Grantville shopping center stalker sentenced to one year of probation

City Attorney Mara Elliott announced recently that a San Diego man accused of harassing women at a Grantville shopping center has been sentenced to one year of probation and ordered to undergo therapy.

Orlando Joseph Chavez was charged with false imprisonment and battery related to a series of events at a strip mall on Friars Road where he accosted women in the parking lot, sometimes by crawling underneath their cars so they couldn't leave. He told one woman, "You can flatten me out any time."

Chavez, 73, pleaded guilty to misdemeanor false imprisonment. In addition to probation, a San Diego Superior Court Judge ordered Chavez to spend a year enrolled in STOP (Stalking Treatment Options Program), and he was ordered to stay away

from the shopping area parking lot. At his sentencing hearing, Chavez also pleaded guilty to a subsequent charge of soliciting prostitution.

Chavez had a documented history of approaching women in the parking lot of the same mall, telling them it looked like their cars were leaking, then crawling underneath the vehicles - effectively holding them captive. There were at least six known incidents involving Chavez between 2018 and 2020, when he was arrested and charged.

In one case he grabbed a woman by the arm. After she called her supervisor for help, he told them, "You girls are so pretty and should come with me," according to an affidavit for an arrest warrant filed with the Court. He approached one woman who worked in the shopping center on three occasions. When she refused to engage with him the third time, he followed her into her workplace and asked for her, according to the affidavit.

Another incident was observed by an off-duty San Diego police officer, who saw Chavez climb under a woman's car. The officer ordered Chavez to come out from under the car at least five times before he did. Chavez then velled that he wasn't doing anything wrong, got into his truck, and drove off. At least twice Chavez reportedly harassed women and then followed them in his truck as they drove out of the mall parking lot.

He approached yet another victim as she waited to pick up her children at school. He was investigated for stalking that woman for nearly two years and for slashing the tires of her husband's car.


Following a few heartbreaking one-goal losses early in the season to Westview and Carlsbad, the team was able to reflect on those losses, process their successes and failures and continue progressing



Why Don't Republicans Value Americans' Lives AFTER They're Born?

Over the last several weeks, a grim and familiar American ritual has played out across the

Family members in Buffalo, N.Y., arranged funerals and grieved openly as they mourned loved ones who had been gunned down as they shopped in a supermarket, for no other reason than they were black. In Uvalde, Texas, church services, one after the other, centered around tiny caskets, as parents buried their nine- and 10-yearolds, who were shot as they sat in their classroom.

In a similarly ritualized response, most American people reacted with outrage and horror, and voiced the heartfelt demand that our government take some action, to do something, that might make these uniquely American tragedies less frequent or less deadly. But not all Americans. Republican officeholders have, as they do

after every mass shooting, offer empty platitudes of mourning for the victims' families, while steadfastly refusing to do a damn thing to prevent or lessen future tragedies. Rightwingers are quick to condemn calls for action as "politicizing" the tragedy.

The risible and unctuous Ted Cruz excoriated people for "politicizing" suffering after a massacre, even as he himself would stand at an NRA convention two days later, doing that very thing. So apparently "politics" should not be part of saving American Lives. Yet we know for empirical fact that sensible gun regulations save lives. State laws that require a permit, with a background check, to purchase a firearm are associated with 60 % fewer mass shootings. Similarly, research show that states with bans on large capacity magazines are associated with 38% fewer fatalities in mass shootings, and 77% fewer nonfatal injuries. And a 2019 study found that as many as 21 mass shootings in America could have been prevented by so-called "red flag laws," that allow police to

take firearms away from people who exhibit threatening behavior. If the GOP considers itself "pro life," why wouldn't they support these widely popular and commonsense proposals?

Because the Republican Party isn't "pro life," it's pro birth. At the same time Republicans turn a cold heart and a blind eye to the public massacres of innocent black folks and schoolchildren, they are steaming full speed ahead to "politicize" when and how American women choose to become mothers. But their stomach-churning hypocrisy is doubled when one considers that, even as they proudly become the "pro fetus" party, they are simultaneously pursuing laws that disregard the well-being of both new mothers, and those same fetuses, once they've become babies.

GOP-led states are passing laws that will increase unplanned pregnancies, while limiting access to healthcare and programs for mothers with babies. The U.S. has the highest maternal death rate in the developed world. But as Republicans gleefully pass legislation to force

women to give birth, they are limiting access the very services intended to save or help them. Federal Republicans fought the law requiring health insurers to provide no-cost coverage of FDA-approved contraceptives. They also steadfastly refuse to support efforts to institute paid parental leave, universal prekindergarten, and the Biden administration's expanded child tax credit to benefit the poorest mothers and their children. And the GOP-governed states that are most radically changing the laws to force women to give birth, are the same states the refuse to expand Medicare coverage, at no cost to them, which is how most low-income moms and their infants stay healthy and alive.

So Republicans tell us that we can't politicize the pain and loss of the mass murder of little children. But the GOP, at all levels, demands that we politicize some of the most difficult moments in a woman's life: when she faces a life-threatening pregnancy complication; if she has

How to avoid rental scams



Rental housing in San Diego County is a precious commodity and usually comes at premium cost. Now, bad actors are taking advantage of increased demand, by using popular payment apps and COVID-19 social distancing practices to scam trusting consumers and avoid detection.

Rental scams have historically been a problem for consumers and law enforcement. Fraudsters target hopeful renters using fake or hijacked

pricing. In fake listings, scammers post pictures of properties they have no association with, then create a false advertisement to lure renters.

Hijacked property listings involve targeting an actual rental listing and reposting it with the scammer's e-mail and phone number. When a potential renter shows interest, fraudsters rely on high-pressure sales tactics to create a sense of urgency, requiring a deposit to hold the property. Once the scammer receives the money, they disappear.

In the past, it was easier to identify scams.

property listings with attractive Scammers required money wires or cash, avoided in-person contact and refused to allow renters to tour a property without first paying a deposit all red flags that would have derailed the scam. But now, those practices are normal and bad actors are taking advantage of the perfect storm that relies on electronic communication, the ease of electronic transactions such as Venmo or PayPal and avoids in-person interactions.

HERE ARE WAYS SCAMMERS WORK:

• They place ads on websites such as Craigslist and Zillow and social media apps, often listing the properties below market value to entice unsuspecting They take advantage of

- social distancing protocols by avoiding in-person meetings and requiring electronic communication and money transfers.
- When potential renters ask for a tour prior to paying, scammers use technology to provide fictitious virtual tours or conduct video tours of a hijacked property listing.

As new methods for conducting business change, it has become more difficult to identify rental scammers, but there are still some telltale signs of fraud.


"I'm very excited and grateful that I have been given the opportunity for this," Robertson said.

about the people and places of San Diego and how they have helped make San Diego the beloved city that it is. Her novel mentions some of these places as


well as a walking group, in real life called Walkabout, International. Participating in that group helped give structure to Robertson's life as well as provide inspiration for scenes in her novel.

a miscarriage; when she must decide whether to give up a baby she is unable to support, or even to face having to endure a pregnancy caused by rape or incest.

That is today's Republican Party. An institution dedicated to protect the freedoms of a potential mass murderer, while actively working to deprive a woman of freedom over her most profound life decisions. An institution that professes concern for a fetus, but callously disregards the life of a little girl in her classroom. An institution that claims to support a 'culture of life,' but willfully refuses to act to protect or value human life, once it's no longer ensconced in a womb.

It is not "politicizing" to strive to use our political institutions to end our horrifying tradition of institutional indifference to the mass slayings of our citizens. It isn't "politicizing" to insist our political institutions recognize the value of a mother's life, just as much as we value the life of her child. forward. Coach (Andrew) O'Neill urges his players to try new skills and tactics in practice and often uses the term "fail forward" which he believes will help the team learn and develop individual skills and improve their overall game IQ. Those early season losses were lessons learned and helped the team stay mentally strong in one-goal games in both the CIF semifinal over La Jolla and CIF final over Coronado. In both of those games, Patrick Henry held three-goal leads.

In the CIF semifinal against La Jolla, Patrick Henry was up 9-6 going into the fourth quarter and La Jolla fought back with three goals of their own to take the game to overtime, 9-9. All momentum going into overtime was leaning towards La Jolla, but Patrick Henry knew they controlled their destiny and had to focus on making a play at a time rather than letting the big moment and emotions settle in. Twenty seconds into overtime the game was over as Eli Kell picked up a loose ball following a penalty, beat a defender and scored with a bounce shot over the goalies' shoulder to send the Patriots to the finals, 10-9.

Similarly, in the CIF final, the Patriots were up 7-5 in the fourth quarter and gave up three straight goals to go down 8-7 to Coronado with less than five minutes to play. Following a big defensive save by senior captain Ethan Pham, the Patriots cleared the ball and pushed transition, leading to a game-tying goal by Jack Denton. Soon after, Hans Sweatt picked up a tough ground ball after a blocked shot and fed Connor Stagner for the game-winning

goal. Henry was then able to retain possession and run out the clock for the remainder of the game. Back-to-back CIF championships completed.

The Patriots attribute their successes to the strong bonds and cultural norms they've established within their lacrosse program. Each graduating class has left the program in a better place than when they found it and have continuously moved the needle of success in the right direction. The foundation was set and the Patriots triumphs the past two seasons are a result of following through on the standards and legacies of the players before them.

This 2022 team believed they were better friends off the field than any other team they were playing, so their on-field effort and relationships were simply stronger. Their leadership and standards are also seen in the classroom where the team holds an average GPA of a 3.5 with eight of the 11 graduating seniors finishing their cumulative GPA's greater than a 4.0. Seven of those seniors will be continuing their lacrosse careers in college as well as one playing hockey at the next level.

within the eastern San Diego and East County communities. During his time as head coach at Patrick Henry, the Patriots are 61-32 and have won two SDCC Eastern League titles, a Division II CIF championship, and a Division I CIF championship.

O'Neill is also the founder and boys director of Mission Trails Lacrosse Club (MTLC) which is a non-profit 501c3 serving the Patrick Henry cluster of elementary and middle schools and surrounding neighborhoods. From what started with a small youth program of 25 boys annual players in 2017, there's now nine teams consisting of over 150 boys and girls annually. O'Neill also coached the 5th/6th grade MTLC team that just repeated as back-to-back 5/6 A Division championships.

- Use caution with ads that have significant grammatical errors or misspellings. A legitimate rental listing should be professional.
- Verify the rental by checking known real estate websites to ensure the home exists, is located at the listed address and is available as a rental.
- Do an online search of the rental company to see if there are any bad reviews or warnings of scams about it.
- · Be cautious of high-pressure rental tactics requiring you to make a deposit or payment quickly. Speed and urgency are the fraudster's tools.
- Meet your landlord in person. Avoid a completely cyber transaction which could make it difficult to identify the
- Never make a deposit or payment before seeing the property and signing a lease. • Make sure the owner or agent has
- access to the rental unit. Tour the unit or have someone you trust tour the unit.
 - Don't settle for an exterior tour.
- Never wire money or pay in cash, cryptocurrency, or gift cards. Wiring money is the same as sending cash and impossible to recover.

2. Such a project needs approval from the district. This involves a lot of time, red tape, patience and challenges.

3. The scope of such a project is expensive; estimated to be at \$300,000.

"Our school and our kids with gravel-scraped bandaged knees has been yearning for this seemingly impossible dream as long as all our families can remember," Gross added.

Longtime kindergarten teacher Sue Sward noted, "I was at a staff meeting in the fall of 1996 when the principal asked us how to spend \$10,000. I said "GRASS! Let's plant grass!" the whole staff looked at me like I had lost my mind. The principal said, "Grass is expensive. It would take a miracle for us to get a grass lawn." These

parents are our miracle workers. They are making it happen and we are forever grateful all of the families who have supported our school community."

According to Benchley-Weinberger Foundation President Stephanie Stocking, the goal is to provide students with a safe place to exercise, make connections with peers, all the while engaging in outdoor learning.

"Our families have focused fund-raising efforts on installing nearly 40,000 square feet of artificial turf for a safe and beautiful place to play and learn," Stocking remarked. "The primary playground is the designated space for recess for grades 1-3, the space we gather for assemblies, the area used for our annual jog-athon, and the location for PE and other outdoor activities."

To her knowledge, Stocking said the school has never had a grass or turf field in the areas where the project is focusing on.

"We are approaching our project in two phases, and the first field – approximately 22,000

square feet – is scheduled to have turf installed in August – just in time for the students to return in the fall," Stocking commented. "Our goal is to continue the momentum and raise the funds needed to install turf on the second field – approximately 15,000 square feet – in summer 2023. We need to raise these funds in addition to the money we raise to fund enrichment programs, pay for a reading interventionist, support the media lab, and other ongoing commitments to the school."

As Stocking noted, "We are unfortunately the only school in our area without grass or turf, so we have been figuring this out as we go along. The Foundation is composed of 15 parents who are volunteering our time to help improve and enrich our school. We would love to have a green space like the other schools in the Patrick Henry cluster."

Stocking added that parents and others involved in the project would like to get some sponsorships.

"We would be really excited to have sponsorships from local businesses, and we have planned ways to recognize sponsors through banners on the school fences and inclusion in newsletters to our school community," Stocking remarked. "We would also be so grateful for direct donations to our project. This is an amazing neighborhood school in a fantastic neighborhood

and community, and we believe that we can all come together to make this huge change to campus that will benefit students for years to come."



Allied Gardens/Grantville Community Council: Reflecting on coming to the community

The other day as I was coming up Waring Road from I-8 I had a sudden rush of recall, the memory of the first time we came to this community.

We were frustrated with apartment living and had been looking for a house for almost two years, but our search had not brought us to or through Allied Gardens. On this day our realtor told us about some possibilities in the area, so here we were.

Our first look was the shopping center. Within walking distance from most residences and only a short drive from the rest, it had a variety of goods and services that made frequent trips out of the area unlikely. The composition of the stores has changed over the past 54 years, but only to adapt to the changing needs and tastes of our neighbors.

With that first look behind us we began working the open houses

As we drove from block to block and visited house after house we learned how special these residences are.

Built in the late 1950s and early 1960s there were at least five different building styles with varying orientations that, even before all the changes the owners made, avoided the drab sameness of so many subdivisions that preceded and followed. This subdivision was the first to use copper plumbing. It was the last to build the houses on foundations rather than on concrete slabs. It was the last to have interiors walls made with lath and plaster rather than with dry wall. And the last to complete the houses with high quality oak flooring. They are solid buildings made to last, structures ready for the additions and modifications we have made over the years.

The housing development provided for two elementary schools, a middle school, a library, an expansive park that nestled next to the extensive grounds of the middle school, provision for a swimming pool, and open space in the canyons. By the time we moved in the folks in the community had already raised many churches. More than 60 years after the first house was sold we still have those amenities. The really good things in life, and in Allied Gardens, don't change.

We quickly got to know our neighbors. Most were original buyers and many were working in the aircraft industry, then the pride of San Diego. Warm, caring, and welcoming folks, folks to whom we turned and who turned to us in times of

After we were settled in on this cul-de-sac street of 18 houses we counted 42 children, not counting those who had already grown up and left the street. Our daughter made it 43 and our son, born a month after we moved in, was number 44. We used to talk about curb-to-curb children. They were safe to play in the street and to stay out after the street lights came on. When it came to hide and seek or kick the can, every bush and back yard was fair territory. This is how it was throughout Allied Gardens.

Allied Gardens is well over 60 but really hasn't changed that much from what it was. There are a few first-time buyers still holding on, sometimes as occupants and sometimes as lessors. There are many who grew up here, moved on, and then

BE SURE TO "FUND" YOUR TRUST AS PART OF THE ESTATE PLANNING PROCESS

You may have a beautifully prepared Declaration of Trust or Trust Agreement which sets forth your exact intentions and directions as to whom is to receive the property in your trust (in the trust estate) when you die.

However, unless you transferred your titled assets, such as a house, bank accounts, or stock brokerage accounts, at or after the time you created your trust, when you die these titled assets, depending upon their values, may well require a probate (long, costly court procedure) to enable their respective titles to be transferred into your trust, before your successor trustee can transfer these assets out of the trust to your intended trust beneficiaries. Simply listing these titled assets on a schedule attached to your Declaration of Trust is not enough. You must transfer your legal ownership in each such asset to yourself as trustee of your trust.



Typically at the time your trust instrument is prepared, your attorney will prepare the deed necessary to transfer legal title to your home into your trust, and you yourself will be responsible for transferring the other titled assets into your trust. This process is often called "funding" your trust. And it is somewhat of a hassle for some folks to do this. This is because you usually must personally visit your bank to change title to bank accounts and must correspond with stock brokerage firms and complete lengthy forms to transfer your brokerage accounts. But all your effort is certainly worthwhile, if by doing so you avoid a probate!

Matilija Poppy has a long history

You probably know that the California Poppy (Eschscholzia californica) is the state flower of California. But did you know that the Matilija Poppy (Romneya coulteri) was the runner-up in that contest?

In 1890, the California State Floral Society held an election to determine the state's signature flower. The contestants were the Mariposa Lily, the Matilija Poppy, and the California Poppy won that election by a landslide. In 1903, the state legislature made the title official.

The Matilija Poppy did not fade away into obscurity, however.

The huge size and spectacular beauty of its flowers made it an ornamental garden favorite. It even became popular in England, where it gained the Royal Horticultural Society's Award of Garden Merit. In sandy soil in California, it grows via rhizomes, and thus it can grow under your house and come out the other side, under driveways, or consume your entire yard.

The Matilija Poppy may have gotten its name from Chief Matilija of the Chumash peoples whose ancestral lands were in present-day Santa Barbara and Ventura Counties and the Channel Islands.

Chumash descendant Julie Turnamalt-Stenslie wrote in My Chumash Ancestral Legacy about the story of Chief Matilija's daughter, Amatil, who was in love with a handsome warrior, Cocopah, who was tragically killed in battle. "Amatil's love was so deep and so pure that she laid upon her lover and there she died. What remained of that love was a beautiful flower with pure white petals symbolizing their love and a yellow center to represent the everlasting brilliance of their love. We know this flower as the Matilija Poppy."

The Chumash are reported to have used the plant for skin and gum problems and stomach upset. Fresh leaves and flowers were crushed and made into a poultice that was

Trinitea Tea: Great stop for an afternoon refresher

Let's talk tea.

Some trivia first - did you know that black, green, yellow and white teas as well as Oolong Tea all come from the same tea plant called Camellia Sinensis? They are processed differently to get different levels of oxidation.

Trinitea Tea, on the corner of Navajo Road and Lake Murray Blvd, by Grossmont College, is part of the trend in teahouses with a variety of teas for our experimentation. Sure, you can also get coffee and smoothies, but the main focus is tea.

A little back-story is necessary. Bubble Tea (also called Pearl Milk Tea, Bubble Milk Tea, Tapioca Milk Tea or Boba Tea) originated in Taiwan in the 1980's and made its way across the Pacific to America shortly thereafter. Now it has spread throughout the world and many people are enjoying bubble teas or Boba teas. Bubble teas come with or without milk, add a fruit flavor, a sweetener, and chewy textured tapioca pearls, which sink to the bottom of the cup. These tiny balls of deliciousness can be regular or popping, which burst in your mouth when you chew them.

"People come here because they want something a little different. They might need an afternoon pickme-up or want to enjoy a smoothie or even a hot tea," said Leo Cotton, manager of Trinitea Tea. "Some people want a Taro Ice Slush which is purple and has no caffeine and some want a Vietnamese coffee that

has six shots of espresso. Some like the snow Boba which is a cross between a smoothie and a milkshake." With a tea base, you can customize your drink a multitude of ways with sweeteners, toppings, Boba, milk or different types of milk.

The lounge area is inviting with comfortable chairs. Grab a game or a table and chair to do some computer work. Purchase a tea, plug in your device and get to work.

Some intriguing drinks that sound scary but taste awesome are the Cheese Bobas. "The cheese foam tastes like cheesecake," Cotton said. "One of our popular teas is the Thai Tea which is an orange tea with lavender milk and caramel snow Boba."

"We only offer one food item and that's an Acai or Dragon Bowl. It's a sorbet with fresh fruit topped with granola in a bowl."



The residents on Turnford Drive in San Carlos held their fourth disaster preparedness meeting last month.

The families on this street, consisting of 21 homes, are being prepared with their own emergency kits in the event of a natural disaster such as an earthquake or fire.

Present also at the meeting was District 7 council member Raul Campillo, district representative Anthony Hackett, and Tony Cruz representing SDG&E. Valuable handouts from The Red Cross and SDG&E were distributed.

Residents were made aware again on how to shut off water and gas in the event of an emergency. People need to understand that it could be three to five days or longer without help, so having emergency supplies on hand is essential.

Below are a few bullet points on disaster preparation:

- Keep emergency cash on hand. ATMs and banks might not be functioning. Stores will only accept cash for food, water, gasoline, etc., so small bills, no larger that \$20.00 should make up your emergency cash.
- Keep a supply of bottled water on hand and rotate new every 3 months.
- Your BBQ might be your only way of preparing hot food and boiling water. Keep an extra canister of propane on hand.
- Prepare a disaster kit with necessary items including medical supplies. Make sure that any medications that you take are available to take. You never know how long it will take pharmacies to be back up and running. If you have pets, make their food part of your emergency kit, and rotate to keep fresh.

These, and many more helpful suggestions, are available from the San Diego Office of Disaster Preparedness, The American Red Cross and SDG&E.

Home prices continue to rise despite rising interest rates

The rise in home prices continues with little signs of a slowdown.

The College Area, San Carlos, Allied Gardens, and Del Cerro all have had significant increases in single family home prices since the beginning of this year. You have likely read that mortgage rates have greatly increased recently but historically, rates are still low, in the 5's for well qualified buyers.

Rates haven't had much of an effect on slowing down property inflation. If rates get into the 7 or 8 percent range, a greater slowdown is expected, but it's not clear how much further rates will increase. Back in the very late 1970's, mortgage rates were over 10%. That clearly resulted in a slowdown in the economy.

I have a buyer who is waiting for home prices to drop 20% like they did in 2008, but I let them know that scenario is unlikely as we are in a different environment than in 2008.

Our current economy is experiencing significant price inflation in everything from food, to energy prices, to services. Fundamentals of economics state that it typically takes many years to return to price stability. Also, San Diego lacks any meaningful new development.

Back in the 1960's, 1970's, and 1980's, there were huge new housing developments under construction all over the county. And in the 1990's, Carmel Valley was built out but today, there are very few new housing developments being created. I read that San Diego needs a minimum of 100,000 new housing units just in the short-term to keep up with natural population growth, but that is not happening.

Our housing supply is somewhat fixed or growing very slowly but with demand continuing to grow annually. Many people in their late 20's and 30's are making good money in San Diego (in healthcare and high tech jobs for example) and are searching for property ownership. Mortgage rates in the 5 or 6 percent range will not deter these buyers.

Many people are purchasing homes as rental properties in order to have an investment that protects against the inflation that may be occurring for quite a few more years, further increasing demand for housing.

Another issue is no one is selling. People are holding onto their properties with mortgage rates in the 3's. Inventory is still ridiculously low. The United States Federal government is sitting on \$30 trillion in debt. As rates rise, interest in that debt greatly increases, causing more budget deficits, and more debt resulting in a weaker dollar and likely continued inflation. "A dollar won't be worth a dime." Expect home prices to continue to rise.

MARKET REPORT (single family homes): 92115 - College Area, the median home price hit \$1,100,000 which is a 25% increase since the beginning of the vear. 92119 - San Carlos, the median home price for May was \$1,075,000, a 17% rise since the beginning of the year. 92120 Allied Gardens, Del Cerro had a median price \$1,157,000, a 10% rise since the beginning of the year.

applied to irritated skin. For gastroenteritis from bad food, an infusion was made from the leaves, floral parts, and smaller green stems. Despite the pleasant fragrance and medicinal uses, the plant contains strong chemicals to repel herbivores and mild saponins that can cause skin irritation and gastric issues in humans.

Romneya is a genus of flowering plants in the poppy family (Papaveraceae). There are two species in the genus Romneya, which was named for the Irish astronomer John Thomas Romney Robinson. Coulter's Matilija Poppy (Romneya coulteri) commemorates Thomas Coulter, an Irish botanist and explorer who first collected the Matilija Poppy in California in 1831-32. The Hairy Matilija Poppy (Romneya trichocalyx) has hairy sepals on the flower buds and is overall a smaller plant with smaller flowers.

Determining the range of the two species is difficult, because some authorities do not recognize R. trichocalyx as a distinct species, but rather as a variant of R. Coulteri. Moreover, the popularity of the Matilija Poppy led to the planting of both species, or hybrids of the two species, in many places throughout San Diego County, including in Mission Trails. To simplify matters, the term "Matilija Poppy" will be used to refer to both species.

In the wild, the Matilija Poppy has a limited range, extending from Ventura County south to northern Baja California, where it grows in dry canyons, in chaparral and coastal sage scrub plant communities.

It is a tall shrub that may exceed 2.5 meters in height. The inflorescence is a large solitary flower with six crinkly white petals, each up to 10 centimeters long. At the center of the flower is a cluster of many vellow stamens. The fruit is a bristly capsule 3 or 4 centimeters long containing many tiny seeds. The flower is the largest of any

species native to California. It is a fire follower. The California Native Plant Society's Rare Plant Inventory gives Coulter's Matilija Poppy (R. coulteri) a rank of 4.2 (a plant of limited distribution and moderately threatened in California). Hairy Matilija Poppy (R. trichocalyx) was considered but rejected for the Rare Plant Inventory.

There are several stands of Matilija Poppy in Mission Trails. One stand is off the Oak Grove Loop near Mission Gorge Road. There are other stands of Matilija Poppy near Old Mission Dam, along the Rim Trail near the 52 freeway, and near the East Fortuna Staging Area.

Look for the huge, beautiful flowers of the runner-up state flower in April, May, and June.

Would you have voted for the Matilija Poppy, or for its small orange cousin, the California Poppy?


