Federal funds squeezed from beach schools By SEBASTIAN RUIZ | BEACH&BAY PRESS

Schools in Pacific Beach, Ocean Beach and La Jolla are poised to receive less federal funding this year to support students whose families struggle

The San Diego Unified School Board of Education voted 3-2 on Jan. 27 to give less federal funding to some beach area schools and shift it to other schools.

Pacific Beach Elementary stands to lose \$31,752 in federal funds if the board upholds its vote.

SDUSD board member Richard Barrera said it was an effort to give money to schools that have more students from poorer families. Barrera voted to shift the money, but said he rushed last week's decision.

"I made a mistake," Barrera said, "I think I jumped into a decision without...community input. My feeling is that we need to back up a little."

The board will address the issue at their next board meeting Tuesday, Feb. 10, according to Barrera.

Board members John de Beck and Katharine Nakamura voted against the motion to move the money, while board members Shelia Jackson, John Lee Evans and Barrera voted in favor.

Nakamura said the board also eliminated the district's "6 to 6" program. The program provides childcare for working families before and after school.

"These are families that are right on the edge and we're going to pull the carpet from under them?" Nakamura asked.

The decision to eliminate federal funding for schools with students and families qualifying for assistance only makes the budget for these schools worse, she said.

Graffiti busters prepare to spray


Jim Menders now sees graffiti everywhere but he's not so sure he appreciates the enlightenment. Menders is one of a few hundred people who will take to the streets on Feb. 7 to clean graffiti off streets, sidewalks, utility poles and dumpsters.

The Pacific Beach Town Council's Safe and Beautiful Committee is calling on volunteers to help out at its second annual graffiti day this Saturday.

Taggers tend to come out en masse in the summer, according to Menders, who said once he started looking for graffiti he saw it everywhere, from fences to street signs.

"It's kind of disturbing to be enlightened in this way," Menders said, who helps coordinate the graffiti cleanup. "I thought my neighborhood was relatively free of graffiti and then I found out it's everywhere."

MB High student slain, suspect unknown

George Podhorsky wore his daughter's jacket as he spoke to members of the media about his daughter who had been murdered the day before in National City. He mourned the death of his daughter as he sat in the quiet Pacific Beach Christian Church across the road from his apartment.

An unidentified attacker shot Hannah Podhorsky as she stood outside a friend's home at 2:40 a.m. on Feb. 1 on the 700 block of South 42nd Street in National City, according to police. She and a friend were returning from a party.

The 16-year old, Mission Bay High School student died at the scene despite the efforts of first-responders. Police are unsure why Pod-

horsky was murdered and are trying to determine if the shooting was gang-related.

According to police, Podhorsky was at a friend's house with a group of friends. They decided to go to a party several blocks away on West Street. A fight erupted at the party that may have involved up to 20 people, according to San Diego Police Lieutenant Terry McManus.

"Whether or not the victim and some of her friends were involved in the fight; we don't know that for sure," McManus said. "We do think the victim may have been involved in a fight."

Police said Podhorsky and a friend decided to leave the party and walk back to the home on 42nd street. Shortly after arriving at the home, approximately two Hispanic males

suspects approached on foot.

"The victim and her friend were out in front of the home on 42nd street and for whatever reason the suspects fired gunshots in their direction and she was struck." McManus said. "She was the only one struck."

Police don't know if the victim and the suspect knew each other, or if Podhorsky was even the intended target.

But as police investigate Podhorsky's death, her father grieves.

He recounted how his daughter's life changed after she left the private Christian school and joined Mission Bay High School.

"She started to go down the wrong path," he said.

The cut in federal money to beach area schools comes as the unified school district works to close an estimated \$30 million budget shortfall for this year.

Schools like Pacific Beach Elementary could lose teachers in subjects like math and Spanish if money isn't available to pay them, according to Dawna Deatrick, president of the Friends of Pacific Beach Elementary, the school's Parent Teacher Organization.

"Our teachers that are already spread thin will be spread even thinner," Deatrick said. "The students just won't get the same instruction they're getting now."

University City High School used this year's federal funds to hire extra instructors and tutors, said Principal Michael Price.

"This was our first year [to receive federal dollars]," Price said, "If [the board's decision] were to remain, we would lose the ability to use those dollars to pay for after school tutoring."

Solving the \$30 million shortfall

To address the \$30 million budget deficit, the board imposed a hiring freeze with a few positions approved on a "case by case basis," according to SDUSD spokesman Jack Brandais. Administrators must also approve all spending, he said.

"We really want to keep a real tight lid on spending," Brandais

said. "If there are things that can be postponed, [administrators] will take a look a them,"

The district's budget crisis stems, in part, from the inability of California state legislators to resolve the state's budget crisis, Brandais said.

The state budget problem has the school district preparing for an estimated \$20 million to \$40 million current year budget cut with impacts on next year's budget, he said.

In January, board member John de Beck had called for a savings plan that would close the district for nine days for the next two years, and cut salaries for board members for two months. De Beck represents schools in Pacific Beach, Mission Bay, Ocean Beach, Point Loma, Bird Rock and La Jolla. De Beck estimated his plan could save the district \$70 million over the next two years, and avoid layoffs. His proposal, however, fell on deaf ears, according to de Beck.

De Beck said the district should address the budget by Sunday, March 15, when the school district becomes obligated to pay teachers' salaries. By law, the district must notify teachers by March 15 if they will be laid off, he said. With about 80 percent of the school budget dedicated to teachers' salaries, any savings from layoffs would be minimal.

The SDUSD board next meets Tuesday, Feb. 10 at 5 p.m. at the Eugene Brucker Education Center, 4100 Normal St.

Last year families, children, activists, politicians and locals sprayed the graffiti with a solvent that quickly dissolves it, or painted over it with paint.

This year, volunteers will meet at 8:30 a.m. on Saturday, Feb. 7 at the Pacific Beach Presbyterian Church, located at 1675 Garnet Ave. The committee will train volunteers from 8:30 to 9 a.m. and provide refreshments, and volunteers will then head out to clean until noon.

Menders said volunteers will know how to clean graffiti next time they see it.

"You look at it; you take a photo; you remove it," Menders said, adding people should report the graffiti to the San Diego Police Department's Graffiti Strike Force. "Don't call the city [to remove it]. They can't assist you."

Hannah wanted to be an oceanographer he said. He spoke of his sadness and his anger over how his daughter's life was cut short.

"There shouldn't be parties for 16-year olds at 2 a.m.," he said. "There had to be some parents there that knew what was going on."

Hannah, who turned 16 last November, was the middle of five children and had a 19-year old sister, a 17-year old brother and two younger siblings ages six and four.

"The youngest two don't understand what's happened yet," George Podhorsky said.

Pacific Beach Town Council sounds the call for enforcement

Enforcing alcohol laws and parking regulations is this year's top priority for the Pacific Beach Town Council (PBTC) that hosted its second annual community forum on Jan. 21. Approximately 30 people turned out to discuss the top issues.

The town council also plans to install video surveillance cameras, remove gum from the sidewalks, especially along Garnet Avenue; beautify medians with landscaping; boost attendance at town council meetings; and build a Pacific Beach Good Neighbor Policy.

"I think this is tremendous," said

Jerry Hall, who chairs the Safe and Beautiful Committee and acts as the PBTC director "This is a much more manageable list [than last year]."

Hall described himself as a subscriber to the "broken windows" theory, endorsed by Rudy Giuliani when he was mayor of New York City, who believed that addressing small problems, like broken windows and graffiti, can have a positive impact on crime and other bigpicture challenges.

"If we focus on little things, it helps us address the big things overall," Hall said.

PBTC President Rick Oldham reminded the group that the city

has no money.

"We have to come up with solutions and think outside the box," he said.

To ensure that the city hears their concerns, attendees identified areas where the town council can act as an advocate for the community. Enforcement was again the big issue. The city needs to help enforce regulations on parking, traffic and the handbills that often litter the street. Parking was of special concern because illegally parked cars often prevent streets from being swept, attendees said.

Getting city council to pass a proposed oversized vehicle ordinance that would limit the amount of time that recreational vehicles, boats and other large vehicles can park on city streets continues to be one of the town council's foremost goals.

"We're here to do what we can," said Thyme Curtis, who represents Councilman Kevin Faulconer.

Recruiting a variety of businesses to the area is another priority for the town council that plans to offer incentives to woo certain businesses. The council also wants to establish and maintain image standards for local businesses. The council plans to appoint a liaison between Discover Pacific Beach, the local business improvement district (BID), and the town council.

BMW hijacked on Ingraham

"[The victims] are ok physically, just a little bit shaken up," said Mònica Muñoz, a San Diego Police Department spokeswoman.

The suspects' court date was set for Wednesday, Feb. 4, according to a public information database.

School district voted to shift funds from PB schools

Last week, the San Diego Unified School District Board of Education voted on how it divvies up federal funding earmarked for economically disadvantaged students. Against the recommendations of the superintendent and deputy superintendent of San Diego Unified, as well as the parent committee charged with overseeing the funds, the board, headed by board member Shelia Jackson, voted to cut off such funding to 32 schools with somewhat lower percentages of poverty.

The cut-off coincides with an expected windfall in the funds for San Diego Unified under the federal economic stimulus plan. The district estimates that it will receive an additional \$5 million above the \$19 million in such feder-

al money received this school year. The new plan means that the larger sum will be spread among a smaller group of schools. Pacific Beach Elementary School (PBE) is directly affected by this decision, which means a reduction in funds of approximately \$50,000. Presently, PBE has approximately 51 percent of students who qualify for free or reduced price lunches; that's more than half of our student population.

These federal funds have been used to hire additional teachers, which benefit all students at the school regardless of economic background. In an already dire fiscal situation, this decision will seriously impact our school. As a parent of two students at PBE, I was shocked and severely disappointed in the school boards' decision Loss of these funds will cripple our educational process and affect all students. I am somewhat perplexed that although the board of education unanimously voted to hire Dr. Terry Grier as the superintendent, presumably based on his experience, education and record; they failed to follow his recommendations, or that of the parent advisory committee.



PB resident travels to Capitol Hill for inauguration

When Stacie Somers learned she had won a ticket to attend the presidential inauguration of Barack Obama in Washington, D.C. on Jan. 20, she knew she would witness history.

"I wanted to be there in person, and be a part of the energy," Somers said.

While considerable energy and patience was required to navigate the crowds, Somers, a Harvard Law School graduate who works as a research attorney for an appellate court justice, said the experience was incredible.

Somers had entered her name in a free drawing for 198 tickets that U.S. Rep. Susan Davis, D-Calif., was giving to her constituents. She had read about the drawing on the Congresswoman's website, and, in December, received an email saying she had won a ticket to watch the ceremony from the National Mall.

When Somers arrived in Washington on January 16, the crowds hadn't assembled yet but preparations for the event were already visible. Obama's name and image was everywhere, from multi-colored murals to aprons to handmade earrings and jewelry. Even the Metro, D.C.'s subway system, issued tickets with photos of Obama on them.

"Every store had something Obama," Somers said. Crowds had grown challenging on the Monday prior to inauguration day, when Somers went to the House of Representatives to pick up her tickets. A condition for winning the tickets was she had to retrieve them in person from Congresswoman Davis' office. Apparently all congress members had made the same stipulation, as throngs of people waited to retrieve their tickets.

"The lines were nuts," Somers said. "We stood outside trying to get in for an hour-and-a half, and it was about 20 degrees. I wasn't prepared to run into that."

Finally, Davis' staff came to find their ticket recipients, and Davis herself walked them through security

Public bond sale means savings, improvements

Two weeks ago, the city of San Diego achieved a significant milestone that will result in savings for taxpayers and more tax dollars to use for neighborhood improve-

After two years of chairing the city's Audit Committee and working with the mayor, city staff and San Diego voters on financial reform, our hard work bore fruit with the city's first public bond sale in five years. This bond sale will save taxpayers more than \$8 million.

Until recently, past-due annual financial audits had cast a long shadow of doubt over the city's fiscal fitness and left the city with a credit rating that was next to the lowest possible. Since public lenders were not willing to take a chance on San Diego, only the private market — with its much higher interest rates — was available to lend San Diego the funds to make infrastructural improvements, which include replacing and fixing aging pipes to help prevent breaks and spills, and to help keep our neighborhoods safe and functioning.

I also worked with you, the voters and

taxpayers of San Diego, to pass Prop C, which established an independent auditor's office to be the taxpayers' watchdog, and added volunteer citizen experts to the Audit Committee. These safeguards will help ensure that city government and politicians are more transparent and accountable, and tax dollars are used properly.

In response to these reforms, the rating agencies have upgraded San Diego's credit rating and opened the door for the city to re-enter the public bond market.

It means more can be invested in water and sewer infrastructure to help reduce breaks and spills, more can be invested in our roads and streets to help reduce traffic and more can be invested in our public safety infrastructure so that San Diego is better prepared for the next firestorm.

Refunding the 1998 bonds saves the city more than \$8.7 million over the next 12 years, which represents 5.9 percent in net present value savings —well above the sav-

ings target of 3 percent — and makes even more funds available for investment in our infrastructure.

Now we are entering the annual budget formation process. The city's budget deficit was caused by decades of mismanagement and has added to the impact of the nation's overall economic recession.

As we begin to review options on how to balance the budget, I look forward to your creative ideas and input. Our neighborhoods are built on the strength of each of you, and I believe we can find the best solutions for our city.

I encourage you to contact my office to share your ideas or tell me about anything I can do to help improve your neighborhood. Together, I know that we can continue moving San Diego forward.

to her office.

Somers learned she would stand in the "silver area" of the National Mall for the inauguration.

"I think it was the worst section, the farthest away, behind the reflecting pool," she laughed.

Inauguration day began with a 5 a.m. wake-up call for Somers.

"I didn't eat or drink because I knew I would be in lines for hours," she said.

Somers and her friends arrived at the Metro an hour later to realize every car was packed. It was near impossible to get on.

Forty-five minutes later, Somers walked along Independence Avenue looking for the end of the line for the silver ticket holders. At eight

a.m., the gates opened and people rushed toward their standing room spots on the mall.

"People were everywhere, and they were in incredible moods," Somers said. She added that everyone was patient, considering the number of people, the cold temperature and the length of time they had to stand and wait.

Somers soon left her friends to find a better angle to shoot photos but soon realized she would not be able to rejoin them until after the inauguration. The crowd was too dense.

"We were shoulder to shoulder but everyone was so friendly, and we all just started talking," Somers said.

Somers said the crowd cheered for anything that involved the Obamas. As the swearing-in-ceremony approached at noon, a hush fell over the crowd.

"During [Obama's] speech, there was silence, which is crazy to think about in a crowd like that," Somers said. "It was amazing. You could feel the weight of it. There was such a renewed sense of pride and patriotism from people throughout the crowd."

After the event, Somers and her friends decided to skip the Metro and walk the 30 blocks home.

"I was surprised at how quickly it all seemed to go by," she said.

Back at home, Somers posted her photos online and unpacked her souvenir T-shirt: an image of President Obama on a postage stamp.

"It really was an incredible event," she said. "Thinking about it brings tears to my eyes. Someday I can tell my grandchildren that I was there."

Mission Beach gathers to say goodbye to longtime friend

A bench looks out toward Mission Bay at the corner of Riviera Drive and La Mancha Drive. People will rest on the bench from day-to-day but not all will realize whose life the bench honors.

Friends and family members will gather at that spot on Saturday, Feb. 14 at 3 p.m. to dedicate the bench to Gary Glover, 61, who passed away quickly from lung cancer on Oct. 5th. Everyone is welcomed to share memories about Glover at the dedication

A local activist, Glover rallied for beach issues. He helped install volleyball courts at Mission Beach. He worked to preserve free parking at the beach that he felt should remain open to families of all incomes. He pushed to ban alcohol on the beach that he believed had come to degrade the quality of life and bring crime to the community.

"He could see right and wrong in an issue but he was most concerned about what was best for the community," said Glover's wife, Pam.

Glover served on the Mission Beach Planning Board for the past nine years, which he also chaired for four years. He was a fixture at the election polls at the Mission Beach Women's Club. Despite all the serious meetings and hard work, Glover is remembered for his gentle, kind temperament. He knew how to have a good time. Glover could often be found at the recreation center, where he dressed as the bunny for Easter and Santa Claus for Christmas. At pancake breakfasts, he was the "the bacon chief." Glover earned a nickname as "Bubble Man" for waving huge bubbles from a wand on the beach.

"He always loved the bay and the beach," Pam said. "He never grew up."


Glover was born on Christmas day in 1946 in the backseat of his parents' car in the middle of San Diego bay as they traveled on the Coronado Ferry. He was raised in Lemon Grove and graduated from Mount Miguel High School. He lived in Mission

Beach since 1985, and worked as a builder for the past 25 years.

Pam described her husband as her best friend, soul mate and her strength.


"I've learned over the last three months that one's strengths often come from one's weakest points and Gary's death forced me to dig for those strengths," she wrote in memory of her husband.


Glover is survived by his wife, three sons, Gary, Mark and Brad; his daughter Marci; and seven grandchildren.

Henkel, Chateau Orleans,

San Diego is fortunate to have a lot of fine blues musicians, but few can touch the artistry of Robin Henkel. Performing at Chateau Orleans on Feb. 13 and 27, Henkel is a virtuoso at all styles of blues, with an endearing manic performing style that has kept him a solid draw at venues throughout Southern California for decades. Particularly stunning is his slide guitar work, with a seemingly endless well of classic tunes and authentic sounding originals in his repertoire.

Buick Invitational swings into action

The attention of the golfing world turns to San Diego next week for The Buick Invitational at Torrey Pines Golf Course, slated for Feb. 5 through 8.

The event kicks off with practice rounds on Monday, Feb. 2, and Tuesday, Feb. 3, followed by firstday play on Thursday. Play continues through Sunday, with the final round slated to kick off Feb. 8 at 8:30 a.m.

Golfing fans are mostly asking if Tiger Woods, who captured the U.S. Open at Torrey Pines last summer, will play in the event.

Woods, who has won five of the last six Buick Invitational tourneys in San Diego, has not played since the U.S. Open last summer due to knee surgery. While Woods could defend his title, he has until tomorrow, Jan. 30, to let tournament officials know. Woods has not played in any events since his surgery, but he is back to a regular practice schedule.

The PGA stop in La Jolla follows action last weekend at the Bob Hope Classic in LaQuinta, where Pat Perez captured his first PGA Tour victory, winning by three shots.


many of the world's other top male golfers.

The Buick Open, although under several different names over the decades, has a rich history in San Diego. From 1952 to '53, the tournament was held at San Diego Country Club in Chula Vista, prior to spending 1954 at Rancho Santa Fe Golf Club in Rancho Santa Fe. One year later, the event moved to Mission Valley Country Club in San Diego, and after the 1956 event was played at Singing Hills Country Club in El Cajon, it returned to Mission Valley until 1961. In 1962, Mission Valley Country Club changed its name to Stardust Country Club (now known as Riverwalk Golf Club) and the event stayed there from 1962 to '63; after spending 1964 at Rancho Bernardo Country Club (now Rancho Bernardo Inn) in San Diego, it returned to Stardust Country Club until 1967. The event moved to Torrey Pines in 1968, where it has been played since.

Ray Young, from Ontario, Ca., was visiting the park with his family when he heard about the end of the free-beer era for the Anheuser-Busch parks.

"I think it's sad," Young said. "It must be the new owners."

While Young refers to the merger of Anheuser-Busch and Belgium brewing company, InBev, that was announced last year, SeaWorld representatives deny the merger has anything to do with the end of free beer.

Others chose to take advantage of the remaining days of free beer at the amusement park.

A few weeks before the change, San Diego resident Cindy Gray, 54, and friend Bruce Walker, 55, from Washington state, toasted to the last days of free beer at the park. They hoped to make good memories last.

After learning of the decision, Walker said he planned to take

advantage of every chance.

"We'll be here for the next 15 days then." Walker said.

Parks where the free beer flows no more include SeaWorlds in Florida, Texas and California. The corporation also runs Busch Gar-

dens Europe, Water Country USA and Adventure Island in Tampa, Florida. Anheuser-Busch InBev distributes about 200 different brands of beer, including the flagship Budweiser, Stella Artois and Beck's.
