YEAR IN REVIEW – Park renamed for black educators, Village redevelopment plan, and roller skating trend takes off

While COVID continued with new variants, residents in Pacific

and Mission beaches, as well as La Jolla, persisted demonstrating their mental toughness, resolve, and ability to adapt quickly to changing times. Public meetings continued remotely, people did what was necessary to protect themselves and others during the pandemic, and communities forged ahead dealing with the dayto-day realities of the new normal. The following are some of the more important things that happened along the beachfront in 2021.

JANUARY

SUNNY DISTRICT

Lysundra "Sunny" Lee took the baton from Sara Berns to become Discover PB's new executive director guiding the beach community's business improvement district through unprecedented pandemic times.

SEALEBRATION

For the seventh year, Casa Beach was closed January through May 15 to give the seals privacy prior to giving birth, delivering their pups safely away from human interference. Visitors were not able to access the sand as a chain link secured the stairs leading to seals on the beach.

PB PROTEST

Shock, anger, and disgust were the primary reactions of PB leaders and residents to the culture clash between supporters of former President Trump, Antifa, Black Lives Matter, and police on Jan. 9 along Mission Boulevard. San Diego Police declared an "unlawful assembly" due to acts of violence, reportedly from Antifa, that erupted during the assembly. Witnesses reported people threw rocks and glass.

FEBRUARY

RECALL RECALLED

An effort to recall District 2 Councilmember Dr. Jennifer Campbell was officially launched but ultimately failed to collect 14,421 signatures – 15% of District 2's 96,140 registered voters - to qualify the measure on a special election ballot.

SHORT-TERM RENTAL REGS

City Council voted 8-1 to adopt a new proposed ordinance that would regulate short-term rentals and become effective July 1, 2022. The short-term rental compromise was proposed by District 2 Councilmember Campbell.

MARCH

PANDEMIC AID

As part of efforts to protect vulnerable San Diegans from the impacts of the pandemic, Mayor Todd Gloria on March 15 announced the launch of the Housing Stability Assistance Program.

LA JOLLA ENHANCED

The first Enhance La Jolla Day was March 20 as Enhance La Jolla, the community's maintenance assessment district, and the La Jolla Village Merchants Association, joined to spruce up the Village with a community improvement

UC 'SAN DIEGONAUTS'

When NASA unveiled the initial team of astronauts for its ambitious moon exploration project, the news quickly spread that two of the announced 18 Artemis program team members hold degrees from UC San Diego. The alums are Jessica Meir, who received her Ph.D. in marine biology in 2009 from Scripps Institution of Oceanography, and Kate Rubins, who earned a bachelor of science degree in molecular biology in 1999. As members of the Artemis Team, Meir and Rubins will help pave the way for NASA's next lunar missions including sending the first woman and next man to walk on the moon in 2024.

APRIL

BELMONT BACK

Belmont Park in Mission Beach bounced back, reopening some of its popular rides as San Diego sprung forward through reduced COVID tier restrictions.

PARK CURFEWS

Increasing crime in parts of Pacific Beach during the evening- and early-morning hours prompted the beach community to recommend curfews at Fanuel Park, Pacific Beach Library grounds, and Mission Bay Youth Fields. That recommendation was approved by the City Council.

SEAWORLD REOPENS

Having relaunched its rides on April 12, SeaWorld fully reopened its theme park with limited capacity featuring animal exhibits, presentations, and other entertainment experiences.

SLOW STREETS

Some PB neighbors wanted the brakes put on the Slow Streets pilot program on Diamond Street from Mission Boulevard to Haines Street, claiming it is adversely impacting their neighborhood and was no longer needed.

FIREWORKS OVER FIREWORKS

The resumption of fireworks at SeaWorld resurrected longtime opposition to the pyrotechnic displays, which opponents insist can be harmful to both animals (especially dogs) and people.

PB WOMAN'S CLUB

Escrow closed on the century-old PB Woman's Club and three parcels at 1721 Hornblend St. The buyer was Ramin Karimi, who purchased the three Hornblend parcels for \$1.4 million.

MAY

VFW REOPENS

VFW Post 5985 in North Pacific Beach, closed 14 months due to the pandemic, reopened on Armed Services Day May 15 at 853 Turquoise St. where it has been since 1938.

RE-TRIAL IN PB CARJACKING

A Texas man will have a re-trial on May 5, a judge set on Dec. 22, following an appeals court ruling overturning his carjacking and kidnapping convictions in which he abducted a college student in Pacific Beach in 2018. The 4th District Court of Appeal found judicial error as the reason to reverse the conviction of Skyler Jace Battreall, now 22, after finding that San Diego Superior Court Judge Sharon Majors-Lewis erred in not holding a mental competency hearing for Battreall when he exhibited unusual behavior during trial.

Battreall's attorney told Majors-Lewis his client wasn't able to keep his head up during trial, and had attempted suicide in jail. Battreall was hospitalized on a Friday, but the trial resumed on a Monday.

Majors-Lewis said her bailiff had spoken to the hospital staff and they told him they did not believe Battreall had taken an overdose of pills while in jail. She also refused to conduct a mental competency hearing because the trial had already started.

The 3-0 opinion, written by Justice William Dato with Justices Richard Huffman and Judith Haller concurring, recommends that Majors-Lewis not be given the case in re-trial. She has since retired.

The opinion faults Majors-Lewis for not conducting a mental competency hearing. The record showed Battreall's attorney kept the pressing the issue, but she didn't want to hear it.

They also faulted her for accepting heresay from her bailiff in concluding there was no suicide attempt from hospital staff.

The victim, Brett Charbonnel, then 22, testified Battreall asked him for a ride in Pacific Beach in Oct. 14, 2018, saying his motorcycle had been stolen. Once inside his car, Battreall pulled out a gun replica, pushed it towards his hip, and told him to keep driving. Charbonnel drove towards a populated area and Battreall grabbed the steering wheel.

Battreall hit Charbonnel in the face with the gun, knocking out a tooth, and shoved him out of the car. Battreall drove off, but crashed in the 1300 block of Emerald Street and the car was totaled.

Battreall remains in the George Bailey Detention Facility without bail. He has pleaded not guilty.

PANGA OPERATORS OFF LA JOLLA GET PRISON TERMS

Two operators of a panga boat involved in a deadly smuggling venture that resulted in one drowning death off La Jolla were sentenced Monday (Dec. 13) to 71 and 60 months in federal prison.

The panga's captain, Victor Alfonso Soto Aguilar, 37, received the 71 month term from U.S. District Court Judge John Houston. Jose Ramon Geraldo Romero, 24,

who assisted Soto in boat operations in lieu of paying a smuggling fee, got the 5-year term.

Rogelio Perez Gutierrez, 43, a citizen of Mexico, was found unconscious in the water on May 20 in the early morning hours, but he was pronounced dead once lifeguards arrived on scene.

The small boat was overloaded beyond capacity. Around 5:23 a.m., the operators instructed all 14 passengers to remove their life jackets and jump in the water about 80 yards from Marine Street Beach in La Jolla, according to court documents.

They were told the water was shallow, but Gutierrez could not keep afloat and he drowned.

"A human being is not here because of the risk you were willing to take," said the judge to both defendants.

Houston spoke of the "extraordinary danger" of smuggling on the high seas. He said both men should tell people of the consequences of what they did.

"This was a tragedy that never should have happened," said Acting U.S. Attorney Randy Grossman in a press release afterwards.

"We urge anyone who is contemplating an attempt to cross the border illegally: Don't do it. Don't put your life in the hands of greedy smugglers who care about money, not you," said Grossman.

Reaction from the Coast Guard Monday was similar.

Expanded Museum of Contemporary Art San Diego in La Jolla to reopen in April

glimpse into the new state-of-the-art Museum of Contemporary Art San Diego in La Jolla revealed a maze of indoor galleries in cavernous climate-controlled surroundings.


The museum's indoor exhibit space is now quadrupled offering outdoor patios with sweeping ocean views. The museum's remodel/expansion also pays homage to the building's extensive architectural heritage.

A special sneak peek at La Jolla's vastly improved \$105 million renovations and expansion of MCASD by world-renowned Seldorf Architects was led on Dec. 15 by Kathryn Kanjo, the David C. Copley director/CEO of MCASD.

"We had the one chance to do the renovation," said Kanjo. "We went big. We went deep. We gathered the space."

Kanjo pointed out the updated MCASD has about 40,000 square feet of exhibit space compared with only about 10,000 feet previously. She said the museum is now appropriately sized to fulfill its many needs.

"With the Seldorf expansion, MCASD's flagship building is, at last, scaled to showcase the work it has collected over the past decades," she said. "Soaring ceilings and natural light allow for inviting displays of the collection alongside lively changing exhibitions."

Added Kanjo: "The design honors the museum's rich architectural history as it frames distinctive views of La Jolla Village and the coast, providing an updated space for the art and today's audience. We look forward to inviting the public to explore our world, our region, and ourselves through the prism of contemporary art."

MCASD La Jolla is scheduled to reopen to the public in April.

Of the museum's refit, principal architect Annabelle Selldorf said, "Our goal for the museum was to allow the fantastic site and views of the Pacific Ocean to guide a coherent circulation path and instill

a generous and inclusive spirit to bring people to the great collection of MCASD."

MCASD traces its roots to La Jolla philanthropist Ellen Browning Scripps whose modern oceanfront dwelling in La Jolla, completed in 1916 by noted architect Irving Gill (1870-1936), served as the museum's first location in 1941. The property has since undergone several architecturally distinct expansions. Mosher & Drew completed a series of expansions in 1950, 1960, and again in the late 1970s.

There was also a 1996 renovation of the La Jolla property by Venturi, Scott Brown and

Associates, which restored the Scripps House facade, added Axline Court, and enhanced the museum's garden and cafe.

"We are an 80-year-old institution collecting art from 1950," said Kanjo. "We needed more space to show our collection of more than 5,000 pieces, which are now in a 25,000-square-foot storage facility. We're expecting to bring pieces back and have them on a longer-term view, while simultaneously being able to have special exhibitions."

Kanjo conducted a grand tour of the new, improved, and expanded museum, winding through its diverse exhibit spaces with towering ceilings located on multiple levels.

Asked why Annabelle Seldorf from the East Coast was selected to do the museum remodel, Kanjo replied, "She had designed such exquisite art spaces, not just for museums but also for commercial art galleries. Also, we chose her for her ability to deal with historical renovations. She is not the kind of architect who comes in and plops something new down. She works very pragmatically with the community and with what she's given."

Kanjo noted permitting delays not related to COVID have extended the museum's renovation/expansion. "Construction has taken 32 months so far, and it was supposed to have taken 28," she said.

INAUGURAL MCASD EXHIBITION

For its inaugural curated exhibition, MCASD in April will introduce a presentation titled "Niki de Saint Phalle in the 1960s." It will be the first exhibition to focus on the experimental and prolific work of trailblazing French-American artist and sculptor Niki de Sainte Phalle (1930-2002), during this formative decade of her work.

On view through July, the Saint Phalle exhibit will feature numerous works from European collections, many seen in the United States for the first time. The exhibition will explore this transformative 10-year period of Saint Phalle's work when she embarked on two of her most significant series: the tirs, or "shooting paintings," and the exuberant sculptures of women she called Nanas.

Affirming the artist's place in post-war art history, this show will highlight her prescient works of performance, participatory, and feminist art, as well as her many transatlantic projects and collaborations.

"While local audiences are familiar with Saint Phalle's later fantastical works of public art, we in Southern California have had less exposure to her radical work of the 1960s, which put into circulation strikingly original representations that resonate strongly in our moment," said Jill Dawsey, MCASD La Jolla's curator. "Saint Phalle had an important relationship to this region. In the early '60s, she staged several shooting sessions in Los Angeles, in what were among the earliest instances of performance art in Southern California. She would eventually settle in San Diego in the 1990s."

"Having spent the last years of her life in La Jolla, many of Saint Phalle's fantastical creatures and visionary environments cover our landscape and resonate with the community," said Kathryn Kanjo, MCASD's director/CEO. "This rare presentation from a pivotal period in the artist's career is a gift to our public and a homecoming for the artist."

"We absorbed a lot of the delays because it was such a big project."

Kanjo said the museum's reconfigured space now includes onsite underground staff parking. The former Sherwood Auditorium has been converted into an exhibition space.

SEA LION ADVOCACY

SURF-DRIVEN MURAL

A community-driven surfboard garden mosaic mural was being created to invigorate the look and appeal of Pacific Beach Rec Center at 1405 Diamond St. Muralist Rob Tobin agreed to do the high-profile community artwork.

MOBILE HOME CLEANUP DELAYED

A proposal by Campland on the Bay to demolish vacant mobile homes at the former De Anza Cove mobile home park and convert about 150 mobile home sites there into RV spaces, was paused after the California Coastal Commission attached numerous conditions to those plans.

JUNE

FIESTA ISLAND OPTION

The California Coastal Commission selected Option B favored by Fiesta Island Dog Owners (FIDO) keeping the island intact and undivided while increasing the fenced, off-leash area as part of an amendment to the Mission Bay Park Master Plan to update the land uses of Fiesta Island.

VACCINATIONS PITCHED

Nancy Yam, associate chief pharmacy officer at UC San Diego Health, threw out the ceremonial first pitch at the San Diego Padres' reopening game June 17, two days after the state lifted most COVID restrictions for outdoor gatherings.

GRAND REOPENING

La Jolla Village Merchants Association on June 15 held a grand ribbon-cutting ceremony celebrating 38 businesses that opened, or were opening, during the past 15 months of COVID. The celebratory event was held at Sotheby's Plaza, 1111 Prospect Ave.

JULY

FIREWORKS FIZZLE

La Jolla Fireworks Foundation organizers lambasted the last-minute cancellation by the City of the return of Fourth of July fireworks at the Cove due to permitting problems. A court challenge was brought by environmental attorney Bryan Pease; and the California Coastal Commission decided that a permit was required to host the pyrotechnics event.

ROLLER SKATING TREND

Roller skating, a lifestyle on wheels, has become a growing trend along the beachfront and the epicenter for artistic expression and forming friendships. Not just a hobby, the new trend was here to stay as a form of exercise and transportation.

OLYMPIC SURFING DEBUTS

As if he'd just mastered a big wave, International Surfing Association president Fernando Aguerre of La Jolla was in Tokyo just prior to the Summer Olympic Games rejoicing as his 20-plus year effort to make surfing an Olympic sport had ended in triumph. "It was a long battle, and not an easy one, but a good surfer never really gives up; you stay on the wave," said Aguerre of his accomplishment.

VILLAGE ENHANCEMENTS

The community's maintenance assessment district, Enhance La Jolla, unveiled phase one of a long-range plan to improve community gathering spaces by reclaiming and increasing space for pedestrians, street furniture, and landscape.

ADMINISTERING YOUR TRUST UPON YOUR DEATH

You may wonder what is involved when your successor trustee administers your revocable living trust following your death. Here are the primary actions (not necessarily sequential) your successor trustee will need to take:

- 1. Arrange for the on-going care of your pets; secure your home; and make the final arrangements for the disposition of your body.
- 2. Order several Death Certificates through the mortuary to be used in connection with closing financial accounts and transferring title to real property.
- 3. Mail out "Notice to Beneficiary/ Heir" letters as required by California law.
- 4. Obtain preliminary value of your estate to determine whether a federal estate tax return may need to be filed with the IRS (within nine (9) months from the date of your death).
- 5. Notify the California Department of Health Care Services as required by California law if you received or may have received any benefits from Medi-Cal.
- 6. Open a new checking account in the trust name (or convert an existing account). This account will be used to pay all of your debts and on-going trust expenses. In this connection, obtain from the IRS a new income tax reporting number (EIN) for the trust which the bank will require, since your trust became irrevocable upon your death.
- 7. Transfer title to all financial/brokerage accounts from your name into the successor trustee's name, or close (sell the assets in) all or some of such accounts and transfer the proceeds into the new account in the trust referred to in Para. 6 above.
- 8. Locate all outstanding bills and pay same from the account referred to in Para 6. above.
- 9. Make claim for any death benefit(s) payable on your death.



- 10. As to any personal property in your estate, have an appraisal of such property made by an estate personal property appraiser, and sell such property and deposit the sale proceeds into the trust bank account, or divide such property among the entitled beneficiaries based on value or as otherwise required by the terms of your trust.
- 11. Obtain date of death values of all other property in your estate. Your banks and brokerage firms can provide the trustee with a statement(s) covering the time of your death and/or a letter providing the date of death value(s) of such account(s). The trustee will probably need to hire a qualified real estate appraiser to value your real property(ies) (needed for income tax basis purposes).
- 12. The trustee should keep a good record of all trust income and expenses and trust distributions, since an accounting should typically be provided to each beneficiary at the end of the trust administration.
- 13. The trustee should pay to himself or herself the compensation he or she is entitled to under the terms of the trust; and if none is provided for, "reasonable compensation" as authorized by California law.
- 14. After all estate expenses and debts have been paid, make the distributions to your beneficiaries called for by the trust.
- 15. Have an accountant prepare and file the needed income tax returns for you and for the trust.

I was good to go to type gimpy-handed on the heavy-duty manual Underwood typewriter I churned feature stories out on. I don't remember if I successfully blocked my opponent's shot.

All of this was memory background when I attended three

of the four days of the Holiday Classic on Dec. 27-30 at Torrey Pines High School, as well as a morning at a secondary site, St. Augustine High. John Olive, the long-time Falcons boys basketball coach, was able to resume the nationally-recognized tourney after a hiatus due to COVID in 2021. DeMatha and Iona Prep, two Eastern entities, had to cancel before the tournament even started, and many more had to have their respective participation adjusted.

New state laws address animal welfare, police reform, and cocktails

ew laws on the books in California in 2022 address everything from COVID guidelines to racial profiling and systemic racism to a minimum-wage hike, price gouging, property taxes, domestic abuse, and fire protection.

Here are a few of the more noteworthy laws that took effect Jan. 1:

 Minimum Wage: All employees in San Diego who perform at least two hours of work in one or more calendar weeks of the year within the City will receive a wage increase from \$14 to \$15 an hour. SB 3 requires the minimum wage for all industries employing 26 or more employees to rise to \$15, and \$14 for employers employing 25 or fewer workers.

- Animal Welfare: Proposition 12, approved by voters in 2018, makes metal enclosures that restrict pigs from turning around and cages that prevent hens from opening their wings illegal.

– Cocktails to-go: SB 389 allows getting cocktails and wine to go with your dinner order at

restaurants extended until Dec. 31, 2026. The delivery of cocktails alone, however, ended Dec. 31, 2021.

– Food Delivery Apps: In an effort to support delivery workers and increase billing transparency, AB 286 makes it illegal for food delivery apps to retain any portion of a tip or gratuity. If the order is for delivery, that tip must go to the individual worker. If the order is for pickup, the gratuity must go to the restaurant.

- Police Reform: AB 1475 protects the rights of people arrested but not yet prosecuted, forbidding

law enforcement from posting mug shots of those arrested on suspicion of non-violent crimes.

- Rape: A new law alters California's penal code to make rape within marriage the same in every legal sense as any instance of rape.

Police Decertification:
 Another noteworthy new law allows police officers who've committed misconduct to be decertified. Previously, problematic officers could sometimes find employment in other areas without repercussions. Now they will have their license revoked and

not be able to simply switch departments after being fired.

– Campus Products: AB 367 requires California public schools, including colleges, to provide free menstrual products to students. The signing of the bill followed a nationwide push for affordable access to pads, tampons and other items.

- Traffic Safety: AB 43 authorizes local authorities to reduce speed limits to protect the safety of vulnerable groups such as pedestrians and cyclists.






