PLHS girls seize first CIF championship in 23 years

Ladv Pointer basketball player Morgan Maclean knew her team could end Point Loma High's 23-year drought since its last CIF championship, and she was determined to make that a reality last Friday morning.

And so, when her sixth-seeded Pointers entered the fourth quarter of their title match down 24-22 against fifth-seed Hoover at Jenny Craig Pavilion on the USD campus, the 6' 0" junior took charge.

Over the final eight minutes, Maclean scored 15 of her game-high 22 points, including a stunning 8 of 8 from the free throw line, part of a 15-4 Pointer scoring run that propelled them to a 43-36 comefrom-behind win over a tough Cardinal squad for the Div. IV title.


she'd one day command it. "When I graduated from the police academy in 1982, my goal wasn't to be chief of police," she said. "My goal was to do the very best job at whatever assignment I

had.'

An Ohio native from Cleveland and an Ohio State University alum whose father was a World War II combat veteran and a trial attorney, Zimmerman first came to California to the Rose Bowl to see her beloved Buckeyes play. Afterward, she visited San Diego, which proved to be life changing.

"I came down to the zoo and immediately fell in love with the beauty of the city," Zimmerman said. "I'd shoveled my last driveway."

After breaking her parents' hearts

with the news, Zimmerman said she moved to San Diego "not knowing anyone. Didn't have a job. Didn't even have a place to stay."

"And here I am 32 years later as the chief of police," Zimmerman

Jack is a board member of the Irish Congress of Southern California, Inc., a nonprofit promoting appreciation of Irish culture, which annually plans and implements the St. Patrick's Day Parade and Irish Festival in Balboa

"You ride in the parade and represent the Irish Congress, mostly at events in Balboa Park, throughout the year," said Jack of her role as Irish Woman of the year.

As an annual St. Pat's parade volunteer, Jack said her job involves "doing all the logistics, including the setup and teardown."

Council fine-tunes city's operating rules for food trucks

San Diego City Council unanimously passed new rules for increasingly popular mobile food trucks citywide which allows them to operate on public streets and in commercial areas, but restricts their latenight operating hours while requiring them to be at least 300 feet from resi-

Food trucks will only be allowed to operate between 6 a.m. and 10 p.m. Sunthrough Thursday, 6 a.m. to 11 p.m. Friday and Saturday.

Mobile trucks can now be operated without a permit in industrial, commercial and high-density residential areas. They will largely be prohibited however, except for special events, in low-density neighborhoods and in the restaurantdense Gaslamp Quarter and Little Italy.

Food trucks will also be allowed only by special permit on streets in parking overlay zones near the beachfront and close to universities.

New rules also prohibit truck operators from having amplified music or selling alcohol, and to police themselves by collecting litter within a 25-foot radius before moving on.

ing pedestrian or vehicular traffic. They also will be allowed on private property with a permit costing between \$491 and \$931. Trucks must also have a city phone number posted on them so violations of operating conditions can be reported.

"If you read the ordinance, only 5 percent of the city will not be open to food trucks, and even in those areas they will be allowed by special-event permit," said District 3 Councilman Todd Gloria, who noted that presently "laws do not allow for food trucks on private property."

"We're trying to change that," said Gloria about existing truck regulations adding, "These rules are fair.'

Noting there's room for "both brickand-mortar and mobile food trucks to be successful," District 6 Councilmember Lori Zapf expressed concern about truck operations impacting residents. She made the successful motion that trucks be required to be at least 300 feet from

Public testimony largely was in favor of proposed amendments to the city's municipal codes and the need to clarify food truck operating conditions.

Denny Knox, executive director of the Ocean Beach MainStreet Association, a business improvement district (BID) representing the restaurant-rich Ocean Beach community, said she was confused about the new truck ordinance and uncertain of its consequences.

"There are so many parts to this, I don't know whether to support it or be opposed," testified Knox. "We're worried

the city, like ours, where 40-some percent of employees work in restaurants."

Another Obecean, Dave Martin, president of Ocean Beach Town Council, said the "parking impact overlay zone protects us." Martin said beach residents just want to make sure that "we're on a fair playing field" with the new truck regula-

After the March 3 hearing, Chris Olson, a Pacific Beach Planning Group member, said food trucks provide a com-

"I love the food trucks at the Saturday Seaside Farmers Market at Mission Bay High School," Olson said. "This is a "win, win, win. They do not impact local restaurants, a portion of the proceeds go to our local schools and I get a great Saturday lunch during my bay-loop bike

The City Council also voted to review the changes to the ordinance in one year to assess their impacts and effectiveness.

Seals win key victory in long-running saga with humans

a thumbs-up in the seesaw battle over shared use at La Jolla's Children's Pool after the San Diego City Council voted 6-3 to close the beach to human contact during the marine mammals' five-month pupping season.

District 1 City Councilwoman Sherri Lightner, who represents La Jolla. along with Mark Kersey of District 5 and Scott Sherman of District 7, cast dissenting votes.

The pro-pinniped vote came after Lightner's motion to oppose city staff's recommendation to approve Children's Pool seasonal beach closure from Dec. 15 to May 15 was defeated

The Feb. 24 vote came after three hours of public testimony in the decade-long battle over co-existence of the two species at the crescentshaped pool.

The Children's Pool was created in the 1930s by La Jolla philanthropist Ellen Browning as a safe wading area for children and ocean recreational-

Beach-access proponents argued before the City Council that the seasonal beach closure was both unnecessary and unwarranted.

Seal enthusiasts countered seasonal closure was essential to protecting seal mothers and pups. Their argument was bolstered by numerous videos depicting seal harassment by

Harbor seals got a flipper version of munity activism" and "passion for sure of the Children's Pool as "regusupporting neighborhoods," Lightner said she's "never been supportive of a seasonal beach closure." She said a year-round rope barrier and ranger are in place at the pool to keep the peace between humans and pin-

> "There are better ways to balance the needs of humans and marine mammals," Lightner said adding she couldn't believe the Scripps' trust creating the pool could actually be interpreted to "eliminate physical access to the beach."

> Lightner argued that appropriate studies have not been done to assess the impacts of a seasonal beach closure on the surrounding marine ecosystems.

> "I'm concerned that we're drawing a line in the sand that we do not need," Lightner said, adding she felt the beach closure would "set a chilling precedent that public, physical access to the beach provided for in the Coastal Act is not guaranteed."

Lightner described the seasonal clo-

latory overkill."

District 9 City Councilwoman Marti Emerald disagreed with Lightner's perspective.

"Just because a very generous member of the community more than 80 years ago donated this pool doesn't mean we have to continue along that vein as times and circumstances change," Emerald said. "It's also become abundantly clear that this tiny piece of beach with its harbor seals has become a regional and national treasure, as well as having gained international recognition."

"We should have reverance and respect for wildlife," noted Emerald pointing out that isn't in evidence from the reports we're seeing about abuse of the environment and overfishing."

Pointing out "many people will never have the opportunity to see the miracle of birth in nature," Emerald made her countermotion to approve the seasonal closure of the Children's Pool to protect the seal rookery.

seasonal beach closure.

"Seals are not an endangered species. Their population is exploding," testified Phyllis Minnick, adding "harrassment is a myth."

Others agreed.

"As a result of human activities, the balance of nature has been changed," argued La Jollan Mike Costello, a scientist. "It's not nice to fool Mother Nature."

Costello is an advocate of doing a comprehensive management study to figure out best practices for dealing with pinnipeds.

Ken Hunrichs, president of Friends of the Children's Pool advocating beach access for people, said seasonal closure would have the net effect of "criminalizing beach use."

San Diego Fire-Rescue Department lifeguard Ed Harris, who has presented an alternative plan to beach closure which envisions using faux boulders, which can be moved to encourage use of the beach by either species, chided the city for not being

Several La Jollans spoke against the open-minded, warning, "You're really setting this up for litigation if you go through with this plan.'

Seal enthusiasts sporting name tags saying "beach for seals" defended the seasonal pool closure.

"It isn't safe for baby seals to share the beach with people," said Ellen Shively, speaking for the Seal Conservancy of San Diego. "Sharing the beach during pupping season does not work.'

Shively showed video footage depicting people prompting seals as a group to flush into the ocean, as well children touching seals, "as if this were a petting zoo."

Attorney and animal-rights activist Bryan Pease claimed the majority of San Diegans favor greater protection for seals during their pupping season.

"This is the final step in a management plan voted on in 2010," Pease said. "Harassment has been ongoing."

Others agreed.

"You are the last defense for the seals. The buck should stop with your vote today," said Carolyn Price.



EDITORIAL

David or Goliath? Who really has your community's best interest at heart?

There's a battle for freedom and independence going on.

But this time, it isn't a British invasion. It's real-estate baron "Papa" Doug Manchester, the owner/publisher of the *U-T San Diego*.

Manchester has embarked on a grand plan to bolster his flagging metropolitan daily's readership by gobbling up local, independent publications.

Is it "Papa" Doug's intent to improve the local print product? Or are his acquisitions a thinly veiled attempt to buy out his competition so he can claim circulation increases and enhanced market penetration?

What does this consolidation bode for the future of San Diego's independent newspaper voices and our local readers who hunger for community news and insight about our neighbors and families? Is this a positive change benefiting the print newspaper industry as a whole or a harbinger of "land grabs" yet to come?

Examine the track record. A case in point is the sale of the *North County Times*, which "Papa" Doug purchased in September 2012, claiming he would maintain the publication's integrity and independence.

The end result: one-third of the Times' staff was subsequently laid off. Ultimately, the print edition of the

North County Times was folded into the *U-T*. Barely six months after the Times' acquisition by Manchester, the supposedly independent *U-T North County Times* name was dropped all together and a *U-T North County Edition* was produced, essentially wiping out community autonomy.

These are disturbing times in the local journalism industry, said Julie Main, publisher of the San Diego Community Newspaper Group, which publishes *The Peninsula Beacon*, covering Point Loma and Ocean Beach; *Beach & Bay Press*, covering Mission Beach, Pacific Beach and Mission Bay; and *La Jolla Village News*, which serves La Jolla, University City and the Golden Triangle area.

"The media industry has changed drastically over the last 30 years," said Main. "Dailies failed to heed the warning signs from competition. Little by little, they lost insert business to direct mail. Shopper-type publications and local community weeklies gained momentum through direct delivery and market saturation, luring retail-advertising business away from the dwindling subscription numbers of the dailies.

"More recently, Craigslist devastated classified revenues," she said.
"Plus, countless print, online, TV and radio outlets have vied for regional ad dollars. It does not come as a surprise

that the U-T would try its hand in gaining back market share by buying out the competition as they did in North County, and now through the Main Street Media acquisition (the La Jolla Light and sister publications). We will continue to do business as usual. providing our readers with an independent voice. We will continue to publish fair and balanced local news coverage to these neighborhoods in print and online, as we've always done. We have a solid reputation for providing businesses with cost-effective advertising solutions that work. It's a natural win-win."

Noting the *U-T* "has deeper pockets than any of us," Jim Kydd, publisher of *Coast News* and *Rancho Santa Fe News*, emphasized these are, indeed, uncertain times for print journalism as a whole.

"We're going to keep doing what we've been doing for 28 years. We're still here, stronger than ever, with a very good reputation."

Perhaps more readers should begin asking the question: Will "Papa" Doug Manchester save San Diego's independent print media or plunder and profit from them, ultimately absorbing and digesting them?

Stay tuned.

said adding "it's a privilege to wear this uniform and badge."

Once in San Diego, Zimmerman still thought she'd follow in her father's footsteps and enroll in law school. But she ended up choosing a different path.

"I'd helped put myself through Ohio State and I thought I'd have to do the same with law school and I heard the Police Department was hiring," she said noting of the force, "I loved it from day one.'

From the start, Zimmerman was impressed by the variety — and impact of police work.

"You have an opportunity to make a positive difference in somebody's life every single day," she said. "You use every bit of knowledge you've ever learned, no matter how important or seemingly meaningless, because you come across such a variety of situations."

"We don't get the calls that say, 'Come out and celebrate with us. our child made honor roll,' " Zimmerman said. "We get the calls that say, 'Come out, please hurry, because someone just assaulted us, or just assaulted our child. When we get there, we have the opportunity to do what we can to make a positive difference - to make a terrible situation better."

Hired in the wake of 10-year veteran police chief Bill Landsdowne's resignation in the wake of multiple allegations of sexual misconduct within the department, Zimmerman said, "Those very few who've made the terrible decision to discredit this badge we're not going to tolerate "

merely a piece of polished metal but a "symbol of service" standing for "integrity, honesty and professional-

"We are going to instill a culture of excellence in our police department," Zimmerman said. "We are going to demand it of ourselves, because our communities deserve it. We are recommitting every single second of every single day to the words that are written on the doors of our police cars, not just San Diego's finest but America's finest.' "

Zimmerman favors an independent audit to "see how we can do it (policing) better."

San Diego's new police chief also supports a proposal to outfit every patrol officer with a camera monitoring their

"We're in the testing phased right now and it's going well," Zimmerman said pointing out she's "completely in favor" of using any technology that can "make us more effective, provide the best service possible to our public."

Once captain of SDPD's Northern Division covering the coastline, Zimmerman credits the beach alcohol ban for being a "game changer" making beaches a more suitable environment for everyone, especially families.

"It smells like a beach now, you're not dodging bottles and cans" said Zimmerman, a beach jogger. "Families have returned, People are enjoying themselves in an environment of safety and

Zimmerman pointed out policing the beachfront is of paramount concern not only for the 1.3 million people who live here but for the many millions of visitors we have.

Becoming San Diego police chief during a time of great transition, Zimmer-Zimmerman said a police badge is not man said the department is much differ-

ent today than it will be when she

"Half of our department is eligible to retire within the next four years," she pointed out. "And half of our working patrol officers have six or fewer years on our department. On some commands, 70 percent of offices have six or fewer years. That's a lot of young officers. Not by age but by experience."

The task of transforming a 21st century police force for the nation's eighth largest city falls to Zimmerman.

Noting the role is ever-expanding, Zimmerman said law enforcement is no longer about just being a good police officer.

"We're social workers," she said. "We're parents, mentors — anything you can think of.'





COLLEGE ROUNDUP PLNU's men win NCCAA West Regional

The Sea Lions saved their best performance for last against Azusa Pacific. After the Cougars narrowly edged the Point Loma men's basketball team twice earlier this season, PLNU got its revenge with a wire-to-wire 86-70 victory over APU in the NCCAA West Regional final on

Junior Morgan scored a game-high 24 points and pulled in nine rebounds to lead the Sea Lions (17-11). Hayden Lescault also added 21 points on 7-of-9 shooting and Sam Okhotin hit four 3-pointers to notch 12 points.

It was the defensive effort of the Sea Lions which set the tone in the game early and allowed them to hold a double-figure lead throughout most of the contest. PLNU scored the first five points of the game and went up 13-3 on a Junior Morgan layup less than seven minutes into the game. The Cougars hit just one of their first five shots and committed three turnovers in that span.

After an APU (17-10) basket and a pair of free throws the Cougars cut the Sea Lions' lead back to six (13-7) but PLNU answered with a 14-5 run and it took a 37-24 lead into the locker room. Midway through the second half APU would make its run by scoring seven straight points to cut the lead to five (44-39) but once again PLNU answered the run. Lescault hit a 3 and Morgan made a jumper on consecutive possessions to extend the lead back to 10 (49-39).

Azusa would never again really threaten Point Loma's lead. It cut PLNU's advantage to nine at 58-49 with six minutes left but the Sea Lions then scored nine straight points (five from Marek Klassen and four from Morgan) to put the game out of reach at 67-48 with just over four minutes remaining.

Robert Sandoval led four Cougars in double-figures with 17 points. Troy Leaf also had 15 and Jared Zoller came off the bench with 13.

This was the third time this season that Point Loma and Azusa Pacific had faced. The first two came in conference play where APU won the contest at Point Loma 75-74 on a Sharif Watson layup with 0.4 seconds remaining. Then off the game at APU went two overtimes with the Cougars edging the Sea Lions 87-84.

Hayden Lescault voted PacWest Newcomer of the Year

Point Loma junior guard Hayden Lescault has been voted as the 2013-14 Pacific West Conference Newcomer of the Year and named to the second team allconference by the league's coaches. Lescault was also joined on the All-PacWest team by honorable mention selections Marek Klassen and Junior Morgan.

Lescault led the Sea Lions and ranked eighth in the PacWest with 17.3 points per game while shooting 52 percent from the field. He was also fourth in the league in steals (1.78) and 10th in assists (3.62). Lescault even stepped up his performance in league games where he averaged 18.5 ppg to rank fourth in the PacWest. He scored in double-figures in 23 of 27 games, including reaching the 20plateau 12 times and the 30-point mark







Four PLNU women named to All-PacWest Team

Four members of the Point Loma women's basketball team were voted to the All-Pacific West Conference team by the league's coaches. Callie Rhoads, Savannah Erskine and Jessica Escorza all earned second team honors, while Abby Boorman was voted to the third team.

This is the second straight year Rhoads has earned All-PacWest second team honors. She finished eighth in the league with 14.1 points per game. She was third in the league with a .428 shooting per-

centage from long range and fourth with 62 3-point baskets on the season.

Escorza earned second team honors this year after being placed on the honorable mention team last season. Despite playing in just over half the conference games, the junior forward was recognized by the conference coaches for her impact on the court. She led PLNU with 16.6 ppg, which would have ranked her third in the PacWest, while averaging 5.4 rebounds and 2.4 assists per game.

Savannah Erskine earned all-conference honors for the first time in her career after leading the PacWest in both steals (3.89) and assists (6.22). She averaged 11.1 points per game to rank 24th in the

Abby Boorman capped off a fantastic senior season with a selection to the All-PacWest third team. The forward from Reno, Nevada paced the conference with 2.8 blocks per game and was fifth with 8.6 rebounds. She finished the season with six double-doubles.



When we host an event of this nature of course we want artists that folks know and enjoy. I often feel guilty about asking my friends — all pros — to comework for free, Thankfully, I've been blessed with many talented friends that are willing to help."

Singer Whitney Shay said she is happy to contribute.

"I think it's important to give or lend a shoulder in general," she said. "I don't think of it as "giving back." Sure, I struggle financially. I'm a working musician, but there are certainly others in the same boat and much worse off. If donat-

ing my talents helps in any way and I'm available, it's the least I can do," she remarked. "I feel blessed that I can offer a gift of music and that may help another in need. We have to keep things in perspective and lend a hand, or a voice. Every little bit matters."


While the fundraising aspect of this show is important, for Cannon, the interaction between musicians is the


