Point Lomans rallying against **FAA flight plans**

A Point Loma resident has started an online petition drive that's garnered more than 2,000 signatures in less than two weeks opposing a Federal Aviation Administration study seeking to change airline flight paths over the Peninsula that some believe could diminish their quality of life.

Casey Schnoor, who lives on Hill Street, has set up a website, noplanenoise.com, as well as a corresponding Facebook page titled Point Loma Air Route Forum, to protest proposed regional airline flight changes, including those at San Diego International Airport.



Spiny lobster season opening on Oct. 3

Beginning early Saturday morning, Oct. 3, hundreds of divers will be in pursuit of the California spiny lobster. San Diego beaches are popular for lobster fishing but can be hazardous for divers and boaters. Lifeguards will be increasing staffing on opening night to help Department of Fish and Game wardens and to respond to emergencies. The majority of diving-related injuries and deaths are preventable.

Boaters need to be aware of the increased diver population when transiting through or near fishing areas. There should always be a lookout on the boat helping the operator avoid divers and other boats at night, and navigation lights always need to be on.

People using hoop nets should not set them in areas that would cause obstruction to vessel navigation – particularly Mission Bay Channel. Boaters should be aware of the surf conditions and avoid getting close to breaking waves.

Lobsters may be taken only by hand or hoop nets. Lobster season lasts until March 16.

Planning group working on **Midway Community Plan Update**

In September, Midway Community Planning Group got progress reports on its ongoing Community Plan Update and on urban greening, a public workshop on which was held immediately following the meeting at San Diego Community College's West Campus.

"We've got our consultant back under contract, and we're working on a public review draft of the community plan," Vickie White, of the city's planning department, told planners. "What we'd like to do is set up a design template for that work, adding photographs and illustrations for what kind of urban design we have.'

White said the goal is to allow community planners, residents and stakeholders to weigh in on this phase of the Midway Community Plan Update.

Planner Cathy Denton stressed planners are especially interested in the traffic study being prepared as part of the plan update.

"We've been waiting three years for the traffic study," Denton said.

White responded that the traffic study document is in process while noting it is involved and takes time.

"It will involve urban design and a more technical study, more datacrunching type of information, which will lead into an environmental impact report." White said.

Nickel asked White to talk to the city about getting those responsible for doing the traffic study to come out and talk to the group about that process.

Urban greening

Marty Schmidt and Melissa Garcia, of the city's planning department, also informed planners of recent developments with the Midway-Pacific Highway Urban Greening Plan.

Urban greening plans recognize the importance of street design in providing connectivity for pedestrians, bicyclists, drivers and transit riders. Plan elements combine to create streets with comfortable, shaded walkways, efficient use of "I thought we were waiting for the water, improved water quality and connections for walking, biking, transit and

Schmidt said the Urban Greening

Plan being prepared for the Midway area is designed to accomplish a number of goals, including providing way-finding signage, as well as improving the street tree palate, encouraging drought-resistant and native species.

Schmidt said the Urban Greening Plan "takes the community plan to a higher level," via creation of improved bike lanes and median landscaping.

"It's a very comprehensive project," Schmidt said, noting that, when completed, the greening plan will be "specific" to Midway, addressing the special needs and considerations of the community.

Denton pointed out it would be helpful to "work with city staff to help identify where funding sources might be" in implementing the Urban Greening Plan.

"We (city) just hired an urban forester," replied Schmidt, noting that that individual might be able to meet with the group to advise them on what to do, and not to do, in implementing urban landscape improvements.

In other action:

· Group chair Nickel noted the first legal, city-approved medical marijuana dispensary, The Point Loma Patients Consumer Co-Op, at 3452 Hancock St., which opened recently, has had some parking issues.

Patrons have been parking in front of the dispensary and not in the rear, where parking is provided.

"They ought to put out signs that say 'Parking in the rear,'" suggested Nickel.

that lengthens firefighters' response times, places the region at risk for emergency fire coverage.

Emerald exhorted citizens and her council colleagues to "identify the (firefighting) infrastructure needs and start planning today for those needs."

Emerald added that "30, 40 years of not prioritizing" has forced the region to have to address inadequacies in its firefighting-response system.

Pocket park

Also on Sept. 17, the board voted 13-0 for an advisory letter supporting creation of a park using developer impact fees already collected by the city to be put toward creation of a new pocket park on Canon Street. The site is two-thirds of an acre of city-owned land along Canon Street in Point Loma's Roseville neighborhood at the upper end of Avenida de Por-

Park proponents have noted that Roseville does not have its own park despite being more densely populated than much of the rest of San Diego.

After the meeting, park proponents Don Sevrens and Jon Linney, board members speaking on their own behalves, discussed their vision for the pocket park.

"It would have winding trails, colorful

and drought-tolerant plants, benches and picnic tables, monuments and placards celebrating the community's culture and history," Sevrens said.

"There will be a children's area, just not one in the typical tot-lot mode. Mulch instead of grass, quiet conversations instead of team playing fields. No concrete, no restroom."

Sevrens added that board member Nicole Burgess, also on the San Diego Bicycle Coalition, said the park is also being studied as a waypoint on an expanding bicycle network.

Conrad Wear, aide to District 2 Coun-Emerald added she's lobbying in favor of cilmember Lorie Zapf, told the meeting that Zapf fully supported the park and that there was money in the developer fees account available for it, with no competition from other conceivable projects.

Linney concurred with Sevrens in noting, "'We need a park instead of condos. This will be a park that we can all be proud of and all can enjoy, from toddlers to older

Board member Bruce Coons introduced the motion to support using \$830.000 in developer tees for the park.

But not everyone has been all in on the proposed Canon Street Park concept.

Some neighbors on Canon Street have expressed concern that the park, as wellintentioned as it might be, could draw undesirables and become problematic. They've also questioned where funds to maintain the park will come from.

Board member David Dick has also expressed caution in using all available funds for this one proposed project. He suggested it might be wise to do an assessment of other conceivable community needs before committing all available funding to this one proposed project.

two sides of the hill, but we're the same peninsula. You get off the freeway and you have to go through OB to get to Point Loma, and vice versa. We should help each other."

The trio of community activists gathered informally to discuss changing times and ways to pool both communi-

One thing agreed upon by all three players was that a lot has changed over the years in both communities and that past stereotypes about the distinctive identity of each no longer apply.

OB, for instance, has ceased being the largely youth-oriented, freewheeling community it once was back in the '60s and '70s.

"OB has a lot of rich history during the Vietnam War when it was a center of protest," said Jackson, adding the community in the '90s also had an infusion of "skinheads," the OB Rats, who made things difficult for a time.

"They've vanished," Jackson noted.

"A lot has changed for the better," pointed out Perrotti, noting "I have never seen a fight at the beach, which is family-friendly. And the neighborhoods are quiet."

Perrotti attributed the change, in part, to rising real estate values and a changing age demographic on the beachfront. He said groups of young people renting out single-family homes, for instance, has markedly diminished.

Martin noted attitudes have changed as well.

"Police were willing to accept more (then) than they are now," Martin said.

"The community is demanding it (tougher police enforcement)," agreed Perrotti.

"The perception was that it (OB) was not a comfortable and safe place," said Martin. "It is."

"The perception used to be that anything goes in OB," said Perrotti. "That's not true."

One project of community benefit to all Peninsulans, agreed all three activists, is ongoing efforts to create a new OB Veterans Plaza.

As envisioned, the OB Veterans Plaza

veterans with a new artistic/beachy plaza with an artificial rock wall mimicking Sunset Cliffs' stratified geology with veterans' names etched into four granite slabs. Other plaza flourishes would include inlaid stars representing lives lost in battle and low-lying artistic-themed meandering walls.

"We've already got 200 people (veterans) signed up to have their names on it (Plaza)," said Martin.

"What's holding us up is the (city) permitting," noted Perrotti, adding the process is taking longer than expected and fundraising can't really begin until that groundwork is laid.

"It will be a focal point for the city." said Martin.

"We've put quite a bit of money into it already with the design, where we are at at this point," noted Perrotti, adding the Plaza is "going to happen," though he's unsure of the timetable.

"We're hoping to get the plaza up by Veterans Day, Nov. 11, in 2016, but that might be a push," said Perrotti.

Donors for the proposed veterans memorial wall are contributing \$250 for its ongoing maintenance.

"It's a great project recognizing people who have served (militarily)," agreed Jackson, adding he felt the plaza would represent both communities.

"I don't think its being in OB should prevent anybody from participating," Jackson said.

Other Peninsula projects in the pipeline include formation of Saratoga Park. Conceptual plans by OBCDC are to construct park improvements for all ages at the foot of Saratoga Avenue adjacent to the Ocean Beach lifeguard sta-

Another large-scale, long-term project, shepherded by the PLA and endorsed by all other Peninsula groups, has been improvements made to medians leading into and out of the Peninsula. Jackson is currently working with the San Diego Port District, and the city, to clean up medians near the airport, which are dying or distressed.














Bixby, the stolen bike and the TV reporter

After riding 9,000 miles, there's a happy ending

It's a tragedy-turned-triumph story of how a man who pedaled 9,000 miles through 31 states promoting pet adoptions had his bike stolen in Mission Beach - then promptly recovered a day later with the aid of a TV newscaster.

Nearly three years ago, bartenderturned-animal welfare spokesman Mike Minnick decided to change his life. Opting to leave his past in the rearview, Minnick quit his job and gave up smoking. He then set out from Texas on a cross-country "odyssey" with Bixby, his 5-year-old rescue dog, riding on his Yuba Mundo cargo bike, outfitted to accommodate Bixby's bed in a crate, as well as the pair's mascot, "Chicken Charlie," a rubber chicken.

The pair's goal: to promote pet adoption, animal shelters and the welfare of four-legged creatures large and small wherever they go.

However, their journey almost stopped, for good, on Sept. 18, when Minnick, who'd been staying temporarily in a dwelling with a garage with a defective door near the Belmont Park roller coaster, found his bike, and most of his belongings and all the memorabilia from his trip, missing about 4 a.m.

Crestfallen but undaunted, Minnick, who described the theft as "a really big hiccup," vowed to get it back "one way or another" while not letting "one jerk ruin everything I've done over more

than two years."

So Minnick did the usual things with stolen property. He filled out a police report, started combing through Craigslist ads looking for his stolen property and contacted local broadcast news sources to get word out about his plight.

Enter 10News reporter Itica Milanes, who interviewed Minnick for a TV news

That's where the story got really interesting.

"Itica was coming back from the airport after picking up a friend and saw harbor police talking to a man on a bike that looked exactly like mine," said Min-

nick. "Police let the man go, and Itica followed and confronted him. She asked the man nicely, 'Where did you get that bike?' He said, 'Mission Beach.''

Milanes continued to question the man about his bike, suspecting, from the hesitancy of his answers, that he was the thief.

Under further questioning, the suspected bike thief got antsier and antsier. He subsequently fled after the reporter point-blank asked him if the bike had been stolen, to which he mumbled something incoherent, like 'A guy in a wheelchair needs it more."

"They found the guy riding my bike a

short time later and arrested him and put him in jail," said Minnick.

Minnick recovered his bike, with its light broken, from police. But he was still missing Bixby's bed and most of his memorabilia as well as Chicken Charlie.

The carton containing Bixby's bed miraculously turned up a day later, found next to a dumpster on Texas

Minnick was thrilled. But he said his "victory" won't be complete until – or unless - he recovers his mascot.

"As dumb as it may seem, that rubber chicken is special, is one of a kind, and has been with me more than two years as part of our 'menagerie,'" said Minnick, adding, "I intend to get it back."

Minnick has had some 200 fliers made proclaiming that "Chicken Charlie is still being held hostage."

He's distributed them along the beachfront and elsewhere in town and remains hopeful that he and his mascot will be reunited soon.

Longtime Point Loman Dave Purcell is working on his fifth start-up company, Prostar, which is busy outfitting Life-Walker Upright, an improved walker to assist the aging and disabled.

Purcell, age 77, and his wife, Jean, have lived in the Peninsula for 34 years. The couple have been retired 12 years and had no intention of getting back into business.

But "something" came up.

That something was serious problems that Jean, who has had 16 spinal surgeries as well as rheumatoid arthritis, developed with her walker, which she

"My wife's been using a walker for several years and she's fallen on it, and that's hard to take when you love someone and what she depends on is inadequate, having to walk behind it and not feel safe," said Purcell.

"I thought, 'I could do much better care professionals specializing in ortho- and specifications for Protostar's walker.

The problem Purcell decided to tackle was a real one. According to the National Council on Aging, one-third of Americans aged 65 and older fall each

There also was the challenge of improving upon a device many older people need to get around.

"Walkers haven't changed (much) since 1953 when they were invented, more than half a century ago," Purcell pointed out. "That's crazy."

So Purcell "attacked" the problem of redeveloping the classic walker. He pulled in experts and advisors in design engineering from his previous companies and UCSD Medical Center health-

"I used the computer to come up with Together, Purcell's team discussed a 3D design," said Purcell adding that led to development of a mock-up of a better walker that users were then able to "test drive" for him to make further refinements.

"We had people try out the mock-up about it," Purcell said. "What they said was they didn't like walking behind it and pushing it like a wheel barrow, which they felt was unsafe, saying it (walker) needed to more upright. They tried the new walker, loved it, thought it was improved. A couple of them wanted to take it home."

Purcell said the objective is now to Through several videos, Purcell began move forward with creation of an actual prototype walker.

Purcell has filed for patent protection for the new device. He's also formed a

limited liability company with a board of directors to launch his prospective new start-up.

The LifeWalker Upright's purported enhancements:

- Armrests that provide stability and support;
- Weight off-loaded from the spine, hips, knees, ankles and feet:
 - Walk longer and farther;
- Improve your general health with exercise; and
- Stand upright and see the world

What are the next steps for Purcell with his new-and-improved walker?

Protostar launched a Kickstarter campaign (www.kickstarter.com) on Sept. 10 to raise \$150,000 to bring the device to market.

"It will be sold in clinical settings hospitals, rehabilitation centers, skilledand assisted-living facilities and by physical therapists," said Purcell of LifeWalker Upright, adding, "We're going to Europe to set up distribution there.'

Pointers comeback falls short against Eagles

After digging themselves into an early deep hole, the Pointer football team was clinging to a final chance to extricate itself on a fourth-down play with only one minute remaining in last Friday's nonleague game at home against South Bay's Olympian High School.

Only minutes before, while trailing by seven (21-14), the Pointers had pounced on an Eagles fumble, with just 35 yards needed in the final 5:02 to tie the game.

The Dogs marched down the field before finding themselves in this do-ordie predicament. Senior quarterback Brenden Torrence then lobbed a high pass to the left side of the end zone, targeting 6-5 wide receiver Ken Watson.

But Eagles defender Brandon Ridgels, who stands 5-10, was able to leap high enough to swat the ball away and seal the victory for his team.

The loss leaves the Pointers with a 3-2 record, while the Olympian Eagles

Pointers to swallow after their defense stopped the Eagles time after time for nearly three quarters while their offense tested the visitors but was only able to add scores just before and after the break.

The first setback for the Pointers came on their opening drive when a fumble was snagged by an Eagles defender and returned 41 yards for a touchdown with 8:50 left in the first quarter.

Then, on the Eagles' first drive, they scored on a 24-yard quarterback keeper that followed a fake handoff so well executed that it fooled most Pointer

defenders and a cluster of sideline news media photographers.

A pass interception by the Eagles on the next Pointer possession set them up at the hosts' 44-yard line. On the first play of the second quarter, Olympian struck for their final score on a nicely executed 40-yard pass play.

The Pointer offense had four possessions during that span, resulting in two fourth-down stops and a punt plus a blocked short field goal attempt.

And after the third Eagle touchdown, the Pointer defense forced six punts and recovered a fumble, yielding only two first downs in the process.

That hole was just too deep.

The lone bright spot for Serra was a two-play sequence in which a fake punt play gained over 30 yards on the surprised Pointers. They followed that with a 40-yard touchdown pass, only their second score after five games.

Also known as the Qs, the once-proud program is 0-5 this season and has been outscored 212-13.

La Jolla Art & Wine Festival Oct. 10-11

"There's something for everyone" rings especially true at fall party time – but when you're talking the La Jolla Art & Wine Festival, the phrase takes on a little different significance. Proceeds benefit underfunded art, music and science programs and onsite medical care at the neighborhood's public elementary and middle schools - clearly, the festival's founders and partners recognize that La Jolla's young people aren't just "everyone."

They're as fine a group of students and volunteers as you'll find, and some will probably be working a booth or two at the festival. The event's seventh installment, which will take up a large portion of Girard Avenue, is set for Saturday and Sunday, Oct. 10 and 11, and it'll feature the works of more than 150 artists from San Diego, L.A., Orange County, the Baja and other locales; a silent auction, roving entertainment and a gourmet marketplace; a family art center and a wine and beer garden. And while the latter is off limits to the kids, they stand to benefit from a development whose significance has far-reaching effects for trade throughout the region. Indeed, wine is as much a part of the area as it is half the festival's name.

Ken Chalmers, proprietor at Bird Rock Fine Wine since its founding in 2012, knows this well. Not only is his shop a featured festival retailer, it's a catalyst for his place in the neighborhood.

"Most of the wines I sell aren't necessarily local wine." he said, "but I'm a local wine shop. For the festival, I like to pick out five or six that represent my store. That's a tricky thing, to say there are regular customers or people that you'll see at the festival. The important thing is that I engender goodwill in the neighborhood and in the schools. My daughter went to Bird Rock Elementary, and it's important to me to stay a part of the school and the neighborhood. If being part of the festival [accomplishes] that, I'm willing to do it."








Memorial for Joe Longa in Lemon Grove on Oct. 3

25th annual San Diego Music Awards to feature the best bands and performers

The local music community's biggest event of the year, the San Diego Music Awards, takes place on Monday, Oct. 5 at Humphrey's Concerts by the Bay. Celebrating the best in music from San Diego, winners in 27 categories will be decided, with trophies for everything from Best Jazz to Best World Music. Winners in the artist categories have been selected by the public, while the San Diego Music Academy votes for the album categories.

2015 marks the 25th anniversary of the SDMAs, so event organizer Kevin Hellman has put together an impressive lineup that will feature performers from throughout the awards' history, including legendary saxophonist and now Rolling Stones sideman Karl Denson, reggae favorites Big Mountain, acoustic troubadour Gregory Page & His Accompanists, indie combo Louis XIV, The B-Side Players, Americana quartet Berkley, Hart, Selis, Twang and up-and-coming singersongwriter Cody Lovaas. This year's Lifetime Achievement honoree will be guitarist Peter Sprague.

Of course, it's not all about the fun. Money raised goes to support the San Diego Music Foundation's Guitars and Banjos for Schools programs. Since the programs began, more than 2,978 instruments have been placed in 85 schools throughout San Diego County by the San Diego Music Foundation, Taylor Guitars and Deering Banjos.

also (sponsoring) a great industry mixer and a party. Meanwhile, we are also raising money for a very good cause."

Hellman is happy to be helping aspiring young musicians. "With school funding cutbacks, the arts have taken a big hit at schools, and this is a way of bringing some of that back."

For many local artists, the event's highlight is the camaraderie. "We noticed a lot of our friends got into many different categories this year," said Lety Beers, drummer for Schizophonics (nominated for Best Hard Rock Band). "For me, it shows that the community is paying attention to all the things that are going on musically, whether it's new stuff like Birdy Bardot's project and The Bassics or seeing bands like Deep Sea Thunderbeast and The Loons, who have been around for a while. It's a fun scene to be in and see it keep charging up."

"We've developed some strong ties with other bands we've played with, and sometimes we'll go out and support them and vice versa," she said. "I'd say there's a pretty strong sense of camaraderie in the music scene here – and everyone seems to know everyone!"

Ultimately, though, for musicians, the awards are validation for their hard work. Pianist Danny Green is nominated in three categories this year (Best Jazz, Best Jazz Album and Album of the Year), and he notes the awards are a great showcase for area musicians.


"It feels great to have my work recognized, and, if nothing else, hopefully these nominations help introduce my music to people who haven't heard of me yet," he remarked.

"It has served as kind of a wake-up call/confirmation that what we're doing is being well received," said KI singer Kiley Halpern, "because it's really not about the award — more so when we found out about the nomination it just made us feel great to know that people are loving what we're doing! 



Portuguese Park is long overdue

For the past year, the Peninsula Community Planning Board deliberated over implementing an important part of our community plan - the creation of a new park in Roseville.

In 1986, I chaired the update of our Peninsula Community Plan and was a member of the Coastal Area Committee of the Park and Recreation Board, and in 1995, I was elected San Diego City Councilmember for District 2 for two

During the update of our Peninsula Community Plan, we fought for language to add park acreage to the plan, later adopted by City Council in 1987. Based on any analysis ever completed, the Peninsula community does not have adequate acreage dedicated for parks, particularly in

smaller neighborhood and community park categories. In addition, the "Peninsula Park Inventory Needs Analysis" completed in 2006 clearly shows the fact that our community contains park deficiencies.

The Canon Street/Avenida de Portugal site was one of the best sites identified to provide additional parkland for Roseville. Other potential park sites are limited in size, inaccessible or very steep. The area of Roseville adjacent to the Rosecrans transportation corridor is zoned for multifamily, and additional housing units are anticipated as part of our adopted plan and SANDAG forecasts.

This elevated park site is an ideal location for a natural, peaceful pocket park providing a point of reflection overlooking San Diego Bay and an important landscaped pedestrian and bicycle connection from the Portuguese Hall to Cabrillo National Monument along Avenida de Portugal, Canon Street and Catalina Boulevard fea-

safe pedestrian and bicycle paths. Furthermore, the proposed park has broad community support from many residents and civic organizations willing to help and is consistent with our adopted Peninsula Community Plan.

The good news is our Councilmember, Lorie Zapf, has identified park funds within the Peninsula Community Developer Impact Fee account to proceed with the park completion now. These fees have already been paid by developers for this purpose. The next steps are community workshops to receive public input, completion of a low-water use native landscape design and construction of the actual park. And our community will have opportunities to partner for special park enhancements and features.

This is a victory! It is time to complete this long-overdue park for our enhanced quality of life.

People's Autumn Corn Soup

This thick, sweet, satisfying soup is a favorite of kids and adults. Serves 4-6

- 4 cups corn, fresh, canned, or frozen
- 1 Tbsp. butter
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 2 sticks celery, finely chopped
- 1 green or red bell pepper (finely chopped)
 - 1 small potato, diced
- 4 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 1 chili pepper, finely chopped (option-
- 1 Tbsp. cornmeal or flour Salt and pepper
- 5 cups vegetable broth

Melt the butter in a large pot or Dutch oven on medium heat. Add onion, celery, bell pepper, and potato, then stir. Cover the pot and let everything fry and steam for about 5 minutes. Take the lid off the pot and add the garlic and chili pepper, if using. Stir the vegetables, using a splash of water or broth to free any that get stuck to the bottom of the pot.

Let the vegetables cook, stirring occasionally, for another 5 minutes. They should be lightly browned and soft, although the potatoes will not be fully cooked yet.

Add the corn and cornmeal or flour to the pot and stir. Cover with about 5 cups of broth and bring to a boil, then turn the heat down to low and simmer for about 30 minutes. The broth will thicken and become opaque.

Add salt and pepper to taste. Serve with thick-sliced garlic bread.

pilots use as a navigational guide. Schnoor said keeping the LOWMA Waypoint is important because that is where air traffic controllers direct the majority of eastbound departures from San Diego International Airport. Abandoning use of that waypoint, Schnoor contends, will have negative ramifications for those on the ground.

"The real issue is, with the removal of the LOWMA Waypoint (which has been in place for 20 years), that the preponderance of air traffic would be directed for a second pass eastbound over Point Loma anywhere from the Cabrillo Monument to Talbot and Hill streets," Schnoor said.

Schnoor said opposition to changing the LOWMA Waypoint is not about NIM-BYism (Not In My Backyard).

"It's about noise, air, water and visual pollution," he said. "It's about our oceans, tidepools, Point Loma Nazarene College and other schools. It's about the entire Point Loma area, all of the city of San Diego, really, because tourism goes to Cabrillo National Monument, Fort Rosecrans National Cemetery, the tidepools and other landmarks."

The FAA claims that deviating from the LOWMA Waypoint will save \$7.8 million in fuel cost annually and will result in a negligible increase in noise for those down below.

The SoCal Metroplex Study Project proposes to improve the efficiency of airspace in Southern California by optimizing aircraft arrival and departure procedures at more than 20 regional airports, including San Diego's.

The project may involve changes in aircraft flight paths and altitudes in certain areas but would not result in any ground disturbance or increase the number of aircraft operations within the Southern California airspace, the FAA claims.

The FAA has said the 500-plus daily departures and arrivals at San Diego International Airport, 97 percent of which leave to the west and arrive from the east, won't cause much of a noise impact, adding that "noise levels won't exceed an average daily increase in excess of 5 (more) decibels.'

District 2 Councilmember Lorie Zapf has responded with a letter to the FAA detailing her concerns.

"I oppose removal of LOWMA Waypoint, as many of my constituents have expressed," she wrote. "I am concerned that the permanent removal of the waypoint may only increase levels of visual and noise disturbance for many residents in OB and Point Loma.

"This proposed waypoint change may attribute to an increase of the 'early turn' of commercial jet liners that we as a community and airport have worked so hard to protect against... I am optimistic that we can have an efficient flight path that honors precedence and does not sacrifice the quality of life for my constituents."

Peninsulan and former local legislator Byron Wear also concurs with keeping the LOWMA Waypoint.

"As the former District 2 councilmember, I was proud to work with Congressman Brian Bilbray, the FAA and the Air Traffic Controllers Union on a 1998 agreement to route aircraft away from the Peninsula," Wear said. "I oppose any changes to the agreement that would add more disturbance over the Peninsula affecting residents, visitors and the Navy installations on the Point."

A sense of urgency, though, is growing among a number of Peninsulans, including Deborah Porter, of Savoy Street. Porter seriously questions the FAA's claims of marginal or negligible consequences from proposed flight-path changes.

For debut Point Loma novelist, art imitates life (and vice versa)

The buzz in today's book industry says that for every 1,000 mainstream manuscripts submitted for publication, only three – three – see a year's daylight, even in sunny San Diego. The field is awash in new production technologies available to hungry wannabe authors; even so, public opinion has a way of separating the wheat from the chaff, and the latter rarely meets with real success after 12 months' visibility.

Point Loma native and resident Jill G. Hall thinks a well-researched story, crafted from several art forms and steeped in references to pop culture icons, trumps the odds. At 60, she's a debut author whose plot speaks to the intangible boundaries within time and space, a trend that's gained a media foothold over the last 20 years. She's also a poet and a former educator, who spent two decades fueling inner-city school programs through her love of the arts. Support groups like San Diego Writers, Ink and thrift-shop coat pocket ignites the inter-

Bravo School of Art are familiar with her administrative savvy, and her PhD from Northern Arizona University doesn't exactly hurt her litany of credentials.

Comes now "The Black Velvet Coat: a Novel," Hall's stream-of-consciousness piece on the paper-thin veil that separates the main characters' lives.

She'll sign and discuss her book, published by She Writes Press, at La Jolla's Warwick's Books on Sunday, Oct. 11, from noon to 2 p.m. and will formally launch it on Saturday, Oct. 24, from 5 to 7 p.m. at NTC's Barracks 17 in Point Loma. She'll have a lot to talk about, as the characters aren't just placeholder figures - their flesh-and-blood backgrounds color their flesh-and-blood contexts. 1960s heiress Sylvia van Dam's loser fiancé is in love with her eventual fortune, and present-day itinerant artist Anne McFarland doggedly searches for Sylvia and fights self-defeatism as she seeks to mount a one-woman exhibit.

A supposedly innocuous key in a

section of the women's lives amid the 50 years that separate them. From there, each figure surrenders to her greater potential, with extraordinary new life paths the result.

Hall spent 10 years crafting this story, hungrily exploiting more than one source from art and the commerce it reflects. Among them was community support from writing groups like San Diego Writers, Ink and Tuesday Brown Bag – that meant sharing her ideas with like-minded members in spite of herself.


"That first typed draft, I didn't know what I was doing," Hall explained. "It was all out of sequence and a mess. But the group members were very patient and encouraged me to continue and helped me hone my craft. After that draft, I was able to put it in some kind of order, and lo and behold, I did have a story."

Ambition set in as Hall further culled her narrative through McFarland's penchant for visual art.




