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July 4th beer flotilla sails by beach ban

With inflatable inner tubes and rafts in tow, a group of an estimated 200 friends trekked to the edge of Mission Bay and cast off. They floated peaceably in the water on the Fourth of July, and enjoyed a beer while doing it.

Brad Boyle, a Pacific Beach resident and organizer of the floating party, said the peaceful gathering should motivate City Council to consider a partial ban on alcohol on major holidays instead of a permanent ban on alcohol at the city's beaches and

Boyle, an informational technology engineer for Qualcomm, said the event was not a protest against the beach ban.

DA says man deliberately swerved before fatal crash

Prosecutor says driver wanted to scare his friend in back of his truck

The driver of a pickup truck that crashed into a tree in Pacific Beach and killed the man illegally riding in the truck's bed was driving erratically while drunk and deliberately swerved on the road to scare the passenger, a prosecutor said.

After hearing from four passengers in the truck, San Diego Superior Court Judge David Gill on July 9 ordered Quinton Lamar Dickens, 25, to stand trial for gross vehicular manslaughter while intoxicated and for causing great bodily injuries to the passengers, who suffered broken bones.

Dickens, of El Cajon, is accused of causing the death of Nikko Maeva, 19, of Mira Mesa, who suffered blunt force trauma on April 8 at 2:32 a.m. when the Dodge Ram pickup struck a tree on Lamont Street near Thomas Avenue. It was estimated that Dickens was driving at approximately 58 mph when the speed limit is 30 mph.

During the 1 1/2 day preliminary hearing, Gill heard testimony that the group was drinking beer and rum at a bonfire at Ski Beach. Gill noted that one person said Dickens was "the least drunk" among them, and it was his truck, so he drove the group that night. Dickens had four passengers inside the truck and Maeva was in the back, for a total of six occupants in the vehicle.

Deputy District Attorney James Simmons told the judge the death resulted from a combination of drinking, Dickens deliberately Maeva and Dickens allowing a injured, and his blood/alcohol passenger in the bed of the truck.

"He did an act that is dangerous to life," Simmons said.

Dickens' attorney, Robert Ford, contends his client says another vehicle was behind him and struck him and left the scene of the accident.

Simmons responded by saying, There's no physical evidence the truck was struck by another vehicle," and noted the passengers did not testify about any other car.

San Diego police officers and accident scene reconstruction experts testified about the path of skid marks and tire treads and

damages to the truck and tree. Despite the defendant's claim, they said there was no evidence of another vehicle being involved.

Maeva apparently stood up during the drive, according to testimony. Ford said the group sang loudly to songs on the radio.

"All the people were particularly lit up," Ford said.

"They were all close friends and devastated by the death," said the

The prosecutor amended the charges during the hearing to include allegations the passengers suffered great bodily injuries, which included fractures to ribs, swerving the truck to scare backs and legs. Dickens was also level was .12 about 1 1/2 hours after the incident, according to testimony.

If convicted of all charges, Dickens faces a maximum sentence of 24 years in state prison. At the end of the hearing, Dickens pleaded not guilty to all charges and Gill set a trial date for Aug. 28.

Ford said some of the passengers are getting attorneys to represent them so they can sue Dickens for damages.

"It's a sad case. Somebody died," he added.

Dickens remains free on \$100,000 bond.

Concerts have fans dancing in the green

Georgina Smith grew up with the music of The Beatles in her native England and met singer Tom Jones long before he had his own TV show or grabbed a microphone on the Las Vegas stage.

Mark Johnston's lifelong love of music began when he was a boy in Alaska, and expanded to include playing 13 instruments, including his current favorites, the mandolin and saxophone.

Just as there's a story behind every song, there are caring citizens behind every community concert. Smith and Johnston organize the free Pacific Beach Concerts on the Green in Kate Sessions Park at Lamont Street iust north of Beryl Avenue, presented by the Pacific Beach Town Council and the Pacific Beach Community Foundation. The pair is now in their sixth year of planning the annual concert series, combining their special event skills, love of music and support for the community. The concert series and its organizers encourage families to bring their blankets, chairs and picnics to the park on summer Sundays, July 20 through Aug. 10, from 4 p.m. to 6:30 p.m.

Marveling at how the crowds fill the park with each concert, Smith, the concerts committee chair, remembers the Pacific Beach of 1969.

"It was a quiet little beach town," she said. "Garnet Avenue would close up after six at night." A community volunteer for many years, Smith said she became involved with the concert series when Byron Wear, then San Diego City Councilman for District 2, sug-

gested revitalizing a program that had begun as one military band concert per summer. Smith stepped forward to coordinate the new concert series and is its biggest fan.

"It's a really good family event, and very successful," she said. "It gives me great joy because it's for the community. I can't wait!"

Now in its sixth year, the concert series doesn't require the planning time that it used to, according to Smith. She starts working on it in January and devotes much of her efforts to recruiting sponsors.

Smith credits Mark Johnston, the band coordinator, with helping to make the shows so successful. Johnston is also the event coordinator at Rose Creek Cottage, 2525 Garnet Ave. He has been a Pacific Beach resident for 20 years and said he has known Smith

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

"While working in conjunction with the city officials, we were able to prove that a group of people with alcohol could maintain our right to assemble peacefully and abide by the law without being subjected to a generalization that we are going to be a problem," Boyle said.

the beach involving a crowd drew riot police to Reed Street. It resulted in the arrest of about 15 people.

The fight spurred Councilman Kevin Faulconer to support a oneyear trial ban on alcohol at the city's beaches and bays. City Council adopted the law with a 6-1-1 vote in November.

Since December, consuming alcohol on the sand of the city's beaches and bays has been illegal.

It is legal, however, to have an open beer on a floating vessel or boat as long as the driver is sober, according to San Diego lifeguards.

Lifeguards also pointed out that inner tubes and flotation devices don't always count as vessels.

"A surfboard is not a boat. An inner tube is not a boat. But when you get into a raft, then the boating law starts to apply," said lifeguard Lt. Andy Lerum.

While the group of floaters may Last year's Labor Day fight on have skirted around the beach booze ban, lifeguards and police do not recommend drinking while boating, swimming and, in this case, floating or rafting.

"Our concern was that people under the influence [of alcohol] could be in jeopardy of drowning, Lerum said. "You could call it what ever you want, it's not a good idea to drink and swim."

Though nobody drowned or was hurt floating on the Fourth, there

were no drinking citations handed

Police did order people off nearby boats in Sail Bay considered too full to be safe, Lerum said. He added that boats overloaded with people would not have enough lifejackets for everyone as required by law.

Also, nobody is allowed to build a pier, float or wharf in Mission Bay unless approved by the city, he said

Between extra lifeguards and the San Diego Police Department's Harbor Unit patrolling Mission Bay, the Fourth of July celebrations at Sail Bay went without any big problems, Northern Division Police Capt. Shelley Zimmerman said.

The main goal is making sure everybody is safe," she said.

Police also did not cite anybody for drinking while floating because no one caused any problems, police said.

Bothered by graffiti, gum on the sidewalk and other eyesores blighting the beaches, boardwalk and streets of the seaside community, Hall formed and acts as chairperson of the Safe and Beautiful Committee. The subcommittee of the Pacific Beach Town Council (PBTC) holds monthly cleanup events and is also working on longer-term beautification projects like painting area utility boxes with picturesque murals and enlisting the help to paint over graffiti tags.

"That's an ambitious project, but hopefully we can do it without getting punched in the nose," Hall joked.

His ambition and determination to improve the community have earned him citywide recognition. Two years ago, he received the Channel 10 News Leadership Award for his work on the wordmurals project at Pacific Beach Middle School.

Hall also has numerous local supporters.

"Jerry Hall is an enthusiastic, dedicated volunteer and community member and it's been a pleasure to work with someone so sincere about improving the quality of life in Pacific Beach the past two years," PBTC president Ruby Houck said.

Hall's enthusiasm, perhaps his most defining trait, can be a curse as often as it is a blessing. And he is not without critics.

After being named Outstanding Volunteer of the Year, he said he was asked to step down from Dis-

directors after serving 90 days. Hall said that though the board gave him a standing ovation after presenting his ambitious business plans, they advised him to address one topic at a time.

"Pacific Beach is not a one-thingat-a-time community," Hall said.

Acknowledging that he can be scattered, Hall said his seemingly boundless energy results from a sincere desire to improve the community he loves.

"I'm seen by some as a real pain, but when you look at my intentions and outcomes and the spirit of the work, I'm trying to build a unified community," he said.

That process is often frustrating to Hall and puts him in unfamiliar territory.

"As an entrepreneur, you have cover Pacific Beach's board of to make decisions immediately,"

he said. A self-employed designer of business websites, Hall's profession allows, in fact demands, that he act quickly and fluidly.

Pushing a community plan through the proper hoops and putting it in action, however, can take months, if not years.

"There is a certain bureaucracy to it," Hall said. "You have to take time to learn the game."

He took a crash course, becoming one of the community's most visible volunteers on the PBTC. He continued his education as one of the 14 members of Councilman Kevin Faulconer's Beach Alcohol Task Force.

"I tried to stay in the middle of the road on that one as long as I could," Hall said of Pacific Beach's most volatile issue.

"I want people to drink, I want people to have a great time. I'm not against alcohol — I'm against

alcohol-related crime," he said. The 2005 PB Block Party was the event that ultimately turned him from an alert community member into an active one, he

"I never got involved in local politics because there's a lot of divisiveness," he said.

That divisiveness and bureaucracy hamstring the efforts of volunteers, according to Hall.

"A lot of volunteerism is stifled by the system," he said. "In an ideal world, you want to give volunteers the tools."

Balancing his vision for an ideal world with realistic expectations is a concept that Hall is becoming more comfortable with.

"The idealistic part of me thinks it takes every resident in Pacific

Dress is casual. mission, Gotch first ran for public office in 1979, when he won the District 6 seat on the San Diego City Council. At that time, District 6 covered Clairemont, Pacific Beach and Mission Beach.

Gotch was host of plans to create the Ocean Boulevard boardwalk near the Crystal Pier, the redevelopment of Belmont Park, cleanup of stormwater going into Mission Bay, completing the walkways around Sail Bay, the 20-year extension of the De Anza Cove lease from 1982 to 2002, the managed growth elements of the City General Plan and many other accomplishments.

He went on to serve two terms representing the beach area in the State Assembly from 1990 to 1994. Schulze was his chief of staff while on the City Council and in the

He stayed in Northern California as a consultant until he was hired by Gov. Gray Davis to serve as leg-

islative secretary to the governor. Gotch represented the governor's policy interests to the elected legislators and state agencies. He resigned the position months before that administration began

"I keep a close eye out for the interests of San Diego," Gotch said while serving in the governor's office in 2001.

Gotch died May 18 at Scripps Memorial Hospital in La Jolla of skin cancer at the age of 60. He had been living in Borrego Springs.

He is survived by his wife Janet, his father Howard of Arizona, brothers Jeff of Napa and Steve of Glendora, sister Deborah of Pauma Valley and Myhro.

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

Fourth of July problems missing, but not missed

What a difference a year makes! After just six months of a total beach alcohol ban, Pacific Beach and Mission Beach are demonstrating positive, constructive change. The just-past Fourth of July holiday weekend was remarkably peaceful and showed that San Diegans and out-of-town visitors can enjoy a safe and sane holiday even with beach alcohol restrictions.

Families have returned to the beach, many for the first time on the Fourth of July. Children now romp in the sand, build sandcastles, dig moats and search for sea creatures. Mixed-age groups are laughing over picnics and barbecues. Bikini-clad women and girls can sunbathe peacefully, without constant expectation of groping or lewd remarks. Adults, teens, and children are playing traditional sand-games, including horseshoes, Whiffle Ball, bocce ball and beach volleyball, refreshing themselves with chilled water and sodas rather than free-flowing

The atmosphere now is friendly and relaxed, more like a traditionally laid-back Southern California beach town.

Civility has returned to the boardwalk, where walkers, bicyclists, Rollerbladers and skateboarders no longer have to fear jostling and intimidation from aggressive binge-drinkers tanked up on cheap beer. People again feel safe going to the beach.

The mood in the beach communities was starkly different this

year and clearly demonstrates Councilman Kevin Faulconer and the City Council's wisdom in enacting a one-year trial alcohol ban. This long holiday weekend in the recent past would have aroused dread among many beach dwellers worried about potential damage to their homes and uninvited visits from rowdy beachgoers demanding immediate toilet access.

Gone was the normal tension filling the air the night before the holiday weekend's start. Gone was the usual pre-holiday midnight screaming from drunks revving up for a long beer-filled

Once the day dawned this year's Fourth of July was unexpectedly quiet. The pre-6 a.m. shrieking music which in past years woke everyone on Sail Bay was missing. Also missing but not missed from the beach this Fourth of July weekend were:

- Beer bongs, ice luges and other drinking games
- Underage drinking
- Binge-drinking
- Staggering drunks spewing profanities
- Overflowing and overturned Port-a-Potties
- Non-permitted amplified music (still at some house parties, though police shut down many
- noisy parties) • Discarded beer cans, cardboard boxes, uneaten food, broken chairs, abandoned tents, forgotten clothing and other debris left on the beach

Boardwalk funds transferred to repair Soledad Mtn. Rd.

Emergency repair on Soledad Mountain Road in La Jolla got a \$2.27 million boost Tuesday, June 24, from the San Diego City Council in a 7-0 vote by transferring funds from seven other pending road projects that include \$245,000 taken from the Mission Beach Boardwalk Bulkhead pro-

The bulkhead project is an ongoing program that replaces approximately 500 feet of boardwalk about every two years.

The funding transfer was needed now, said Patti Boekamp, the director of the city's engineering and capital projects department, as "we don't want to stop work while waiting for money.'

Boekamp told councilmembers the city is waiting for reimburse-

ment from state and federal agencies to assist in repairs for the Oct. 3 landslide that resulted in the closure of the heavily traveled road. Four homes have been demolished and many others need repairs. In response to a question from Councilman Kevin Faulconer, Boekamp said the city would receive reimbursement within six to nine months.

The council paid \$7.5 million to partially fund the emergency construction to restore and reopen the road on Dec. 18. The cost to repair damage to the roadways is estimated at approximately \$26

The city hopes to reopen Soledad Mountain Road by October, which is one year since the landslide occurred. City staff has described the landslide as "a sudden natural event" that occurred

along the 5700 block of Soledad Mountain Road.

Money taken from various other projects includes \$925,000 from improvements to Miramar Road; \$380,000 in guardrails work around the city; \$200,000 in traffic signals in the city; \$245,000 from the bulkhead fund; \$270,000 from work on the West Point Loma sidewalk project; \$200,000 for a mitigation project on Mira Sorrento Place; and \$50,000 from new developments.

Boekamp said the Miramar Road project funds were large because it involved a land purchase that was funded by the City Council, but not yet purchased. In some of the other projects, money was taken from construction, but

We can all say good riddance to all these behaviors characteristic of uncontrolled drunks as well as to the trash-strewn beaches of previous years. Sober beachgoers apparently pick up after themselves, using trash and recycling bins provided. Little was left for beach cleanup volunteers to gather the following morning.

Crowds at the beach were definitely down, but foggy weather, high gas prices and a struggling

economy undoubtedly played as much or more of a role as the beach alcohol ban. Families with children replaced many of those who in previous years came only to drink as much as they could.

Those who didn't come to the beach because of the alcohol ban demonstrated clearly that they came only to drink, not to enjoy the beach. Those who came to the beach this year appeared to enjoy the sun, water and sand and the camaraderie of friends and family, based on their exuberant smiles and laughter.

Lifeguards report that this year, with alcohol off the beaches, they're able to return their attention to saving lives on the water, while the police note more than a 60 percent drop in arrests and citations over last year's alcoholsaturated crowd. With their resources no longer focused primarily on babysitting drunks and breaking up alcohol-fueled fights, our public safety officers are better able to do the jobs they were hired to do.

As word spreads that San Diego city beaches are again safe, friendly and welcoming, crowds will return, just as they did in Fort Lauderdale. Once that south Florida beach city banned alcohol from its beaches, tourism grew from 3 million to 10 million visitors a year, just as their business mix improved and revenue grew. Many tourism-dependent PB businesses are already reporting that business is up and their guests are happy with the improved beach environment.

San Diego, we're on the right track in ensuring our beaches are clean, safe and enjoyable for everyone. Let's maintain our progress and make the beach alcohol ban permanent.

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
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

Sea snails dig in for dinner with toothy tongues

For many years, I assumed nearshore rocks and boulders became pockmarked from millennia of steadfast hammering by the surf. I never imagined that very small, seemingly inconsequential mollusks called limpets are responsible.

La Jolla Cove hosts a variety of life that clings to the rocks, and these include 2-inch-long owl limpets (Lottia giagantea) that occupy home scars (depressions) on rocks. The depressions may be a good fit or exceed the circumference of their shells.

How can soft-bodied animals make such an impression on a rock's surface, and why are the grooves different sizes and depths? The answer to the first question is succinctly explained by their name: "Limpet" means lickrock, and that's exactly what they do. Sounds impossible, and it would be with a human tongue, but owl limpets are endowed with 150 rows of teeth on their oral appendage. Called a radula (sandpaperlike tongue), it has the necessary tools to rasp away at surfaces.

The limpets' recessed abodes vary in depth and diameter compared to the animals' sizes because limpets don't necessarily get their groove on from scratch. Hailing from the Cretaceous period (around 100 million years ago), limpets take advantage of their long history by leaving a legacy to the next generation once their life reaches its inevitable conclusion (10 to 15 years). Over the years, successive limpets add to the depressions with their own signature rasping. This changing-ofthe-guard strategy boosts survival of future limpets because younger, smaller limpets clamp down on a recessed scar instead of facing the wrath of a fully exposed rock face. Consequently, they are less likely to be yanked off the rock by relentless pummeling from breaking waves. It also means that larger, deeper concavities are likely thousands of years old.

Owl limpets also use their radula as a gardening tool, feeding utensil and property defender. They farm their own food, an algal species they staunchly protect against other limpets. Clearing their territory of anything besides their food source encourages the algae to develop into a thick film just right for grazing. The farmers run a fine line

of those who do until the proprietor sidles over and pushes out the freeloader — using its radula, of course.

Not all limpets face the same daily struggle integral to surf zone existence. Kelp limpets (Acmaea insessa) enjoy resort living compared with their rock-rasping brethren, but they still require a radula for survival. Only a halfinch long, kelp limpets settle onto feather boa kelp (Egregia menziesiis), a large, brown seaweed found a bit further off shore, and rasp away on the central stemlike part called a stipe (compared with rasping rock, this must be like licking an ice cream cone). When I come across a feather boa, invariably I find kelp limpets in depressions all along the stipe interspersed with holes eaten through by limpets. Kelp limpets get a two-for-one with this approach: The feather boa acts as both a home and food supply. No territorial farmer here, once a limpet eats a hole through the stipe, it creeps off to fresh terrain. As with owl limpets, young kelp limpets grow faster and survive longer if they settle on scars made by past limpets. This limpet species then benefits from enhanced security against surge and current.

On the surface, limpets are between filling their bellies and mundane-looking creatures, so overharvesting the crop, and this they don't get much attention from must take into account loss from most tidepoolers. Personally, I'm a stealing. Smaller limpets lacking huge fan because I appreciate

their own territory raid the plots their physical capabilities and resulting handiwork. In fact, every time I notice rocks and boulders with telltale scars, I am compelled to trace my fingers along an empty depression or two, knowing I have encountered a true archeological

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Charlie Jones touched lives with voice, heart

Having been a sportswriter for nearly 20 years and a sports fan since what seems like birth, I've accumulated my share of sports items over the years.

Among those items are books related to sports. While going through my collection recently in a "spring cleaning" mode, I came across a book co-authored by Kim Doren and Charlie Jones. I paged through some of it to refresh my memory on its contents, then put the book back on the shelf with my other collectibles.

While looking through the book, I had wondered what Charlie had been up to in recent years.

I had the pleasure of meeting him in his La Jolla office a number of years back to do a story on his book writing and a look back at a stellar sportscasting career.

As you can imagine, it came as a great shock a few days later when I saw on the newswires that Charlie had passed away at 77 of a heart attack in La Jolla. Once the shock wore off. I realized how lucky I was to have met this man.

I don't want to date myself — or Charlie, for that matter — but I remember as a kid tuning in NBC on Sunday afternoons for NFL games and hearing that voice. Much like Keith Jackson doing college football, Charlie had a very recognizable voice. What's more, he not only knew the game but made it fun to listen to. Just as when I met another La Jollan years ago, veteran sportscaster Dick Enberg, Charlie was an institution as far as I'm concerned when it came to calling games.


Charlie, who called the very first Super Bowl, did much more than just Sunday afternoons or the Fiesta Bowl from Tempe. His career saw him cover more than two dozen sports nationwide and around the globe.

I spoke to Kim via e-mail last weekend and asked her to share some thoughts on her friendship with Charlie. To say that the two had a bond would be an under-

"Charlie had been more than my business partner — we had been best friends for the past 17 years," Kim said. "I loved the man. Even though his health has been deteriorating the past couple years, I was shocked at his death."

watching Charlie as a youngster on television calling sporting events.

"I always dreamed that one day I would be an athlete being interviewed by him (our families were also acquainted)," Kim went on to say. "Of course, that type of interview never happened, but we did meet in the context of sports. I was a marketing executive with Cobra Golf and we first met (as two adults) in Lake Tahoe at the 1991

Celebrity Golf tournament. Charlie was NBC's golf host in '91 and '92 (with Johnny Miller) and we became instant friends. After I left Cobra in '96, I helped (p.r./edit) his first book. 'What Makes Winners Win,' which made it onto the New York Times business best-seller list. We shared an office in La Jolla Shores, and when NBC lost NFL football we started work on numerous projects.

Our first book together was 'You Go Girl,' and it happened in a pretty serendipitous fashion," she continued. "I had been a volunteer girls softball coach and had been lamenting to Charlie that all the sports books focused on men and wouldn't it be nice to have a book to inspire girls. I came up with WOW (women on winning) and he immediately picked up the phone, called Chris Evert and said, 'My partner and I are writing a book — can we interview you?' We didn't have an agent, publisher or anything, but that is pure Charlie. He would take off on an idea (he had millions of them — plays, TV and radio shows, books, etc.) and go for it. Naysayers, rejections, etc., didn't faze him. He was incredibly positive and resilient. A year and a half later, our book was published and it was followed by several others, including 'Be the Ball: A Golf Instructional Book for the Mind,' 'That's Outside My Boat: Letting Go of What You Can't Control' and 'Heaven Can Wait: Surviving Cancer.'

Charlie had prostate cancer and Kim said he loved giving out the book and talking to those with cancer to encourage them.

Battling cancer is no easy matter, Kim, like myself, remembered but even Charlie found a humorous way to deal with it.

"As a funny aside, when Charlie was going through radiation at Day he drew a big heart around him." where his radiation was targeted. He had a great sense of humor. I think he really enjoyed leaving a legacy, whether it was his broadcasts or his books — these will live

Not only will Charlie's written word in books live on, but his voice will live on in endless sports broad-

"Charlie loved broadcasting," she said. "He knew that's what he wanted to be as soon as he took his first radio job as a kid. The adrenaline rush he would have after doing a game would keep him up for hours. He fed off people and this energy would help him overcome any physical pain he was having. He thoroughly enjoyed sharing his craft with up-and-coming broadcasters.

"Bill Walton is probably the bestknown example. He spent hours reviewing tapes with Bill and helping him develop skills. Of course, NBC recognized Charlie's ability to develop talent; he had a multitude of various partners over the years because of this. Charlie was selfless on the air. He pulled his partners in, set them up and let them shine, unlike others who let their egos get in the way. He was a terrific mentor. He was mine for public speaking.

Kim said that as for Charlie's legacy, he was extremely proud of his induction into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

"He took pride in being old school — setting up the story, letting the game be the star and making the whole experience a joy to viewers," she said. "The real test, he said, was to hold viewers when the game was a blowout. That's where his story-telling ability could really shine. Of course, he did tons of different sports, but he loved his Olympic experiences (track and field in Seoul, swimming and diving in Barcelona and canoeing, kayaking, rowing in Atlanta). I remember hearing many stories from people who met him and felt Scripps, he loved joking with the like they were being interviewed, nurses," Kim said. "On Valentine's even when they went to interview

Another thing that made Charlie special was his love for his community. Many notable people just use a town for what it has to offer

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

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Atoll pairs dinners & diners with winemakers

Bringing a bottle of wine to a dinner party embodies good etiquette. But when the Atoll Restaurant at the Catamaran Resort Hotel and Spa throws a dinner party, guests meet the winemaker as well as new wines.

Once a month on a Tuesday, the Atoll Restaurant, 3999 Mission Blvd., hosts a wine dinner with three main ingredients: several wines from a featured vineyard, the winemaker and a four-course menu designed around the wines by Chef Rob Famulare of the Atoll Restaurant.

"We wanted to do something special for people who really love food and wine," said Jennifer Huether, Atoll Restaurant manager. "We think it's really special that you can sit down and have dinner with the people who made the

Last month, the restaurant kicked off the series with Cecil and Christine De Loach of Hook & Ladder Winery in the Russian River Valley, Calif. Better known as the founders of the popular De Loach winery, the couple has been making wine for more than 35 years.

"When we started, there were 40 wineries in the area," Cecil said. "Now there are 400."

The couple sold the De Loach name along with that branch of their winery to a company that wanted to buy its well-known

"I can sign my name on a letter, but I can't put it on a bottle," Cecil laughed.

Then the couple began their new enterprise, named Hook & Ladder to honor Cecil's 17 years as a San Francisco firefighter and the firefighting profession. They described the family's 400 acres of vineyards.

To start the evening, restaurant patrons leisurely settled into their seats at two long tables with views of the bay. Richard Beckman of Beckman Wine & Spirits Company introduced the De Loaches and encouraged guests to ask ques-

"This is your chance to find out everything you wanted to know about wine from the people who make it," he said.

Cecil started sharing stories as the guests began their first course: spicy lobster with mango, ginger and cucumber salad, paired with a 2006 estate-grown Gewurztraminer. He said he bought his first vineyard in 1970.

any money," he said.

After the first few years of success in both selling grapes and purchasing additional vineyards, the couple's wine business grew systemically from there.

The history of the family's winethe wine as the best grapes from making continued as diners enjoyed a second course of butter lettuce, shaved fennel and pink grapefruit with citrus vinaigrette, paired with a 2006 estate-bottled Chardonnay. Cecil described the challenges of upholding quality while trying to hold prices down and how a frost could spell disaster for the grapes.

When a 2006 Pinot Noir was served with the third course of Copper River salmon and crispy potato pancetta mash, one patron asked what made Pinot Noir so special. Cecil said that the market had improved for Pinot Noir since the movie, "Sideways," set in California's wine country.

"It's not that it's difficult to grow; it just needs to be grown in the "It was the cheapest land you right place," Cecil said. "It needs could buy because it never made the fog at night and the warmth of the day to retain its acid. Without

those cool nights, it's flabby and just falls apart."

The fourth course brought a tearubbed tenderloin to the table, paired with a 2005 estate-grown Cabernet Sauvignon and 2005 proprietary wine called The Tillerman. Cecil said that he named this particular blend of Cabernet Sauvignon, Cabernet Franc, Merlot and Sangiovese for the years he spent driving the back of a hook and ladder fire truck and operating the aerial ladder.

"I was 70 feet behind of the driver, so I had to know what I was doing, especially around corners," Cecil said.

To the patrons at the wine dinner, it's apparent that he also knows what he's doing around

"Cecil loves to talk about the winery and its history, but he really just wants people to enjoy the wine," Christine De Loach said.

The next wine dinner will be Tuesday, July 22 at 6 p.m. and will

Wherever you are, Charlie, thank you for all you gave us during your time here. We all learned a little something from you.

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
