Beautification project wiped out by overwatering

Daily over-irrigation of nearby residential lawns causes an untold amount of damage to Pacific Beach streets. And damage to the intersection at Garnet Avenue and Cass Street could cost the city possibly hundreds of thousands of dollars to repair well before a street's approximate 20-year life span is up.

Take a stroll down Garnet Avenue and have a look for yourself.

Nearly every morning a pool of water collects at the intersection where passing cars and buses slosh through the water causing extensive erosion to a once-decorative brick crosswalk, which was laid in 2000. The yellow sea stars and other marine life silhouetted against the blue

barely noticeable.

The city has plans to fix part of the intersection by late July to prevent the puddles, according to city officials.

The \$40,000 beautification project sprouted from local community members' desire to brighten-up their neighborhood. The streetscape plan included other projects such planting trees along the street meant to give Pacific Beach a fresh look.

Now, almost eight years later, all that's left of the project are some faded splashes of the yellow sea stars on eroded, rocky asphalt.

Large delivery trucks stunted the growth of the trees along the sidewalk, whacking the branches as they drove

colored asphalt are so eroded they're passed, Benjamin Nicholls, executive director of Discover Pacific Beach said.

"It was a good program," Nicholls said, "it just wasn't thought through well

The Pacific Beach Business Improvement Association, now called Discover Pacific Beach, started the master plan beautification in the late 1990s with a series of community meetings and an extensive design process that lasted a few years.

Nicholls, who was not part of the group at the time, said the organization has since looked at redoing the intersection about four years ago, but added that it would have probably been a waste of

Valdez pitches a perfect game in 13-0 win over **Clairemont**

Mission Bay senior Francisco Valdez stepped up to the pre-season rankings as one of the top pitchers in the county Wednesday, April 23, when he threw a perfect game while the Bucs defeated Clairemont High 13-0.

The win pushed the Buccaneers to the top of the Western League with a 5-1 team record.

"It was my goal this year to throw (a perfect game)," Valdez said. "When I looked at the scoreboard in the 5th inning, I began to bear-down — I felt we could make it happen.'

A perfect game (in a high school 7-inning game) is 21 up and 21 down; no hits, no walks, no hit bat-

In Mission Bay High's 54-year history of premier baseball success, no player has pitched a perfect game, until now.

"By the fourth inning I looked at the other coaches and we knew he was rolling along nicely," said head coach Greg Farrar. "Francisco is a bulldog he is a competitor, he wants the ball. He was in control and got the job done."

In addition to his command of the plate, Valdez has able to rely on his pick-off moves to control games this season.

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Man pleads guilty to threatening seal activist SDN EWS COM

A La Jolla man pleaded guilty April 17 to threatening a seal Children's Pool. The threat occurred in an explicit e-mail to a volunteer of the Animal Protection and Rescue League, which monitors contact between people and harbor seals at the tourist attraction.

face a maximum term of 10 years in federal prison, but such a long sentence is unlikely, said his attorney, Mark Adams. The federal guideline range for such a crime is between 10 and 16 months, but the U.S. Attorney's Office is expected to recommend five months in custody plus additional time in a halfway house on probation, Adams said on Friday, April 18.

Following the guilty plea, Adams asked U.S. District Court Magistrate Louisa Porter to release Trego on bail, but she denied his request. Porter earlier ordered Trego to remain in the Metropolitan Correctional Center without bail in light of death threats that were e-mailed to the unnamed activist

The incident reflects the ongoing controversy at Children's Pool himself "Biker Bobbie," Trego

who say the beach should be used for children and not seals. People have walked on the beach and activist who videotaped divers at appear to be taunting the activists as well as the seals.

Sentencing is set for July 7. The activist videotaped Trego with two scuba divers who appeared to be disturbing the seals on Sept. 22, 2007. Misdemeanor charges were later filed against the divers, and Kent Douglas Trego, 54, could the activist was considered a federal witness. Trego pleaded guilty to threatening a federal witness. Two other counts of transmitting threats in interstate commerce will be dismissed.

> Trego remained on the beach when the two divers went into the water, which caused approximately 18 of the 50 harbor seals to rush into the water, according to the U.S. Attorney's Office. The activist also videotaped the license plate of the vehicle in which the divers arrived. Trego and the activist exchanged words, and the activist reported it to federal law enforcement agents of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

Trego used a public computer at the Riford Library in La Jolla on Jan. 12 to send a threatening message to the activist. Calling

between seal activists and others sent the death threat and created an e-mail account called deathtosealwatch@vahoo.com.

> The threat claimed the divers had friends in motorcycle clubs and told the activist she "will be dealt with very harshly, if not killed."

The threat continued, "She has brought this on herself."

No physical harm ever occurred to the activist, who reported the threat to authorities. Trego was indicted by a federal grand jury on March 4 and was arrested March

Adams said his client has no criminal history. Trego, who is unemployed, spent a lot of time at Children's Pool, something the magistrate said she considered when she denied bail for him. Porter said she did not want him to return to the beach and interact with the activist or others he may have threatened.

The Children's Pool was originally created in the 1930s as a shallow wading area for children, when philanthropist Ellen Browning Scripps paid for construction of the seawall.

There are health warning signs that say the beach and water has high fecal contamination by the seals, which are protected by fed-

He started his career in Florida as a member of the marketing team that opened Walt Disney World.

Ed died on April 25 of complications arising from his almost fiveyear courageous battle with pancreatic cancer. "He just didn't want to leave his wife Robin, and two children, Sam, 11, and Marin, 9," said his oldest brother Peter. "At the end of a long conversation late last year bragging about the academic and athletic accomplishments of Sam and Marin, and almost as an

afterthought, Ed mentioned his induction into the Florida Tourism Hall of Fame. He was a humble person who always managed to deflect praise."

Ed was Anheuser-Busch's corporate vice president for marketing alliances and synergy, joining the company in 1990 as vice president of marketing at SeaWorld Orlando.

Ed served as the vice president of marketing for SeaWorld San Diego from 2000 to 2007. He was responsible for the planning, coordination and implementation of all marketing programs for SeaWorld San Diego, which includes advertising, sales, promotions, public relations and new product development.

"Ed had a great insight, an intuition, about consumers and their behavior," said Andy Fichthorn, executive vice president and general manager of SeaWorld San Diego. "His ability to make connections with people made him not only a great marketer and leader of people but also a trusted colleague and friend to many at SeaWorld and throughout the tourism industry."

Before joining SeaWorld Orlando in 1990, Ed was director of tourism for the state of Florida under then Secretary of Commerce Jeb Bush.

His extensive marketing and tourism background also includes serving as director of United States marketing for Expo '86 in Vancouver, British Columbia; director of professional staffing for the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics.

Ed has served as chairman of the National Council of State Travel Directors International Committee, vice chairman of Travel South USA. vice chair of the State of Florida Commission on Tourism. He has also been a board member of the Florida Special Olympics.

He was selected as an "Outstanding Alumni" from the University of Wisconsin, Whitewater and received his bachelor's of arts degree in liberal arts. Ed graduated from Horlick High School in Racine, Wisconsin.

Ed is survived by his wife, Robin and children Sam and Marin; son Mark from a previous marriage; and two brothers, Peter of Coronado and David of Racine, Wis. A memorial service is scheduled for 10 a.m. Monday, May 5 at SeaWorld San Diego. In lieu of flowers, the family requests donations to the Hirschberg Foundation for Pancreatic Cancer Research in his name. Private family services are yet to be scheduled.

At a cost of up to \$600,000 a mile to resurface a street, next year's proposed budget plans to resurface, or overlay, about 80 miles of street, according to city officials. District 2, which includes, will see about 28 miles of newly overlaid streets next

The cheaper, thinner-coated, slurry-seal costs about \$100,000 a mile. The city has plans to slurry seal about 133 miles of streets citywide, next year as well, said David Jarrell, deputy chief of Public Works for the mayor's office.

Whether a street gets slurrysealed or scraped and overlaid depends on the condition of the pavement. If it's real bad it gets overlaid, he said.

But as for the problem intersection at Garnet Avenue and Cass Street, Jarrell said the city plans to remove part of the street and repave it so it drains properly. That project is calculated separately and may cost about \$15,000 to \$20,000, he said.

"That work is going to be done by the end of July [2008]. So, sometime within the next 90 days." Jarrell said.

The streets become so worn for two reasons, he said. Either thev weren't maintained properly over the years, or they simply out last their useful service life, which is about 17 to 20 years, he said.

Although a city ordinance targeting overwatering exists, the city relies mainly on public education campaigns to aid prevention rather than handing out citations, Jarrell said.

"We do it through education, because somebody is spending money on water that's really only spraying into the street and not for tips on runoff prevention.







2008 Red Bull races are up in the air

One victory does not a title season make, but acrobatic pilot Paul Bonhomme's dominating performance in March at Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates, is a great start.

The British Airways 747 pilot is setting his sights on the Red Bull Air Races, which he won last year, over San Diego Bay on Saturday and Sunday, May 3 and 4, at 1 p.m. He'll face a multitalented 11 other pilots, including 2007 champion Mike Mangold of the United

It would appear Bonhomme set a standard last year, but he missed topping Mangold for the title by a fraction of a second. Each had finished with 47 points, so officials had to go to the clocks to determine the titleholder.

As for Bonhomme's Abu Dhabi performance, he won by 6 and 7 seconds in the semifinal and title run-off against Austria's Hannes

Bonhomme revealed that he made some secretive adjustments to his plane over the winter. He declined to reveal details, but he said his team put "a lot of thought and effort" into getting the setup right for each track.

Others in the field include Americans Kirby Chamblis (2006 champ) and Michael Goulian; Britons Steve Jones and Nigel Lamb; Nicolas Ivanoff of France; Alejandro Maclean of Spain; newcomer Glen Dell of South Africa; Peter Besenyei of Hungary and Serge Rakhmann of Russia.

The action will take place between Embarcadero Park and Coronado Island. Last year, an estimated 50,000 watched the

on Sunday evenings on Fox Sports Network starting in July.

Inflatable pylons, or air gates, define the course, a creative and complex feat of engineering by Austrian designer Martin Jehart and the team at Bellutti, an Innsbruck-based firm. The company uses a spinnaker rip-stop nylon, an extremely lightweight and flexible material normally used to make sails for boats.

Preceding the air races May 3 at 10:30 a.m. is the Sea & Air Parade, the kickoff event for Fleet Week San Diego, with six Navy warships passing in view on San Diego Bay.

The parade is one of 20 yearly programs mounted in tribute to the military. They include a Baseball Classic, scheduled this year

races. Each race will be broadcast for Aug. 25, the Star-Spangled Salute Sept. 20, the Coronado Speed Festival Sept. 27 and 28 and the Miramar Air Show Oct. 3 through 5.

Event officials said the parade warships include one cruiser, a frigate, two destroyers and two amphibious ships. Additionally, two Tall Ships, the Californian and the HMS Surprise, will engage in a mock gun battle.

The ships will sail from Point Loma through the bay, with the show's center between the USS Midway and Seaport Village.

Show officials encourage spectators to view the parade from Harbor Island for the best view. Eventgoers can also see the action in Coronado from the Ferry Landing, SDG&E Park and Centennial Park. Parking is limited.

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
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Even with 22 innings, Pads still couldn't pull off the win

Fans attending the San Diego Padres' April 17 contest against the Colorado Rockies at Petco Park got free baseball – for 13 innings. The Padres lost 2–1 to the Rockies in the 22-inning affair that ended at 1:21 a.m. the next morning.

"If they came to see baseball," said Petco Park general manager Richard Andersen, "they got their money's worth that night."

The game was the longest in Major League Baseball since 1993—also a 22-inning affair in which the Minnesota Twins beat the Cleveland Indians 5–4—and marked the most innings in a game in Padres history. While this uncharted territory yielded a rare and exciting experience for fans, it also created unique challenges for various facets of normal game-day operations.

By the end of the game, only hundreds of the original 25,984 in attendance remained. Most had moved to the lower seating bowl of the ballpark.

"It was 1 a.m., and there's people chanting, and I'm sure they've got work or school the next morning," said Padres radio announcer Ted Leitner. "But they entertained me—the fans entertained me rather than the other way around, because I thought they were the ones that made it a show more so than the game."

Those fans sprinkled across the park after midnight created a festive atmosphere. Padres director of entertainment and production Erik Meyer said the in-game entertainment fed off this.

"The people that are there that are left are so into the game and so into the crowd shots that they end up being some of our best crowd shots," Meyer said, "because they're having so much fun dancing to the music we're playing, or even being quite loud."

One of the most memorable moments of the game was the 21st-inning stretch, the contest's third rendition of "Take Me Out to the Ballgame."

The announcer on the public address system tagged the final version, which followed stretches in the seventh and 14th innings, as ultra-rare.

"The 21st-inning stretch was definitely needed, because fans weren't getting out of their seats and stretching their legs for the purpose of cheering for either team," said Gen Salter, 21, who attended the game with co-workers.

Although alcohol sales stopped after the seventh inning, three concessions stands in the ballpark remained open for the entire game. This meant those left in the stands did not go hungry or without caffeine

Some new bodies filled the left field upper reserved seats in the later innings — the maintenance crew. The staff sat in their bright yellow uniforms waiting for the game to end, although their shifts had already started.

"That was a night where people that were here and on the clock got paid to wait," Andersen said, "until it was time to do what they were

supposed to do."

Andersen said the complete cleaning process usually takes four hours. Including a minimum halfhour wait to clear the building, this means the crew did not clock out until around 6 a.m. Friday morning.

Fans that stayed for the entire game were still able use mass transit to get home on Friday morning. MTS media and communications specialist Luis Gonzalez said Blue Line services ran every 15 minutes until 1:54 a.m., orange line services ran regularly until 2:01 a.m. and the last special event line train from downtown to Santee left at 1:46 a.m. Each of those final departure times was two hours later than those on a regular evening.

As for the game itself, the Padres and Rockies remained scoreless through the first 13 innings. In the bottom of the 13th, the Friars lost what appeared to be their best chance to break the scoreless tie.

Left fielder Paul McAnulty led off with a double but was thrown out trying to advance to third base. Leitner said that out was the play he remembers most from the game.

Although he alternated with Andy Masur on XX Sports Radio's broadcast, Leitner called 15 innings of the game, the most he had done since at 20-inning game in 1980. Despite that, Leitner's voice was intact.

"It wasn't sore," he said. "It was just raspy from talking so much."

In the top of the 14th, the scoreless tie was broken as Padres reliever Kevin Cameron issued a bases-loaded walk that scored Rockies centerfielder Willy Taveras. In the bottom half of the inning, the Padres responded in the form of an RBI single from catcher Josh Bard. Bard's single tied the game 1-1 and it meant more baseball.
