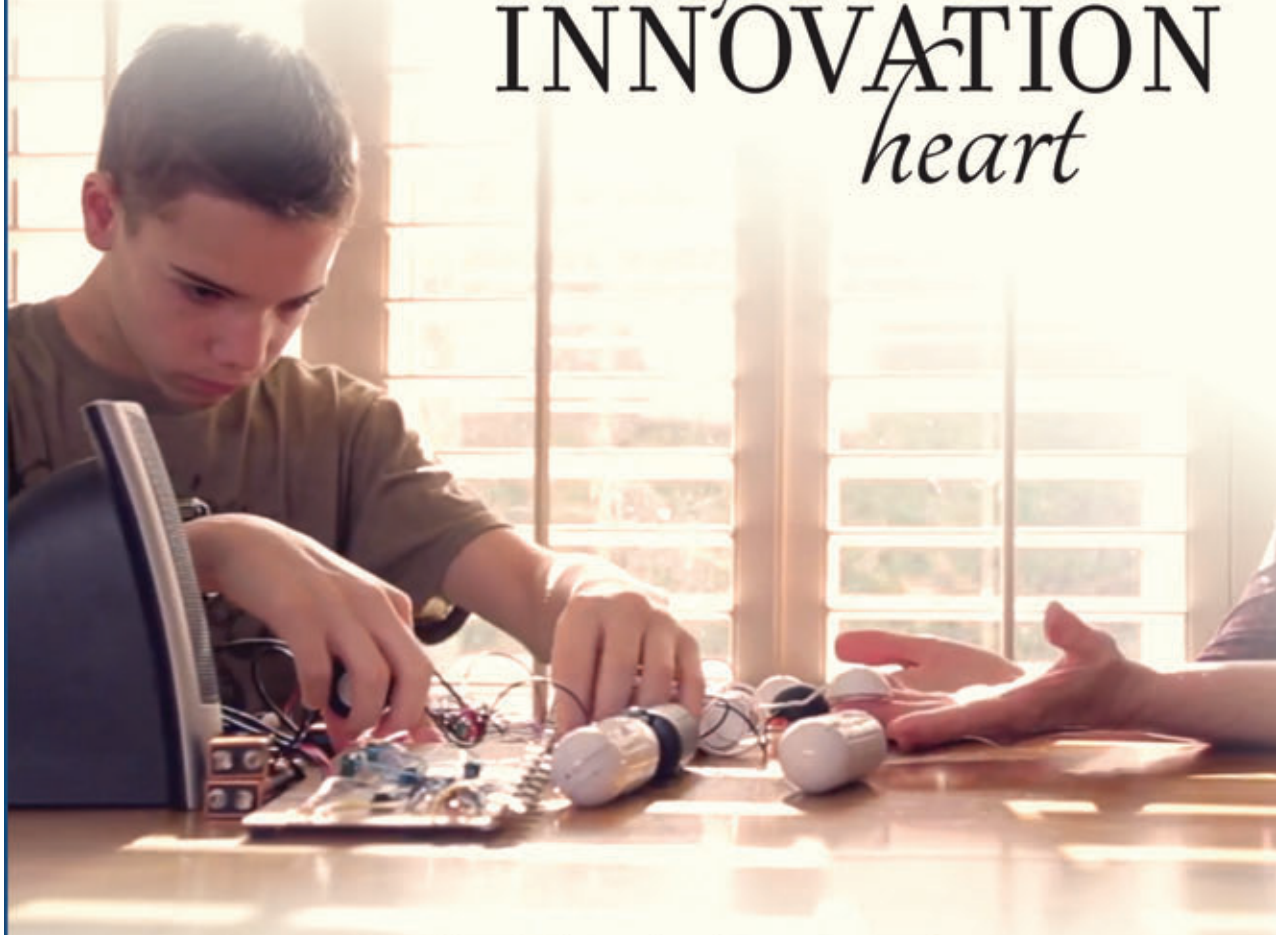

Man shot by authorities
in Point Loma operation

A 44-year-old man was reportedly shot and wounded by police and the U.S. Marshals Service Fugitive Task Force during an operation in Point Loma on Dec. 30.

The shooting reportedly happened shortly after 8:30 a.m. as the Marshals Service and San Diego Police Department moved in during a joint operation in the 1600 block of Catalina Street to arrest Joseph Hill, suspected in the shooting death of another man in Linda Vista the previous day.

Task force officers reportedly saw Hill leave a residence on Catalina Boulevard and get into a vehicle. When officers

attempted to arrest him, Hill started the vehicle and attempted to drive away.

As Hill drove away, he struck an officer and pinned him against a parked vehicle, according to police officials.

Fearing the pinned officer would suffer great bodily injury or death, several officers fired their duty weapons.

Hill continued driving north on Catalina Boulevard, where he reportedly struck another vehicle in traffic, lost control of his vehicle and crashed into the front yard of a nearby residence.

Officers were able to take Hill into custody, said police.

Hill suffered multiple gunshot wounds and was rushed by paramedics to UCSD Medical Center, where he was listed in critical but stable condition.

The officer who was pinned against the parked vehicle was also transported

to a local hospital for treatment of minor injuries, according to investigators.

Local faces sentencing in
murder of homeless man

Shane Brian Grattan, 57, of Pacific Beach, will be sentenced Jan. 17 for first-degree murder in the 2012 death of a homeless man whose body was found in Point Loma.

Grattan was convicted Nov. 6 by a jury in the Jan. 19, 2012 death of Darin Joseph, 45, whose body was found in some bushes at 4960 North Harbor Drive. Joseph's abandoned wheelchair was found not far away.

Grattan's sentencing was delayed on Dec. 9 by San Diego Superior Court Judge Amalia Meza to give Grattan's attorney time to file more court docu-

ments. Grattan is expected to get 25 years to life in prison.

Joseph's blood and DNA was found throughout Grattan's van, despite attempts by Grattan to clean it. Grattan's attorney argued that Joseph had stayed temporarily with Grattan and pointed to this as the reason why Grattan's DNA was found at the scene.

Grattan did not testify and his attorney argued the slaying was committed by someone else. Grattan was living in his van at the time.

He remains in custody without bail.

Police probe shooting,
robbery try of brothers

Two brothers were reportedly approached by three or four suspects

who tried to rob them in Point Loma Heights on Dec. 23 around 3:30 p.m., according to police officials.

A struggle ensued between the two parties and one of the suspects reportedly shot one of the brothers, a 34-year-old, in the lower stomach, said investigators.

The suspects then fled in a vehicle located on Poinsettia Drive.

Two of the suspects were eventually arrested in the 3500 block of Browning Street.

Although investigators have identified the remaining suspects who are at large, no identities have yet been publicly released.

The shooting victim is expected to survive his injury, according to police.

sailing program it sponsors for 40 youngsters in partnership with the San Diego Yacht Club and the Peninsula YMCA.

"We are trying to expand our involvement and philanthropy in the Point Loma community," said current Optimist Club president Travis S. person violated misdemeanor DUI laws when that person has refused an officer's request to submit to, or has failed to complete, a blood test. This law has been in effect since Sept. 20.

• **Immigrant licenses (AB 60, effective Jan. 1, 2015)** — requires the DMV to issue a driver's license to an applicant who is unable to submit proof he or she is legally present in the U.S. The department will draft new regulations and prepare field offices to process these new applications. Applicants will be required to meet all other driver's license qualifications.

WORKPLACE

• **Minimum wage (AB 10 and AB 442)** — The minimum wage in California has not risen from its \$8-an-hour benchmark since 2008. That will change on July 1, when the minimum wage goes to \$9 an hour. Another increment occurs on Jan. 1, 2016, when the minimum wage rises to \$10 an hour.

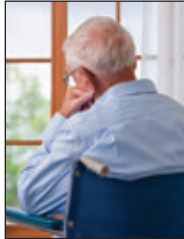


• **Garment manufacturer requirement (AB 1384)** — This new law creates a civil penalty for a garment manufacturer's failure to display his or her name, address and registration number at the front entrance of the premises.

• **Leave of absence for reserve peace officers/emergency rescue personnel (AB 11)** — If you have employees who are also reserve peace

officers or emergency rescue personnel, this new law mandates that employers with more than 50 employees must give temporary leaves of absence not only to volunteer firefighters for training but now to reserve peace officers and emergency rescue personnel. A leave of absence can be up to 14 days.

• **Paid family leave of absence (SB 770)** — Until now, employees have been allowed to receive up to six weeks of state disability insurance to care for an ill child, spouse, parent or domestic partner or build a relationship with an adopted or foster child. The latest version of the law now allows employees to take time off to care for a seriously ill grandparent, grandchildren, sibling or in-law. This law takes effect July 1.



• **Leave of absence for crime victims (SB 400 and SB 288)** — Current law prohibits adverse employment action against an employee who is the victim of domestic violence or sexual assault and needs to take time off to seek relief. A new law (SB 400) expands that protection to victims of stalking and also provides that those employees be provided any requested safety while at work. Another new law (SB 288) prohibits employers from retaliating against an employee who is a victim of a crime for taking time off from work to appear in court to testify at related proceedings. This applies only to specific crimes that include solicitation for murder and vehicular manslaughter while intoxicated.

• **Whistleblower protections (SB 496)** — Expands whistleblower protections to include reports alleging a violation of a local rule or regulation. It also protects employees who disclose or who might disclose information regarding alleged violations "to a person with authority over the employee or another employee who has authority to investigate, discover or correct the violation. SB 496 also prohibits retaliation against an employee because the employer "believes the employee disclosed or may disclose information."



• **Immigration status (AB 263 and SB 666)** — Two new bills protect undocumented workers from retaliation or adverse actions when they file employment-related claims or complain about wage theft. Employers cannot threaten to contact immigration authorities about a worker's legal status in the country because of the complaints. A penalty of up to \$10,000 per employee can be issued to the employer per violation. In addition, state authorities can pull an employer's business license for reporting or threatening to report a worker's immigration status in response to an employee's wage complaints.



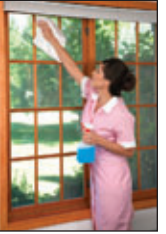
• **Attorney fees (SB 462)** — A new law states that employers who win wage-claim lawsuits may recover attorneys' fees and costs from the employee only if a trial court finds that the employee filed the lawsuit in bad faith.

• **Recovery-rest periods (SB 435)** — California law currently requires employers to give employees who work outside in weather exceeding 85 degrees several five-minute cool-down periods, or recovery periods, in a shaded area to protect from overheating. Under an expanded law, employers are prohibited from requiring employees from working during a recovery period and they must pay them one extra hour of pay for each workday a required recovery period is not provided.



• **Anti discrimination (SB 530 and AB 566)** — Currently, state law restricts employers from considering certain criminal records in making hiring choices. Under SB 530, employers are prohibited from asking a prospective new hire to disclose information about a conviction that has been dismissed or ordered sealed unless certain limited exceptions apply.

• **Domestic-work employees (AB 241)** — The Domestic Worker Bill of Rights provides for specific overtime pay for certain in-home employees or a "domestic work employee who is a personal attendant." Those with in-home help will need to carefully determine whether the new law applies to them because AB 241 contains many specific definitions and exclusions.



• **Sexual-harassment definition (SB 292)** — Amends the definition of harassment to clarify that sexually harassing conduct does not need to be motivated by sexual desire. The law clarifies that hostile treatment can amount to unlawful sexual harassment, regardless of whether treatment was motivated by any sexual desire.

remains.

Those remains were subsequently identified by the Humboldt County Coroner's Office as those of Rodriguez.

"A forensic pathologist confirmed that Rodriguez is the victim of a homicide," according to the Coroner's Office.

Once an Ocean Beach resident, Rodriguez was reported missing April 25 by his father, who had contacted the Humboldt County Sheriff's Office.

"His father told the investigating deputy that Garret told him he was coming to Humboldt County to work on a ranch growing medical marijuana in an area near the so-called "Murder Mountain," Humboldt authorities

said.

"It's an illegal, underground industry," said Humboldt County Sheriff's Department spokesman Lt. Steve Knight, who added two detectives and the FBI are continuing an investigation into Rodriguez's murder. "Sometimes people who come up here to work in [the marijuana-harvesting industry] just go missing. In this case, there are remains and a family that's made inquiries, which is enough to begin an investigation."

"People come up here to make a fast buck — sometimes they never leave," said Knight.

Knight said "Murder Mountain" is not a formal geographical designation, but rather a nickname given to the rural area by "outsiders," indicating its remoteness in an area known to be frequented by marijuana traders who sometimes wind up missing or worse.

"There are no [such things as] legal marijuana farms," said Knight.

The family of Garret Rodriguez retained Cook & Associates, a private investigator in Humboldt County, in May to search for their missing son.

"Our goal from the beginning has been to provide answers to the family as to the events surrounding Garret's disappearance," said the investigation firm in a prepared statement.

Excerpts from statements made by Cook & Associates to the Lost Coast Outpost, an online publication founded in 1996 in rural Ferndale, about the Rodriguez investigation are as follows:

"On the day after Thanksgiving, private investigators received calls from anonymous sources that an individual had confessed to the murder of Garret Rodriguez ... The sources advised that the body would be [discovered] off of Jewitt Ranch Road, a general location that had been reported by other confidential sources as early as June 2013 ... The physical size of the property in question made it difficult to search the area without specific directions from someone who knew the spot ... It was not until Nov. 30 that the Sheriff's Office received a more specific location to search that the body was discovered."

Rodriguez family members could not be reached for comment.

Cook & Associates declined further comment on the case, noting it was a private investigation.



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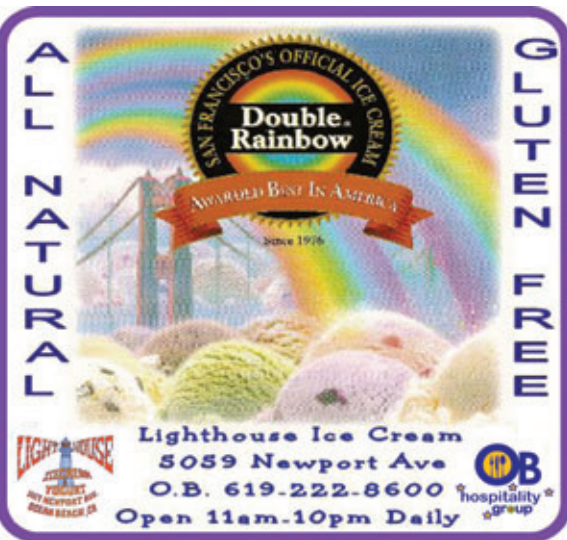


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Danny and the Tramp continues to make inroads in beach communities

San Diego's burgeoning music community continues to draw musicians from all over the world. Perhaps it's the cold winters, but a lot of East Coast musicians seem to end up here, like the founding members of local indie rockers group Danny and the Tramp.

Appearing at Soda Bar on Jan. 3, the band is based around the core of Pennsylvania high school friends Danny Tatulli (bass) and John Langan (guitar), now with West Coast additions drummer Branden Josefosky and pianist Ezekiel Parnow, the impetus for coming to San Diego in 2009 was simply the need for change.

"Take a trip to Pennsylvania in December if you want to see why we didn't stay there," Tatulli joked. "John hit pretty much every city in the U.S., and San Diego was his favorite. From what I've seen, I'd have to agree."

The pair had a band in Pennsylvania. "But there's a time in every kid's life, or at least in ours, when you say, 'OK, I can do what everyone else in this town does,'" he said. "Get a job that I can eventually convince myself I like, find someone who doesn't find me too annoying and perpetuate the human race. Or I can take a gamble. I can go against the grain and have an adventure."

Meanwhile, musical partner Langan said he had his heart set on the second path. Almost immediately after graduating from Penn State, he hit the road with no real end goal outside of heading west.

At the same time, Tatulli was knee deep in the first path.

"I had a cushy job, was a family man, but I knew I wanted more. When John called preaching the good news about San Diego, I went with the red pill. Long story short, the beach towns have been our stomping grounds — more specifically Pacific Beach and Ocean Beach."

He admits there was a bit of culture shock in the relocation. It wasn't musical, though.

"Californians can't drive," he said. "No offense guys, but if you have trouble believing this statement, take a ride on the Interstate 8 or State Route 163 during rush hour. Other than that, it's been great."

He said it was difficult having no connections and starting from the ground when they first arrived, "But the friendliness of the locals has made it a lot easier on us."

Though it wasn't a factor in his move, Tatulli's earliest musical influence was through his family and local hero Blink 182 bassist Mark Hoppus.

"My father was a drummer, so I always had that urge to tap my foot to any beat," he said. "I think that's why bass was perfect, for its rhythmic purposes. I really started listening to music in my early teens. Blink 182 played a huge role in it. From there, I picked up a bass and it just felt right. Later in life, I started branching out of the pop punk scene into bands like The Beatles and Queen."

The band released its debut album, "All In," earlier this year, with a wish list for 2014 that includes touring, a music video and "radio play in places besides San Diego," said Tatulli. "We're not quite sure on how all of this will be happening, but that's what the new year is all about."

The past year saw the band release its debut album, as well as play major venues such as the Casbah and Belly Up.

"We're looking to ride that momentum into 2014 and keep chugging along," Tatulli said. "As long as we are having fun, that's all that matters."

He said there are also side projects like

the Ezekiel Jay Band, which will also keep band members busy.

Happy in his new home on the West Coast, Tatulli said he appreciates his positive experiences, but considers the journey to that gig or album release more important than the success of it.

"John and I were actually talking about this the other day," Tatulli said. "It's all about the chase. And by that, we are talking about the whole process of creating a song and all of the term oil that goes along with it. To finally get the finished product out and to have people thoroughly enjoy it, that's just icing on the cake."

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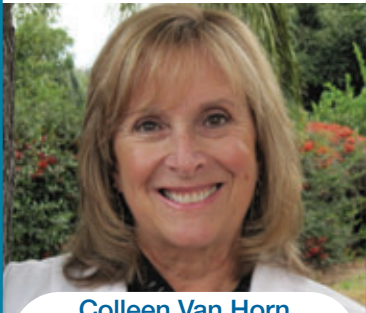
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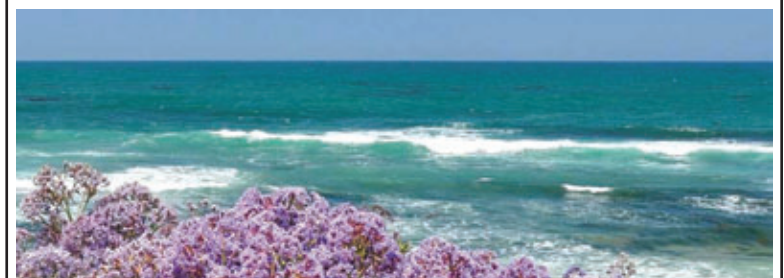

The Private Gym to
host weight-loss study

Natalie Gibbins, certified personal trainer and owner of The Private Gym in Ocean Beach, is seeking 10 individuals to participate in an upcoming weight-loss study.
