There has, however, always been a clear division of labor within their relationship.


"She takes care of the social aspects of life — the scheduling, all that sort of thing," said Don.

## **Faulconer outmuscles Alvarez in hard-fought** mayoral runoff battle

Swearing-in ceremony likely to take place in early March

In a hotly contested special election for mayor with lower-than-expected voter turnout, Republican City Councilman Kevin Faulconer (District 2) outpolled rival Democratic City Councilman David Alvarez (District 8) by a 10-point margin.

With 100 percent of the ballots counted in all 582 precincts, Faulconer collected 137,296 votes (55 percent) to Alvarez's 114,478 (45 percent).

"The people of San Diego have sent a message tonight," said Faulconer, 47, of Point Loma during his election-night speech to cheering supporters. "And it is loud and clear. You want an indepen-

"You want a mayor that will bring San Diego together," he continued. "You want a mayor that will continue the reforms that you voted for, to create the city that you deserve. I will be that mayor."

Alvarez, 33, was gracious on election night as he conceded the mayoral

### Voluntary water conservation a good first step but enough?

Citing 2013 as California's driest year on record, city officials echoed the San that the region has plentiful water in storage and called on the community to do more to conserve in light of the state's formal drought declaration.

San Diego Coastkeeper, which protects fishable, swimmable and drinkable waters, praised the city for its call to conservation, but warns voluntary measures may not be enough to ensure supply.

"As water importers, we have a responsibility to conserve when our end-of-pipe habits have devastating effects rippling throughout the western United States." said Matt O'Malley, global policy director for the waterkeeper movement. Coastkeeper is one of a dozen waterkeeper organizations in California alone.

"We import over 80 percent of our water from outside the region, which means the low snowpack and the drying

on our water supply," he said.

O'Malley said the drought can serve as Diego County Water Authority's claim a good educational tool to inform the public as to why permanent conservation methods are a necessary part of life in San Diego. Regionally, he said, almost 60 percent of the drinking water supply is used on outdoor irrigation.

> "I'd like to see the city investigate and implement permanent scheduled irrigation in San Diego as part of its Water Wise Program," said O'Malley, who will request the city's Environment Committee to amend municipal code chapter 6. He said he'd like the code to include mandatory and permanent irrigation scheduling of two days per week maximum, or a similarly restrictive localized schedule, and restrictive timeframes on the duration of the watering to maximize water conservation. "This restriction should be the new normal in San Diego."

To give it perspective, O'Malley said

Colorado River have major implications Dallas, Texas, adopted an ordinance that made maximum twice-weekly watering mandatory in 2012. According to Dallas officials, it's too early to share concrete numbers, but they said they have seen a reduction in consumption since enacting the ordinance in 2012.

> History shows water restrictions work in San Diego, too. When the county Water Authority enacted mandatory restriction in 2009, county residents responded by conserving around 20 percent. And in 2009 to 2011, the region reduced its water use by 14 percent.

> "We can no longer depend on increasing water imports from the Colorado River — it's drying up," said O'Malley. While that strategy has worked for several years, and it's why our water storage appears healthy right now, it's not going to last."



"I want to congratulate Kevin Faulconer," tweeted Alvarez. "It's clear that he will be the next mayor of San Diego. I am looking forward to working with him and interim Mayor Todd Gloria to move our city forward. Once again, thank you to the fantastic volunteers and supporters. I am truly proud of you."

Cynthia Paes, assistant registrar for San Diego County, said election officials have 28 days to certify the results. She added voter turnout was nearly 38 percent.

"We were expecting at least 45 percent," Paes said, who adding the actual turnout number was "pretty average" compared with other counties in similar circumstances statewide.

City Clerk Liz Maland said Faulconer's swearing in is tentatively set for March 3

The City Council will need to appoint an interim councilmember to fill Faulconer's seat because Faulconer is termed out after two four-year stints, said Maland. The appointed replacement will serve until Faulconer's term officially expires in December, even though a primary election for District 2 is set for June 3. If none of the candidates in the primary election garner 51 percent of the vote, a runoff election will be scheduled for Nov. 4, Maland said.

Meanwhile, Faulconer will serve out the remaining nearly three years of disgraced former Mayor Bob Filner. Filner resigned Aug. 30—just nine months into his term - after numerous women came forward to allege he sexually harassed them.

Faulconer's departure to serve as mayor decreases the Republican City Council minority from 5-4 to 5-3, although the City Council is technically a nonpartisan political body. If a Democrat were to be appointed to fill the remainder of Faulconer's term through December, that would give Democrats a 6-3 majority advantage, with the prospect of veto power to reject the new mayor's agenda.

"What happens is there will be 30 business days, once the seat is vacant, to apply for a special appointment to fill out the term of [Faulconer's] seat," Maland said. "It's a major process requiring the gathering of at least 50 signatures."

Maland said the interim Council District 2 representative would likely be seated in April. The interim councilmember will not be allowed under the city's charter to run for the full District 2 term in the June election, Maland said.

Maland said whoever wins the race for District 2 — either in the primary or a runoff election — would not be inaugurated and seated until December.

Faulconer will have the distinction of becoming the only Republican mayor in any of America's 10 largest cities.

#### Teen jumped by several attackers, carjacked

Investigators are looking into a brazen attack by at least a half-dozen assailants who reportedly beat a 17-year-old at Ladera Park on Feb. 8 and carjacked his vehicle.

According to police, the boy was parked in a BMW waiting for friends to meet him at the park shortly before 8 p.m. when he was approached on foot by five or six Hispanic men and two Hispanic women — all of whom were believed to be in their mid-20s.

The driver told police two of the suspects forced their way into the car and began ransacking its contents. The victim told investigators he tried to push the suspects from the vehicle as he drove away, prompting the men to beat him. He told police that when he stopped the car, all five or six of the men reportedly began kicking him in the face and head before fleeing in his vehicle.

Officers located the car about 50 yards away from the scene of the attack.

The victim was taken to a local trauma center for treatment of moderate facial injuries.

#### Suspect arraigned in string of street robberies

Police moved in to arrest one of three men suspected in a string of street robberies that ranged from Ocean Beach to La Jolla on Feb. 2.

The man, identified as Benjamin Hernandez, 23, of National City is believed to have been the getaway driver for the trio of robbers, according to police investigators. He is scheduled for a Feb. 20 preliminary hearing.

Hernandez pleaded not guilty Feb. 5 before San Diego Superior Court Judge David Szumowski, who set bail at \$500,000.

"In two or three of the robberies, guns were actually held to the heads of the victims," said Deputy District Attorney Dan Link to the judge. "This driver was identified by his license plate."

The other two suspects are still being tracked, said police.

The crime spree, which targeted at least 10 victims, unfolded shortly before 7 p.m. on Cape May near Cable Street in Ocean Beach, when the suspects produced a handgun and a crowbar to demand cellphones and wallets, among other items, from victims, according to investigators.

The robbers then shifted locations over the next few hours, hitting more unsuspecting victims in Midtown, Hillcrest. Golden Hill and Mission Beach before turning their sights on the campus at UC San Diego. Here, the trio robbed two students, one of whom managed to catch the getaway vehicle's license plate.

The subsequent investigation led to the arrest of Hernandez at his National City home on Feb. 4. He is being held on \$100,000 bail.

#### 'Ho-Hum Bandit' eyeing 20-year sentence

A man suspected of being the "Ho-Hum Bandit" for his nonchalant demeanor during three local bank robberies pleaded guilty Jan. 28 to three holdups in La Jolla and another on Rosecrans Street in Point Loma in 2010.

Adam Lynch, 36, also pleaded guilty to three other bank robberies in downtown San Diego and Hillcrest in 2010. A U.S. District Court judge set Lynch's sentencing for April 21.

Lynch faces at least 20 years in federal prison for the holdups locally. He is currently serving a 64-month federal sentence for bank robberies in Denver, and Cheyenne, Wyo. A parole date of Dec. 10, 2015 has been set in that case, but his sentence here is expected to run consecutively.

Lynch got his nickname in San Diego because of his almost-routine manner of robbery that didn't really stand out to witnesses or tellers. He always had a demand note that said he was armed, but no weapon was ever displayed and no one was physically harmed.

After stealing more than \$25,000 locally, Lynch moved on to other states and he was arrested in Denver on April 21, 2011, according to court records. The first bank he robbed was a U.S. Bank branch at 1075 Rosecrans St. on Feb.

Lynch then robbed a Wells Fargo Bank branch at 7714 Girard Ave. in La Jolla and twice held up the same Citibank branch at 7900 Hershel Ave. a month apart.

According to court records, the note Lynch gave a teller at the Wells Fargo bank read: "Do what I say. This is for real. Don't talk. Don't move." Lynch's hometown is Corte Madera, Calif. and he remains in custody without bail.

There's a particularly cringe-worthy comment some make that belies the orange cones, sandwichboard signs that say "School Crossing" and high-energy volunteers who work smackdab in the middle of the 4700 block of Santa Monica Avenue where mostly kindergartenage kids cross.

"It's not a real crosswalk," one driver said mockingly.

It's a remark usually borne of frustration from parents who are too time-depraved to observe laws — and common-sense practices — when it comes to double parking, Uturns, hurried drop-offs and three-minute parking zones.

But when the Ocean Beach Planning Board this month voted on what to do about that curious spot that has two parallel lines that were originally painted yellow but then topped with black paint days later because of a city miscue, the decision brought nothing but cheers.

The board Feb. 5 settled what supporters hope is the final detail holding up construction of a new, "real" crosswalk. After hearing audience members sound off on four options, the board voted unanimously in favor of the "shovel-ready" alternative: a raised, concrete crosswalk with curb cuts that will allow wheelchair access and act as a speed bump.

The project will cost around \$13,000 and already has the necessary funding, said John Ly, aide to District 2 San Diego City Councilmember Kevin Faulconer, who sought the board's help to reach a consensus on the design.

Some parents had expressed support for an alternative that eliminated curb cuts. with the speed bump/crosswalk flush with the sidewalk. The design, based on a crosswalk at the Belly-Up Tavern in Solana Beach, could have included landscaping and features intended to improve accessibility and stormwater flow.

But when Ly revealed it would require further design and cost more than \$60.000. support for that alternative evaporated and swung to the "take-the-money-and-run"

option, as Piña put it.

"As long as we can at least get something to slow people down," said Suzy Reid, a mother of two Ocean Beach Elementary students who holds leadership positions on the school's Site Governance Team and School Site Council. "All of our parents are really looking forward to this. We've been talking about this for years."

A timeline was not available. Gary Pence, the city's senior traffic engineer for the project, said in an email he needed time to work out details between the school and the city's Streets Division.

The yellow-line crosswalk that used to be there is an oddity of almost folkloric proportion. Immediately after it was painted, the city realized it committed a violation because a mid-block crosswalk has to be accompanied by a streetlight.

When a work crew returned days later, it laid down black paint directly on top of the yellow lines without blending, so the outlines are still prominent.

Public pressure for a streetlight intensified last year. It was installed on the south side of Santa Monica Avenue two months ago.

### Humanitarian and Pioneer in research on high frequency radio noise 1940-2014

David passed away peacefully at home on January 28, 2014, after living with Progressive Supranuclear Palsy for 12 years. His cat Zippy was on his lap and his wife Abby was by his side. He donated his brain the UCSD Brain Observatory so they can hopefully find out more about how such a brilliant mind can be so devastated by the insidious disease PSP.

David was born in Ouray, Colorado, in a log cabin on May 14, 1940. He attended elementary school in a little town in Wyoming, that no longer exists, called Grass Creek. Both of his parents were teachers there and his mother was the superintendent of schools. He always said they were very strict but always kind when he was in their class. He did not have a TV when he was growing up so he developed many hobbies, many of which he continued the rest of his life. He collected rare Dixieland jazz records, stamps, Olympic pins, and stuffed moose. He things. He won many awards for the photos he took with his Leica camera. He became an expert on whatever interested him by being an avid reader. He read every book in the library on Native Americans when he was young. He took a bus to high school in Thermopolis, Wyoming, excelled academically, played the tuba in the band, was one merit badge away from earning his Eagle Scout Award, and was the valedictorian of his graduating class. He then went on to DePauw University in Greencastle Indiana as a prestigious Rector Scholar majoring in both math and physics. He moved to San Diego in 1964 to join the Propagation Division as a radio research physicist at the Naval Electronics Laboratory, now called

SPAWAR. He retired from there in 1998. He then spent the next four years volunteering in Abby's kindergarten classroom, as well as pursuing his many hobbies.

In the summer of 1967 he attended a physics institute in Boulder Colorado. He met his wife Abby there on a backpacking trip through the recreation department of the university. She was on her summer vacation from her kindergarten teaching in Elgin, Illinois, and her church organist job to study organ and music theory. They had a long distance relationship for nine months(Abby still has all the letters David sent her) and married on June 29, 1968,

David received his M.S. degree in physics from San Diego State University in 1971. He continued to do ground breaking work for the Navy, authoring over 144 technical notes, reports, documents, presentations, and journal he publication of the award in 1997 and 1998, the latter of which was the reporting of a discovery he made of a significant error in the atmospheric radio noise model used on navy ships. He travelled throughout the world delivering his papers, and he did research in the Arctic, which was a highlight of his career. He was the Navy representative on the Joint Directors of Laboratories sub-panel on Dynamic Spectrum Management, and he was an active member of a Working Group chartered by the Electromagnetic Wave Propagation Panel of NATO. From 1976 to 1979 he was involved in the Navy's preparation for the 1979 World Administrative Radio Conference. These efforts resulted in the development of a capability to access the electromagnetic compatability of one High Frequency radio system with another.

It is because of David's work that the subject of radio noise has remained a very important interest to the Navy. David held memberships in many prestigious national and international research groups including the International Union of Radio Science.

David took Abby and their three month old daughter Jeannie to Geneva, Switzerland, in 1976 when he served on the U.S. delegation of one of his International study groups. In 1977, his second daughter Amanda was born.

In addition to David's brilliant career, he was active in his community, from serving on committees in his daughters' schools to being an avid supporter of the Peninsula YMCA. He always led a very healthful life, never smoked or drank, and he researched the most healthful food to eat. He even cooked the family holiday year! He folk dance monthly ballroom dinner dances with Abby, and ran half marathons. He even ran one of the 7 most grueling races in the world, the Mount Marathon Race in Alaska when he and his family visited his parents who were then teachers there. When he got to the top he just sat there to enjoy the view and let all the other racers go by him. He said it was so beautiful up there. David saw the beauty in the world everywhere. That's why they sang For the Beauty of the Earth at their wedding and will sing it again at the celebration of his life.

He served on the Board of Directors of the Peninsula YMCA and was often the highest campaigner for their annual support campaign. Abby is continuing the work that he started. He

was truly committed to the Y and he also cared very much about people. His daughter Amanda remembers what a great listener he was for her and others, and his daughter Jeannie remembers his kindness to everyone, including her. David never said an unkind word about anyone. He always had time for others, always listened to them and rarely talked about himself. For years one of the people who gives to the Y because of David has said that a special article should be put in the paper about David and his sincere, caring style of campaigning. He always insisted on making personal calls and spending time with each person. This was rare in the ever-changing world of non-personal communication. They looked forward to his visits every year, and he always called on them dressed in his suit. He received the Red Triangle award from the Y, the Bob and Meredith Giantvalley award, as well as other accolades. In 2002 David's previously active lifestyle began coming to a standstill when he went to the dentist and had a deep cleaning and was not given antibiotics. Bacteria escaped to his brain, causing PSP. Immediately he began falling and showing other signs of neurological problems. Abby stopped teaching in 2005 and retired in 2006 to take full care of David at their home. They were blessed to have students from Point Loma Nazarene University and Point Loma High School who volunteered their time every day to help David get out of the house and back in. When they couldn't do it friends and family were there to help. It was truly a blessing to see all the love and care David had poured out to others being returned to him for almost 10 years! He loved getting out in the van that a very kind person from their church helped them get a few years ago. It made it so much easier to get him out at church and other places. David and Abby rarely missed a Sunday together at church for 45 years.

As David began to lose his ability to talk his family almost forgot his wonderful sense of humor. When he retired someone said he had such a great sense of humor but it was always in good taste! His daughters, Jeannie and Mandy, said one of their very favorite things about him was his contagious "HEE HEE HEE laugh". Abby heard that laugh every Sunday when he read the comics. She would ask "What's so funny?" Abby hardly ever understood the humor like he did.

Abby continued to play Dixieland jazz for avid during his illness. He had a colle almost 2000 jazz records. Their cat Zippy who was his constant companion even learned to

David is survived by his wife Abby of 45 years, daughters Jeannie and Mandy, granddaughters Breanna, Molly, Samantha, Meghan, sons-in-law Justin and Santo, brothers Don and Steve, and sister Judy.

fiths, neither of whom puts much stock in "special occasions." They prefer just to enjoy one another's company each and every day.

It wasn't love at first sight, according to the Griffiths. The pair met on a blind date as college students in Iowa back in the late 1940s.

"She was in nursing and I was in engineering," said Don, adding both occupations are virtually inherited traits passed down respectively from one generation to the next in their family lines.

Margaret and Don were from different backgrounds. She was from a small town. He was a city boy.

Like all long-term relationships, the Griffith's love has stood the test of time, overcoming accidents, illness—even an earthquake.

The first incident was an auto accident the pair got into while still in college, when Don spun out on a gravel road and Jill was thrown from the vehicle.

"I was in a body cast for three months," she said. "We celebrated our first wedding anniversary in the hospital, where my mother was taking care of me."

In 1963, Margaret, who had had three children by then, was diagnosed with lupus, an autoimmune disease where the body's immune system attacks normal healthy tissue that causes swelling and organ dam-

Having lived with the effects of the condition the rest of her life, Don said he's done everything possible since to keep Margaret's lifestyle "stress free."

Don said Margaret's survical of a condition like that "makes you appreciative of life ... [and] there's some benefits of tragedy."

The pair also survived the big Northridge earthquake in the Los Angeles area in 1993.

"That was a pretty big one. You're shak- Not while he's got Margaret, anyway.

ing pretty good," said Don.

He said the quake put his "water heater through the wall" and "finished off my chimnev.

The first thing he did was check that their gas and water lines were shut off, as well as those of his neighbors.

Don said their pastor opened up the Sunday School to quake refugees.

"We were without electricity and water for five days," said Margaret. "It was a war

By comparison, the Griffiths these days live mostly in a "peace zone."

Don and Margaret are very active at Point Loma Community Presbyterian Church. Don is in charge of facilities and associated with a group of volunteers known as "Men At Work" at the Presbyterian Urban Ministries downtown.

"It's a hand up for the homeless, where we fix things and haul furniture," Don said.

Margaret is involved with a church group that organizes memorial services.

The Griffiths walk along the beach near their home every night. Don is busy with his grandson, working to restore a 1947 Jeep he has sitting out back of his home.

"We're very blessed that we're both still here," said Margaret.

She said a lot of women she knows at church would "love to have been married for 61 years."

Don agreed, saying men with their generally shorter life spans tend to be sought after by the ladies after a certain point.

He told of a man he knew in his 90s who finally broke down after his wife died and went to live in "one of those care places."

"He said the ladies always saw to it he sat at their table and always came afterward to visit him in his room. He said, 'You know, you've almost got to lock your door at night.'

Don doesn't have to worry about that.

panel discussion in the school's cinematic theater, which included student activist Max Guinn, founder of Kids Eco Club. and marine biologist Dr. Toni Frohoff.

Although SeaWorld San Diego officials have strongly decried the accuracy of the documentary and defended their animalcare practices in a pushback to the "Blackfish" program, they were invited — but did not participate — in the panel discussion.

"Blackfish" explores the 2010 accidental death of SeaWorld's Dawn Brancheau, trainer of the orca Tilikum, and is critical of keeping killer whales in captivity and using them to perform in shows. The film premiered at the Sundance Film Festival in January 2013, then went mainstream in October when expose on the marine park. it was featured on CNN and became the subject of several CNN news features.

Though they declined to participate in the PLHS panel discussion, SeaWorld officials issued the following statement: "As we responded a few weeks ago to the filmmaker's debate challenge, we have no interest in helping promote a film this dishonest and manipulative," said SeaWorld San Diego spokesman Dave Koontz.

"Our position has not changed," continued the statement. "We did not receive any specific invitation from the school regarding today's screenings. We would like to thank Kearny High School for inviting us to provide a SeaWorld presentation to their students last week. We applaud the school's desire to provide its students information on both sides of the issue to help them make a more informed decision. It's unfortunate that we did not receive invitations from the other schools to provide a SeaWorld presentation to their students."

"I was making a documentary about trainers and their relationships with apex [top] predators, almost a philosophical film," Cowperthwaite said. "It wasn't going to be controversial."

But as she delved deeper into the story, "I began peeling back the onion and started to realize, shockingly, the truth," Cowperthwaite said.

Marine biologist Dr. Toni Frohoff said scientists "have an obligation when we find dolphins and whales we're studying are dying and languishing in captivity to speak out. It's not a matter of being animal-rights activists. It's a matter of scientists being responsible to populations of animals and the habitats they live in."

Asked if "Blackfish" has caused Sea-World to make any changes in its business model, Cowperthwaite replied, "We sometimes hear rumblings that they might be changing the environment of the sea lion pool or making nicer waterfalls. [But] so far, they're standing their

ground, saying they're proud of their history and to look at all the good things they do [animal rescues, conservation, public education]."

Cowperwaite likened challenging Sea-World's business model to "poking the

"Nobody's talked about any of these things [orca treatment] for 40 years," Cowperthwaite said.

She added that she and others challenging Sea World's methods are being branded by some as "crazy activist scien-

"The Kids Eco Club teaches environmentalism and this is a really big issue, and we thought it was important for kids to hear both sides of the argument so than can decide who's right or wrong," said Guinn, when asked why he organized the "Blackfish" panel discussion.

Frohoff said orcas in the wild are 'some of the most peaceful of all social species," adding she felt captivity may cause some of them to become stressed and "pathological."

Frohoff said it's impractical to try and take orcas that have lived their entire lives in captivity and unleash them into the wild where they wouldn't know how to take care of themselves without human care. But there might be a middle ground, she suggested, through the creation of 'sanctuaries," fenced-off, more natural habitats where people could observe them, but where orcas and other marine mammals wouldn't be forced to perform like circus animals for human entertain-

A student asked Cowperthwaite who they should believe in the orca debate – SeaWorld or their critics.

"Don't trust either of us," she said. "Go and do your own research. I want to encourage you all to do your own critical







### Johnny 'V' turns lifetime of blues stage work into musical mentoring in Point Loma

Along with reggae, the blues probably has the biggest pull among San Diego music fans. True, there are only a few local venues like Patrick's II that specialize in the music, but it's also true there are few venues in town of any size that don't feature blues somewhere on their

As much fun as it is to listen to blues short seminar about music, it's even more so when you participate in making the music. To that end, music school Rock and Roll San Diego has started a combination jam session/group workshop on Mondays at 6 p.m. that are open to participants of all

There are many places in San Diego to learn blues and even a few venues that hold iam sessions, but the combination of the two, under the tutelage of slide guitarist Johnny "V" Vernazza, makes for a rare opportunity to learn about playing — as well as performing.

Vernazza is key to this.

San Diego has many great guitar players, but few have reached the heights of Vernazza at his 1970s prime. As a member of the Elvin Bishop Group, he scored gold in 1976 with the No. 4 hit, "Fooled Around and Fell In Love," regularly performed at stadiums to more than 40,000 people and became the most frequent guest on NBC-TV's show "The Midnight Special," where he appeared 14 times, including a spot backing Van Morrison.

"To get lessons from someone like Johnny, who has been out there and has a lifetime of experience is great enough, but to be able to play with him in a group setting and trade guitar licks and ideas, that's really something," said Rock and Roll San Diego owner Mark Langford. "It is, indeed, learning from one of the best. But it can also be a lot of fun."

"I enjoy a big stage. In the stadium days, you really had room to move around and that can make for a better show," he said. "But the amount of work and preparation you put into a performance itself, whether the draw is 10 people or 10,000, it's the same."





> "Sometimes, the one thing in your life you think is going to break you is what makes you who you are," he said. "The only reason I got through that was because of faith, stability in my household and my mother being a strong, extraordinary person."

McPherson added his own thoughts.

"Sometimes, we think our problems are big until we hear someone else's story," he said. "Hopefully, God is encouraging and letting you know you are not by yourself and that you can overcome whatever you are going
