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Going out in style Motorcycle hearse gives the dead a final ride

Douglas Trobaugh drives the only Final Ride motorcycle hearse in Southern California.

Beach-area dwellers tend to exhibit a distinctly jaded attitude toward the odd, the strange and the weird. Fire-breathing jugglers perform weekly on the beach; armor-plated, tornado-chasing vehicles park in the neighborhood; and kite-propelled surfers hurl themselves 30 feet skyward above

And yet The Final Ride - a Victorian-style black hearse pulled by a chrome-detailed Harley-Davidson parked outside the Pacific Beach Chapel recently - managed to stop passersby in their tracks on the corner of Cass and Diamond streets.

"I can tell you anything you want to know about it except the price," quipped funeral director Douglas Trobaugh, driver of Pacif-

ic Beach Chapel's most unusual hearse. "I will tell you this, though: I could have bought a couple of nice Cadillacs instead."

The hearse is more a cross between a Victorian-style coach with gilded carriage lamps, crushed velvet interior and sixspoke, chrome wheels – and Cinderella's glass-walled carriage.

The hearse and the threewheeled motorcycle were built by Tombstone Hearses in Bedford, Pa., where owner Jack Feather says he is working on the 27th one at a cost of roughly \$80,000. While most of the 26 previous motorcycle-pulled hearses were built for funeral homes within the U.S., Tombstone has sent two to England, one to the Caribbean and one to Australia. With an estimated 10 million bikers in the U.S. (1.3 million in California), the demand for

the unique hearse is steady, especially in the Midwest, according to Feather.

"This one is the only one [of the Final Ride hearses] in Southern California," said Trobaugh, who has been riding bikes since his father bought him his first one - a Harley Davidson dirt bike – when he was 9 years old. Trobaugh's father, John, is still riding a Harley at age 75.

Demand for the Final Ride has been steady, with about 30 services performed since the funeral home purchased it two years ago. In mid-April the funeral procession of a Vietnam vet created a spectacle when more than 200 bikers followed the distinctive hearse from the La Mesa Chapel out to Jamul and back for the deceased man's

City Council to replace MB **Park Committee with experts**

City Council voted on June 9 to term out the current Mission Bay Park Committee by July 1 and replace the board with members that have expertise in city finance and management. It is unclear who the new members will be – and if any of the current board members will return to their seats.

The mayor's office sent an ordinance to City Council to overturn the 15-member board and replace it with an 11-member board with qualifications in city finance, planning, auditing, resource management and protection, wildlife protection, construction manage-

According to the ordinance, the mayor will appoint three members nominated by District 2 City Councilmember Kevin Faulconer and three members nominated by District 6 City Councilmember Donna Frye, whose districts cover Mission Bay. Three "at-large" members, one hotel lessee representative and one lessee not related to hotels will round out the board of mayoral appointments. Committee members will still volunteer their time and have two-year, staggered terms.

In previous years, the mayor

Pool shop spruces up corner

Brian Costelloe has splashed color onto the tiny cottage that houses Pacific Paradise Pools & Spa on the corner of Cass and Wilbur streets, and transformed a dirt lot into a decorative garden to market his pool, spa and landscaping products. Costelloe bought the retail store – formerly known as La Jolla Pools for 40 years - this past October. Muralist Virginia Ann Holt, who met Costelloe at a home show, has volunteered her time to paint the stucco walls into a tropical paradise of palm trees, hibiscus plants and ocean hues. Ann Holt also painted the outside façade for the French Gourmet on Turquoise Street.

The garden showcases the services and products for sale: pavers lead past a sturdy thatched bamboo palapa, alongside a bench carved into a pony, past foxgloves and a bird bath to a 4-foot-deep pond. Secret Gardens Landscape volunteered its services to build the garden – a tradeoff for finding a place to showcase its work.

Police watch over Belmont Park from above

Surveillance cameras watching over the parking lot at Belmont Park have been up and running for two years now and have already helped police nab at least one vehicle prowler that plagued the area for several weeks in 2008.

Police used footage to connect the alleged prowler, identified by police as 48-year-old Pacific Beach resident Jonathon Clark, to 14 alleged vehicle prowling incidents. When police pulled him over in October of 2008, he reportedly

had with him stolen items, said Northern Division Capt. Shelley Zimmerman.

One of Clark's tactics included following local surfers and stealing keys that they buried in the sand to hide. He allegedly unlocked the vehicles and took property and then reburied or replaced the keys, giving him time to escape before the owner noticed.

"[The arrest] was a direct result of the cameras," Zimmerman said. "[Cameras] are a force multiplier...it gives us more eyes."

With cameras in five spots around Belmont Park and parts of Mission Beach, police have eyes in the sky.

Police and government officials unveiled the system about two years ago as a security measure to deter beach area assaults and other crime. Signs posted near the monitored areas let potential rulebreakers know that someone may be watching. As a result, Zimmerman said, calls for service have

appointed the committee members but did not specify required qualifications.

"We made those changes today...trying to strike a balance, and also trying to ensure we have expertise on the board because there's going to be a lot of important projects and money associated with the park," Faulconer said.

City Council also charged the Park and Recreation Board with overseeing regional park improvement funds of at least \$2.5 million a year from Mission Bay lease revenue by July 1. More than \$23 million in improvement funds is expected to flow to Mission Bay Park next year from the voterapproved Prop. C passed in November, according to the mayor's proposed budget.

But Mission Bay Park Committee member Judy Swink, who has served on the board since 1994, said the change in qualifications of the committee members could "crowd" out the voice of the average citizen.

"I was concerned that it might have the potential to limit the citizens' ability to participate meaningfully in the decision making process," Swink said.

She said citizen advisory boards should be "broadly representative of the community," and that City Council shouldn't rush into deciding whom to appoint to the new Mission Bay Park Committee.

City officials addressed the concerns of citizens like Swink at the June 9 meeting.

"It was not the intention of myself... to preclude members of the community with the skill sets that aren't professional but have a value to allow them to perform effective oversight," Frye said at the meeting.

Mission Bay Park Committee Chair Rick Bussell said he hopes future boards won't look at everything in terms of dollars and cents but will do what is best for the Mission Bay community.

"In my heart of hearts I believe that these people will do what's in the best interest of the park, and not just for political expediency,' Bussell said at the June 2 Mission Bay Park committee meeting.

At the City Council meeting, District 1 City Councilmember Sherri Lighter unsuccessfully pushed for additional language to the ordinance to allow each council district to nominate a member to the Park and Recreation Board.

"In that every council district does have regional parks, it would be appropriate for every district to have representation to the Park and [Recreation] board," Lightner said at the meeting.

City Council members can currently nominate Park and Recreation Board members; however, final appointments rest with the mayor and are approved by City Council.

While City Council wrestles with the details of the Mission Bay Park Committee, a list of Mission

Bay projects sits in the pipeline. Slated projects include improvements to the jetty, Rose and Tecolote creeks and expansion of wetlands.

The Park and Recreation Board will use the approximately \$2.5 million from Mission Bay Park revenues for park improvements throughout the city, including projects in Balboa Park, Mission Trails Regional Park, Otay River Valley Park, San Diego River Park.

Faulconer, a former Mission Bay Park Committee member, said that the entire project is a huge step forward for the City of San Diego. He added that it was frustrating seeing revenue generated from Mission Bay Park used elsewhere.

"[We were] seeing wetland improvements, restrooms [projects] that were never going to get done because the money kept getting diverted each and every time," Faulconer said. "We're going to have the opportunity to move forward on projects that were long overdue.'

The Mission Bay Park Committee meets the first Tuesday of the month at the Santa Clara Recreation Center, 1008 Santa Clara Place. The committee is scheduled to next meet Tuesday, July 7.

last ride.

However, it's not just bikers who choose this unique last procession.

"More than 25 percent of them have never ridden a bike," said Feather at the factory in Pennsylvania. "Lots of little old ladies choose it."

Trobaugh said the very first service he performed in San Diego was for a 94-year-old woman whose family picked the coach for the oldfashioned style that harked to the turn of the last century when she was born. Of the 30 funerals Trobaugh has driven the Final Ride, only six were for bikers.

On Cass Street a man approaches Trobaugh, who is dressed in a black suit and a black leather jacket inscribed with the El Camino Memorial logo, to ask if he can photograph the hearse. He told his wife about the Final Ride last night and wants a picture.

Trobaugh said the public is wel $come\ to\ photograph\ The\ Final\ Ride$ but forbidden to climb upon it. The Pacific Beach Chapel is located on the corner of Cass and Diamond streets.

"I've had people asking me if they can climb inside the coach to pose for pictures," said Ray Rios, funeral arranger at the Pacific Beach Chapel, with a hint of incredulity in his voice.

to head to La Jolla when his vessel hit a rock. Lifeguards from various locations saw the accident and safely rescued the boat owner within five minutes; and then towed the sailboat off the rocks, which sunk into the bay.

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


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PBTC hosts wine and dine

The town council is hosting its eighth Annual Wine Tasting and Silent Auction on June 14 from 5 to 7:30 p.m. at Lotsa Pasta restaurant at 1762 Garnet Ave.

"It's a fantastic way to come out and meet your neighbors and other community members in a social atmosphere for a very affordable evening," said past president Ruby Houck.

The evening features a silent auction and raffle prizes, but its main purpose is to raise money for youth programs sponsored by the town council. While town council members are known for pounding the streets to collect trash, the

fundraiser will benefit programs with a little more spark. As for the wine tasting, representatives from Eagles Nest Winery, San Pasqual Vineyard and Rock Canyon Vineyard will discuss their wine. The silent auction will feature a onenight stay at a hotel with an ocean view, tickets for four at SeaWorld, restaurant certificates, spa treatments and the Pacific Beach ubiqui-



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
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Lifeguard union's ex-GM, suspected of money mischief, resigns

Weeks after San Diego City Council members approved a plan allowing lifeguards the option to leave their current union — the San Diego Municipal Employee Association (MEA) — to join the 911 Teamsters, MEA officials said in a May 29 memo to union members that an internal investigation resulted in the involuntary resignation of former MEA president and general manager Judie Italiano under a cloud of allegations.

"We as MEA's elected officers placed MEA's General Manager Judie Italiano on an involuntary leave of absence in order to conduct an unfettered investigation of possible misfeasance in the handling of MEA's monies," MEA officials said. "We have concluded that Ms. Italiano breached her duty of trust as MEA's General Manager by using the MEA credit cards which were entrusted to her... and, in so doing, she incurred a substantial indebtedness to MEA."

The San Diego MEA union represents about 100 full-time lifeguards and nearly 4,500 white-collar city employees.

MEA member and San Diego lifeguard Sgt. Ed Harris said Italiano was not fulfilling her member responsibilities. So Harris sued Italiano on or about May 6, citing a September 2006 report from former San Diego City Attorney Michael Aguirre that alleged Italiano unlawfully used MEA credit cards for personal use.

"This continues to unfold and we continue to learn more things — that was the purpose of the lawsuit," said Harris' attorney, Amy Lepine.

Lepine said she asked lifeguards and MEA members to join the class action lawsuit.

According to court documents, by January 2006 Italiano allegedly used MEA credit cards to purchase at least \$131,000 of merchandise from stores such as Nordstrom and spent more than \$1,000 at casinos.

Three years later, Lepine said she "estimate[s] the amount has doubled."

MEA officials said May 29 that Italiano allegedly reimbursed the union for \$13,000. But Lepine said the former general manager owes much more.

"We're hopeful that having her removed will get some money back into the coffers," Lepine said. "[Union members] pay a substantial amount in dues."

In the May 29 letter to members, MEA officials said they referred the matter to the District Attorney's Office for "its determination as to whether any crime was committed..." Harris said he asked San Diego County District Attorney Bonnie Dumanis' office to perform a complete audit of the current MEA board.

"We've received the request to investigate [the MEA] and we're reviewing it," said Steve Walker, deputy communications director for Dumanis.

Meanwhile, lifeguards continued

planning for an election to determine if a majority of San Diego lifeguards want to leave the MEA to join the 911 Teamsters, Harris said.

"We're currently working with labor relations and the MEA to come up with the rules of the vote," Harris said. "Once we get that set up, we're hoping to come up with a vote sometime in late July."

Body found near jetty

The decomposed body of a man was found June 3 by fisherman near Mission Beach jetty.

"We received a call of a body that was submerged underwater in about 15 feet of water near the jetty," said Capt. Shelley Zimmerman. "We called in a joint lifeguard and SDPD dive unit that did a very thorough investigation."

The body has not been identified, but the medical examiner has determined the cause of death to be drowning.





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Duo has rocked the Bahia Belle for two decades

A husband-and-wife team has been rocking the bay waters every Friday and Saturday night for 19 years. Aboard the Bahia Belle paddleboat that cruises guests between the Catamaran and Bahia resorts, Michael and Lisa Laughbaum have kept the party going with their renditions of popular and classic songs.

On a Friday night on the calm bay waters, Michael strums his electric guitar amid stands and gadgetry and dons a cowboy hat. All Lisa needs is a microphone.

She lets the words to the famous Beatles song "Let it Be" roll right off like a natural singer. Together, they're known as B Natural.

"We really enjoy the boat because it's a mix of locals and tourists. It's also nice for our friends. We always have a place for them to come down," Michael said.

And when Lisa doesn't perform, Michael calls up some of those friends as backup. Mark Cutkomp on drums, Joe Godfrey on bass and Michael are the Nude Blues – Michael's other band. They have filled in occasionally for the last seven years.

But for the most part it's B Natural's show.

The duo has performed nearly every Friday and Saturday night from 8:30 p.m. till past midnight for the past 19 years cruising off the docks of Mission Bay's Bahia resort.

Jamming from one side of the stage to the other, the duo covers classic rock hits and other popular music that the audience likes to hear. They produce their own music, but they prefer to take requests when playing the Bahia Belle.

"The best part is that you can totally depend on each other," Lisa said. "You don't have to worry about egos."

The duo met in junior college sometime during the late '80s. Both wanted to study music. When it came time to transfer to universities, Michael wanted to go to the University of California, San Diego (UCSD) and she wanted to go to San Diego State University.

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Mission Beach doctor, activist dies

Jack Bark, a long time resident and fixture of Mission Beach. passed away from heart failure May 23, 2009. Jack, as he was known by all, was born in Paris, France on Nov. 21, 1935. His family, escaping the Nazis, arrived in New York via Ellis Island in 1940. He spent his childhood years in New York and graduated from Columbia University in 1957. He continued on to medical school, graduating from the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine in 1961. It was during medical school that he met his soon to be lifelong companion, soul mate and Beshert, Jean Chotiner (an RN).

They traveled out West together, where lack completed his internship at County Hospital in San Diego and residency in pathology at Cedars of Lebanon Hospital in Los Angeles. Jack returned to San Diego in 1968, joining the faculty at the new UCSD School of Medicine. In 1972, he was recruited to design and direct the clinical laboratory at the then under construction Alvarado Hospital. He remained at Alvarado until his retirement in 2007. His years at Alvarado included tenure as chief of staff for the hospital, in addition to his primary position as director of pathology. He also held an appointment as clinical professor of pathology at the UCSD School of Medicine.

Jack lived in Mission Beach from 1968 until his death. One of the great joys of his life was that all three of his now-adult children also chose to live in Mission Beach. in no small part to be close to their parents. He loved the community and was an avid runner, swimmer, windsurfer, bicyclist and walker. He loved to play beach volleyball and taught his three sons to appreciate it as well.

Despite all of Jack's responsibilities, family always came first. Jack never stopped saying how fortunate he was to have his three sons all living within a mile. Family visits were not limited to holidays or special occasions, but were a part of his everyday life. Jack and his wife Jean were welcome fixtures in all of their son's homes, especially since the arrival of their five grandchildren.

Jack and Jean had always been avid campers. Camping was an integral part of their lives, from their cross-country trek to Califor nia as newlyweds to sending their children to summer camp. They continued their enjoyment of camping during their retirement. Their love of camping and Jewish tradition was manifested in their dedication to Camp Mountain Chai. As an active member of its executive committee. Jack was a driving force in the camp's formation, growth and development. He was devoted to ensuring that Camp Mountain Chai would provide a vibrant, inclusive Jewish experience for San Diego youth, including his grandchildren, thus helping to ensure a lifelong involvement in the Jewish community.

Jack had a great love not only for

lewish tradition but for the State of Israel. Both of his parents lived in Israel, and the family visited frequently. Through his involvement with the American Israel Public Affairs Committee, (AIPAC), Jack made sure that his support of Israel echoed in the corridors of power on Capitol Hill. He passed



that legacy on to his sons and friends by introducing them to AIPAC and encouraging them to involved.

Jack was a member of AIPAC's San Diego Leadership Council and had recently been asked to serve on their National Council. Working closely with members of Congress. Jack embodied what it meant to be a pro-Israel activist.

Jack is survived by his wife, Jean; three sons, Alan, David and

Michael: brother Maurice: and five grandchildren, Ethan, Lonnie, Shafer, Allegra and Arielle.

A celebration of Jack's life will be held on Thursday, June 11 at 6:30 p.m. at Congregation Beth Israel, 9001 Towne Centre Dr. Call (858) 535-1111.

City hosts website to track stimulus \$\$

The City has launched a new website to track federal stimulus monies flowing to San Diego from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act that President Barack Obama authorized on Feb. 17. Visit sandiego.gov/stimulus to read about the funds the City is expected to receive.

According to the website, the Army Corps of Engineers will receive \$10.5 million to dredge the channel from the Pacific Ocean into Mission Bay where silt has built up to create dangerous conditions. Some parts of the channel have apparently shrunk to six feet in depth, whereas 20 feet of depth is needed for safe travel, according to the website. The stimulus money will also help repair the rock jetty that will better allow the U.S. Coast Guard to provide navigational aid to boats.

The City is expected to receive approximately \$3.75 million in additional Community Development Block Grants (CDBG) that

supports libraries, park facilities and other public buildings, as well as street and road repairs.

The legislation requires that the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), which oversees the CDBG program, use the money for projects with bid-based contracts within 120 days of receiving the funds,

The City of San Diego is expected to receive \$20.18 million for local transportation projects. The city is expected to receive approximately \$3.7 million in Justice Assistance Grants to fund public safety prevention, intervention, and suppression activities; law enforcement personnel; equipment and facilities (including crime laboratories): community policing: and technology improvements.

State Route 905 that runs parallel to the Mexican border is set to receive \$74.4 million of the \$76.8 million to complete the western portion of the freeway to quicken the flow of trade between America and Mexico.



Rose Creek and public transit can coexist

The way I see it, the only reason the Rose Creek corridor was spared undergrounding, like San Pedro Creek, or extensive development over the last fifty years, was that it was being saved for future development. Well the future is here. SANDAG is moving ahead with plans for light rail running along the creek. Now I'm a huge fan of public transit (I use it almost every day), but I'm also a huge fan of wild places in my neighborhood.

Currently SANDAG, the State of California high speed train project, the Coaster, Amtrak and the company running freight trains all have plans to put more tracks down along Rose Creek. Mostly there is a single or double track

At the May meeting of the Friends of Rose Creek, Move San Diego make a presentation on their vision for public transit in San Diego County - and it is based on high speed bus routes. The focus of the presentation was on the area in and around Rose Creek. For the most part, their ideas of keeping the buses on existing roadways made us very happy. Their plan is a plan in progress and we gave them plenty of input.


Their idea to put a transit connection at the intersection of Bond & Garnet in Pacific Beach seemed a bit far fetched to me. This of course was predicated on a

bridge from the north east corner of Balboa and I-5 over the freeway and over Mission Bay Drive - another stretch of the imagination in my opinion. Hopefully they took our suggestions to heart that a better location for Pacific Beach would be near the entrance to Mission Bay Park and I-5 South so transit patrons could pop off the bus and roller blade or walk directly into the park.

However, I was very pleased with the consideration their plan gave to avoiding impacts to Rose Creek. I personally am a dreamer and I believe that we can have excellent public transit and greenbelts in our neighborhoods. It doesn't have to be one or the other.

City Council to consider modifying coastal code

The City Council will hold a public hearing to discuss the California Coastal Commission's suggested modifications to the city's coastal program and municipal code regarding deviations for affordable housing and sustainable development. The meeting will be held Tuesday, June 16 at 2 p.m. in the council chambers at the city's administration building, 202 C St.

The modifications allow developers to deviate from development regulations when building sustainable development projects in coastal areas, including height and parking requirements. They have been in place in the city since 2003 and required the California Coastal Commission's approval – which happened in April – before being adopted in coastal areas.

"It's incentive for builders to build sustainable housing and affordable developments," said program manager Mike Westlake.

Film contest shows city's conservation effort




That means that the city's warnings are still fairly friendly in their scope and tone. The city's recent and very proactive water conservation film contest, called "Water Conservation, the Next Feature Presentation," is testament to that — and in reality, it's not quite over. The winner, Conserve Water, created by a group of Point Loma High School students, was announced May 18 from among six finalists at Balboa Park's IMAX Theater and will show through June at the AMC theaters in Mission Valley and Fashion Valley before the feature presentation.

The contest, for which thousands of entrants submitted their best 30-second creations, was made possible by a grant from the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California.

Conserve Water touts a clever bit of irony — its protagonist is seen operating a garden hose that abruptly quits working, as though the operator's been caught violating a guideline. The closing scene shows him locked in a battle with the hose, which spews a wad of dust in his face.

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Storage Tips for Summer Produce brought to you by O.B. People's Organic Food Market

- · Do not refrigerate tomatoes! They will retain their flavor and ripen correctly at room temperature. Once they are ripe, use within three days.
- For best flavor, "ripen" cantaloupes at room temperature or approximately 70° F. for about two to four days; once ripe, store them in the refrigerator where they can keep for 10 to 14 days.
- Store fresh basil wrapped in a paper towel in a plastic bag in the refrigerator to keep the leaves dry and protect them from becoming black or wilted.
- Store celery in the refrigerator in a plastic bag. Keep celery away from apples, onions and pears, as it will absorb their odors.
- As with peaches and nectarines. allow plums to ripen and soften at room temperature. Don't put plums in the refrigerator until they're as ripe as you want them to be. To quicken the ripening process, put your soft fruit in a brown bag with an apple.
- Bulb onions can be stored loose in a paper or mesh bag in a cool, dry place for up to two weeks.
- Because corn is highly perishable. it should be refrigerated immediately after you buy it. Cook as soon as possible after it is picked or purchased.
- Green beans are best used immediately, but can be stored in the fridge, tightly wrapped in a plastic bag, for up to five days.
- Store zucchini in a plastic bag in the fridge crisper drawer for up to five days, and wash just before
- Blueberries are best used immediately, but can be stored (in a single layer) in a moisture-proof container in the refrigerator for up to five days. Wash just before serving. To freeze, place in a single



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Couple sold cocaine to undercover cop

A lacrosse coach and his fiancée pleaded guilty to cocaine charges after they sold the drug to an undercover police officer at their Pacific Beach home this past May.

Edward John Jeziorski, 31, and Brandi Rochelle Linn, 30, will be sentenced June 26 by San Diego Superior Court Judge Kathleen

Jeziorski was a lacrosse coach at

Westview High School in Rancho Penasquitos, and is now on administrative leave. He pleaded guilty to two counts of selling cocaine to an undercover officer, and child endangerment of his 2year-old son, according to court

Linn pleaded guilty to possession of cocaine for sale and child endangerment. Linn wrote on a court document that possessing

cocaine in their apartment caused her to "unlawfully endanger the health and welfare of [her] child."

Jeziorski and Linn don't have prior records, so probation is a possible sentence. Jeziorski faces a maximum sentence of six years and six months in prison, and remains free on \$50,000 bond, while Linn is also free on her own recognizance.

Handyman jailed for porn stint

Joshua Adam Kittle, 37, the former handyman for a Pacific Beach apartment complex, was sentenced May 27 to one year in jail and three years' probation after pleading guilty to two counts of residential burglary when he illegally accessed computers in the apartments to look at pornographic websites.

Kittle was given credit for 120 days in jail including time off for good behavior by San Diego Superior Court Judge Kathleen Lewis.

Lewis ordered Kittle to pay \$1,711 in restitution to victims in the apartment complex for toll calls he made on residents' phones in apartments in the 600 block of Tourmaline. The restitution will also go toward the cost of a surveillance camera a female resident installed in her apartment after she noticed her computer history showed porn websites had been accessed.

Kittle was arrested March 9 in

the woman's apartment by San Diego police after she was monitoring her home from another location. Kittle was charged with five other counts of residential burglary, but those were dropped after he pleaded guilty to two counts, said Deputy District Attorney James Teh.

As a probation condition, Kittle is barred from returning to the apartment complex. He is serving his sentence at the East Mesa Detention Facility.

17 stab wounds later, suspect heads to jail

A San Diego man who repeatedly stabbed a patron outside Bub's Dive Bar & Grill in March of 2007 was sentenced last month to 20 years in state prison.

Matthew David Thornton, 27, was given the term by San Diego Superior Court Judge Kerry Wells for stabbing Clifford Riek, 28, 17 times outside the Pacific Beach

The judge ordered Thornton to pay \$3,630 in medical costs to Riek that were not paid by insurance. Thornton received credit for spending the last two years in jail, which will be subtracted from his

A jury found Thornton guilty of attempted murder, assault with a deadly weapon and battery with serious bodily injury on March 24. Thornton did not testify, and his motive was not explained other than that the crime was alcohol-related.

Riek, who was intoxicated, had been ejected from the bar by secu-

rity personnel around 12:30 a.m. and testified that he did not recall much of what happened that evening. An off-duty El Cajon police officer, William Guerin, testified that he chased Thornton and saw him drop a knife outside. The knife was stained with the victim's blood.

The sentence includes an additional five-year term because Thornton had previously been convicted of robbery, said Deputy District Attorney Allen Brown.

Thornton's attorney, Brian Funk, argued that the stabbing was caused by two other people.

Patrick Barreiro, 27, of Oceanside was initially charged along with Thornton but later pleaded no contest to felony assault of the victim before he was stabbed. A judge in 2007 reduced it to a misdemeanor and sentenced Barreiro to perform 20 days of public service work. Barreiro was placed on three years probation with a suspended 180-day jail term.

While Murphy's star may have faded a bit, he remains a riveting live performer and still possesses one of the most distinctive and commanding voices ever record-

Music mania rocks Del Mar Fair

If temperatures around San Diego start to rise over the next couple of weeks, don't be alarmed – it is probably just the deep fryers at the 2009 San Diego County Fair. This year's edition, themed "Music Mania," will be held at the Del Mar Fairgrounds June 12 to July 5.

The Music Mania exhibit will showcase the music industry with an interactive exhibit where fair goers can learn how to build guitars, play instruments and even learn about music history.

Food lovers will not be disappointed by the new eats at this year's fair. Snacks new amongst the 109 food vendors include grilled asparagus, fried cheese curds and smores, chocolate-covered bacon strips, barbecued spaghetti, catfish and giant pork sandwiches.

The most unusual food item is the oatmeal cookie chicken sandwich. This unlikely combination features two oatmeal raisin cookies - one covered with strawberry jam and the other with cream cheese – surrounding a fried chicken breast in a savory sauce all made into a sandwich. Zweig has tried the sandwich and was not completely repelled.

"Don't think about it, just eat it,' said fair information officer Linda Zweig. "The flavors compliment each other, and it's actually really good."

Zweig jested that the oatmeal cookie chicken sandwich might also be one of the healthier choices on the fair menu.

More than 1.2 million people attended the fair in 2008. Zweig said she expects that number to increase despite tough economic times, in part because of the increased number of deals that this year's fair offers.

The best deal of this year's fair is the Best Pass Ever, sold online through today, June 11. For \$22, people can come to the fair each of the 22 days it is open. Passports required to travel via land, sea or air

Americans driving across the border of Mexico or Canada – or traveling to the Caribbean or Bermuda – by land, sea or air must now possess a passport book or card to reenter the United States. In 2007, Americans were required to possess a passport to travel internationally via airplane and that restriction has now extended to land or sea travel.

Applicants must make an appointment with the county clerk to apply for a passport. Call (619) 531-5600 for an appointment.

Residents living in border communities who frequently cross the Mexican or Canadian border or who travel through seaports can apply for a passport card, which is not valid for international air travel

Vacationers are advised to apply for a passport in advance, which can take up to six weeks to receive. For an additional fee, applicants can receive a passport within two to three weeks. San Diegans can apply for a passport at the County Administration Center at 1600 Pacific Highway, Room 402, opened Monday to Friday, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. No appointment is necessary. 

PB biker patents the smoothest beach cruiser

Rusty Spokes Bike Shop owner David Morrow dreamed of creating the softest riding beach cruiser in the world. After eight years, five prototypes and a trip to China, Morrow's entrepreneurial dream has taken rideable shape in the Softcruise® rear suspension bicy-

Eight years ago Morrow realized roughly 70 percent of a person's weight is carried in the back of the bike. Shock-absorbing suspensions in the front of the bike does not accomplish much when it only absorbs approximately 30 percent of a person's weight, according to Morrow. He set about designing a cruiser with a rear suspension system and appears to have finally done it.

"It is the only beach cruiser with a shock-absorbing spring in the rear portion of the bike, which cushions bumps and gives a superior ride," Morrow said. "Nobody has ever done it with a cruiser, and the design is mine."

on the rear-suspension spring design to protect his invention. Utility patents are more difficult to obtain, as they are brand new inventions.

"Design patents are improvements or changes made to an existing invention. I currently have five [patents] right now, with four more pending. Of those five [patents], the rear suspension spring is the only utility patent I currently have," Morrow said.

In the pursuit of creating "the softest-riding beach cruiser in the world," Morrow found his path leading to an undisclosed city on the southeast coast of China. He lived there for two weeks while the bikes were created.

"I tested them out, gave them my ok, and had my first container made full of 340 bikes," said Morrow. "Having bikes made in China is a much more economical solution, and all the bikes in stores around [Pacific Beach] are mostly, if not all, made in China."

Morrow did not disclose the

Morrow obtained a utility patent name or exact location of his Chinese manufacturers as a precautionary measure to ensure his design stayed protected.

> "My design is safe in America, but there are no rules in China. Once other Chinese manufacturers see what I am doing, they will start making the same thing and selling it." Morrow said.

> The Softcruise® line of beachcruisers arrived at the Rusty Spoke Bike Shop five weeks ago direct from the Chinese manufacturer. The new line has been a little harder to sell because people have never seen it before, Morrow said.

"I have to get [customers] to ride the bikes, and once they do, they can feel the difference between a regular beach cruiser, and the softest riding cruiser at the beach," Morrow said.

Morrow is originally from Manhattan Beach but has been in the Pacific Beach area for 18 years. His first bike was a girls' Western Flyer made in the 1940s. After restoring it, Morrow was overwhelmed with the amount of positive feedback he received.

"I bought five more old bikes from a swap meet and began restoring them. And that's when I got the idea to start my own bike shop. I opened up 12 years ago with 35 vintage bikes for sale," Morrow said.

Morrow has since changed gears over the years with his product line and added a litany of different bike
