# City Council OKs deal with Toyota on beach with Toyota on beach vehicles for lifeguards By NEAL PUTNAM | BEACH & BAY PRESS The City Council voted 7-0 on Oct. 10 to approve a marketing partnership with Toyota that could save up to \$1 million for the city to use Toyota vehicles free for two years

keting partnership with Toyota that could save up to \$1 million for the city to use Toyota vehicles free for two years on city beaches as the "official vehicle of San Diego lifeguards."

San Diego Lifeguard Services Chief Rick Wurts, along

San Diego Lifeguard Services Chief Rick Wurts, along with Mary Lewis, the city's chief financial officer, made the proposal to the City Council. Lewis estimated the savings between \$555,000 and \$1.1 million, and calls for the free use of the Toyota vehicles without the obligation of purchase or lease during the two-year agreement.

Toyota will loan 34 vehicles, some of which will be used in television commercials to be filmed at unspecified city beaches.

" $31~\rm of~the~34~(city~lifeguard)$  vehicles are past due for replacement," Lewis told councilmembers on Monday.

The city will have an option to purchase the vehicles after the two-year deal expires. Because the vehicles will be used at the beach where ocean conditions can pummel

### Crown Point, Bayview Terrace focal points of local closure, consolidation plan

Pacific Beach residents and parents are girding for the San Diego Unified School District's (SDUSD) Realignment/Closure Committee's recommendations that could send ripples across a Mission Bay Cluster that encompasses the Pacific Beach and Mission Beach area.

Formal approval is not expected by the school board until Dec. 13.

However, according to a Powerpoint presentation made by the committee during a meeting of the Mission Bay Cluster group on Sept. 19, one of the committee's preliminary recommendations includes the elimination of busing districtwide, moving the Crown Point Elementary School program to the Bayview Terrace Elementary School campus and restructuring the Bayview Terrace campus to create a comprehensive elementary that would then open the Crown Point campus to other uses — including outright sale of the property.

A second recommendation outlined during the Sept. 19 Powerpoint presentation is to move Pacific Beach Middle School's (PBMS) international baccalaureate (IB) program to Mission Bay High School and make it a combined IB academy for grades six through 12.

One committee member said during the presentation that combining the middle school and high school would take a few years, but that it would also help "stabilize MBHS, as enrollment and transportation

may be reduced."

Moving the middle school would open up the PBMS campus for other use as well, including outright sale of that property as well.

SDUSD officials believe that consolidating and/or closing schools in 10 of its 16 clusters would help save the budget-pinched school district up to \$5 million. The 10 school clus-

ters facing possible realignment/closure are Mission Bay, Crawford, Hoover, Madison, Serra, Clairemont, Patrick Henry, Kearny, Morse, Point Loma and atypical schools. Despite the fluid nature of the school district's realignment/closure vision — and quite likely representing a moving target for the next

# Smuggling boat carrying 15 illegal immigrants hits PB shore; 1 dead

U.S. Border Patrol agents encountered a group of  $15\,\mathrm{Mex}$ ican nationals, including one dead man, after a panga-style boat made a hard landing on the beach near Law Street in north Pacific Beach on Oct. 5.

The maritime smuggling of the illegal immigrants — involving nine men and six women, occurred around 2:30 a.m., according to Border Patrol agent Scott Simon.

Agents found two of the individuals inside of the 16- to 18-foot boat, one of whom was pronounced dead and turned over to the county Medical Examiner's Office for an autopsy, be said

Thirteen others were found and arrested about one block away from the panga boat's landing point shortly afterward, said Simon.

Eleven of the individuals were transported to a local hos-

them, Toyota will undercoat the bottom of the vehicles to prevent rust. The city will be responsible for repairs and gasoline during the contract.

"I really want to compliment Toyota," said Wurts. "One of the important things we need to do the job are reliable vehicles to get to the rescues."

Other rescue officials echoed the sentiment.

"We're grateful for this deal. We're really in favor of this," lifeguard Larry Sanders told councilmembers. "We understand that savings will be put toward our budget, which will help our training."

District 8 City Councilman David Alvarez made the motion to authorize Mayor Jerry Sanders to sign the agreement, a move seconded by District 1 City Councilwoman Sherri Lightner.

In approving the deal, the council also authorized a commission of more than \$49,100 to the marketing consultant who brought the Toyota deal to the city. Alvarez and District 5 City Councilman Carl DeMaio were critical of paying the commission, but Lewis said it had been authorized by the City Council beforehand.

No specific beach area was mentioned as to where the commercials will be made or when. The Japanese automaker will reportedly reimburse the city for the cost of staff time for recording commercials.

Toyota will be mentioned on the city's website and direct marketing to municipal employees will be extended, according to the plan. Toyota will also sponsor city-organized "Water Safety Days" events in San Diego.

The proposal was first heard Sept. 21 by the council's Budget & Finance Committee and forwarded on to the City Council for formal approval.

### **LunaFest Film Festival** screens women's issues at MCASD

### Former Hennessey's CFO arrested for alleged embezzlement

arrested former Hennessey's CFO James Cram, 54, from his Rancho Palos Verdes home on Oct. 6 on 19 felony counts, including suspected grand theft,

> Redondo police Sgt. Shawn Freeman said the yearlong investigation led police to believe Cram was signing checks in Paul Hennesesy's name during the course of his employment. He is suspected of embezzling nearly \$1.15 million from the company and its owners during that time.

> He is currently being held at the Redondo Beach Police Department on \$500,000 bail.







### **Campland reports its** best July on record

Campland on the Bay, San Diego's most popular year-round campground and marina located along the shores of Mission Bay, had its most successful July on record, according to Michael Gelfand, president of the 40-acre park that boasts nearly 600 tent and recreational vehicle campsites.

"The families who enjoy our beach and marina year-round really love the warmer summer weather," Gelfand said. "Last summer, in July 2010, San Diego was unseasonably cool and cloudy, and this summer was picture-perfect beach weath-

"However, even accounting for pentup demand and ideal conditions, we exceeded our July projections by every metric, shattering our occupancy and revenue records, and providing safe, familyoriented, beach-front camping opportunities to more campers than ever.'

General revenue from campsites tallied 4 percent above projection in July and about 4.5 percent ahead of July 2010. The park booked 230 more site nights

than projected, for a total of 15,130 site nights in July, about two percent over projection as well as over July 2010, according to Campland officials. Overall campsite revenue also was up four percent over projection and an increase of almost five percent over July 2010.

The Hungry Wolf Café reported the single-largest revenue uptick, logging in seven percent ahead of projection and 13 percent ahead of July 2010. The market and marina exceeded forecast by five percent and four percent respectively, according to figures provided by Campland.

month or two - many parents and residents in Pacific Beach are nervous and uncertain over the potential long-term effects to the quality of education locally if these changes are made.

"There are so many pieces to this puzzle and so many changes that are being recommended that I hope we are seeing the big picture. I hope we have the insight to make the best choices possible," said Amy Monroe, the mother of two schoolage children.

Other parents see the move as a good idea if the quality of education can be continued — assuming the recommendations are approved.

"Overall, this can be a very exciting time for our neighborhood," said Jennifer Tandy, a mother of two students in Pacific Beach-area schools who is also the chairwoman-elect for the Mission Bay Cluster Committee.

In the past, when SDUSD officials decided to close schools, it was because of small enrollment. But the Realignment/Closure Committee is now using broader criteria that include enrollment, traffic, location and other factors, said local school administrators. "A big one for this cluster (Mission Bay) and every single cluster is that the district is cutting back on transportation," said Pacific Beach Middle School Principal Julie Mardels.

The potential elimination of busing could also dramatically reduce the attendance at both Mission Bay High School and Pacific Beach Middle School, which would force the two to consolidate to stay open down the line. "If we were to eliminate transportation to PB Middle and Mission Bay, there would only be about 400 kids who would end up coming here (PBMS)," Mardels said.

The school district transports about 200 students to Pacific Beach Middle School. Overall, there are about 900 students in grades six through 12 that currently attend public school in the Mission Bay Cluster.

"We don't know how many children in the area whose families have selected to go to private schools," Mardells said.

The committee's recommendations are not final yet, and there will still be opportunities for public input and discussion. There will a series of meetings between now and December to decide what schools will be consolidated or closed — if any.

The SDUSD Board of Education will hear an update on the issue on Oct. 25, followed by a first reading of recommendations on Nov. 29 and then a tentative board workshop on Dec. 6. A second reading of the recommendations is set for Dec. 13, when board approval is expected.

pital with minor injuries, including one who suffered from hypothermia and dehydration.

Simon said no drugs or contraband were found on the boat and the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) Agency is currently investigating the case to determine who was in charge of orchestrating the human smuggling inci-

Simon said there is a federal maritime security initiative with enhanced consequences for smuggling by way of ocean and waterways because of the growing trend and increased dangers associated with maritime smuggling.

"The intent of the initiative is to prevent death, deter illegal entry and disrupt illegal activity," Simon said.

Maritime smuggling includes any illegal smuggling attempt by way of ocean routes, including boating, swimming, surfing and even scuba diving.

Simon said that unless ICE officials determine there is a need to give any of the immigrants a formal deportation which includes a formal hearing before a judge — the federal authority will expedite the illegal immigrants' deportation without a formal trial.

"With that comes a criminal record," he said. "They must wait five years before they can apply to enter the U.S. legally."

Additionally, if any of the individuals attempt to enter the country illegally again, they will be charged with a federal

offense and can face anywhere from two to 20 years of imprisonment.

According to Lauren Mack, spokesperson for ICE, there have been 602 arrests involving maritime smuggling incidents in Southern California between Sept. 30, 2010 to Oct. 1 this year. Of those apprehended, 44 were drug-related arrests, all others were for maritime human smuggling.

The number of maritime smuggling incidents this year has dropped since the 866 arrests made the previous year, which Mack attributes to a stronger enforcement stance, including the enhanced maritime smuggling-penalty measures.

"This is a deterrent tool for their own benefit," Mack said. "It's such a dangerous way to be smuggled."



# PB library exhibition shines a light on the night

All of the art exhibitions shown at the Pacific Beach/Taylor Branch Library are special to curator Mark-Elliott Lugo. But the current exhibition, "John Daniel Abel — Nocturnes," is the palpably satisfying result of a process that began three years ago when Lugo had the idea for an exhibition of night scenes, or "nocturnes."

When he originally conceived the idea, Lugo foresaw Abel, a San Diego artist who resides and works in the East County, as a contributor to the project. However, as curator and artist corresponded, and as Abel's concentration on night scenes grew over time, Lugo realized this would easily become an all-Abel show, and made it so. It was a wise decision, leading to a fascinating and wideranging exhibition.

"Nocturnes" is, in fact, John Abel's third solo exhibition for the library, and it is difficult to overestimate its variety. The exhibition features a broad range of works in oils and mixed-media drawing. Abel's oils range in style and subject to include broadly-stroked urbanites in a social-realist style of the 1930's (think Weegee meets Diane Arbus in oils), to a night study of an empty reading chair, the quiet of which evokes Rembrandt.

Abel's "tenebroso" moonlight also falls on and defines the shapes of a variety of automotive forms, highlighting their sculptural elegance in the reduced detail of darkness. Of his plein-air landscapes — in the impressionistic tradition of Maurice Braun and Everett Jackson – once visitors have discovered their astonishing secret, they will be left doubly appreciative not only of the vision, but of the determination and durability of this remarkable artist.

An entire show of nocturnes is a rar-now tops 2,000; attendance is strong,

ity, as such paintings usually make up a small portion of an artist's work. Both the challenge of working with the reduced color palate that darkness brings and the frequently somber mood of such paintings usually renders them a specialized category among the brighter subjects of day. Yet both Lugo and Abel have sought and found night subjects of both sculptural calm and visual vigor, finding the bright note in each and highlighting it to dramatic effect in both paint and print. An elegant catalogue is available for purchase from the library, accompanied by an insightful essay by Lugo.

The Pacific Beach/Taylor Branch Public Library has become a widelyknown quantity in the world of Southern California art galleries and showrooms. The library's exhibition email list

and patrons are regular.

"During our last exhibition, which was the ninth Invitational Drawing Competition, we had 14 different classgroups of over 30 students each, attending as a mandatory class requirement at the local universities," said Lugo, a particular aficionado of drawing tech-

"There seems to be a new emphasis on formal realism emerging as a foundation for the broader, more experimental techniques, so it's exciting to know that what we're showing is relevant and inspirational to a new generation of artists," he said.
