Summer ritual again to draw tens of thousands

t's time to fire up the crockpots and get out those cool chili scoopers. The Ocean Beach Street Fair and Chili Cook-Off returns to Newport Avenue for its 29th year of chili rivalry, artisan booths and live music that attracts tens of thousands of people every year from around the city and the world.

The summertime tradition gets under way Saturday, June 28 from 10 a.m. to 8

Last year's event drew an estimated 70,000 people who strolled down Newport Avenue in an entire day of fun and fanfare, giving local residents and businesses a chance to showcase the community's unique arts and business culture that is Ocean Beach, said Denny Knox, Ocean Beach MainStreet Association's executive direc-

With its seaside lure, the free community event has

grown into a much-anticipated and bustling iconic mainstay from its humble beginnings as a barbecue, a few tables and a couple of bands nearly 30 years ago, Knox said.

"All the hotels fill up with people anxious to come to the event six months in advance," she said. "A lot of people who used to live in Ocean Beach come back."

Funds for NTC Park pool may flow yet

The city appears ready to dip into redevelopment funds so Point Loma families can take a dip of their own — this time into a longawaited public pool at the NTC Park at Liberty Station.

But community members aren't out of the water just yet.

City Council is expected to vote whether to set up a capital improvements fund to start the planning phase on Tuesday, July 8, according to District 2 Councilman Kevin Faulconer.

The action would move \$466,726 from the redevelopment agency into a fund that would be applied toward design of the aquatic center. Combined with a potential donation of between \$5 million and \$6 million from the San Diego Foundation's Hervey Family Fund, the funds would make a

good start toward making the center a reality.

"I've been working with the community and the city and looking forward to [July 8]. It was important to me to cut through the red tape. I'm looking forward to it, looking forward to the process and community outreach," Faulconer said.

Julie Cramer, the community coordinator for Families for a Point Loma Swimming Pool, has spent most of this decade wading through city's red tape trying to get a 50-meter swimming pool and community aquatic center that includes two smaller pools and associated facilities at NTC Park.

Eight years, a city financial crisis, departmental reorganization and three Districty 2 City Council representatives later, it seems the city

New Americans Museum touts richness of immigrant diversity

A tiny museum with weighty offerings opened its doors to the public in Point Loma on Saturday. Seven years after Deborah Szekely founded the New Americans Museum, it finally has a place to call home at the NTC Promenade at Liberty Station.

Intended to be a center to celebrate the contribution that immigrants - that is, new Americans - bring to the United States, the 4,000-square-foot

museum will include a gallery, a learning center and a story booth where visitors can record their own family's immigrant history.

"Our mission is to be a catalyst to celebrate America," said Szekely. "We aim to foster public awareness of the values and strengths that immigration brings to our commonwealth - their new energy, their values, their hard

San Diego Police Department Northern Division Capt. Shelly Zimmerman said an increase in police staffing starts Thursday, July 3 in anticipation of the crowds expected

to descend upon beach communi-

With the no-alcohol and no-

smoking beach laws in effect, Zimmerman said she expects a lot less alcohol-related incidents but that staffing will increase nonetheless.

"We want people to enjoy themselves," she said. "And we ask the public to educate themselves on the



The facility is located within a soundproof vault used by military personnel when the building was part of the NTC Command Center. The soundproof feature may prove valuable during recordings as aircraft leaving Lindbergh Field roar overhead.

Museum officials said there are many reasons why San Diego seems like a fitting location for the New Americans Museum. There are similarly themed museums planned around the world, and one already exists in New York at Ellis Island.

However, there are few other places in the world where so many immigration issues co-exist in one place.

A mere 20 miles south of the door of the New Americans Museum, located at 2825 Dewey Road, is the San Ysidro border crossing — the busiest international crossover spot in the world.

Just to the west of the crossing, in Border Field State Park, a series of stark metal girders rises out of surf and across the beach. It is the start of the controversial border fence that stretches eastward from the Pacific Ocean for miles across San Diego's South County.

At about the same distance from the museum to the east, the casino trade has transformed the look and feel the area's Native American communities.

Standing at the door of the museum, looking across San Diego Bay, one's imagination can conjure up visions of a waterway once overflowing with the great tuna fishing fleets of Portuguese and Italian immigrants.

In more recent years, refugees fleeing from poverty, economics and violence from places that include Somalia, Sudan, Colombia, Southeast Asia, Afghanistan and Iraq have made a fresh start here and now call San Diego

home. While the new facility celebrates the richness and diversity of new Americans, the word "immigration" has become so synonymous with "illegal immigration" that the board of directors voted to leave it out of the museum's name, even though it is part of the associated New **Americans Immigration Museum** and Learning Center, Inc.

She has only been home three or four nonconsecutive days since the show ended but recently returned to have dinner with her husband Todd at The Field in the Gaslamp Quarter. Prior to her newfound celebrity, Smithson worked as a bartender at the Irish pub and restaurant.

"It was a completely different experience," she said, still in awe of her sudden fame. "I couldn't get out. It was very strange to have all these people know who you are and want to talk to you. But it was so nice to see all my friends."

Smithson said that her most 'normal" experience during her visit was hanging out at her husband's tattoo shop, Nothing Sacred, at 4th and Market streets. She also credited her husband for fully supporting her during "American

'The shop is Todd's dream – it's his shop. I helped him get it open, decorated it and supported him, and now he supports me, totally," Smithson beamed. "He's a great husband."

During the show, family and friends are not allowed in the apartments provided by the show, and it was difficult for the Smithsons to be separated from one another.

"It was traumatic because we're joined at the hip," she said.

Once in the finals, life for the contestants literally changed overnight – even when it came to everyday things such as doing laundry.

Cook was politely informed that he wasn't going to have any time to do his own laundry.

"It was very strange for all of us, I think. We never had other people doing our laundry. We all had very normal lives and then we jumped into the 'Idol bubble' and everything changes."

Smithson reported that while they were competing against each other, all the contestants remain friendly.

"We've all become very, very good friends," she said.

What's next, after the tour? Smithson said that she and her husband are presently looking at houses in Ôcean Beach.

"OB is definitely somewhere I would love to settle, maybe more up on the hill. That view up there is ridiculous. It's such a cool place; laidback and chill."

PCPB chair says letter writer seems ill-informed

I read with interest the wild claims and accusations of Mr. Richard Agee ("Objects to leadership changes for PCPB panel," June 12 Beacon, page 6). I have not had the pleasure of meeting Mr. Agee. Moreover, I am unaware of his having attended any meetings of the Airport Authority Subcommittee in the 60 days that I have been on the board [Peninsula Community Planning Board

Be that as it may, he certainly seems to know all about my actions and has a rather one-sided opinion thereof and on how it has impacted (former PCPB Airport Authority Subcommittee chair Lance Murphy).

The first thing that sprung to my mind after reading his letter was that old quote, "He doth protest too much."

So I set about trying to figure out who Richard Agee is. Google turned up some interesting information. His name most frequently crops up with something called the San Diego Coastal Alliance. Never heard of them. Yet, after perusing several of the writings, I learned that Richard Agee claims to be a co-founder SANNoise.org. There's an organization I have heard of.

This is the group, led by the other co-founder Lance Murphy, that is trying to raise money from Peninsula residents to file a lawsuit against the airport. This would be the same Lance Murphy that recently failed in his attempt to be elected to the PCPB.

Clearly, Mr. Agee is upset with the recent failings of his friend at the ballot box. I invite Mr. Agee to come to a meeting of the PCPB. If his time permits, he is also welcome at the next meeting of the Airport Authority Subcommittee. Both of these forums will continue to bring the facts forward on what is happening at our airport. There is no spin and we are not fundraising.

Albert I. Decker, 83, longtime Point Loman


Albert (Bert) Ingersoll Decker, 83, passed away on May 28, 2008, after being diagnosed with pancreatic cancer in March. He was a long-time resident of Point Loma.

Bert was born in San Diego on Aug. 17, 1924, to Benton Weaver and Edwina Naylor Decker. He attended schools in Annapolis and San Diego, including one year at Point Loma High School. After graduating from Annapolis High, Bert spent a year at Severn School to prepare for entrance into the U.S. Naval Academy. He earned a B.S. in engineering from the Navy in only three years, as his class of 1946 (18th Company) was graduated in 1945 so they could go to

From 1945 to 1958, Bert was on active duty with the U.S. Navy. He and his brother, Ben, were fifth-generation naval officers, continuing a family tradition that began when their great-greatgrandfather, William Augustus Weaver, joined the new U.S. Navy in 1811.

Bert served on the USS Iowa, Astoria, Partridge, Purvis and Fessenden. He spent much of his duty in the South Pacific and North Atlantic. He also taught chemistry at the U.S. Naval Academy from 1950 to 1952. In the late 1950s, he coordinated public relations activities in San Diego for the Navy and was especially involved with the International House Association, which hosted foreign officer visitors.

In 1959, Bert began his second career as a math and science teacher. He earned his teaching credential and master's degree

from San Diego State College and taught for 26 years in the San Diego City Schools. He taught at Dana, Roosevelt and Wilson junior high schools; at Hoover, San Diego, Kearny, Point Loma and Morse high schools; and Midway Adult School. He loved attending football games at Morse High.

1959 was a surreal, bittersweet vear: he started his new career: his family moved to their Point Loma home; his second daughter, Jenny, was born; and his beloved brother, Ben, was killed when the Navy plane Ben was piloting crashed into the Inland Sea of Japan. Ben died on May 28, 1959, exactly 49 years to the day before Bert died.

Bert retired from the Navy Reserve as a commander in 1975 and from the San Diego City Schools in 1985. As a retiree, he became an ardent community activist.

He served on the Peninsula Community Planning Board, North Bay Redevelopment PAC and Save Our NTC board. He was involved with Friends of Famosa Slough, Save Dana (Jr. High), and San Diego Coastal Alliance; and he worked to prevent the installation of parking meters on Shelter Island.

He was program director for the Shelter Island Rotary, Presidio Optimist, and Point Loma Clipper Club. He was passionate about preserving San Diego's quality of life, history and military heritage. He opposed giving away public lands to private developers.

Bert's hobbies included international travel, discussing World War II, current politics and family camping.

He will be greatly missed by all of those whose lives were touched by his good-heartedness and helpful spirit.

Bert is survived by his wife of 51 years, Dona; five children: Jib Davidson, Mary Decker, Jennifer Decker Hiller, Ben Decker and Carol Decker Vallejo; and nine grandchildren. Interment will be June 27 at Fort Rosecrans National Cemetery.

A memorial service will be held June 28, 2 p.m. at Point Loma Presbyterian Church, 2128 Chatsworth Blvd. A reception will follow. Donations to the American Cancer Society or Disabled American Veterans are welcome.

Hands-free phone law takes hold July 1

The state's new "hand's-free" cell phone laws will take effect Monday, July 1, which will prohibit all drivers from using a handheld wireless phone while operating a motor vehicle.

However, drivers 18 and older can use hands-free device. It will be illegal for all drivers 16 and 17 years old from using either a cell phone or hands-free device while behind the wheel.

The San Diego Police Department is allowing a 30-day grace period and will begin issuing citations on violations beginning Aug. 1, but other law enforcement agencies, such as the California Highway Patrol or sheriffs could possibly issue tickets for drivers using cell phones.

The penalty will be \$97 for the first offense and \$211 for the sec-

Cramer also thanked the Hervey family for the potential contribution of \$5 million to \$6 million — a hope that has kept the project afloat through the years, she said.

She also thanked District 2 council staff for their work and Faulconer's leadership role.

Though Cramer and others in the community worked for years to get a community pool, the city

has had a hard time getting it ing, which was about \$250,000 per

In 2003, a City Council vote scratched plans for a pond and requested that city staff and the Corky McMillin Cos., the lead contractor for NTC Park, come to an agreement on how much money to set aside for the design of the aquatic center.

Many residents in the community didn't want the pond feature for many reasons, including safety concerns, Cramer said.

McMillin officials were never obligated to help fund an aquatic center at NTC Park because the money for the center was never earmarked in the original budget-

acre set back in 1998, said Kimberly Elliot, senior vice president for McMillin.

A unanimous City Council vote in May shifted \$466,726 in redevelopment agency funds to pay for the planning and design of the aquatics center. Now, officials need to set up the funding mechanism to actually start it.

Phase II of NTC Park's construction would complete the remainder of the park and is made up of 28 acres of landscape, two large picnic tables, two restrooms, a playground for toddlers and the restoration of historic artillery guns. If pool advocates get their way, the plans will also include a Point Loma Community Aquatic

The total cost of the park has gone up from about \$15 million to just under \$17 million because of rising construction costs, according to city officials.

McMillin pays for the construction of the park up front and the city reimburses the company from taxes levied on local residents and businesses, said Elliott.

Now that it seems all the city's ducks are aligning in a row over the pool, only a "no" vote from the City Council would stop this part of the project.

NTC Park project manager Libby Day said the redevelopment agency is ready to pour money from the redevelopment agency into a capital improvements fund.

"We just want to give them the money so they can get started," she said.

In other PCPB news:

• Airport Authority representative Ted Anasis reported to the board on the San Diego International Airport Master Plan Report on Mitigation Procedures concerning the ultimate buildout of Lindbergh Field.

According to the report, effects on the environment, traffic, air quality, human health risks from gases, historic and cultural resources associated with airport land use and impacts on endangered and threatened species all remain significant even after mitigation.



Additional officers along with SDPD traffic division will also be monitoring beach-area clubs and bars throughout the weekend and monitoring parking lots.

The police department also works with lifeguards to monitor beach safety.

In addition to ramped-up police department staffing, other community members will be working to remind visitors to keep the beach

Danielle Miller, spokeswoman for San Diego Coastkeeper, said the organization will be posting signs and posters in local hotels, along the beaches and near shores reminding people to pick up after themselves.

San Diego Coastkeeper will also place an extra 150 trash and recycling receptacles along the city's beaches and bays.

"We want to make it at easy as possible [because] the last thing people think about is where to throw away their trash," Miller said.

San Diego Coastkeeper also works with employees and volunteers of I Love a Clean San Diego, Freepb.org, and the San Diego Chapter of Surfrider Foundation for beach clean-ups.

The event is dubbed the "Morning After Mess." Volunteers will be hitting the sands from 8 a.m. to 11 a.m. on Saturday, July 5, Miller said. The group is also promoting a clean-up Monday July 7, from 9 a.m. to noon at Belmont Park in Mission Beach. Volunteers will be provided with clean-up supplies, according to the group's website.

This is the first year various nonprofit groups have come together under the name San Diego Clean Beach Coalition and have teamed up to increase awareness about beach pollution and prevention.

According to a statement from San Diego Coastkeeper, the following is not allowed on the beaches and bays this year:

- •Alcoholic beverages are prohibited in beach and park areas.
- Glass bottles and glass containers are not allowed at any time in the beach and park area.
- Smoking is prohibited in all beach and park areas within the City of San Diego.
- Fiesta Island, Dog Beach and Dusty Rhodes Park are designated dog areas that are leash-free.
- Dogs are not permitted within Mission Bay Park and the beach areas April 1 to Oct. 31 from 9 a.m.

to 6 p.m. Dogs must be leashed at

- Fires are permitted in city-designated fire rings between 5 a.m. to midnight only.
- Fires cannot exceed 12 inches above the fire ring.
- Clean dry wood or charcoal only. No pallets, painted wood, greenery, nails or furniture are allowed in the fire rings.
- Camping and overnight sleeping are not permitted in the beach

or park area.

- Parking lots are closed at night between 10 p.m. to 4 a.m. and 2 a.m to 4 a.m. Read and obey the posted signs.
- Parking spaces cannot be blocked off and/or saved; all parking spaces are first come, first served.
- Each vehicle is allowed only one stall and must fit within the stall at all times.

Craves Cafe serves elaborate menu

"We're striving to be healthful" says Dave Martin, owner of Craves Café located at 4953 Newport Avenue in Ocean Beach. Martin's restaurant serves an elaborate menu of healthy salads, sandwiches, paninis, and lavashes. As well as delicious, healthy food, Craves has a new line of retail items with either a local, organic, or heartfelt cause at its core.

Martin has been in the restaurant business for 30 years but with Craves he decided to start his menu from scratch. He got "sick and tired of fast food" so he uses whole grains, fresh vegetables, and olive oil to create what he calls "the most emotional menu in Ocean Beach". When you order the "Joy" salad and the "Courage" sandwich, you understand the theme. The bread, cookies, and sangria are all homemade and all of the food is packaged in paper, both washable for reuse and "blue bin friendly".

Craves also has a small retail line that includes organic mints and candies, locally made Jackie's Jams, and hand packaged items from the Women's Bean Project. The Women's Bean Project is a socially conscious organization that strives to break the cycle of chronic unemployment and poverty by offering job readiness training and developing employment skills for women who need training to enter the traditional work force. These women are learning the basic skills needed to support themselves and their families. Women's Bean Project items include soup, cornbread and dip mixes, spice rubs, and teas. Each item has a tag signed by the woman who packaged it.

Not only does Craves support the environment and local manufacturers, the restaurant also supports local events such as Newport Nights. Their featured artist is San Diego resident Patrick Kennedy, the self-proclaimed "neo constructivist", whose work is currently displayed on the east and west walls of the dining room.

Although the menu certainly has that healthy, hippy, OB feel, the portions at Craves are surprisingly large and filling. Even if you're the type that craves a greasy burger on occasion, you won't feel like you are skimping to be healthy at Craves. "If you want to get fat and get a coronary, then go to Shades", says Dave Martin. (Martin also owns Shades Oceanfront Bistro located on Santa Monica Ave.)





St.; and the Surf 'n' Sea Custom Wetsuits, 1874 Bacon St., in previous years.

Goodbye to a Good Friend

Richard Donald James, 61, of Ocean Beach, passed away Sunday night, April 27, 2008. He was an artist, businessman, community activist, world-traveler and irreplaceable friend to many.



Rich was the smiling guy in the "Dolphinmobile," his 1965 Chevy convertible featuring hand-painted dolphins. Locals might remember seeing him transporting his

beloved dog Buddy, and Buddy's doggy friends for their daily workout at Dog Beach.

Rich served in the U.S. Navy along with his brother, Ron, and his dad during the Vietnam War. After an honorable discharge, he enrolled in Chico State University where he earned a degree in graphic design.

In the early 1970s, Rich and his brothers settled into Ocean Beach. In 1980, they started the James Gang, a T-shirt screen-printing company that grew rapidly and soon expanded into a small chain of beach-apparel retail stores around San Diego and in Redding.

The James Gang became active in the OB community, where Rich and his brothers played significant roles in launching the annual Fourth of July Festival and the Ocean Beach Christmas Tree Festival and Parade.

In addition to his many contributions to his beloved community, Rich created and designed the ocean-themed community murals seen around town. The first mural went up in 1999 as a result of Rich's vision to beautify Ocean Beach and instill a sense of community pride through his art.

A true community effort, artists of all types gather to paint the individual mosaic-type squares that Rich designed. After each street fair, Rich and his friends would install the mural for all to enjoy. The mural gets hung on the wall of a locally owned business eager to display their community pride.

Although Rich worked meticulously on his mural designs, he delighted in the fact that anyone and everyone would recreate his work. "Young kids, moms, dads, old and young, they all come out to paint," said Rich. "It's really a lot of fun."

This year, since his sad passing, some of Rich's closest friends volunteered to carry on his mural legacy. Help us pay tribute to this incredible member of our community by taking part in the Rich James Memorial mural of 2008.





This year's community mural will be in tribute to Ocean Beach icon Rich James, who passed away earlier this year. James, who is credited with founding the community mural in conjunction with the OB Street Fair and Chili Cook-Off, also helped found the annual Christmas Tree Festival and Parade. In tribute to James, local muralist Janis Ambrosiani is designing this year's mural. She said anyone can purchase a section of the mural to paint for \$5.

Composting Made Easy

By Jay North

Composting is the simple act of recycling and it's as easy to do as taking out the garbage! Not everyone wants to grow their own garden; not everyone CAN grow their own food. But everyone can seek out organically grown products at the grocer. Those of us who do garden, or farm, know the pure joy of growing one's own food and the pleasure of beautiful landscapes that we've created for ourselves, not to mention the exercise and extra vitamins we get from the sun. Composting is an important ingredient to a successful organic garden and is done by simply creating a box or a space for table scraps of vegetables and fruits and adding whatever you can find in the neighborhood to add nutrients. If you live near where livestock in raised, sold, bred or kept, ask the owner of the property if you can collect some of the manure. Cows, horses, chickens, pigeons, doves, rabbits, and pigs all create material tailor-made for your compost heap, even your morning coffee grounds are great material for your compost bin; as is your fall leaf droppings. Add all the organic matter you can to your compost bin.

- Here are a few tips for composting: 1 Yes, it smells and attracts flies. By hanging a non-toxic pest strips nearby, you can reduce
- infestation of pest, and once compost breaks down, pests are no longer a major problem. Be sure to place your compost bin as far away from the house as possible. Or if you live in an apartment and just want to start composting, do it under the kitchen sink. Latter us your composted
- materials for house plants--indoors 3 Turn the material in your compost bin to allow for air circulation and to heat what may be too
- low or too high in the bin to break down quickly. 4 Building the bin is easily done with recycled chain link fence, wooden pallets, or a plastic bar-5 If you must, you can purchase ready-made organic compost such as Bumper Crop from your
- local garden shop. Whether you buy it or make it yourself, add compost to your garden area in spring and winter. Works very well to feed indoor plants to. When you add the compost also consider adding decomposing pine needles, straw, wood chips, fish guts, fallen leaves, fireplace ashes and decomposed seaweed. Many of these contain
- essential minerals that actually create the flavor of the foods, or add color to the pretty things that 7 Large-scale growers should first gather all the free compost materials possible, then seek low cost items next.

I remember when living near the polo fields in Santa Barbara, California. The management there was always happy to see our truck leave every week with a fresh load from the horse stalls. You will be surprised how people will help you, by providing composting materials, if you ask. The circle of life begins by feeding the earth. I hope you remember to give Mother Earth what she craves - the natural goodness from compost--and she will continue to supply you in return.




