OB's iconic youth hostel changes hands, not mission

A look inside at the kitchen and amenities at the Ocean Beach International Backpackers Hostel, where young lodgers may stay for up to two weeks during their travels. The building is one of Ocean Beach's oldest, rooted in its beginning as a hotel in 1909 after the streetcar line was built in OB.

The Ocean Beach youth hostel is under new ownership and management, but it's business as usual at the establishment.

One of OB's oldest buildings, the Ocean Beach International Backpackers Hostel, at 4961 Newport Ave., was recently sold by immediate past owner John Asher to USA Hos-

USA Hostels also operates hostels in San Diego's Gaslamp Quarter, as well as in Hollywood and San Francisco.

"[USA Hostels has] been in business for more than 20 years and we've been in the San Diego market for more than 20 years," said Maria Minos, USA's chief operating officer.

"We've always wanted to get our hands on this hostel, so it was great timing that he (Asher) was ready to retire and move on to

Midway merchants, planners lurch forward in effort to rekindle a viable business improvement district

A historic first step was taken by Midway merchants to reform a long-dormant business improvement district (BID) as interested parties held their first meeting Sept. 24 at the Hampton Inn San Diego-SeaWorld/Airport area hotel.

Spearheaded by Hampton Inn general manager Victor Ravago, turnout was low, but morale was high for that first meeting.

Local merchants, community planners and Rachel Gregg, a community invest in revitalizing the area."

representative from California's 78th District Speaker of the Assembly Toni Atkins' office, met to discuss reassembling a broadly representative merchants group.

"We need a real collective voice for the Midway area," said Ravago, noting the new group may look to local government officials to "find out what assistance we can get" in rebooting the BID.

Ravago noted local legislators' offices may also prove useful in attempting to secure some "development dollars to

Aesthetics is just one area that needs to be addressed in the Midway District. which is characterized by high traffic volumes along Rosecrans Avenue and Sports Arena Boulevard.

Midway-Pacific Highway Corridor is a hodgepodge of commercial, industrial, office and warehouse land uses, plus limited residential, in a transitional area bordering Old Town, Point Loma, Pacific Beach and downtown San Diego.

On its website at www.Midwaybid.org, the new Midway BID said its goal is to "unify the businesses within the Midway/North Bay Area to work toward the goal of economically revitalizing the Midway District. Our efforts will include marketing programs, civic beautification projects, commercial recruitment and parking and transportation improvements. "

On Sept. 24, it was mentioned that the Midway area is poorly lit and that there are also numerous opportunities "to add greenery." Midway is currently involved in updating its community plan seeking to make it more current, and to create a sense of identity for the community, which adjoins several other areas and is one of the first places visi-

"With the (airport) rental facility going in right now it's really a gateway," said Kathy Denton, a Midway merchant and member of the Midway Planning

Ravago pointed out the task of re-activating the business group is made easier by the fact that the "entity is still there with the city," despite the fact that's it's been inactive for several years.

Ravago said reconstituting the Midway BID is a simple matter of hosting three consecutive meetings of prospective group members before asking the City Countil to "reinstate the BID in aformal capacity."

"After that, we'll be able to work on beautification and cleanup efforts, as well as homeless isues in the area," Ravago said.

"It's a very significant problem," said Denton of homelessness in the Midway area, adding efforts elsewhere in the city to address homelessness tend to displace it elsewhere to places like Midway.

Fledgling Midway BID members also agreed that the recently closed Midway Postal Office could prove invaluable in redevelopment, bringing new business and a fresh perspective to the area.

It was also brought out at the Midway BID formation meeting that there is \$50,000 in unused funds held over from the previous BID for the new group being formed to work with.

Ravago suggested it also might behoove the group to link with other civic organizations, like the Point Loma Association (PLA), which have a long history of, and experience with, community improvement.

Denton said the sports arena site with its numerous tenants will be a cornerstone of any type of redevelopment going on in the area.

"Everything hinges on the sports arena and what ultimately happens around there," she said.

After initial city gaffes, OB Elementary gets new permanent crosswalk

There's a new crosswalk at Ocean crosswalk — unlike the one it has Beach Elementary — and this time, no one's taking it away.

The twisting, turning tale of the nowyou-see-it, now-you-don't crosswalk at Ocean Beach Elementary is finally over. And like a well-told story that precedes kindergarten naptime, the ending is happy and satisfying.

Dozens of grateful parents, community leaders and citizens — as well as a few television camera crews — showed up bright and early to the official ribbon-cutting Oct. 1 of the mid-block crosswalk to observe the event.

Most gathered to offer thanks to the group of volunteers who rallied community support to make it happen. And more than a few, undoubtedly, planned to cast a watchful eye to make sure this

replaced — stays right where it is.

Ever so briefly, there was a crosswalk at the site several years ago in the middle of the 4700 block of Santa Monica Avenue, which allowed students to cross from the north side of the street to the 100-plus-year-old school on the south. It also connected two kindergarten classrooms on the north side to what those students call the "big school."

But, in an incident that could be a case study for bureaucratic gaffes, a city crew came back within days to undo the crosswalk and pour black paint on top of the yellow lines. City officials said they had no choice when someone realized the site lacked a streetlight, which by law must accompany a mid-block cross-

the streetlight was installed in January, followed by a new crosswalk late in the school year.

When he arrived on the job two years ago, school principal Marco Drapeau found the crosswalk was one of the first matters on the agenda.

"There was a file this thick waiting for me in my office when I got here. We had a lot of people working on this a long time." he said.

Many of those people were on hand for the commemoration. There was Suzy Reid, a mother who serves in leadership roles on the school's Site Governance Team and School Site Council, who succeeded in enlisting the support of the Ocean Beach Town Council last year. So was Nicole Burgess, a pedestrian-bicy-

grant to buy safety equipment for the crossing guards.

It was also a special day for Joseph "Moondoggie" Piña, who stepped forward to volunteer as a crossing guard three years ago after the school canceled its Safety Patrol. (Students who used to work as crossing guards were deemed too young when the school changed to a kindergarten-through-fourth-grade configuration.)

"I went to a meeting and asked why there weren't crossing guards, and (former principal) Maggie Johnson said, 'Oh, are you volunteering?" Piña said.

After a week of trying to control speeding cars, illegal U-turns and double parking, Piña had second thoughts.

"They just issued me a vest and put

Public pressure finally paid off when cling activist who helped secure a state me out there. It was total chaos. I was out here getting run over. I didn't want to come back the next week," he said.

> Just when his morale was at an ebb, a second volunteer — Wayne Simard stepped forward, and the two realized they made a good team.

> "He's the good cop, I'm the bad cop," Simard said. "He was like, 'We have to be friendly. Use the nice voice.' I'm like, 'I'm from Boston. Don't mess with me."

Peninsula YMCA's bid to build, operate NTC pool back to square one

The latest update on progress on the long-awaited public pool proposed at NTC Liberty Station is: well, there is none.

"The request for proposal (RFP process) has closed and there was only one bidder — the Peninsula YMCA. Its bid was deemed 'not responsive' by the city," said Craig Gustafson, press secretary/director of media relations for Mayor Kevin Faulconer. "The city is currently evaluating the next steps to move forward."

That next step, he said, might involve the city's requesting Peninsula Y to tweek

The rejection left Peninsula YMCA offi-

"The YMCA's proposal was not accepted. It was deemed non-responsive and the RFP was canceled," said Vince Glorioso, Peninsula Y's executive director.

Adding the city "did not say why" the Y's RFP bid was rejected, Glorioso said it could stem from problems with "amortization," the paying off of debt with a fixed repayment schedule in regular install-

"One of the things that happened in our conversation with the city was the idea of amortizing the capital investment in the RFP, which was for a concessions agreement on a 10-year basis," said Glorioso. "That was one of the challenges. Some adjustments needed to be made to the RFP

for potential reimbursement of capital niable need for a new community aquatic

Glorioso said the Y would still consider renegotiating terms for the pool RFP, how-

"Certainly, we'd be open to that conversation." he said.

YMCAs currently operate more than 20 public pools countywide. Earlier this year, the city issued an RFP for an organization to come in and develop, operate and lease out the proposed 20,000-square-foot aquatic center in Building 619 in NTC (the former Naval Training Center), which was previously a child-care center.

Julie Cramer, spokeswoman for grassroots group Families for a Point Loma Swimming Pool, said there's still an unde-

"In regards to the need for the pool complex, support for the project continues to be strong," Cramer said. "We recently worked with a group of graduate students from the University of San Diego in their nonprofit leadership program. 

EX-POINT LOMAN FACES CHARGES OF MURDERING WIFE

A former Point Loma man remains in iail on \$5 million bail on a murder charge involving the death of his wife in 2007. The woman's remains were found in a

Anthony Edward Simoneau, 46, was extradited from Hawaii and pleaded not guilty Sept. 29 to a charge that he murdered Fumiko Ogawa Simoneau, who was last seen alive in their Point Loma home on Ian. 2, 2007.

Her remains were uncovered Jan. 20, 2007 in the Anza-Borrego Desert, but were not identified until 2011. An affidavit for Simoneau's arrest was sealed by a judge on Sept. 4. Simoneau was arrested that same day in Honolulu, where he had moved after he left Point Loma.

A date for the preliminary hearing was to be set on Oct. 8 in El Cajon Superior Court. The case is in East County because the wife's body was found in the Anza-Borrego Desert, said Deputy District Attorney Kurt Mechals. The evidence against Simoneau has not been discussed in

Simoneau remains in the South Bay Detention Facility.

new things in his life," she said.

Asher could not be reached for comment.

Minos said USA Hostels took over the local facility on Sept. 5 just before escrow closed on the building.

"It was one of the first buildings here in Ocean Beach and was built in 1909 as The Pearl a few months after the streetcar line came in," said Susan Iames of the Ocean Beach Historical Society. "It was a 20-room hotel and became the Newport Hotel in 1914."

James said the Newport Hotel was shuttered for a while when Asher bought it and reopened it as an international youth hostel in 1995.

There isn't much that's garden variety about Ocean Beach International Backpackers Hostel aside from its youthful appeal.

"We provide 24-hour security and guests cannot bring strangers in, even if it's their brother," said Minos, adding the hostel can accommodate about 100 people. "We have a lot of social activities that you don't find in hostels or bed and breakfasts but do find in hotels and resorts." she said.

Hostel activities include trips to San Diego points of interest and Tijuana

as well as trips outside the local area, repainting, new door locks and new like to Magic Mountain in the L.A.

"This hostel will be offering a lot more in the way of activities," promised Minos. She said changes

may include the possibility of a name change. But she said that won't happen immediately.

Noting the OB hostel "still has a hotel license," Minos said the business has 25 operating dormstyle, 4- and 6bed rooms, some suites and some with shared restrooms.

Minos said the hostel intends to build and expand on its solid foundation.

"Eventually, we'll have a van that will run guests between our two hostels and to different attractions around the area for free," she said adding some remodeling is also in store.

"We'll be doing some spit and shine,

bunk beds," Minos said. "We have an exclusively designed bunk bed that we've developed ourselves that we'll be installing.

"We really like to keep the flavor of the local areas adding spices to the broth to make it even more a flavor of the neighborhood," she said.

There is a two-week limit on stays at the OB hostel.

Minos said the hostel business is seasonal, like much of tourist-oriented San Diego. She said most hostels tend to draw visitors in their 20s and 30s, but she said Ocean Beach gets its fair share of 50-plus-age clients.

"We get a lot of people who used to do hostelling in their 40s and older," she said. "Beach hostels draw a majority of European travelers with a healthy sprinkling of Asian travelers."

The hostel COO said about 15 to 20percent of OB hosteliers are from elsewhere in America, with the rest coming here from abroad.

"The Irish invasion happens every June because Irish students are able to get working visas and come here looking for summer jobs," Minos said. "We also get a lot of South Americans from Brazil and Argentina and Aussies (Australians) all year 'round because they're always traveling. We also get a big influx of Chinese in December."

OB Hostel's appeal for guests wherever they come from is pretty obvious.

"We're one of those vibrant beach communities in Southern California, and one of the few places in Southern California that really retains that true flavor of the Southern California beach town," said hostel manager Jack McKeon. "Our location two blocks off the water is perfect for a lot of travelers."

McKeon spoke of two recent happy patrons.

"We had a couple of Polish gentlemen come in last week and they were super-excited to go surfing for the first time," he said. "We can provide that for people."

McKeon also pointed out that OB "has a lot of culture and vibrancy born out of the California counterculture movement," which makes it more attractive to youthful guests.

"Some call it the hippie hangover, but we think of it in more positive terms," he said.

The OB Hostel is strict about not allowing drinking from under-age guests or drug use of any kind.

"If you're caught (with drugs) you'll be kicked out," said Minos.

Minos said the OB Hostel's new owners want to join with the neighborhood, which she said is a win-win both for the business and the commu-

"We're just getting our hands around the community," she said. "We were lucky enough to buy this hostel, and we're really thrilled to be here."

Minos noted international travelers staying in relatively inexpensive hostel rooms make good guests for a number of reasons.

"They're on vacation, and a lot of them have saved a long time to be able to take these trips," Minos said. "They save money on the room, so they have it to spend on everything else. They provide money coming into the community. We want to be able to contribute to that, bring in the right kind of clientele that will be spending that money."

GOVERNOR SIGNS BILL TO ENHANCE BICYCLE SAFETY

Gov. Jerry Brown has signed AB 1193, The Protected Bikeways Act, giving local governments the liberty to implement modernized bicycling infrastructure. Sponsored by the California Bicycle Coalition and authored by California Assem-

blymember Phil Ting, The Protected Bikeways Act encourages the implementation of bicycle lanes with physical separation from automobile traffic through the use of medians, curbs, posts and more.

The San Diego Bicycle Coalition hailed Brown's decision to make physically separated bikeways viable options for local bicycle infrastructure and the anticipated effect such safety enhancements will have on local riders.

"The key to getting more people on bicycles is giving them a safe place to ride," said Bike Coalition executive director Andy Hanshaw. "Governor Brown's signature is a gift that allows regions to utilize highly regarded bicycle safety standards from around the globe."

According to the Bike Coalition, a safe and designated area for bicyclists improves conditions for bike safety, car traffic and even pedestrians on sidewalks. The coalition cites that 90 percent of riders surveyed in recent reports feel safer with protected bike lanes.

measures more stringent than those of most cities and water districts throughout the state. And on Faulconer's recommendation and with council approval, the city entered into a "drought-watch" status on July 1, 2014, calling for additional voluntary conservation measures in response to the statewide drought. Water usage in San Diego fell 4.4 percent in August and 5.7 percent in September compared with the same months a year ago.

However, other factors, including a significant decline in ground water reserves throughout California, a drop in water reservoirs for the San Diego region, a lack of rainfall and diminished prospects for a strong El Niño and a severe heat wave for the San Diego region in August and September, led Faulconer to call for the second-phase

Under the new guidelines, the voluntary measures in effect since July will become mandatory. They also call for the additional measures, pending council approval, to go into effect Nov. 1, to

- Watering and landscape irrigation using sprinklers will be limited to no more than three days a week on a schedule established and posted by the
- · Watering will be allowed at residences with odd-numbered addresses on Sundays, Tuesdays and Thursdays; watering will be allowed at residences with even-numbered addresses on Saturdays. Mondays and Wednesdays. Apartments, condominiums and businesses will be allowed to water on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.
- During the months of June through October, the watering limit is no more than 10 minutes per assigned day; during November through May, the watering limit is no more than 7 minutes per assigned day.



Scenes like this water fountain at Balboa Park may become far less common under proposed mandatory water conservation measures. If adopted by the full City Council, the new rules could take effect as soon as

- The washing of automobiles, trucks, trailers, airplanes and other types of transportation equipment is allowed only before before 10 a.m. or after 6 p.m. during the months of June through October and only before 10 a.m. or after 4 p.m. during November
- Operation of ornamental fountains will be stopped except to the extent

needed for maintenance.

- Potted plants, noncommercial vegetable gardens and fruit trees may be irrigated on any day but only before 10 a.m. or after 6 p.m. during the months of June through October and only before 10 a.m. or after 4 p.m. during November through May.
- Use of water from fire hydrants will be limited to firefighting, meter installation by the Water Department or other activities necessary to maintain the health, safety and welfare of San Die-
- · Construction operations receiving water from a fire hydrant or water truck

will not use water beyond normal construction activities.

The city plans to enforce the new mandatory measures at no additional budgetary impact to water ratepayers. About 10 staff members in the Public Utilities Department will be tasked with enforcement, which largely calls for educating the public and working with residents and businesses to comply.

The city will shift responsibilities for some workers and fill existing budgeted vacancies to ensure proper and adequate enforcement.







Pointers hit high gear with wins over Scripps Ranch, Santana

Point Loma running back Jaylen Griffin spent the night of Oct. 2 at the home of his teammate and close friend, receiver and defensive back Sergio Gallegos. On Oct. 3, the two players accounted for four of the Pointers' five touchdowns in a wild 34-27 non-league home victory over Scripps Ranch.

The Pointers move to 5-1 with the win while the Falcons drop to 2-3.

Griffin scored all three of his touchdowns during a bizarre first quarter in which:

- The Falcons opened scoring on a 71-yard pass just 63 seconds into the game.
- One Pointer fumbled away the ensuing kickoff but another (Julius Agho) intercepted a pass on the next Falcon play.
- Griffin scored his first touchdown on a 58-yard run with less than two minutes played.
- After a Falcon punt, Griffin scored his second touchdown on a 24-yard scamper with less than four minutes expired.
- The Falcons burned the Pointer secondary again on a 65-yard pass with less than five minutes
- Capping a Pointer drive, Griffin scored for the third time from five yards out with 17 seconds left. After only 12 minutes of play, 35 points were scored, the Pointers leading 21-14.

But neither team was finished.

On their opening drive of the second quarter, a Falcon receiver again flew behind the Pointer secondary, gathering in a pass for another score.

But Pointer Cole Kidd, in his first game back after a concussion earlier in the season, blocked the point-after attempt, leaving his team clinging to a 21-20 lead less than one minute into the second

The action then slowed to a more normal pace, the Pointers driving down the field, aided by a 45vard pass completion from Gavin Grady to Galle-

"We noticed what Scripps Ranch does on

practice," said Gallegos after the game.

Romeo Epperley carried the ball in from five yards out before a failed point-after attempt by the Pointers for a 27-20 lead at halftime.

The Dogs' defense made second-half adjustments, forcing the Falcon quarterback out of the pocket and disrupting the passing game.

The hosts caught a break in the third quarter when a high snap sailed over the visiting quarterback's head in a shotgun formation. The Pointers took the ensuing punt and struck for their final score, Grady again finding Gallegos open over the middle as he eluded tacklers enroute to paydirt.

"It's an unbelievable feeling," Gallegos said of his first-ever touchdown catch. "You're doing it for your team, for the fans out there and the community who wants to see us get the win.'

The 34-20 lead stood until the Falcons responded with just 1:10 left in the game to provide the final score.

"This team has the best vibe and relationships," Gallegos noted. "Our new staff and players are already welcome like family and we all know we have each other's backs."

The Falcon game was the first of four consecutive home games for the Pointers, who begin league play on Oct. 10 against Kearny. The Komets are a Div. IV team, mired in an 0-5 season after a 42-6 loss at Lincoln last week. Kickoff is at 3 p.m.

Then, on Oct. 17, rented "Friday Night Lights" return for the popular annual homecoming game at Pete Ross Stadium against longtime rival La Jolla in "The Battle of the Shoe." Action begins at

The Div. III Vikings are currently 3-3. Notable is their 55-52 loss against Fallbrook last month when quarterback Collin Rugg passed for a school record 569 yards.

The Pointers lead the long-running rivalry 44-33-1, according to the PLHS sports website.

POINT LOMA 47, SANTANA 33

The Pointers were fortunate to only fall behind defense and started working on the connection in 6-0 after a first quarter that saw them turn the ball

over to the Sultans three times with two fumbles and an interception.

Only a stingy defense kept the Dogs from a 21-O deficit after the miscues ended in two Sultan field goals and a failed fake field goal attempt pass fell incomplete.

But the Pointers awoke, scoring 20 second-quarter points.

The Pointers grabbed a 7-6 lead in the second quarter on a darting 25-yard scoring run by Tshombre Carter, but a Santana touchdown pass put the hosts back on top 13-7.

Epperley then broke a 60-yard run and later scored on the Pointers' next drive to pull within 14-

The final 64 seconds of the first half saw the Sultans score to go up 19-14 and Griffin answering with a run to take a 20-19 lead at intermission.

The Dogs then put up 21 third-quarter points to end the frame with a 41-25 lead. Following a Sultan safety, Griffin took the ensuing kickoff and returned it 85 yards for one of the scores. He also scored the final Pointer touchdown.

- Dozens of members of the PLHS staff and several community members were honored in a staff appreciation event before the Falcon game.
- · The game was also selected as Game of the Week of the National Football Foundation's local Walter J. Zable Chapter. Point Loma's Griffin was chosen as his team's most valuable player and will attend a San Diego Chargers game as a guest of the organization. He will also be honored, along with other local prep and college selections at an annual spring banquet. Quarterback Zach Podraza was selected from the Falcons.
- The Pointer junior varsity moved to 5-1 with a 25-0 win over the Falcons, while the freshmen are 4-1-1 after a 33-33 tie.
- · Western League games after Kearny and La Jolla include Mission Bay (Oct. 31 at home, 3 p.m.) and Madison (Nov. 7, away, 6:30 p.m.).

It was Savannah Wedemeyer who was the distributor for the Sea Lions all night. She had 49 assists in the four sets as PLNU posted assists on 56 of 58 kills. Christin Fisher also added 19 digs and Mandon paced the squad with four blocks.

"I don't know if it was emotion or focus tonight, but there was definitely something different about this match, and really this week," said Point Loma head coach Jonathan Scott. "We prepared better than we had all season and it showed."

Medication Mistakes Can Be Dangerous

Every year 1.5 million people are injured or become seriously ill when a medication mistake happens and 100,000 people a year die from the mistake. It is important for everyone to protect themselves from possible mistakes. Knowing how to avoid mistakes is important for everyone.

Confusing two medications with similar names accounts for up to 25 percent of errors. Sometimes the doctor's handwriting is misread, the wrong medicine name is put into the computer or the wrong drug is pulled from the pharmacy shelf but it happens. Drugs that could be confused might be Adderall (a stimulant for ADHD) with Inderal (a beta-blocker for high blood pressure), or Paxil (an antidepressant) with Taxol (a cancer drug) or Plavix (an anticlotting medication). Ask your doctor to write on the prescription what it's for as well as the name and dosage. If the pharmacist sees high blood pressure but the name of the drug is an antidepressant, it should be a red flag for the pharmacist.

Sometimes drugs can interfere with each other because of their side effects. One drug can magnify the other or one drug can magnify a side effect of the other. If you take one medication that says a side effect can raise blood pressure and then you take a second medication with the same side effect, the two together could cause your blood pressure to get dangerously high. So ask your pharmacist and doctor about side effects, read the written printouts and review and compare them.

Former Point Loma resident and bassist Jason Scheff returns to San Diego for a rare one-off show on Oct. 12 at Lestat's Coffeehouse. Best known as singer and bassist for the legendary classic rockers Chicago, he's also part of the legendary Point Loma-based Scheff family of musicians, which includes father Jerry, a legend for his work with Elvis Presley and the Doors, as well as Jason's brother, Lauren, who performs with award-winning local indie rocker Kevin Martin and Get Back Loretta.

Jason Scheff joined Chicago hitmakers in September 1985, scoring an instant hit with "Will You Still Love

Me?", which rose to No. 3 in the charts in 1986. This was followed by 10 more chart entries from Chicago, including "Look Away" (No. 1 in 1988). The band is currently touring behind its recent album, "Chicago 36 – Now," but this special gig is apart from that. It's a chance for Scheff. who today calls

Nashville home, to get back to his Point Loma roots.

The reason for the gig comes down

"My brother, Lauren, has such a great presence down in San Diego and been working with a lot of local talent for several years and nurturing a great scene," Scheff said during a tour stop

"I was going to be finishing up some dates of a Chicago tour in San Diego, so he asked me if I wanted to stick around and we could just do a gig together. I thought, 'What a great idea. I could tap into this great talent pool that he's involved with."

On hand will be the likes of keyboardist Kevin Martin, drummer Duncan Moore and percussionist Bob Sale.

"It's turning into a really fun reunion of sorts, but it's also about getting together with my brother and parlaying everything that we've worked for into a set," said Scheff.

The plan is for a list of choice covers, but don't expect the obvious.

"It's pretty much all covers, songs by Elton John and Earth, Wind & Fire,

that sort of thing. We're going back to my roots, playing songs I heard when I was growing up in the 1970s," Scheff said. "We'll sprinkle a few songs of mine in there, but we won't be doing any Chicago. That's a separate thing.'

While bass seems like the obvious choice for Scheff to learn, it wasn't his first choice.

"It was the last one, actually," he recalled. "I started on piano when I was around 6 years old, just picking up things by ear. I tried to take lessons for a little while, then went to guitar."

Fate had other plans for Scheff.

"My buddies and I in sixth grade put a band together and they all grabbed the cool instruments," he said. "The bass was the only thing left. I thought

> it was appropriate because my parents split up when I was about 3. I really didn't get to spend much time growing up with my dad, so it felt like a connection to him. I thought if I played bass maybe I could try and follow in his footsteps a little bit."

Though Scheff is a regular visitor to the area, there are

some things he misses.

"The whole beach community, just getting up and going surfing and a handful of friends," he said. "I just got out of the water in Daytona Beach," he said. "That reminded me a lot of growing up in San Diego."

At 52, Scheff still enjoys playing music as much as ever.

"I love seeing the joy it brings to people," he said. "We go out there every night, and you can just tell that when you are playing a song people know real well, it takes them back to a point in their life and experiences that they've been through."

He said he considers this connection with his audience to be special - magical, even.

"They can be having the worst day in their life, and the minute they hear a song, it takes them to a better place. And you're part of that delivery method. It's pretty awesome," he said.

A public market emerges on the horizon at Liberty Station

What was originally designated for a project called The Shops in the 22,000-square-foot wing of Liberty Station's Building 1 will now become the site of Liberty Public Market, a culinary bazaar of sorts spearheaded by Coronado native and restaurateur David Spatafore of Blue Bridge Hospitality.

Slated to open in June, the venture was inspired by Spatafore's visits to Redding Terminal Market in Philadelphia and Granville Island Public Market in Vancouver, Canada. as well as others.

"When I'm at those places, it's a visual-smell-taste-touch experience," he said. "You're turned on to things that you never knew existed. And I've always thought, 'Why don't we have anything like this in San Diego?'

Spatafore said he was impressed by the "rawness" of Building 1 at 2816 Historic Decatur Road, which was originally built as the Naval Training Center's commissary in 1921. His vision for turning the vacant space into a public co-op of artisan food vendors won approval from the property's management firm, Corky McMillin Companies, despite its intent at the time of filling the gap with commercial retailers.

Spatafore assures that Liberty Public Market will deliver something much different than a shopping mall. His partnership with McMillin will bring about \$3 million worth of

though implemented without using modern design elements that would alter the historic integrity of the structure.

"A lot of what we're trying to make is already there," he said. "It has all the bones for a cool market."

He said his goal is to open with 34 vendors of local origins that would include a butcher, fish monger, baker, cheese specialist, juicer, tortilla maker and more. He's also reserved two separate areas for wine and beer merchants.

"The list of potential vendors is huge," said Spatafore. "I want an eclectic collection of vendors that will drive that sensory overload of a public market. And I want to give them the chance to have a brickand-mortar outlet without having to sign their lives away."

Spatafore has already begun meeting with dozens of candidates as he continues finalizing design plans. Among them is Pete Balistreri, the executive chef at Tender Greens Point Loma who specializes in hand-crafted Italian salumi.

"He's interested in being part of the market," said Spatafore, adding that he can't yet reveal the others composing an initial short list "until we have something for them to actually sign onto."

He did divulge, however, that the merchant mix will include Moo Time Creamery, which Spatafore founded 16 years ago in Coronado. The ice cream and frozen yogurt parlor is part of Blue Bridge Hospiinfrastructure revisions to the space, tality's portfolio that also includes up dinners and other culinary as well as an outdoor patio area, Leroy's Kitchen + Lounge, Lil' events.

The market lineup, he adds, might also fold in a couple of food-related merchandisers selling cookbooks and kitchen supplies.

In thinking further ahead, Spatafore said he hopes to build a test kitchen within the market that would provide additional cooking space for vendors and serve as a demo platform for local farmers. He also foresees it as a rentable option for chefs who want to conduct pop-



Knox said this year's OBMA awards will have something for everyone, including "a little singing, recognizing our local businesses, catching up with friends — and it's all free."


Five huge baskets, each worth \$500 in gift cards and other items are being





Music on the Point returns with stellar organist performance

Music on the Point, the concert series hosted by All Souls' Episcopal Church, returns on Sunday, Oct. 19 at 4 p.m. The opening concert will be performed by Gabriel Arregui, organist-choirmaster of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Encinitas.

Arregui, an ambassdor for the organ and its literature, will offer works by J.S. Bach, Petr Erben, Girolamo Frescobaldi, Dieterich Buxtehude and Jean Langlais.

This concert season celebrates the 30th anniversary of the construction of San Diego's only historically informed pipe organ. It was created over more than three years in the Fritts-Richards workshop in Tacoma, Wash,, and is constructed of hand-crafted woodwork and pipework. The organ case is adorned with hand-carved, gold-leafed wooden sculptures representing the creatures that live in the tidepools of Point Loma. With the exception of the organ blower and the console lighting, the action of the instrument is completely mechanical, using the finest aspects of 17th century organ-building technology.

For many, this organ remains one of the city's best-kept secrets. For afiicionados of fine music, it is a constant delight to see and hear. The public is cordially invited to attend all of the concerts.

There is a suggested donation of \$5, although no one is turned away. Students are welcome at no charge. A reception follows, where audience members may greet the performer and enjoy All Souls' hospitality and fellowship.
