The district would have charged property owners within a certain area a fee to clean around Garnet Avenue and neighboring streets. It would also pay for extra police and other services. Crown Point Elementary plays a new tune this fall

The students at Crown Point Elementary will be playing a new tune this fall when the school is renamed the Crown Point Music Academy.

San Diego Unified School District recently added the Suzuki Program — a musical instruction program that teaches the violin based on the way children learn to speak — to the school's curriculum.

"The Suzuki Program was started in 1964 by Dr. Shinichi Suzuki, a Japanese violinist, who got the idea in that all kids, if they can learn their mother tongue, they can learn music," said Karen Childress-Evans, director of visual and performing arts (VAPA).

Parents participate with their children, who learn the violin along with the students, Childress-Evans said

"The violin concept is the parents are taught along with the kids and then the parents become the trainers at home," she said. "The kids listen a lot just like when you're learning to speak. The parents talk to the kids and there's a lot of mimicking going on."

Childress-Evans said the small students will be learning on violins approximately one-tenth the size of a full-size violins.

"The whole school is going to be filled with music, music, music," said Crown Point Elementary Principal Barbara Boone.

"In addition to that we going to be infusing music into our literacy, social studies and everything that we

do. Kids will not only be participating in music classes, but they're also going to be learning the history of music. For example, when the second grade students do a unit on biography, they're going to learn about musicians," Boone said.

Beginning this fall, program will be offered for kindergarten through first grade, and then expand one grade each year. Boone said by 2010, the school will offer the Suzuki Program for all students, kindergarten through 5th grade.

The addition of the Suzuki Program will transform Crown Point Elementary into a magnet school.

Boone said the campus is planning on expanding from one kindergarten and first grade classes to three classes for both grades.

Crown Point is an amaz-

Record number of birds found with West Nile Virus

Despite the cool summer weather San Diego County has seen this summer, the number of birds found infected with West Nile Virus has been heating up. So far, this year's total count in San Diego County is 154 dead birds, eight sentinel chickens, five mosquito pools, one horse and one human illness, according to County Vector Control officials.

"In years previous, we generally would not expect to see a large

increase in the number of birds testing positive until we get into August, and the fact that we're not even through July yet and we're already poised to break previous records is definitely cause for concern," said Chris Conlan of the Department of Health Vector Control in an interview last week.

There are contributing factors that may indicate a rationale for the increase in positive cases this year. However, because the disease is relatively new, it has not been present long enough to identify a pattern that links one year's stats to the next.

According to Conlan, this year his staff has seen a large number of abandoned pools, ranging from kiddie pools and full-sized swimming pools. Standing water makes for perfect mosquito breeding grounds.

The virus is spread by mosquitoes and birds serve as reservoirs for the virus. They become infected with the disease and in turn infect mosquitoes that bite them. Once the mosquito

PB church expansion nears completion

Members of the Pacific Beach Christian Church can look forward to settling into a newly renovated facility this fall. The construction of the Church's expansion at 1074 Loring St. nears completion after more than a year and a half of acquiring the appropriate permits and addressing parking and height

Rumors the expansion would include a substance abuse rehabilitation center were dispelled by church Pastor Brian Daly.

While the church does host a Christian-centered recovery support group similar to Alcoholics Anonymous, Daly said there aren't any plans to expand it into a rehabilitation program.


He said the new facilities would host fellowships and various community projects and is not designed to house people.

"Particularly being in North PB which is more residential, we're really trying to be sensitive to the needs of our neighbors as well and not create a negative impact. Our desire is create a positive impact in which the church would actually benefit the community and not be a detriment to it," Daly said.

Church has been holding services for 14 years and has always tried to balance community concerns, like parking, with the needs of the church members, he said.

The renovation of the existing building brings classrooms for the church's youth ministry and a new multi-purpose sanctuary to provide a larger space for about 30 more chairs. The church knocked down a house to make way for the new

115 to 145 people required Daly recently been crowded Sunday to add an additional 10 parking spaces to the parking lot and the adjacent alley, he said.

But even with parking being as scarce as it is near the beach areas, at least one neighbor doesn't seem to mind. Karen Dodge, a real estate agent who lives on the next block over said she doesn't mind trading a minor parking inconvenience on Sundays for the positive influence the church brings to the neighborhood and rest of the community.

"Brian is an asset and so is his church — that's the bottom line," Dodge said.

mornings during the construction because the parking lot was closed, Dodge said only neighbors living close by are most inconvenienced

Along with Sunday services and other fellowship events, the PB Christian Church has for years hosted an alternative Halloween celebration for parents and children that includes games and food. The intergenerational church also hosts a monthly men's breakfast, a Christian women's fellowship, a senior's group and various holiday events.

saying homeowners shouldn't have to pay for the mess made by bar and restaurant patrons.

So Discover Pacific Beach went back to the drawing board and came back with a new MAD proposal that would create a smaller district that includes the west end of Garnet Avenue, a small area of Mission Boulevard and the boardwalk. Only commercial property owners within those boundaries would be assessed the maintenance fee. Residential areas would not be included.

Executive Director Benjamin Nicholls said the new district would raise \$200,000, about half the amount originally sought. That would pay for pressure washing sidewalks only along Garnet Avenue, graffiti removal and about few extra police on the weekend in the bar areas.

Nicholls went before Pacific Beach Town Council in July and must present the plan to the Pacific Beach Planning Committee before approaching City Council with any type of proposal. He said he wants to come before City Council the end of the year.

A potentially smaller district means less money, which means less service than originally planned. This excludes trash pickup in the residential neighborhoods and extra police patrol along the boardwalk as previously proposed.

"We don't have to solve every problem right now, we can solve problems down the road," Nicholls

But at least one business owner says those problems can be solved

with money that businesses already pay into the Business Improvement District represented by about 1200 businesses associated with Discover Pacific Beach.

Kathie — who goes by her first name only — owner of the Buff clothing shop at 1341 Garnet Ave., said although her business wasn't included in the original area, smaller retail and other businesses shouldn't have to pay extra for something individual businesses already do themselves.

"We are a retail business and we clean up after ourselves. We're out sweeping our porch every day," she said. "If they want to assess somebody, assess the bars."

Trashcans maintained by Discover Pacific Beach, including one

near the Buff, were removed earlier in the summer but were quickly replaced when Pacific Beach businesses called to ask for them, Nicholls said. Discover Pacific Beach maintains about 12 trashcans along Garnet Avenue.

Businesses in the Pacific Beach BID pay about \$150,000 a year.

Discover Pacific Beach raises an approximately \$400,000 for operating expenses through fundraisers and events such as BeachFest, Nicholls said.

Nicholls said he also had to rehire a two-person cleaning crew he had laid-off go in June.

The organization also helped pay for the Community Court. The court is currently funded through August with a grant from San Diego County, Nicholls said, and should be funded through next year with fees charged by the City Attorney's Office.

The city monitors about 20 pedestrian "litter containers" along Garnet Avenue and about 39 along Mission Boulevard on a daily basis, said Dennis Williams with Environmental Services.

Two litter containers near Crystal Pier were temporarily removed during a project to bring an section near the pier into compliance with the American Disabilities Act and will be replaced after the city installs no parking red curbs nearby, he said.

The city also removed, repaired and replaced a littler container in front of 1513 Garnet Ave. The container, which is should be for pedestrian litter, contained too much business waste and had to be repaired, he said.

Smash-and-grab burglars targeting Bird Rock businesses

Bird Rock merchants banded together battling a string of serial burglaries and paintball attacks that began a year ago on La Jolla Boulevard, costing the community a great deal monetarily and emotionally.

'We're on a shoe string budget. This is our livelihood," said Miriam Zieminski, Frame Masters & Fine Art co-Owner.

The Bird Rock burglars' used an entry method in their latest crime spree, July 19, when they broke into Stephanie's Shoe Boutique and Haute Culture Boutiques that merchants allege they perfected over the past year.

The thieves threw rocks through Stephanie's glass door. They crawled through the opening, stealing high-end goods such as handbags, Stephanie's said employee Jackie Zebrowski. Neighbors said that although alarms rang through the air, the pilferers came and went before officers arrived. But one bandit left broken window sliced through him, offering clues to an identity, if police ever nab a suspect, Zebrowski said.

"They threw a rock through the door, kicked out the wood and took a couple of purses. Then they crawled through and must have scraped themselves because there was blood on the door," Zebrows-

Zieminski's frame shop, located at 5631 La Jolla Boulevard, sits next to Bird Rock Coffee Roasters and Bodywear – the neighbors recently became paintball victims, but Zieminski said she doesn't think

the two crimes are connected.

"It seems like a whole different ence" type of attack," Zieminski said. "I feel so bad for the merchants.'

According to Bodywear Employee Amanda Mizell, the burglars began targeting Bodywear about

"We were hit twice. [First,] one year ago, then most recently was three months ago, but there was also a third attempt. You can see where they tried to break-in. There was a rock there," Mizell said.

Bodywear had surveillance

tapes running, and caught the burglars every move.

Mizell described the May incident, where two white or Hispanic men in their late 20 or early 30 broke in. One dashed for an empty cash drawer, she said. When he realized the store wasn't holding any cash, he slammed the register shut, pulled on a heavily wired computer, but couldn't take that, so he broke the monitor. The men began grabbing yoga clothes, then ran out, Mizell said.

"They tried to take the computhis DNA for police when shards of er but couldn't, so they knocked over the computer monitor," she

> In all, the burglars stole more than \$5,000 worth of merchandise, but the extensive hours of inventory time was the worst part, Mizell

The community gathered together to come to a resolution.

"The Bird Rock Community Council (BRCC) had a merchants meeting," Mizell said.

"We had at least one BRCC sponsored meeting in April and we're having one Wednesday, Aug. 6," said BRCC President Joe LaCava. "The [police] have done little changes to increase their pres-

And shop owners like Zieminski said that while merchant meetings with police offered tips to lessen the stores as a target helped a bit, she thinks the community will hire a security guard.

"There's been a rash [of burglaries] for more than a year," she said. "I think we'll probably hire a private security guard.'

LaCava agreed, and said police recommend moving high-end merchandise away from windows to make shops less attractive for

"All shop owners can do is make it more difficult for burglars," LaCava said.

Bird Rock's next merchant meeting will be held Wednesday, August 6 at Lupi's 5518 La Jolla Boulevard, at 6 p.m.



San Diego needs to keep Mission Bay's revenue in Mission Bay

Mission Bay Park is a treasured community resource providing residents and visitors with beautiful vistas and countless recreational opportunities.

Developing and maintaining Mission Bay Park was built on a compact between the city and the taxpayers in which up to 25 percent of the park would be made available for commercial leases. The revenues generated by those leases would stay in the park to cover park maintenance and completion of capital improvements.

But our beloved Mission Bay has suffered neglect over the

years because the city has diverted the vast majority of the \$30 million in annual revenues it currently generates into other non-park related city

That is why Councilwoman Donna Frye and I have proposed a City Charter amendment to help Mission Bay Park pay for itself out of park-generated lease revenues rather than tax dollars. Our proposal will keep millions of dollars of Mission Bay Park revenues in the park to improve water quality, control erosion, restore wetland habitats, increase lighting using sustainable energy and complete other needed

improvements.

As former chair of the Mission Bay Park Committee, I have made protecting Mission Bay a priority. Our proposal is the culmination of many years of working with individuals, neighborhoods and community groups to protect Mission Bay.

This new funding measure adopts the recommendations made by the 1994 citizen-generated Master Plan Update for Mission Bay Park and finally responds to the budget reforms recommended by the 1999/2000 Grand Jury. It is a substantial step forward in promoting transparency and accountability in city budgeting

practices and has earned the mayor's support.

Last Monday, a majority of the City Council voted to place the measure on the November ballot so that you, as a taxpayer, can decide whether to keep more Mission Bay Park revenues in Mission Bay and other regional parks.

We support this reform

because it restores honesty and integrity to the budgeting of Mission Bay monies, protects our community's most vibrant symbol of civic ingenuity and vision, and will ensure that our children and future generations can make memories at Mission Bay Park for years to come.

Faulconer knows the problems of beach drinking

for public safety knowing that he would be criticized by some who wanted to continue to allow a free flow of alcohol at the beach in spite of the negative effects.

Surfrider wants smokers to hold on to their butts

Surfrider wants to remind you that the beach is not an ashtray when it holds its "Hold On To Your Butt Awareness Day" Saturday, Aug. 9, from 10 to noon at the intersection of Mission Boulevard and Ventura Place at Belmont Park.

The event was organized to increase awareness and reduce the amount of cigarette butt litter that makes its way to the beach.

Cigarette butts hold the top spot for most litter items found on the beach during a beach clean up. Of all litter items collected, one in every five items was a cigarette butt. Aside from the obvious, smoking at the beach, this is because people often throw their cigarette butts into the streets when walking or driving.

"If you're waiting to make a lefthand turn and you've got an island, if you look out your window you'll see maybe 50 to 100 cigarette butts. People sit there, finish it and throw it out, "said Ken David from the Surfrider Foundation San Diego County Chapter.

What gets flung to the streets makes its way to the through the waterways and washes down to the beach. This waste affects water enthusiasts as well as marine life.

The misconception is that cigarette butts are made of a biodegradable cotton, making it okay to dispose of them in the environment without harm. However, it contains cellulose acetate, a plastic, not cotton, which takes many years to decompose. The toxic chemicals that get trapped by the filters to prevent them from

entering the body can still be emitted into the atmosphere when immersed in water. The butts are also mistaken for food by birds and fish, threatening the quality of their life and of water, according to David.

"This isn't a 'Don't smoke' message," David said. "If people want to smoke that's fine, just hold on to the cigarette butt and dispose of it properly."

The California Highway Patrol and the San Diego Fire Department joined San Diego's Surfrider Foundation chapter and other organizations in their fight against cigarette litter by creating a hotline in which people can call to report cigarette butts being tossed to the streets and freeways.

becomes infected, it can pass the virus on to any being it bites there after.

West Nile Virus can only be spread and contracted through a mosquito bite, not through casual contact or picking up dead birds.

Most animals do not have an issue with the virus, explained Conlan.

"Dogs and cats usually don't have a problem with it, unless they are already severely health compromised," he said.

Horses and humans can become infected as well.

A horse will become sick three to 15 days after contracting the virus. Symptoms for horses involve loss of appetite along with any combination weakness, convulsions or paralysis of hind limbs, according to Dr. Gundula Dunne, Veterinary Medical Officer at Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory.

There is no specific treatment for WNV in horses, however there is a vaccination

"Whenever there is an increase in activity of positive birds and mosquitoes, that is a precursor that tells you that the risk to humans is present and they are at more of a risk catching it now," Conlan said.

Human symptoms range from mild to serious including headaches, fever, skin rash and swollen lymph glands to coma, muscle weakness and paralysis. However, four out of five people do not develop symptoms at all. Currently there is not a vaccine for humans.

There has three reported cases of human of humans infected with West Nile Virus in San Diego County this summer.

The several species of birds that

have an issue with the virus are crows, jays, ravens, and birds of prey such as hawks.

The county is encouraging residents to call Vector Control at (888) 551-4636 if they find any dead susceptible species so they can be picked up and tested to determine if they had the virus.

The bird must be dead for less than 24 hours with an intact carcass intact and cannot have died from a logical cause, such as being hit by a car. This is because the virus begins to degrade after the bird dies, making it difficult to detect after about a day and diminishes the worth of testing to see what really killed it, Conlan said.

Infected birds have been found in Pacific Beach, La Jolla, Camp Pendleton, Carlsbad, Carmel Valley, College Area, Del Mar, El Cajon, Kearny Mesa, Lakeside, La Mesa, Lemon Grove, Miramar, Mira Mesa, Oceanside, Poway, Ramona, Rancho Bernardo, Rancho Santa Fe, Scripps Ranch, Solana Beach, Sorrento Valley, University City, Valley Center and Vista. The mosquito pools were found in Del Cerro and Oceanside.

To prevent mosquito bites, keep screens and windows intact. Empty or remove backyard water sources, such as children's toys, old spare tires or anything that can retain standing water to prevent the creation of mosquito breeding areas. Mosquito fish can be used to manage larger areas of water such as swimming pools. Wear long sleeves and pants during dawn and dusk, which are peak mosquito biting hours, and wear repellants.

"If ever there was a time to listen to us, this is it. Put your repellant on this year because it's not looking good," Conlan said.





17-21 second game. Needing to win by two, the deciding game went to 24-22.



Works begins on Bay Park shopping center

The City of San Diego has given unanimous approval for La Jolla-based C.W. Clark, Inc. to proceed with a \$33 million redevelopment project of a shopping center originally built in the 1950s that overlooks Mission Bay Park.

The 4.5-acre property is located at Clairemont Drive and Morena Boulevard and is adjacent to the 102-room Best Western Mission Bay Hotel. Plans call for a 66,000-square foot retail, commercial and office complex. It will be called the Bay View

"Everything but the hotel will be torn down," said Jeff Rogers, Development Manager for C.W. Clark, Inc. who has been working on this project of nearly 10 years. "The buildings, parking lot, driveways and landscaping will all be new."

The demolition of the current buildings is expected to begin this fall with a final completion date in November or December of 2009. According to Rogers, despite the current challenging economic times, there is no shortage of interested tenants in the location.

"We already have a name drugstore and specialty grocery store selected as anchor tenants," he said. "We will also have two or three little restaurants and a coffee shop. We have a long list of smaller tenants who are interested in the project."

Because the leases have not been finalized and signed,



Rogers cannot reveal the names of tenants at this time.

In addition, on a corner of the property the current oil change and car wash operations will also be torn down and replaced with a business office building.

It seems these days there can hardly be a shovel put in the ground or a single nail pounded on a construction project without the "green" issue being raised. This project is no exception, but Rogers is confident of the conservation and environmental sensitive efforts that will be used.

"All the building and development codes have been continually evolving on the whole green issue," Rogers said. "There are already strong codes in place regarding clean water, dust protection and recycling of materials. In addition, our tenants have been keyed into energy efficiency for a long time in running their businesses.'

According to Rogers, recycling has become a significant factor in major construction projects like this one when demolition of older buildings is involved.

"Under new requirements and regulations, we will not be trucking all the materials from the torn down buildings and

simply dumping them in the landfill," he said. "Instead, we will try to recycle as much of those materials as we can right there on the property. They will then be used in the construction of the development."

Another aspect of the project is a complete redesign of the median on Clairemont Drive in front of the property.

"We will be tearing out the old concrete and will replace it with a thematic landscape," Rogers said. "It will create a gateway or entry way into Clairemont."

Due to its location, the potential exists for traffic and commuting challenges during the 15-month project. However, Rogers expresses confidence in those issues being at a mini-

"Any new construction project will have temporary impacts to the entire place. It is the nature of construction," he stated. "However, with the size of the property most of the activity will be confined to the enclosed construction area itself. Nor is it like any one issue is going to last for the entire 15 months.

Besides, because Rogers and many people in the Bay Park area have worked so long and hard on the project, most residents are looking forward to the finished product rather than be upset by temporary challenges created with the construction.

"Everything we are doing is geared towards this development being a neighborhood serving complex," Rogers said.

What is the proper way to list the beneficiaries on my IRAs?

When you open an IRA you fill out a form and you list one or

more Beneficiaries. If you have not reviewed these Beneficiary Designations Forms lately. you should do so now. If you fail to list a beneficiary or if they have died, the asset is part of vour estate and may be subject to probate. You want to avoid this court procedure.

The best way to list the beneficiaries is to name an individual or list of individuals. If the spouse is the appropri-

ate beneficiary, it is best to list them as the beneficiary. The spouse can rollover the IRA into their own IRA. Other individuals can rollover the IRA into an IRA, but they will be required to take a yearly minimum distribution. This amount is based on the beneficiaries' life expectancy and the financial institution will figure it out for you.

In certain circumstances you can name a trust as a beneficiary and it can get the same rollover treatment. Check with your financial institution and your estate planning attorney. The benefit of a rollover IRA is that the funds can continue to have tax deferred treatment. The interest income and dividends will not be taxed until the money is taken out of the IRA.

Oil refineries play big role in rising gas costs

Where do you put the blame for the ever-rising gas costs?

Well, we went to our informative computer and it spilled out possible reasons from many online - notably ABC News and CNN-Money.com.

The crunch at the pump can be shared by OPEC, oil barons, soaring demand, limited supply and investors who have been involved in doubling gas prices over the last four years. Take your pick.

Now, President Bush is pushing Congress to remove bans on drilling off the coasts and in Alaska. Simple? Not really. Environmentalists would hop off their bicycles to protest.

Antiquated refineries and roadblocks to build bigger and better

challenges. When landowners are approached, they say, "Build it somewhere else." No one wants a new refinery in his backyard. There haven't been any constructed since the 1970s.

Despite the scar on his nose from the injury, Young said the healing process will not affect his pitching. It just means he might not be able to taste victory.



The current Civic Center Complex needs an estimated \$125 million or more in improvements, including removal of hazardous materials such as asbestos. In addition to this City-owned site, City employees occupy more than one-half-million square feet of leased space at a cost of \$13 million annually. Centre City Development Corporation (CCDC) and the City are exploring the possibility of a public/private partnership, like Horton Plaza and PETCO Park, to redevelop the property, and would move forward only if it resulted in taxpayer savings and improved public services.
