Mammoth Midway postal facility back on sales block

The ultimate fate of the largelyabandoned Midway Post Office is still in limbo, although the gigantic and once-vital postal facility on Midway Drive is back on the sales block.

The United States Postal Service (USPS) is still in the process of divesting itself of the 464,000-square-foot, three-story former United States Postal Service Processing and Distribution Center at 2535 Midway Drive in Loma Portal, said Ken Boyd, USPS facilities and customer relations manager.

'It's listed for sale for a period clos-



The massive 464,000-square-foot former Midway Postal Service Processing and Dising sometime in February," said Boyd. tribution Center on Midway Drive is again up for sale after a failed attempt to sell the property in 2010 to help buoy the U.S. Postal Service's flagging budget.

Alvarez, Faulconer spar in the run-up to run-off election



EDITOR'S NOTE: In this final sprint to the political finish line to deter mine our city's next mayor at the ballot box on Tuesday, Feb. 11, the San Diego Community Newspaper Group presented five uniform questions to both candidates to better educate readers and the voting public on issues of importance to our beach communities. by the candidates - City Councilman David Alvarez and City Councilman Kevin Faulconer - will be of value in helping you make a more informed vote when you head to the polls Feb. 11.

Candidate: DAVID ALVAREZ (City Councilman, Dist. 8)

Q: With the City Council's renewed emphasis on neighborhood enhancement/improvement programs and longneeded updates to decades-old community plans, what is your specific vision for San Diego's beach communities?

A: Our beach communities have specific needs that have been ignored by past city leadership. As mayor, I will ensure we

have clean beaches and water. I have pushed hard to implement a plan that utilizes water purification technology that will help reduce the outflow of wastewater into the ocean. Additionally, I feel strongly

Marengo said the project is merely "following the regulations to meet the (build-

Roseville neighbor Gale Barlow, who lives near the project, said she opposed the map waiver.

"Anyone can fudge," she said, given less stringent height regulations for apartment-to-condo conversions. "We have many condos [already] in Point Loma. We don't need any more."

Barlow said if one were to drive around the neighborhood, "there's nothing that

Another neighbor complained that allowing this apartment-to-condo conversion would "open up the floodgates" to other similar development projects "obstructing view corridors."

"This project is a fait accompli," said planner Norm Allenby. "They're already building it. I don't think there's anything we can do."

Other planners were not so sure.

"We can vote in opposition," disagreed planner Jarvis Ross, who said laws favoring condo conversions in areas not conducive to them "need to be addressed."

PCPB chairwoman Julia Quinn also expressed reservations.

"It's kind of like a Taj Mahal in the middle of Roseville," said Quinn.

The PCPB board voted 11-1 for a motion finding the conversion project didn't conform with community character. A second motion specifically on the map waiver — which required a majority vote to carry — resulted in a 5-5-2 vote. The action fell short to pass the waiver.

In other action, the advisory group voted unanimously in favor of a motion to support placing flashing crosswalk lights at the corner of Catalina Boulevard and Orchard Avenue for traffic-calming measures to protect pedestrians.

"Parents at Silver Gate Elementary School have asked the city to come out with many different options and this is the option that's best with a push-button [system] activating the light," said

Airport board to host Town Hall meeting on planned north-side airfield projects

The San Diego County Regional Airport Authority (SDCRAA) will host a Town Hall meeting in Point Loma on Tuesday, Feb. 11 to receive public input on its northside development plans to maximize the efficiency of the 661-acre airport.

The public meeting will take place from 6 to 7:30 p.m. at the McMillin Companies Event Center at Liberty Station, located at 2875 Dewey Road.

The proposed projects involved in the north-side redevelopment include:

> The SDCRAA was created in 2003 as an independent agency to manage the

Peninsula-area pot dispensaries temporarily lose bid to operate without federal interference

Attorneys for four medical-marijuana dispensaries — including one in Point Loma and another in the Midway District — were denied a legal appeal this month by a three-judge appellate-court panel, which ruled the federal government can continue enforcement effort to ensure California medical marijuana dispensaries comply with state law.

The unpublished decision by the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals panel came in response to a lawsuit filed by the dispensaries and one patient.

Parallel lawsuits have also been filed in Sacramento and the Bay Area.

The attorneys for the plaintiffs filed the appeal in the appellate court, arguing that federal raids violated the constitutional rights of dispensaries and

The court cited a prior 2007 ruling in rejecting the argument.

One of the attorneys representing the dispensary interests is cited in published reports as saying a petition will be filed soon, asking for the appeal to be heard by a full 11-judge panel at the 9th Circuit.

marijuana remains illegal under U.S. law. Today, voters in roughly half of the nation's states have now given the nod to the sale and use of medical mar-

To add fuel to the bitter debate, a majority of voters in Colorado and Washington have also gone to the ballot box to legalize marijuana for recreational use.

Among the dispensaries pursuing the lawsuit are Cloud 9 Cooperative in Point Loma and Light the Way in the Midway District, which were both forced to close their doors after the U.S. Attorney's Office dispatched letters to dispensaries in San Diego County — as well as to their landlords — ordering the businesses to shut down or face forfeiture and criminal prosecution.

Window opens for citizens to make difference in community

OB planners set to host annual board elections

Obeceans, how much do you care about your community? Enough to run for office?

If so, get out your clipboards, sharpen your pencils and start knocking on doors. It's election time, and seven positions are available for qualified candidates to serve on the Ocean Beach Planning Board (OBPB).

Citizens who want to make Ocean Beach a better place by vetting development projects and examining other neighborhood issues have until Feb. 5 to qualify for next month's ballot.

Those who miss that deadline have until March 10 to qualify as a write-in candidate.

To run, applicants must be at least 18 and live, own property or run a business in the Ocean Beach planning area. This area is divided into seven districts.

Candidates must gather 35 signatures in the district of their residence, business or property. The boundaries of the planning area and its seven districts can be viewed at oceanbeachplanning.org.

Hopefuls must also have attended at least one meeting between February 2013 and January 2014.

The OBPB is one of more than 40 community planning boards across the city sanctioned by the City Council to make recommendations on land use and other community matters.

Gaining office carries its weight of responsibilities and commitments. But

for those citizens willing to serve their community, claiming a board seat may be an easier goal to achieve than you might think. Recent board members have been elected with little more than a handful of votes.

The requirement to gather signatures is rare among planning boards, but it's a great way to gauge the pulse of the neighborhood, said Peter Ruscitti, vice chairman of the OB Planning Board.

"Gathering 35 signatures is an important requirement that provides candidates with an opportunity to get familiar with their districts and talk to their neighbors about issues that matter to them," Ruscitti said in an email.

A candidate forum is planned for

March 5 at 6 p.m. at the Ocean Beach Recreation Center, 4726 Santa Monica Ave. Balloting is March 11 from 4 to 7 p.m. at the same location. Identification and proof of residence is required. Voters may preregister and mail in ballots.

Ballots, candidate applications and information will be available at the Wednesday Farmers Market from 5 to 7 p.m. on Feb. 12, 19 and 26, or visit oceanbeachplanning.org.

Terms are two years and meetings take place the first Wednesday of the month. Successful candidates must also complete a planning curriculum as a community orientation workshop. A handbook may be downloaded at sandiego.gov/planning/community/cow.shtml.

Midway planners zero in on vision for sports arena, surrounding businesses

Redesigning and redefining land use in the sprawling Midway-Pacific Highway Corridor continued in January as members of the Midway Community Planning Advisory Group discussed what they'd like and not like to see in their emerging community plan update.

The community plan for the Midway/Pacific Highway Corridor that provides land-use designations and policies guiding future development hasn't been updated since 1991.

Since September, senior city planner Tait Galloway has been walking Midway/Pacific Highway planners through

an overview of their planning group area, which has the Valley View Casino Center (formerly the San Diego Sports Arena) at its center, surrounded by commercial. and light and heavy industrialzoned areas.

The plan area is divided into subdistricts, including the sports arena, Kemper, Dutch Flats, Camino Del Rio, Channel, Lytton Street, Kurtz Street and Hancock Street transportation corridor areas.

Tait said one of the goals of the "discussion draft" he and planners are collaborating on for the new community

Unmanned drone downed near Point Loma coast

An unmanned Predator B drone was intentionally brought down off the coast of Point Loma on Jan. 27 by an air and marine flight crew with U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP)

The intentional downing happened at about 11:15 p.m. when the maritime variant of the Predator B experienced a mechanical failure. The crew determined that the aircraft would be unable to return to where it originated in Sierra Vista, Ariz., and put the aircraft down in the water, said CBP officials.

The cause of the failure is unknown. There were no injuries as a result of the downing, but the CBP grounded its fleet of unmanned drones out of caution, pending an investigation.

The National Transportation Safety Board and the Federal Aviation Administration have been notified and local boaters were warned to watch out for possible floating debris in the ocean.

Judge rejects jury field trip to alleged rape scene

Deputy District Attorney Elizabeth McClutchey told San Diego Superior Court Judge Louis Hanoian this month she wanted jurors in defendant Michael Tesfa's rape trial to see for themselves the "extremely dangerous and extremely dark area" behind a closed restaurant where he allegedly raped a woman.

Hanoian told the prosecutor that photos and a videotape of the scene could convey the area to jurors without them physically visiting the scene behind Perry's Café on Pacific Highway near Rosecrans Street. There is an alcove of

stone behind the restaurant that is like a small enclosed patio. The victim said she was dragged there and allegedly raped by Tesfa on March 18.

Tesfa — who is acting as his own attorney — also opposed the jury's visit during pretrial motions Jan. 24. Hanoian granted Tesfa's motion Dec. 18 to act as his own lawyer after warning him about the dangers of self-representation.

Jury selection began Jan. 27 in the trial of Tesfa, 22, who is accused of kidnapping and raping the 30-year-old La Jolla woman. The victim said she had some conversation with Tesfa before he unexpectedly punched her repeatedly with his fist and dragged her over to the remote area around 7 p.m.

The victim said she redressed herself with clothes she found at the scene after Tesfa ran off with her clothes and cell phone. She called 911 after entering a Rosecrans Street liquor store.

Tesfa has pleaded not guilty and is also charged with robbery and false imprisonment. He remains in jail without bail.

William A. "Bill" Yancey, MD, 2-2-22 to 1-4-14



Dr. Bill Yancey passed away at Sharp Coronado Hospital on January 4, 2014. He was born in Davenport, Iowa to Dr. William Paul Yancey and Lydia Cenac. His father, a physics teacher who studied in the Jesuit seminary, was a descendant of early American colonial settlers from Wales. His mother's family consisted of French oyster fishermen who settled in Terrebonne parish. Louisiana. They met at loved boats, dancing, and tennis. Charity Hospital in New Orleans, La. while William Paul was a patient and Lydia was his nurse.

Bill graduated from Loyola University and the Louisiana State University Medical School, and completed postgraduate study at Tulane University, Wayne University, and the Kresge Eye Institute in Detroit, Michigan. He enlisted in the US Army Cavalry, then served as a Public Health Officer in occupied Nagasaki, Japan following World War II. Upon returning to the

states, he remained in the Army Reserve Medical Corps as a Lieutenant Colonel until 1965.

While he was an intern at Mercy Hospital, Bill met a nursing student, Colleen Dolan. They married, had four children, and settled in the Point Loma neighborhood of San Diego. Suspect in slow-speed chase in OB set for trial

A judge set a Feb. 21 trial date for a suspected auto thief who led police officers on a low-speed chase through Ocean Beach streets on Dec. 13, attracting plenty of attention from bystanders.

Neil Alan Blount, 33, pleaded not guilty to charges of evading officers with reckless driving, auto theft and receiving a stolen vehicle during a Jan. 2 preliminary hearing.

A detective and another officer testified about the 20-minute chase and a map of Ocean Beach was entered into evidence. The incident started when Blount allegedly stole a 1999 black Honda, according to court records.

An officer spotted the stolen car being driven on West Point Loma Boulevard and radioed it in to confirm it was stolen. The officer followed, but Blount refused to pull over near Abbott Street.

By the time the car reached Sunset Cliffs Boulevard, five patrol cars were following it, though the pursuit speeds averaged about 30 mph. Spike strips were placed in front of the Honda at the corner of Abbott Street and Saratoga Avenue, where they punctured two left tires.

Blount continued to drive, but he turned westbound in the 5100 block of Narragansett Avenue, which ends near the ocean. Officers arrested him at gunpoint. Blount has two prior convictions for burglary in 2010 and 2011, according to records. He remains in custody on \$50,000 bail.

Test to determine prison or probation for robber

A judge on Jan. 24 ordered an Ocean Beach bank robber to complete a 90-day diagnostic study in a state prison, where officials can make a recommendation to the court as to whether the man should get prison time or if he is more suited to probation.

Douglas Michael Ellens, 39, and his mother, Debra Ellens, told San Diego Superior Court Judge Leo Valentine, Jr. that he has hit "rock bottom in jail" and wants to be placed in a residential drugtreatment program.

"I want to change my life. When I'm clean, I'm fine," said Douglas Ellens. "I do realize I have a problem."

Ellens said he was turned down by one drug-treatment program and his attorney asked that Ellens be screened for treatment in other programs as part of his request for the diagnostic study.

Valentine re-set sentencing for May 23. He said drug addiction was the reason Ellens robbed three banks in Ocean Beach, Point Loma and Clairemont. Ellens could get seven years for his guilty pleas to those hold-ups.

Ellens was arrested Sept. 13 in a Midway-area motel room where some of the stolen money was found. A GPS tracking device was placed with the money at the third bank, leading police to the motel.

Ellens robbed the U.S. Bank branch at 4827 Newport Ave. at 3:22 p.m. and held up the Comerica Bank at 3361 Rosecrans

No one was injured and no weapon was shown, although the prosecutor said Ellens wrote on two demand notes that he

Sentencing handed down in murder of local man

Shane Brian Grattan of Pacific Beach was sentenced Jan. 17 to 25 years to life in prison for the 2012 murder of Darrin Ioseph. 45. a Point Loma man who was beaten to death in Grattan's van.

Joseph's family members said the victim was not homeless and had been living in a sober-living facility until about a month prior to the murder. Joseph's aunt, Belle Joseph, told Grattan, 57, that he must have offered alcohol to her nephew, which she said likely led to Joseph's decision to leave the facility.

Joseph's body was found Jan. 19, 2012 in some bushes at 4960 North Harbor Drive. His abandoned wheelchair was found not far away. His blood and DNA was found throughout Grattan's van, despite Grattan's attempts to clean it up, according to police investigators.

As he did in his trial, Grattan said nothing during the sentencing. A jury convicted him Nov. 6 of first-degree murder. He was arrested Feb. 8, 2012.

Superior Court Judge Amalia Meza ordered Grattan to pay nearly \$3,700 toward the victim's funeral expenses and fined him more than \$10,200.

Grattan's attorney argued that Joseph had stayed temporarily with Grattan, but that someone else committed the murder. Grattan has filed an appeal.

"Any offers we get will be evaluated and we'll move from there."

Melanie Nickel, chairwoman of the Midway Community Planning Advisory Group (MCPAG), said the group has discussed the Midway postal facility several times previously, knowing the property has been offered for sale by the federal government.

"We heard two or three presentations by prospective buyers, none of whom actually wound up purchasing the place," Nickel said, adding there are several community concerns about the property's ultimate disposition.

'We are very concerned about the traffic impacts of development," Nickel said. "Any large development would make the already awful traffic situation at Midway [Drive] and Rosecrans [Street] even worse. Some kind of street infrastructure improvements will definitely be needed and will, hopefully, be one of the things the city requires from the developer.

The Midway postal facility itself is in the middle of a historic area known as Dutch Flats. Dutch Flats was the name

used by Ryan Aeronautical Company near what is now Midway Drive and Barnett Street.

Dutch Flats became famous when Ryan built a specially designed aircraft for Charles A. Lindbergh, who tested it there before flying it solo across the Atlantic in 1927. Several existing historic plaques inside Midway Post Office commemorate Dutch Flats and Lindbergh. Nickel said the Midway Community Planning Advisory Group believes the Dutch Flats/Lindbergh plaques should be retained in any redevelopment of the Midway Postal site.

This isn't the first time the USPS has tried to sell its Midway site. In 2010, the USPS teamed up with CB Ellis Real Estate to sell the property, then estimated to be worth about \$62.5 million.

Amikas, a local nonprofit group, came forward with a bid to use the land as a self-sustained homeless center, a proposal which never bore fruit. The site was also rumored to have been considered for a Costco store, but that never came to pass and the property was taken off the market.



Michael Charter, decorated veteran, tireless volunteer, activist


In the early morning hours on Jan. boa Park and was 23, Michael Paul Charter passed away. He was 69.



Ninety-five acres of the former San Diego Naval Training Center is an area that holds a special place in the hearts of not just the hundreds of thousands of sailors who called it home, but of the entire community that watched it grow up. One of only four historic districts in the City of San Diego to be listed on the National Register of Historic Places, the NTC Historic District will forever be a place that turned boys into men, launched war heroes into battle and made San Diego the great Navy town of the 20th Century.

The above map directs you to markers explaining the significance of many of the historic sites at NTC. Start your self-guided walking tour at the NTC Command Center, Building 200 (2640 Historic Decatur Road), and walk your way through history.



Alley Cat Street struts flair for Jerry Garcia's solo work

Lots of great bands emerged during the 1960s, but only one drew fame for its audiences as well as its music — the Grateful Dead.

Still one of the world's most famous groups, despite the passing of frontman Jerry Garcia in 1995, it's only natural that there be tribute acts in their honor, including Ocean Beach favorite Electric Waste Band. Now comes Alley Cat Street, a new offshoot of this combo; — this time dedicated to Garcia's solo work.

Alley Cat Street debuted Dec. 7 at Winston's Beach Club, where it will continue to play regular gigs. The group is made up of keyboardist Paul Bell, guitarist Andy Braunstein, drummer D.J. Bonin and bassist Andrew Lantz.

Bell said Winston's is the obvious choice when it comes to a home base.

"It was a no-brainer," said Bell. "I played 16 years of straight Monday nights there. The 'dead-head' scene is thriving in OB."

Bell said he originally left Electric Waste didn't go too far.

"After spending over 16 years playing in the Electric Waste Band, I had a feeling it was time to move on," he said. "I will always love Jerry Garcia's musical sensibilities and will crave that style, so I knew I would be able to assemble these cats and have a good ol' time playing with what, to me, are brand-new sets of music."

Garcia fans will be happy to know that Alley Cat Street does, indeed, stick to Garcia's solo work.

"For now, we are making an effort to not play Grateful Dead songs," Bell said. "Jerry Garcia Band [JGB]would only play one or two songs that were also in a typical Dead show. The song 'Deal,' for

For Bell, the most exciting thing about Band for a change of pace, though he Alley Cat Street is the different genres that can show up within a single show.

"JGB lists would include Jimmy Cliff one minute, then Irving Berlin, some Chuck Berry, some Motown, some funk, gospel," said Bell. "A lot of these tunes are songs my dad would know and love.

On the other hand, the no-Dead-songs rule is not set in stone.

"I sang over 95 tunes with Electric Waste Band, and if someone throws some dough in our [tip jar], I will oblige them with their Dead request, sure," he laughed.

With two decades of playing Garcia's music, it's clear that Garcia has been a huge influence on Bell.

"I saw him with the Grateful Dead over good night," he said.

"After discovering the [Gratefull Dead, and particularly Jerry [Garcia], it opened up the possibility of my entire instrument to be utilized at any given time. He taught me improvisation and musical exploration and to embrace the amost out-of-control sensation of improvising with others."


50 times and with Jerry Garcia Band another 20 or so," Bell said. "He made me realize any song is fair game, and a good piece of music is a good piece of music. He had such a playful style. I used to be a very rigid piano player growing up, only able to play what was written in front of me.

PLNU men's basketball entering home stretch of season

This year, the Point Loma Nazarene University men's basketball team is 10-7 overall and in eighth place in the PacWest with a 5-6 record in conference. The Sea Lions played much of their early season schedule on the road but will close out the season with seven of its last nine games at home starting Saturday, Jan. 25.

Hayden Lescault leads PLNU and ranks sixth in the PacWest with 16.8 points per game. He also ranks fourth in the conference in steals (1.7), eighth in assists (4.1) and fifth in minutes (34.7), while leading the team in each category. Junior Morgan has provided PLNU with a solid presence in the paint since joining the team this offseason. He is averaging 14.4 points per game and 6.5 rebounds to rank 14th in the PacWest in both categories. He is also ranked ninth in the PacWest in shooting percentage at .554.

Fellow big man AJ Ussery is seventh in the PacWest in shooting percentage (.566), 11th in rebounding (6.6) and fourth in blocks (1.6). Point guard Marek Klassen ranks sixth in the PacWest in 3-pointers per game (2.4), ninth in assists (3.9) and 19th in scoring (12.8).







plan is to create "a more pedestrian scale and feel" to lend more of a main-street atmosphere, encouraging smaller stores to come in.

"Did you study any options with the sports arena not being there?" asked Midway planner Cathy Kenton, who was told by city officials one non-sports arena alternative was being studied.

Advisory group chairwoman Melanie Nickel pointed out there is one important consideration to be factored into any rethinking of area land use.

"No one much lives here, pretty much everyone arrives by car," Nickel said.

She added the community is not interested in seeing redevelopment characterized by lots of blacktop or concrete

parking lots, which already predominate

"If there isn't a sports arena, than maybe there could be some kind of entertainment focus there," said Nickal

City engineer Galloway responded that "a big theater with shopping around it, or an ice-skating rink or park space" could be redevelopment alternatives to be considered. He added local planners could look to other areas elsewhere in the state and nation that have similarly redeveloped urban spaces like the Midway/Pacific Highway Corridor.

Jarvis Ross, a planner representing the nearby Peninsula Community Planning Group covering Point Loma, said any redrawn map of land use in the Midway area will necessarily have to focus on traffic impacts in the notoriously crowded and cramped urban corridor linking

coastal communities, Old Town and the San Diego River.

Galloway said aesthetics is a critical consideration in re-envisioning what the Midway/Pacific Highway Corridor can be, helping it to achieve its full potential.

"We need to focus on green streets for sustainability measures, using shade trees and traffic calming, developing elements connecting you to park space accommodating pedestrians and bicyclists," Galloway said.

The advisory group will resume discussion of the Midway/Pacific Highway Plan Update at its Feb. 19 meeting, when it is hoped planners will vote on some key provisions of a new community plan

The group meets the third Wednesday of the month at 3 p.m. at San Diego Community College West City Campus, 3249 Fordham St. in Room 208.


