Minimum-wage hike plan will have to wait a little longer now

Though the City Council previously voted in favor of incrementally raising the city's minimum wage, councilmembers Oct. 20 rescinded that action and unanimously sanctioned putting the controversial measure before voters on the next regularly scheduled election ballot in June 2016.

The council vote was forced by a successful new petition-gathering effort by opponents of the wage hike.

On July 14, the City Council voted 6-3 along party lines to increase the city's minimum wage to \$11.50 an hour by January 2017. Under the ordinance, San Diego's minimum hourly wage would have risen to

\$9.75 in January 2015, to \$10.50 in January 2016 and to \$11.50 in January 2017. Further increases tied to the local consumer price index would have begun in January 2019.

Council president Todd Gloria, a strident supporter of the measure, asked if the wage hike, which could not go into effect until after June 2016, could be made retroactive, if passed.

"This [situation] is really unique. We have to take a clean look at that," replied City Attorney Jan Goldsmith.

District 2 City Councilman Ed Harris. who represents the Peninsula, thanked Gloria and others for moving the measure

Prepare for stricter water-conservation measures in drought

The City Council voted Oct. 20 to enact a "drought alert" status, the second phase of citywide conservation that calls for mandatory water-use restrictions to begin Nov. 1 in response to the severe drought conditions statewide.

"Working together as a community, San Diego has done a tremendous job in the past in responding to the call for water conservation," said Mayor Kevin Faulconer. "For that, we say 'Thank you,' and now we must ask for your continued help as we face the uncertainty of future rainfall and water supplies at critical levels."

Reacting to the decision, District 2 City Councilman Ed Harris said, "Today's council vote is a critical step to help preserve our

most precious resource. California is in the third year of one of its worst droughts in 100 years. Our water resources are limited, and we must conserve through action, education and enforcement."

Harris counseled constituents to download the city's "Waste No Water" app for smartphones.

Plans to redevelop the old Jessop estate in Point Loma have some neighbors who've banded together against the project calling foul.



Blood boils for some neighbors over plans for Waterpoint development

Some angry neighbors turned out to complain about increasing densification and alleged abuses by developers of the 30-foot height limit at Peninsula Community Planning Board's (PCPB) October meeting.

On the agenda was an update on the Waterpoint project currently under construction presented by Joe Anfuso, chief financial officer of developer ColRich.

"We call it the behemoth," testified Point Loma resident Debbie Pedersen, referring to the waterfront condo development on Scott Street. "It is mammoth, traffic is atrocious and parking is nonexistent."

PCPB members who voted in favor of the Waterpoint project in 2008 were chastised by a couple of local residents for not holding developers' feet to the fire in terms of adhering to the city's rules and regulations on coastal development.

"You need to turn thumbs down on projects like this and some of these contractors," said one resident. "This body needs to help the community change the (city's) rules."

Some board members were quick to defend their previous positions.

"Not all of us voted for it," said PCPB member Jarvis Ross, who noted he opposed Waterpoint then, among other reasons, because "it had no setbacks and sits right up against the sidewalk."



Midway District issues getting attention from Councilman Harris

In October, District 2 Councilman Ed Harris dropped in on Midway Community Planning Group (MCPG) to give a status report on Peninsula issues, including Sports Arena leases, homelessness, medical marijuana, the continuing drought and dwindling police staffing.

"Looking at Black Angus being vacant for seven years, which is an unsightly and unsafe environment, we're pushing the mayor (Faulconer) to move forward with a lease that will allow some development in there," said Harris during an opening presentation prior to an audience Q & A.

MCPG has advocated renegotiation of leases for the Valley View Casino (formerly

the San Diego Sports Arena) property at 3500 Sports Arena Blvd. owned by the city of San Diego, along with Red Lobster, Phil's BBQ, SOMA nightclub, Kobey's Swap Meet's corporate offices, Dixieline, Pier One Imports and the deteriorating Black Angus

Some of those leaseholders are month to month, a situation that has caused consternation among neighborhood merchants because of uncertainty over their future. Noting the sports arena tenant Dixieline has "been a great partner for the city since the '60s," Harris pointed out the home improvement store "has been trying for four years to get a lease extension."

"Three or four years ago, the sports arena ground lease was extended by the City Council without consultation with the people (community planners) who meet every month and take time out of their schedules from their business and personal travel, and that's wrong and very disrespectful, and you should take that message back to the Council," said group vice chair Kurt Sullivan.

Addressing "smart growth," Harris, who grew up in Orange County, noted "they've developed nearly every field that I used to play in when I was a kid," adding, "I don't want to see that here: The beach walled off by too much development."

Concerning recent moves by San Diego to move toward adopting stricter water conservation measures, Harris pointed out that "most other places where our water comes from have been in a higher drought state than we have.

"San Diego's done a lot for conserving water, but we're going to have to do better until we develop more water sources," said Harris, adding, "We want ratepayers to know what this is going to cost."

On the medical marijuana front, Harris said District 2 "has more dispensaries than anybody else and is more impacted than any other (Council) district.'

Acknowledging that closing illegal dispensaries is a "big concern" for Midway, Harris said the political "climate" has changed with regard to state and federal governments' disposition toward dispensaries.

"With it, you can report water waste, learn about water restrictions and water saving tips, as well as learn about rebate programs," he said. "We need all hands on deck so we don't have to move to stricter water-rationing standards."

District 1 City Councilwoman and City Council President Pro Tem Sherri Lightner agreed with the new restrictions.

"San Diegans have done a great job conserving water in the past when we have faced drought conditions, and we appreciate all your efforts to help reduce your water use," Lightner said. "The council also approved a citywide comprehensive water policy in 2012, which will help guide the development of new local water supplies, such as grey water and recycled water.

"Unfortunately, there are no signs of the drought ending in the near future, so we all need to take swift action to conserve even more water," she said. "By conserving today, we can ensure that we have water for the future."

Officials with San Diego Coastkeeper, which works to protect drinkable water in San Diego County, thanked the City Council for moving to the Level 2 drought

This is not a quick fix and this is not a temporary drought. The way we think about water and how we use it must evolve with climate and population realities," said Megan Baehrens, Coastkeeper's executive director. "This is a long overdue step for the region, and our hope is that this level of conservation becomes the new normal.'

In late September, the US Drought Monitor showed 95 percent of the state in severe to exceptional drought. Regionally, the Metropolitan Water District, from which San Diego buys 45 percent of its water, announced it has only one-third of its stored water remaining and that cuts or rationing could be made to certain areas of Southern California.

Locally, the San Diego County Water Authority moved to mandatory restrictions earlier this summer, noting the need to take measures now to avoid severe cutbacks should drought conditions persist.

Coastkeeper has long advocated that mandatory restrictions are necessary to change water-use habits, insisting the city has only begun to show water-use decreases despite the declaration of a drought emergency nearly a year ago.

The watchdog organization adds that

The city implemented its voluntary drought watch stage on July 1. Earlier this month, Faulconer recommended moving to the next level of water conservation based on several factors, including a significant decline in ground water reserves throughout California, a drop in water reservoirs for the San Diego region, a lack of rainfall and diminished prospects for a strong El Niño weather pattern, and a severe heat wave for the San Digo region in the months of August and September.

The drought-alert stage as adopted doesn't contain a sunset clause and will stay in effect as long as the city deems nec-


He had an unforgettable sense of humor with a twinkle of mischief in his

FORMER POINT LOMA BANK OFFICIAL **ORDERED TO PAY RESTITUTION**

A former assistant branch manager at a Point Loma bank who embezzled nearly \$37,000 has been ordered to pay it back and to complete 80 hours of community service on terms of three years' probation.

Mark Masiglat, 25, of San Diego was tion. sentenced Oct. 10 to one dav in iail he has already served by U.S. District Court Judge Anthony Battaglia. He could have received years in prison, but the U.S. Attorney's Office did not ask for any jail time in light of probation conditions that require him to repay the money or risk prison.

Masiglat embezzled the funds in 46 unauthorized cash withdrawals between Jan. 4, 2011 and Aug. 27, 2012 from the J.P. Morgan Chase branch, according to court records. He is no longer associated with the bank.

Restitution was agreed upon by both the prosecution and defense.

The probation conditions require that Masiglat not be employed at a bank or any position where he has access to funds that are not his own. He pleaded guilty to embezzlement on June 5.

The federal sentencing guidelines for this offense range from jail time between 4 and 10 months if the offender has no prior record, according to court records.

The bank's deposits are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corpora-

Other board members agreed.

"Some loopholes have appeared in the (city's) 30-foot height limit," said PCPB member Don Sevrens.

Noting he is a lifelong Point Loman, Anfuso answered the charges, saying, "We're not carpetbagger developers. We're intimately involved with, and care about, the community.'

Anfuso said building plans purchased by ColRich from the original developer were "signed off on by the city" and "have not been changed."

Anfuso said the condo project still has 40 units, adding three have been presold with plans "to close those in early 2015."

Asked who would monitor Waterpoint's living within its development rules, Anfuso replied the project will have a homeowner's association that will see to that.

Neighbor Korla Eaquinta contended Col-Rich ought to give something back to the community as compensation for disrupting the community.

'You ought to donate two pedestrian crosswalks on Scott Street because you're impacting us so negatively as far as traffic and the safety of residents is concerned," she said.

Anfuso said he would be happy to address that with developers.

PCPB planner and bicycling advocate Nicole Burgess agreed ColRich could make Point Loma a more "livable place for all of us by creating traffic crosswalks." She said it also might not be a bad idea for developers to consider adding a bike corral to its allotted parking space to accommodate and encourage nonmotorized travel.

IN RELATED ACTION

- · A presentation was given on a proposal to change four apartments presently under construction at 3015-3021 Carleton St. into condominiums. That proposal was greeted by stiff resistance from a couple of local residents who contended that a growing number of such "condo conversions" in Point Loma are merely a clever way of speeding development through with less parking required for condos. After debate, planners opted to postpone final consideration of the project until November.
- Peninsula planners Jon Linney and Don Sevrens gave a brief presentation on conceptual plans for converting a small parcel of land on Cañon Street into a pocket park. They noted they would likely be seeking an architect, or perhaps a local college student, to do probono design work for the project. "We've not asked for money yet, as it's way too premature," said Sevrens. "We also would have to have a means for safeguarding any money that is donated." Sevrens said further consideration of the pocket park proposal would also necessitate holding a couple of public workshops.

style home built in 1926 by Joseph and Mabel Jessop.

"The development crowds buildings that are out of place in the neighborhood and adds erosion risk to the fragile cliffs by water runoff," said Jim Jessop. "The project requires multiple deviations from the requirements of the Municipal Code and is inconsistent with the community plan."

Carolyn Kutzke is a retired teacher who owns a number of historical properties, as well as the Jessop property, which she purchased more than 12 years ago and leases to a tenant who she lives just a block away from.

"I've spent 10 years and \$380,000 trying to split the two lots totaling 1.5 acres," Kutzke said. "I'm building three new houses (to go) along with the dilapidated (Jessop) home, which I've retained and maintained and has not been declared historical because it's been so changed over the years."

Kutzke said she doesn't plan to do anything unreasonable in redeveloping the property. Her plans include building a home for her nephew, a

"I'm not painting the houses pink, They've been artistically designed," she said. "I'm not building on any steep slopes that haven't already been compromised years ago. One of the objections is [the threat of] fire, and we know there hasn't been a fire in Point Loma in forever. I've hired the best people in town to assess the fire danger, and they've told me there is zero danger. The geologist has indicated there's no problem at all with that hillside."

Kutzke said she's tried to allay neighbors' fears about the project, but to no avail.

"In this case, addressing the concerns has just caused them to grow nastier," she said.

Kutzke said she has an ill tenant living in the old Jessop home she claims has been harassed repeatedly by neighbors who have allegedly been trespassing on the property.

Bill Moody, who lives below the Jessop estate, said the existing home has a real narrow driveway. "Fire trucks can't get up," Moody said.

Kutzke said fire trucks can, in fact, get up to the site. She added she intends to widen the driveway in redeveloping the parcel.

"It's not about NIMBY (Not In My Back Yard)," said Rothman. "It's about being consistent with the city, as well as the community plan.'

"It's not a good thing to just have one house sitting up there all by itself," said Kutzke. "I'm not a developer. This is actually about my fami-

Recently, the San Diego City Council denied a proposed five-lot subdivision known as the Peeling project, located on Harbor View Drive, because of concerns over unstable hillsides, deviations to the zoning code and issues of communitv character.

The Point Loma Summit project was denied by the Peninsula Community Planning Board on Aug. 15, 2012 by a vote of 12-0-1. The project, however, was recommended for approval by the San Diego Planning Commission on June 19.

A final decision on Point Loma Summit will be made by the San Diego City Council on Monday, Nov. 17 at 6 p.m. at City Hall, 202 C St. in downtown San Diego.

Medication Mistakes Can Be Dangerous

Every year 1.5 million people are injured or become seriously ill when a medication mistake happens and 100,000 people a year die from the mistake. It is important for everyone to protect themselves from possible mistakes. Knowing how to avoid mistakes is important for evervone.

Confusing two medications with similar names accounts for up to 25 percent of errors. Sometimes the doctor's handwriting is misread, the wrong medicine name is put into the computer or the wrong drug is pulled from the pharmacy shelf but it happens. Drugs that could

be confused might be Adderall (a stimulant for ADHD) with Inderal (a betablocker for high blood pressure), or Paxil (an antidepressant) with Taxol (a cancer drug) or Plavix (an anticlotting medication). Ask your doctor to write on the prescription what it's for as well as the name and dosage. If the pharmacist sees high blood pressure but the name of the drug is an antidepressant, it should be a red flag for the pharmacist.

Sometimes drugs can interfere with each other because of their side effects. One drug can magnify the other or one drug can magnify a side effect of the other. If you take one medication that says a side effect can raise blood pressure and then you take a second medication with the same side effect, the two together could cause your blood pressure to get dangerously high. So ask your pharmacist and doctor about side effects, read


