10,000th tutoring program participant is ACES with Mission Bay High School

Mission Bay High School students got the red carpet treatment Dec. 17 in honor of the 10,000th student to have taken part in the ACES after-school tutoring program.

"We hit the 10,000th person yesterday (Dec. 16), so we're celebrating that person today," said Lisa McDonnell, San Diego Unified School District supervisor for ACES, the After-school Center for Excellence and Support.

ACES offers helpful reference materials, access to computers, printers, and supplies, free and healthful snacks, college tutoring from SDSU and UCSD students, specialized help for CAHSEE, PSAT and SAT prep, college application counseling and mentor-

De Anza Cove settlement ends 35-year legal dispute with City

A 35-year legal dispute between the city and tenants of the De Anza Cove mobile-home park has been resolved, with tenants agreeing to voluntarily move out of the park within a year in return for relocation compensation averaging \$77,000 per household — \$22 million total.

Peter Zamoyski of the law firm Tatro & Zamoyski, representing De Anza mobile-home park residents, commented on the settlement.

"It was a fair settlement," Zamoyski said. "Was it as much as we had hoped for? No. But overall, it's enough to get them (residents) off to a new home and a new place to live and was done in a manner that the court deemed completely fair and reasonable."

Zamoyski noted many De Anza

residents are seniors, pointing out that many left the park already prior to the final settlement.

"It was very important to be able to fund those relocating, giving certainty, and finality, to a lot of these folks in their golden years," Zamoyski said.

In October, the De Anza Cove Homeowners Association voted to accept the City of San Diego's terms for settling the case. City Council has approved the settlement. Both sides agreed to the terms of a Superior Court judgment on the amount and terms upon which the City should compensate the tenants.

The City's obligation to compensate the tenants had been established in 2005, and for the nine years since, the principal dispute centered on the amount the

Civil penalties assessed in marijuana dispensary flap

A landlord who repeatedly allowed illegal marijuana dispensaries to operate from his San Diego properties will pay the City \$250,000 as a civil penalty, with an additional civil penalty of \$300,000 suspended by the Court so long as he complies with the terms of the stipulated judgment.

John Nobel has been named in numerous actions by the City Attorney's Office as it cracks down on unpermitted dispensaries.

As part of a global stipulated court judgment of those cases, Nobel was assessed \$550,000 in civil penalties, with \$300,000 of that amount suspended, and was

ordered to pay the City for investigative costs of \$8,000. The penalties include \$80,000 of a \$120,000 judgment that previously was awarded the City and that Nobel had appealed.

Under the terms of the stipulated final judgment, Nobel may be forced to pay the \$300,000 suspended penalty if any of his properties is used for any unlawful marijuana operations or for any use not permitted by the City. In addition, he must ensure that any remaining dispensaries vacate his properties, and he must remove their fixtures, effects and signage. Failure to

Mid-January will mark Pacific Beach bikeshare installation By DAVE SCHWAB

A dozen approved bikeshare stations in Pacific Beach are scheduled for installation in mid-January.

"These stations will be activated as part of a rolling launch," said Chris Biele, of MJE Marketing Services, which is handling publicity for DecoBike.

DecoBike signed a 10-year contract in 2013 with the city of San Diego to create a citywide network of 180 bikeshare stations for shortterm rentals.

"To date, 59 stations have been installed," said Biele. "DecoBike would like to have all the stations in downtown and uptown installed before activating the system (about 75-80 stations). This will take until January."

Biele said DecoBike is planning to have a special kickoff event, a concert and a bike ride from Downtown

to Balboa Park, sometime after the first of the year.

Biele added DecoBike has a website, decobike.com/sandiego, up and running (including an interactive station map) and that registration is under way.

"The first 1,500 members to sign up will get a free bike helmet," said

DecoBike stations will be located in communities from Pacific Beach to San Ysidro, providing a robust network that will give the public a viable and environmentally friendly transportation choice. The convenience of being able to rent a bike at one location and drop it off at another encourages bicycling as a mode of travel rather than relying

"Whether it's commuting to work, running errands or simply

enjoying a nice bike ride for exercise, automated bike sharing programs fulfill all those needs in a very efficient manner," said DecoBike. "It's convenient, easy to use and it's 'green' transportation at its best."

Andy Hanshaw, executive director of San Diego County Bicycle Coalition, a nonprofit promoting bicycling regionwide, said the cycling community is excited about the arrival.

"It's already in Miami, New York City and Washington, D.C.," said Hanshaw, pointing out bikeshare is "not a competing bike network" but a component of an overall transportation system.

"It will encourage people to ride and, ultimately, help the local bike industry," Hanshaw said, noting Bikeshare's geared primarily toward short, 30-minute trips that will "fill transportation gaps for many people. I can see it used as a convenience for people to get to local places and to work," said Hanshaw.

Hanshaw said bikeshare is being financed privately by Decobike, which is fronting start-up costs for the station-to-station network, while the city as a partner is invested in promoting the new cyclingsharing program.

Many proposed bikeshare stations are near transit stops, which Hanshaw noted "is smart," because he said it will allow people to complete the "first or last mile" of their commuter trip.

With bikeshare, patrons access program bicycles via a network of bike sharing stations around the city. Bicycles can be checked out from any station and returned to any other station. Stations are solarpowered and automated. They will operate 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Each station will have a map indicating station locations.

Access to bicycles is available with either a membership key fob or a credit/debit card.

Patrons can approach any station stocked with bicycles and select the bike number of their choosing. Once selected, they simply approach the bike dock and remove the bike when the LED light turns green, indicating the bike is unlocked.

Different membership and rental options will be available. At least two membership options will be offered: "Standard," with unlimited 30-minute check-outs, and "Deluxe," with unlimited 60minute checkouts. Short-term rentals will include 30-minute, 60minute and 2-hour options.

DecoBike is for riders ages 18 years and older. DecoBike does not provide helmets at stations. Helmets can be obtained from any bike shop or sporting goods store.

Trial set for suicide-by-cop gunman

pointed a gun in Mission Bay Park will stand trial April 1, 2015 on two counts of exhibiting a weapon in the presence of officers after he waived his right to have a preliminary hearing on Dec. 12.

Lance Marshall Tamyo and his attorney agreed that he would stand trial on the charges without requiring police officers to testify in a preliminary hearing about the Aug. 6 incident, in which Tamyo said he wanted to commit suicide by cop.

Tamyo, 45, pleaded not guilty before a San Diego Superior Court judge, who then set the trial date. He remains free on \$150,000 bond posted after he spent several months in jail after being released from a La

A man shot by police after he Jolla hospital for his gunshot

On Aug. 6, Tamyo called 911 from his car, saying he was suicidal, had a gun and wanted to "commit suicide by cop." Tamyo got out of his car and walked around a grassy area holding a gun. He allegedly pointed the gun at numerous officers and at an overhead police helicopter. He was shot at 12:10 p.m. near De Anza

Officers, using shields, advanced with patrol cars driving on the grass until an officer removed Tamyo's gun

Tamyo faces a maximum sentence of three years and eight months in prison if convicted.

Casteel cited for work with air rescue unit

The son of a Pacific Beach man was recently selected to receive the Air Rescue Association (ARA) Richard T. Kight award.

Senior Master Sgt. Brandon Casteel distinguished himself as a Guardian Angel Operations Superintendent in the United Kingdom from July 1, 2013 to June 30, 2014. During this period, Casteel was vital to the United States Air Force in Europe's buildup of Guardian Angel forces to perform combat search and rescue in support of personnel recovery operations.

As a lead planner for U.S.-U.K. search and rescue exercises, Casteel integrated special operations and rescue forces into a five-platform scenario, strengthening coalition partnerships and refining personnel recovery techniques and procedures.

Casteel also organized a highvisibility demonstration involving

aircraft, ground forces and enemy combatants, showcasing personnel recovery to 30 local leaders. In response to a contingency deployment change,

Casteel was instrumental in preparing 15 mission-ready pararescuemen, providing the United States Africa Command Commander with rescue forces for six named operations. Jane's International Defense Review selected him to highlight personnel recovery during Operation Enduring Freedom.

Casteel is on active duty in New England. He and his wife Conchita have two daughters and a son. Gary, Casteel's father, lives in Pacific Beach.

The younger Casteel graduated from Spring Valley's Monte Vista High School in 1990. He received a master's degree in criminal justice from Excelsior College in 2014.

The ARA is an organization of some 2,500 dedicated retired and active-duty veterans whose goal is to keep alive the spirit of air res-



Prelim delayed in CHP vehicle theft case

delayed Dec. 17 until Jan. 6 for a woman charged with stealing a California Highway Patrol vehicle in Mission Bay while handcuffed. She drove off with the vehicle and crashed into two cars, causing a major response from several law enforcement agencies on Nov. 6.

Attorneys agreed to delay the hearing for Casaundra Rose Lane, 27, because both sides wanted more time to study new police

Lane has pleaded not guilty to theft of an emergency vehicle, felony evasion of police, hit and run and auto theft. Because the car contained a rifle, she was also charged with being a felon in possession of a firearm and ammunition.

The incident started after a CHP

A preliminary hearing was officer found that a stolen vehicle had collided with street signs in Mission Bay. Lane was placed in the back seat of a CHP patrol vehicle, but the vehicle did not have bars between the front and back seats, said prosecutor Michael Runyon.

> The handcuffed Lane somehow drove off in the vehicle. The CHP officer fired shots as she drove off. Runyon said she drove more than 70 miles an hour on Interstate 5 to state Route 163 and then to Interstate 8 until she struck two vehicles in Mission Valley. The car was disabled, and Lane was arrested.

> Lane, who has a prior felony drug conviction, remains in the Las Colinas Women's Detention Facility on \$255,000 bail.

Guilty plea entered in tire-slash case

A panhandler who slashed a tire from Garnet Avenue onto East Misof a motorist on Garnet Avenue has pleaded guilty to a felony charge of carrying a concealed dagger in pub-

Rex Wayne Manley will be sentenced Jan. 7 in San Diego Superior Court and faces up to a year in jail, according to court records. He pleaded guilty before Judge Michael Smyth on Dec. 8. The maximum sentence is three years.

Manley, 48, signed a statement of agreement that his lawyer wrote on a court form, which read, "I unlawfully possessed a dirk or dagger that was concealed on my person."

Nicole Sours Larson wrote about the Sept. 16 incident in the Beach & Bay Press of Oct. 16. Her story says she ignored a panhandler trying to attract attention while holding a sign and flyers as she waited to turn

sion Bay Drive.

Larson wrote that she saw the man kneeling by her front left tire, jabbing at it, before he walked away. Another motorist signaled her to check her tire, which was flattened.

Larson wrote she posted an account of what happened on Nextdoor.com. KGTV Ch. 10 reporter and Pacific Beach resident Dan Haggerty read it and then interviewed Larson. He later saw the panhandler and contacted police.

Manley was arrested and remains in the central jail without bail. A previous misdemeanor case of contributing to the delinquency of a minor and possession of drug paraphernalia will be reviewed at his sentencing.

ship for life, college and career.

"We started the ACES program here about 1½ years ago in my classroom with a bunch of volunteer teachers," said Ron Lancia, ACES program coordinator. "We did it to have a safe, positive place for kids to go every day and interact with their teachers on a different level than they do in the classroom. These kinds of relationships, that's when the real tutoring and enrichment begins."

Tyrese Reed, the 10,000th ACES participant, said he's been involved in the program since its start.

"I was a freshman, and I had eight classes and it's kind of hard to balance," he said about his motivation for participating. "So I came to ACES, and the teachers helped me with everything, really gave me the support system that I needed. Ever since, I've been coming here, because I get help — and the resources — for any subject that I need."

Harmony Ordaz agreed that the after-school tutoring program has really been her ace in the hole.

"The teachers are really supportive, and they always help you no matter what," she said.

Asked what subject she needed help in, Ordaz replied, "Calculus. It's a very rigorous course."

Mission Bay High School principal Ernest Remillard said it's amazing how far the ACES program has come in less than two years.

"It's been fully supported schoolwide," Remillard said of the program.

"They were running 60 to 80 kids last year, and it can accommodate about 120 students, though 100 is a nice number."

Asked if ACES could be a prototype for other schools in SDUSD, Remillard replied, "We definitely want it to be a model."

The principal added that teachers in the program started out volunteering their time but are now being paid through school grant funding.

Currently, about 100 students a day are working at ACES under the direction of a staff of teachers from all content areas. The program's mantra is "Every student, every time," which refers to the program's commitment to engage with every one of the 100-plus students who enters ACES after school to help him and her continue his and her education every single day.

ACES is strictly voluntary and is designed after the metaphorical

The penalty is the largest attained by the City Attorney's Office since it began using civil enforcement action against dispensaries that operate in violation of City zoning regulations.

The City Attorney's Office has closed down more than 200 dispensaries in the past four years. In that time, Nobel-owned properties in Pacific Beach, the Midway district and North Park were leased to dispensary operators despite the fact that they were not allowed under zoning laws. Four dispensaries operated from a building on Rosecrans Street that is 600 feet from an elementary school, a violation of state law.

When an illegal dispensary case is referred to the City Attorney's Office by the City's code enforcement division, a court order to close the dispensary is usually obtained within 30 days. The City Attorney's Office can later seek permanent injunctions and penalties against the property owners and dispensary operators.

In cases such as this, where property owners continue to violate the law despite court injunctions, the City often seeks the maximum permissible civil penalties. To date, City Attorney's Office enforcement actions have resulted in court awards of more than \$1.1 million in civil penalties.

"This case underscores that landlords will be held accountable for renting to illegal marijuana dispensaries," City Attorney Jan Goldsmith said. "There is a process in place for legally zoned dispensaries and that process should be followed."

Nobel was not the sole defendant in any of the 12 cases, as all complaints also named Mahin Nobel. Some also named co-owners Parviz Hakakha and Judith Hakakha. Others named co-owners David Abeles and Melody Abeles.

UPSES installs solar power at Portuguese Hall

The United Portuguese S.E.S., Inc. has installed a solar-energy system at the Portuguese Hall, located at 2818 Avenida de Portugal.

"The ever-rising cost of energy," S.E.S. president Carl Silva said, "caused the hall management to look at installing a solar energy solution as a means towards less dependency on the energy being provided."

The system consists of 65 solar panels placed on the upper roof of the building. It is designed to provide a savings of nearly \$12,000 in the first year from a current

annual energy cost of \$28,000. "Savings realized from lower energy cost will allow revenues to be used towards the increasing costs of maintenance of the Hall and provide more services to the community," Silva said.

The contractor is Baker Electric, Inc., of Escondido.

Financing help in the form of neighborhood grants was obtained from both the County and City of San Diego.

A rebate of \$15,000 has been approved by the California Solar Initiative.

Wildlife photographer Mangelsen has seen it all; now you can too By DAVE SCHWAB

He's taken some four million photographs of animals in their natural states - and wildlife photographer Thomas Mangelsen's new book, "The Last Great Wild Places," is a compendium of the finest work from one of the most prolific and award-winning nature photographers of our time.

"It's a 40-year retrospective,"

said Mangelsen, 69, who was in town recently at his Images of Nature Gallery at 7916 Girard Ave., one of eight Mangelsen galleries nationwide. "It includes all my classic images from the beginning to very recently."

The Grand Island, Neb.-born photographer, the son of a 5-anddime store owner, grew up on the

American plains hunting and observing wildlife. His hands-on approach in part explains his uncanny ability to capture candid wildlife photographs.

"I rely heavily on my experience to put me in the right place at the right time and watch for the right moment," he said.

Like the picture on Eastern Africa's Serengeti Plain of a pride of lions sauntering toward him on a dirt road.

"I was in a Land Rover early in the morning, and lions, 20 or 30 of all different age groups, were coming out of the marsh towards the road," he said. "I realized this was kind of a cool shoot because you could see all their legs coming right at us, the whole man-versus-lion thing."

Noting he didn't get his first camera until he was 23 (extremely late for a photographer), Mangelsen added his avocation "just started out as fun and grew into a profession." He's captured rare moments and vast panoramas during photographic shoots on all seven continents, from shots of Arctic polar bears to images from the deep jungles of South America to pictures of the tigers of India to shots revealing the diversity of wildlife in the American West.

Mangelsen talked about his art, wildlife conservation, climate change and future destinations, saying there's a method to his madness in choosing locales.

"I try to choose new places every year and go back to old haunts I've become familiar with and fell in love with, like the Serengeti," he said, adding he'll be returning to the Serengeti in early 2015.

"The more you go back to a place, the better you know it," said Mangelsen, adding he also returns to spots he feels have great potential for getting shots he missed or would like to get.

"The Earth is a big place. I'll never live long enough to get to all of my bucket list," he said, adding, "It keeps getting bigger."

But Mangelsen's interest in wildlife extends well beyond photography. He's become a passionate conservationist who's befriended others campaigning for preservation of wildlife and their habitats, like Jane Goodall, who wrote a foreword to his new book.

"Twenty-five thousand elephants a year are being poached, mostly for trinkets," Mangelsen said, adding the same fate is befalling a thousand or more rhinoceri a year, slain for their horns, which are purported to have aphrodisiac qualities. Mangelsen pooh-pooh'd this as "just a stupid myth."

Navy's pipeline plan invites many emergencies

The Navy has installed a state-of-the-art this is a bad idea! fuel storage facility and is preparing a fuel pier to be installed after demolition of the 1950s facility, yet they intend to apply a Band-aid fix and cherry-pick areas of the subject pipeline to repair. This vintage fuel pipeline is the glue that holds the entire facility together.

The Navy also proposes to relocate portions of the vintage fuel pipeline along the Rosecrans traffic corridor in Point Loma (the backbone of the Peninsula traffic flow)

This does not make economic or operational sense, as it will cause gridlock and catastrophic public safety risks as well as possible structural failures to other vintage service piping, substandard, deteriorating roads, outdated traffic signals and signs designed decades ago for fewer vehicles, all against a background of construction in earthquake country.

Additionally, the following existing conditions on the Peninsula only highlights that nesses, beach areas, thousands of students

The construction will restrict the flow and merger of already congested business traffic, university/school and church access, heavy military use to and from state highways, residential/public access to Lindbergh Field and downtown San Diego.

It will also restrict emergency egress from all points off the Peninsula to trauma hospitals, because we are surrounded by water on three sides and do not have a hospital on the Peninsula.

(The Navy does not have an emergency plan in place for proposed fuel pipeline con-

The Navy, the mayor and City Council must realize that the risk of catastrophes and emergencies is likely to be more critical and massive from the Peninsula community than from neighboring communities amid airport access, the fueling facility's sprawl, Liberty Station and the area's busiand glut of vehicular traffic.

Think about the effect of a six-month pipeline construction schedule on Rosecrans, the backbone of traffic.


The Pacific Beach Planning Group is seeking candidates for its annual elections.



The current day lasts laas, the Dutch handle for "St. Nicholas," to Black Peter, whose job it is to whup up on naughty kids no matter the time of year – but you and I and God know him as Santa Claus, the year's glad-hander in chief, who stokes his multi-trillion-dollar empire with nothing less innocuous than eight arthritic reindeer and a flaming red parka he prolly got on special. He's aged fairly well since the 1880s, when the fabled Christmas present story made him the central figure of the secular Western world. His solid reputation precedes him from his days as the bona fide St. Nicholas, an ancient Greek bishop who used to put little presents in people's shoes and who paid young ladies' dowries to save them from the world's oldest profession (i.e., pillowfighting).

But the real hooker here is the phonybaloney himself, who royally punks the world every 25th of December with his sleight of hand on land, sea and air. He's sworn his legion of yes-men to secrecy, lining his legacy with the fruits of their labor as they stand at the back of the bus like so many – well – passengers. I beseech you: Don't blame the messenger for what you're about to read, but do embrace his message in the true spirit of the

Think NASA put one over on the country when it staged those bogus Apollo moonwalks? You ain't heard nothin' yet.

Universe Today says the earth takes 23 hours, 56 minutes and 4.1 seconds to complete one axial rotation. City was required to pay. The legal dispute, which began with a City Attorney's opinion in 1978, spanned 19 City Councils and eight mayors.

With the close of this chapter, the property can return to recreational, commercial and educational uses, as intended by state law, said City Attorney Jan Gold-

"Mission Bay was never intended to be a mobile-home park," Goldsmith said. "It is an active and accessible public park -- the world's largest water park - and a place for recreation and tourism, for paddle-boarding and picnics. This settlement fairly compensates the tenants who will be displaced, but most importantly, it returns to San Diego 76 waterfront acres we never should have lost."

In addition to compensating the tenants, the City will pay attorney fees equal to one-third of the total amount paid.

Tenant compensation will be determined by a combination of factors. In cases where the coach can be physically relocated, the tenant will receive an allowance based on the coach's size plus \$1,660 to defray additional costs. Where it is not feasible to relocate the coach, the tenant will receive a \$1,660 moving allowance plus the rent differential for the first four years. Tenants who do not own their coach will receive a \$1,660 moving allowance plus an amount equal to two months' rent for a comparably sized apartment.

The property beneath the mobile homes was originally owned by the State of California,

which in 1945 granted it to the City of San Diego as a "tidelands trust" to be used solely for educational, commercial and recreational purposes, to include parks, playgrounds and facilities. Residential uses were not permitted by the terms of the grant.

When the City granted a 50year ground lease to a master tenant in 1953, that tenant agreed to use the property exclusively for "a tourist and trailer park," language that contemplated camper-trailers, not permanent housing. However, De Anza Park soon evolved into a mobile-home park with longterm residents.

In 1978, the City Attorney's Office issued a legal opinion stating that De Anza Park "may be in violation of the tidelands trust [of 1945]" because of its residential users. In 1980, the State Lands

The tenants were given a reprieve in 1981 when the state Legislature, in an action that required City concurrence, allowed them to continue living on Mission Bay until the 50-year ground lease expired in 2003. On August 27, 1982, the tenants were notified of an eviction date of Nov. 23, 2003.

Nonetheless, the residents did not leave. Instead, they sued, winning a court injunction to prevent the City from enforcing the 1982

eviction notice. Although the City argued that it was not required to compensate the tenants for relocation, the court's ruling in 2005 was to the contrary. This year, the court set forth the amount and terms of payment.

Tenants have 12 months to vacate the park. Future uses of the property will be decided by City Council. The City, however, is bound by the terms of the trust and may only use the property for educational, commercial and recreational purposes, to include parks, playgrounds and facilities.


