Water supply threat goads cities to unify Statewide bond issue could now be on tap

The mayors of some of the largest cities in California, including San Diego Mayor Jerry Sanders, met in Sacramento this month to work toward a statewide voter-approved water bond that would secure water for San Diego and other cities in the future. The meeting marks Sanders' latest efforts to improve the city's water-system infrastruc-

As part of his effort, Sanders also secured a \$150 million loan from financing firm J.P. Morgan to improve the city's water pipes, pumps and other infrastructure, said Sanders' spokesman Bill Harris. Sanders made the deal in advance of the city's expected return to the public bond market later this year, Harris said. The City Council secured the loan Tuesday, Feb. 19 at a rate of 3.3 percent over 12 months, according to city documents.

Meanwhile, the mayoral summit at the capitol on Feb. 13 brought together mayors from across the state to set guidelines for the creation of a water bond beneficial to all California cities.

Recent events, including a 2007 federal court decision that city officials say could reduce the water supply to San Diego by 12 percent or more, spurred the cities' leaders to act in advance of impending future shortages.

"[The meeting] was a continuation of Mayor Sanders' effort to coordinate cities and their support for a statewide water bond," Harris said. "[Sanders] didn't want it to be a [Southern California-versus-Northern California]

Sanders wants any potential water bond to support a restoration plan for the San Joaquin-

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Surge damages OB Pier

An estimated 15- to 17-foot-high swells pummeled the Ocean Beach Pier on Sunday, causing damage to railings, fish-washing sinks and benches along the pier. Another beach community opts for security cameras

In June 2007, the San Diego Police Department (SDPD) began a nine-month project in the Belmont Park area of Mission Beach, installing a five-camera security system at a cost of \$107,000 after four University of San Diego students were brutally attacked in a nearby condo.

Now a La Jolla committee recently voted to install a similar set-up at a nearby beach and park.

Lt. Brian Ahern of SDPD's Northern Division, spearheaded the Mission Beach effort, which consists of mounted cameras on area light poles. An injured or "light duty" officer monitors the feed from a nearby city facility, Ahern said.

Because the cameras are "monitored by a peace officer, they can recognize illegal behaviors and deploy an on-duty resource," Ahern said.

To date, Ahern calls the cameras

"very effective," although the department only collected some data, comparing the area around the Belmont Park cameras to the rest of Mission Beach, and officers used a six-month period from June 2007 through January 2008, comparing the data with the same time frame from the previous year. According to Ahern, total crime in Mission Beach is down 13 percent.

Near the cameras, reported crime is down 20 percent, and calls for service went down 15 percent. While these figures aren't conclusive, Ahern said he's just happy crime didn't increase near the cameras.

The SDPD wants to use the camera technology to seek people violating the law, Ahern said.

"We want to recognize a crime in progress and we want to apprehend that offender," he said.

Members of the La Jolla Shores Association (LJSA) recently voted to install cameras at La Jolla Shores' Kellogg Park. La Jolla board members proposed something similar to the Mission Beach project, saying La Jolla receives more people per square foot than any other place in San Diego between 20,000 to 50,000 people visit the area during summer months and 2 million to 3 million a year, said Mary Coakley, La Jolla Shores Association board member.

A number of car break-ins and auto thefts have been reported in the area, and various other criminal acts have LJSA board members asking for a solution.

"There have been incidents in the area," Coakley said. "A [La Jolla] Beach and Tennis Club employee was assaulted at the restroom."

On an adjacent street, a couple was robbed at gunpoint, and there were robberies of businesses, she said. But the cameras won't cover

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PCPB election parameters emerging

Eligible candidates who want to run for one of the five open seats on the Peninsula Community Planning Board this year have until Thursday, March 13 to contact a board member to ensure a candidate's name appears on the printed ballot, according to PCPB officials.

Candidates will also have a chance to meet with board members and the community during a candidate forum Thursday, March 13 at a time and place to be yet to be determined.

However, potential candidates can also be nominated from the floor on the day of the election, Thursday, March 20, or they can run as a write-in candidate, according to Cal Feb. 21 meeting, according to

Jones, PCPB Election Committee chair.

A candidate must prove eligibility, however, should they win a seat on the board, he said.

"Technically, there's no cutoff [date to apply], but if you want your name on the [written] ballot, then you got to give us a heads-up on that," Jones

To run, a candidate must be at least 18 years old, own property in the planning area or operate a business in the Peninsula planning area, he said.

Also, a candidate must have attended at least one regularly scheduled full-board meeting during the last 12 months prior to the deputy City Attorney Alex Sachs.

However, any potential candidate who attended the special by-laws meeting convened by the full board on Monday, Feb. 11 would also qualify, Sachs said.

A candidate is in with a simple majority vote. However, if there is no clear majority winner, a run-off election date has been tentatively set for Saturday, April 5, according to

A time and place for the run-off election has yet to be determined,

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Mobile Gen. George S. Patton museum to pay rare visit

Seventh- and eighth-grade students at Sacred Heart Academy will soon have the opportunity to experience history firsthand when the Gen. George S. Patton Desert Training Center Mobile Museum comes to the campus. The museum will be part of a full day of World War IIrelated education.

"This is a good, hands-on activity for them to help them better understand the entire World War II picture," said Sacred Heart principal Bob Hamm, "especially the leadership involved in World War II."

The museum is an 18-wheeler that houses an authentic collection of World War II memorabilia. This collection includes actual uniforms worn by Patton.

"There's so much little written in

the history books today," said Col. social studies classes," Hamm said. Paul Kiner, chief of staff for a veterans group known as First Composite Group, which orchestrates the mobile exhibit. "That's why we military veterans went and put this together."

Kiner said the goal of the museum is to educate students about Patton's role in World War II and about how he used his Desert Training Center in California and Arizona.

In addition to touring the mobile museum, students will learn from lesson plans that First Composite's staff has developed and in-class lesson plans about World War II.

"That whole day the students will be having lessons on World War II involved in the museum itself, and the personnel who are with the museum will be doing a lot of the teaching throughout the day in the

A unique aspect about the mobile museum is that at the beginning of the day each student will assume the identity of a person who had a significant role in World War II. This gives students a more personal look at one person from the war.

They have to research it on the Internet to find out who that person was, and what they did," Kiner said. 'At the end of the tour they come back into the classroom and they find out the results of what happened to those individuals."

The museum visits Sacred Heart on Wednesday, March 5. Sacred Heart will be the only stop the museum makes in San Diego Coun-

Gymnastics offerings now close to home

Until recently, Christina Grady and her husband were like so many other Point Loma moms and dads who were driving outside the Peninsula area to take their daughters to gymnastics.

"That was really the first thing that started it, was we had all researched [facilities] and there was no place within 10 miles to take the girls," Grady said. Grady has made several of her own trips to Kearny Mesa with her 5-year-old daughter and had listened to the nightmarish stories of other moms who traveled to Poway — always during the evening rush hour — to involve their children in gymnastics pro-

A gymnast herself from age of 4 through high school, it was a nobrainer for Grady when she decided to establish San Diego Gymnastics, the new 7,000-squarefoot facility scheduled to open March 1 in the upscale Liberty Station complex.

The club welcomes children from 18 months to 18 years.

"A lot of the gymnastics places, they're all in industrial parks," Grady said. "You obviously need a lot of square footage, so they tend to be in places where you wouldn't generally go.'

Passing the time in the middle of nowhere while your child engages in two hours of gymnastics isn't exactly a thrilling prospect for most parents, she

"There's nothing to do, you're sort of trapped there," Grady said. "Liberty Station, not only is it close to everything and three schools

to all the other schools in our neighborhood. It has all the shopping now — Starbucks, restaurants, parks. While my daughter's doing gymnastics, I can pick my son up and take him to football or he can go run over and grab a soda at the smoothie place."

Located in the health and wellness area on Roosevelt Road behind the new Vons supermarket and convenient to numerous other amenities — Grady said Liberty Station is beneficial for every-

"We're extremely excited to have them down here," said project manager Ryan Hoover of McMillin Commercial. "It's definitely a need and their use compliments that building very well, as well as the Point Loma community [as a whole]. I think they're going to do great."

He said San Diego Gymnastics' flexibility and willingness to work within a historic building was a plus for everyone involved. 'I think they saw and see the value of Liberty Station, not only for today but for what it will be in a few years from now," said Hoover.

Programs will focus primarily on gymnastics, though there will also be co-ed classes geared slightly more toward boys and sports.

"They work on muscles, speed and agility and there's other ones (classes) that will kind of align with the sports season." Grady said. "During baseball we'll work on different techniques to improve baseball skills, and we would do the same thing for basketball. It's called Athletic Advantage, and it's

are on the property, but it's close trying to get boys a little bit more at the top of their game.'

Three other non-gymnasticsoriented classes will still incorporate much of the philosophy of gymnastics, including balance and strength that help in every sport.

Another unique offering is the high school gymnastics class that meets nine hours a week and students may simultaneously compete for their high school. "If there's a cheerleader at Point Loma High who has done gymnastics her whole life but doesn't anymore because she's playing other sports, she can come to our club and do the class," Grady said.

"(She) can have a uniform for her school and compete independently for her high school which gets her a varsity letter [and] lets her represent her own school ...," she said.

Other options available at San Diego Gymnastics include a computerized training system, online registration and once they get rolling, a competitive curriculum.

"We actually have some really top gymnasts in San Diego who have already submitted to moving over to this facility from another facility because it's closer to their home," Grady said.

However, she added that the goal of San Diego Gymnastics is to be a recreational program more than a competitive program. "We're trying to produce a program where anybody and everybody can be a part of it at any level," Grady said.

Improving San Diego's fire protection

he wildfires of 2003 and 2007 exposed weaknesses in San Diego's fire protection and response strategies. Although Southern California will always live with the threat of catastrophic wildfire, there is more our city can do to prepare for this threat and to respond quickly and forcefully to fires.

In the wake of the 2003 fires, the City Council requested a comprehensive Public Safety Needs Assessment to identify and quantify the needs of our police and fire-rescue departments. That report projected the expenses of San Diego's public safety agencies to be \$478 million over four years, with approximately \$159 million identified for fire-rescue. Eight categories of need were identified: personnel, communications, information technology, supplies and services, equipment, fleet, facilities and emergency preparedness/homeland security. The report by the city manager stated that additional revenue increases were required to fund those needs.

Armed with this information, the City Council proposed two ballot measures in 2004, aimed at raising the tourist tax by 2.5 percent. The first proposal allocated a percentage of the money raised specifically to public safety. That measure fell just short of the required twothirds vote. In the fall of that year, we tried again with a measure that did not earmark funds for public safety, requiring only a simple majority of votes to pass. That measure also failed.

Undeterred, the council committed itself to increase funding for the Fire-Rescue Department by almost \$57 million between 2004 and 2008, an increase of 46 percent. This allowed us to hire 44 additional personnel, acquire 16 new fire vehicles and operate a fire helicopter. This year we will consider the mayor's request to add a second helicopter. Both would be operational 24 hours a day, which makes a tremendous difference in the early hours of a wildfire.

We also expanded the city's brush management program and building codes, adding code enforcement and brush management personnel, requiring fire-resistant building materials in new homes and increasing requirements for

brush thinning around structures. This year, the California Coastal Commission will consider the final piece of the legislation passed by the Council in 2004 — a comprehensive brush management policy for the Coastal Zone. This will include the use of goats to thin brush in inaccessible areas, such as the steep slopes of Mount Soledad.

Last year, I asked our Independent Budget Analyst, Andrea Tevlin, to prepare an overview of what it would cost to implement and fund the Fire-Rescue Department's Station Master Plan, which calls for the construction and staffing of 20 additional stations across the city. That estimate should include cost estimates for land acquisition, design and construction and adequate staffing, including pension and healthcare costs.

Her review will also include suggestions for how to pay for those stations, including the possibility of a tax increase or bond measure. These ideas should come as no surprise. Every review of fire protection and response requested by the city states that the city must increase revenues to provide appropriate levels of service.

This year, the council created a new ad hoc committee, aimed specifically at reviewing our fire prevention and response policies. I sit on that committee, along with Council President Pro Tem Jim Madaffer and committee chair Councilman Brian Maienschein, both battle-tested veterans of local wildfires.

Later this year, the San Diego Fire-Rescue Department will present its review of the 2007 wildfires to the Fire Committee, identifying what worked, what policies and strategies need to be revised and gaps in service, equipment and personnel that need to be filled.

Based on the information and recommendations of all the groups I've described here, we can determine the best way to fund these needs. This will be one of the most important conversations we can hold as a community. I hope you will join

Seeks discussion about safety at Dog Beach

There's a different feeling in the air here in Ocean Beach for dog owners since the Feb. 9 incident between a pit bull and a small dog that left the small dog dead and turned a beautiful Saturday afternoon at Dog Beach into a tragedy for both the owner and our community. Although we all know it's a rare occurrence, I can sense owners of both large and small dogs are feeling the effects. I was on the jetty that day when I first heard something had happened. A lifeguard had stopped and told a lady who had a small dog to keep her dog close because a small dog had been hurt.

It wasn't until I saw the evening news that I found out a dog was killed. This really shook me up both for the owner of the dog that was killed, and in thinking it could have been my dog just as easy that day that I could have lost. Later that day, I noticed when walking my dog around the block how people with large dogs were quick to tell me that their dog was friendly as I picked my dog up before passing them. [My action was] partially in fear of what happened and because, although my dog is small and has no teeth, she can be just as responsible in provoking a dog into defending itself. The incident [at Dog Beach] just reminded me of that. It made me sad to now be afraid to walk my dog on Dog Beach since the reason I moved to this area was because of the dogs' beach. I

was always careful before. I staved a foot away from my dog, but even then I had a few close calls with large dogs chasing each other so fast that my dog would freeze like a deer in the headlights as I swooped her up just in time from being trampled.

So after this happened, I thought, "What if they made a designated area for just the small dogs?" I know it's not foolproof, but neither is the jetty that separates the dog side from the regular beach. It's up to the owners to retrieve them if they cross over. At least it would minimize small dogs from [being exposed to] fatal accidents, give them a place to run around with fewer chances of larger dogs accidentally running over them or provoking a dog [after which] one bite could prove to be fatal.

Besides the pleasure of living next to the dogs' beach, I have found out what a great community we have here in Ocean Beach. The people watch out for each other, clean up after their dogs and pitch in to do beach cleanups. I am very proud to have lived here for three years.

I know it's rare that a tragedy like this occurs on Dog Beach, but just like any other tragedy that occurs in life, it's an even bigger tragedy if we don't try to learn from it and make changes for the better. And in knowing this close community, we can, and should, be open to discuss any new possibilities toward any safety issues here in Ocean Beach. I don't know how to go about making an area designat-

ed just for the small dogs, or the rules and red tape that would go with this proposal, the cost, or what we could use as a barrier. I'm only a woman who loves to walk her small dog on the beach. So I'm bringing this issue to our wonderful community in hopes that together we can make the changes so that all dogs - large and small, all breeds — can run around on the beach and be as safe as possible.

that area. The board is also concerned with graffiti and drag racing, Coakley said.

"I think if it was the same situation two or three years ago, there would be a big push against [the cameras], but there have been so many problems it seems like the only alternative," Coakley said. "The police are so stretched they can't provide the coverage that's needed."

"Law enforcement can rattle statistics about crime in camera areas, but they can't point to serious studies showing that cameras were responsible for the crime reduction," said Kevin Keenan, executive director with the American Civil Liberties Union, San Diego.

Keenan points to studies that show cameras move crime just outside the camera's view.

According to a report titled "Under the Watchful Eye..." issued by ACLU affiliates that cite several studies, including one from 2002 by the British Home Office, known for its proliferation of cameras, the authors found a reduction of car crime in parking garages but not in violent crime. In another British study, some crime increased while some decreased, the report said.

In La Jolla, tourists and locals converge, forming one of the most popular beach parks in California.

"What you're seeing in this case is that instead of going after crime they know exists, they want to do preventative policing and go after people they think are going to commit lower-level offenses," Keenan said. "They'll be able to target folks who have their beer or wine or a cigarette and think they're getting out the bad influence."

The best way to keep a neighborhood safe is to increase the police presence, Keenan said.

"Whenever new technology is being implemented, we like to ask, 'what is the goal?" said Melissa Ngo, senior counsel and director of the Identification and Surveillance Project, established in Washington, D.C., in 1994 with the goal of informing the public about civil liberties and the First Amendment.

Like the ACLU, Ngo said studies show that cameras do not reduce crime. Both Keenan and Ngo said the police do not catch people in the act of committing a crime. The main argument the police have, Keenan said, is they can prosecute an offender after the fact. But better lighting has been shown to prevent car crimes more than cameras, he said.

Keenan said the ACLU believes the SDPD would be much better off if it invested in its police and not in the surveillance system.

"It's certainly not cheap to hire police officers, but it provides real security as opposed to a false sense of security like the cameras," Keenan said.

The Shores Association tried unsuccessfully to employ a park ranger before voting on the camera surveillance system, Coakley said. Both Coakley and Ahern said crowd control is another major issue for Kellogg Park.

"I don't think it's for crowd control," Ngo said. "I think it's a way to identify everyone. We've experienced this during protests. They can zoom in on protesters. That's one way in which crowd control can be used."

And many local beaches, including La Jolla, have people that continue to drink although San Diego imposed an alcohol ban, Ahern said. Kellogg Park at La Jolla Shores is an alcohol-free area, he


"But people continue to drink there," Ahern said. "Significant crowds go to that park and cameras will assist with preventing or being proactive in potential problems."

Once you think cameras are a way to fight crime, Keenan said, law enforcement is going to creep in. The ACLU is concerned about the slow, steady march toward a surveillance society, he said.

But according to Ahern, the LJSA requested the police department's help. The board asked the police for assistance and would like a police officer to monitor their camera feeds, Ahern said.

"If a tsunami or wildfire occurs, then public safety officials can pull up all the cameras operating in the city. Even at a water treatment facility or a camera in a [scrap] yard," Ahern said.

Sacramento River Delta, as well as a plan to better transport and store water in the future, Harris

So far, a monetary range has not been established regarding the potential bond issue.

With mayors and mayoral representatives from cities such as San Jose, Fresno, Los Angeles and Oakland in attendance, the meeting builds on a previous meeting Sanders helped organize in January, according to a statement from Sanders' office.

Tim Barnett, a climate expert with the Scripps Institution of Oceanography, joined the mayors in Sacramento and talked about problems with getting water from the Colorado River.

"In the future there is going to be less water in the [Colorado] River and somebody who's getting it now is not going to get it," Barnett said.

Barnett said current estimates predict 10 to 30 percent less water coming from the Colorado River because of current drought conditions, along with the overuse of the river water and climate changes linked to greenhouse gasses.

Barnett said there could be pressure on farmers to use less water so that it could go to cities. Barnett said combined efforts of conservation and using recycled water will help deal with looming shortages.

"It took all of us to get into this mess and it's going to take all of us to get out of it. We need some good, strong leadership, I think,'

Barnett said he was glad to see that the mayors were deeply concerned about the problem and pointed to other cities like Las Vegas as examples of efficient water recycling programs. Las Vegas recycles as much as 70 percent of its wastewater, Barnett said.

The city's Water Department is currently studying a water reuse plan more expansive than the "purple-pipe" system that currently reuses treated wastewater primarily for landscape irrigation, according to city officials.

The City Council voted in December to overturn Sanders' veto of the so-called "toilet-totap" program and directed the city's Water Department to explore the costs associated with implementing such a program.

The council gave the Water Department three months to study the issue and present the information to councilmembers.

No date, however, has been set for the City Council to hear the results of the study, according to city documents.

Meanwhile, the \$150 million loan from J.P. Morgan will finance additional upgrades for aging pipes, pump stations and bolstering security measures.

The city would pay the money back in about 12 months. By then, according to Harris, the city should be back in the public bond market.

Beatles-inspired singer/songwriter Humphries to rock Humphrey's

While it's not unknown for many musicians to meet their musical heroes, it's far less common to have the opportunity to work with them in a meaningful way. Growing up in the British town of in the rock music history books are

singer-songwriter Dave Humphries was primed to experience the first wave of Beatlemania, discovering the music of guitarist Tony Sheridan along the way.

The reasons for Sheridan's place

Today, Humphries and Sheridan are good friends, with the British rocker Sheridan appearing on five tracks included on Humphries' latest album, "And So it Goes ..."


Humphries will celebrate the release of the album with an afternoon show on March 1, fittingly enough at Humphrey's Backstage Lounge on Shelter Island. Humphries' music echoes the classic Beatle-esque pop of Badfinger, Pilot and Wings, so he is particularly thrilled with Sheridan's involvement on the album.

did with The Beatles on an LP called 'The Beatles First,' Humphries said. "Can you imagine, I'm a kid in my bedroom listening to this, in 1960-somethingor-other. Then years later, not only have I stood on the same stage with him, a place where Lennon, McCartney and Harrison stood, but he's on my CD and most of all he's a friend of mine. Wow,' Humphries said.

"And So it Goes ..." includes a wide range of influences including rock, folk and psychedelia. Humphries cites the likes of Bob Dylan, John Sebastian and Jackson Browne as influences, with a clear McCartney-esque feel to much of his material.

"The Beatles do loom large," Humphries said. "I always loved them and the variation you got on a Fabs album. Plus the feeling of joy when listening to them is always a pick-me-up."

He got his musical start as a schoolboy in England, initially a fan

> The young group plowed its way through "Can't Buy Me Love" and an original song called "The Girl from Tomorrow." He was instantly smitten with a love for live performance.

"It was my first attempt and the response was great," Humphries

Humphries arrived in San Diego during the mid-1990s, having married a local girl. It wasn't long before he began performing solo on the local coffeehouse circuit.

The arrival in town of German keyboard player Wolfgang Grasekamp, saw the formation of The Dave Humphries Band, originally known as Shooting the Breeze.

It was Grasekamp who made the initial connection with Sheridan, having worked with him in Germany. The connection soon saw Sheridan recording locally and Humphries backing him on a series of gigs.

As a Beatles fan Humphries conof The Shadows, but with his love siders the situation a little surreal.

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"There are times when I wonder if I'm dreaming or maybe in the Twilght Zone," he said. "I'll be onstage or in the studio and turn right and it'll hit me."

Though he had some successes in his homeland. Humphries considers his music career to have taken flight when he arrived in

"Gone are the dark days when I would be playing the working men's clubs around the north of England," he said. "You would work vour socks off on your first set, only to hear the concert chairman (MC) say, 'Thank you, lads. And now ladies and gentlemen, the high spot of the evening,

Humphries finds performing an altogether different experience stateside.

"Playing here is a different thing altogether," he said. "It seems as if being a musician is appreciated more, lots of compliments and encouragement and a genuine

interest," Humphries said.

"And So it Goes..." is barely out of the starting gate, but Humphries is already eager to get back in the studio and begin work on a new album. After nearly four decades performing, he feels life may not get any better than it is right now — and that's OK.

"I get to make music and meet loads of really nice people while doing it. Is there anything else I could ask for?" he asked.
