La Mesa's one-stop boulevard for shopping, pizza, tacos, and coffee could soon welcome some more options to the neighborhood. Entrepreneurs in San Diego now have an incentive to open up shop in the city of La Mesa. On July 1, applications for the La Mesa Entrepreneurship Accelerator Program (LEAP) opened. LEAP is the first program of its kind in California and, potentially, the nation to allocate a portion of federal money from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) —a 2021 economic stimulus bill — to support

up-and-coming entrepreneurs. \$20,000 is available to each entrepreneur accepted into the program after fulfilling eligibility requirements.

He has since expanded to seven locations overall, including

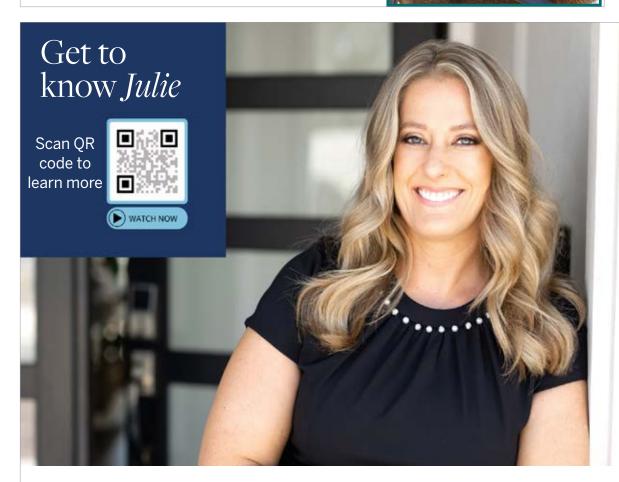

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# San Pasqual Winery receives five medals at San Francisco competition

La Mesa's San Pasqual Winery recently received five medals at the 2022 San Francisco Chronicle Wine Competition, including: gold for their 2021 Albariño (San Diego County), silver for their 2017 Cabernet Franc (San Diego County), silver for their 2021 Riesling (South Coast AVA), silver for their 2016 Malbec (San Diego County), and bronze for their 2016 Petite Sirah (Clarksburg).

The San Francisco Chronicle Wine Competition, started in 1983 as the Cloverdale Citrus Wine Competition. This year's event included more than 5,800 entries, from nearly 1,000 wineries across the United States, Canada and Mexico.

San Pasqual Winery is San Diego's first urban winery and produces approximately 3,500 cases of wine each year. The winery sources its grapes from a variety of local and renowned vineyards across California, and produces the wine at La Mesa Wine Works, located in the La Mesa commercial district.

The winery boasts four tasting rooms, including La Mesa Wine Works, La Mesa Village Tasting Room & Gallery, Seaport Village Tasting Room and Toast Bubble Bar at Seaport Village. Wine Club membership is also available featuring quarterly wine releases, events and specials.

La Mesa Courier recently caught up with co-owners Linda and Mike McWilliams (pictured above with director of operations/assistant winemaker Sheryl Huffman, center) to talk about their business success and more.

**LMC:** How is the wine industry in general doing these last few years due to COVID and general financial challenges to so many industries and businesses?

Mike McWilliams: It's been especially challenging for small wineries like ours that depend mainly on tasting room sales. Although there was an increase in wine consumption during the pandemic, most of that was due to purchases at larger retail stores. We, and other small wineries, are just now seeing sales getting back to pre-pandemic levels.

**Linda McWilliams:** We're also still trying to grow staffing back to pre-pandemic levels. We managed to keep most of our core staff, but many wineries, as well as the entire service industry, have had challenges refilling positions.

**LMC:** What has your winery done to provide excellent customer service to your clientele?

Mike McWilliams: Our focus has always prioritized the customer experience at our tasting rooms. In addition to training our staff to emphasize customer service we ensure that our staff are knowledgeable about the wines that they're pouring. Additionally,

as the owners, Linda and I regularly frequent all of the tasting room locations and engage with the customers, which we feel helps set expectations for our staff.

**LMC:** What are your goals for the winery over the next year?

Mike McWilliams: We have some exciting things going on at all of our locations, starting next Saturday (July 23) with our grand reopening of the remodeled La Mesa Blvd Tasting Room and return of live music (the Barrel Room Sessions) in our refurbished event room. We've also converted office space to an intimate "Vintners Lounge" just off the main tasting room that's great for small gatherings. At La Mesa Wine Works, we're partnering with Serpentine Cidery to offer some exciting ciders on tap. And at Seaport Village we've opened the Toast Bubble Bar, focusing on sparkling wines, and we're hosting private events again after being shut down in our first month of operation due to COVID.

Linda McWilliams: While we're not looking to expand beyond our current tasting room locations or move into large-scale distribution, we'd like to see our wines in more local restaurants. There's a real interest in supporting local in the dining scene and we'd like to see more representation of local wines, including ours.

**LMC:** Anything else readers should know about the winery etc.?

Linda McWilliams: Some people may not know that we were San Diego's first Urban Winery. In fact we were selected by Sunset Magazine as one of the hot 100 trends on the West Coast back in 2009 when we opened in La Mesa. We really enjoy being part of the La Mesa community and appreciate all the support we've received here. As a winemaker, it's always satisfying to hear how much our guests enjoy the wine and to see their surprised faces when I tell them that most of our grapes come from San Diego County - some as close as El Cajon. We do take a lot of pride in the quality of our wines. They've been consistent award winners in prominent competitions including recent awards from the San Francisco Chronicle, the Orange County Fair, and the Toast of the Coast wine competitions. Finally, I'd just like to invite people to come in so we can share our love of wine with them. Our Wine Club is also a fun way to get to know our wines and meet some great people. We have quarterly wine club parties where we pair new releases with foods prepared by local chefs and caterers.

"We see a lot of innovative programs with the caveat that they're not usually coming out of the small local city governments," said James Sly, president of San Diego's East County Economic Development Council (ECEDC). "I think it's very forward-thinking of La Mesa to decide that this is how they're going to try to reinvest that money back into the community, and, hopefully, they'll be able to see that return on investment."

Mayor Dr. Mark Arapostathis and Sly, created LEAP with the hopes of helping the La Mesa business community overcome the setbacks that resulted from COVID-19 and welcome more local businesses.

"As we started to see more and more vacancy in the downtown and all across the business areas of La Mesa, we wanted to promote more local businesses or independent businesses as opposed to national chains and corporate business," said Arapostathis.

"The conversation became, 'What can we do to replace all these vacancies, bring more jobs, and strengthen the small business community?" said Sly.

The answer was LEAP.

Arapostathis said offering support for the small business community and residents through a program like LEAP is something a local government should participate in.

"This is one of the things we [the city] should do: Try to provide an avenue to open businesses that the residents want. That's part of our responsibility," said Arapostathis.

Prior to the ARPA relief funds, Arapostathis explained that offering city financial support to local businesses was a difficult, if not impossible, task, which is why this is potentially the first of its kind.

"The city is limited. When people were trying to raise money for businesses that were struggling during the pandemic, it was a Chamber of Commerce, an EDC, or another outside source because [the city] can't raise money or make money," remarked Arapostathis. "As the federal and state governments gave us a road map of what we could use [with the ARPA], we started to brainstorm regarding how to best help the business community with relief funds but also encourage people to step out on a limb if they were anxious to open a business."

The resulting LEAP plan requires participants to complete workshops hosted by the ECEDC and one-on-one advising sessions with business owners and advisors. The \$20,000 will be dispersed in installment grants based on a payment schedule outlined in the LEAP guide.

Jeff Bernstein, a business advisor with 45 years of experience in the flooring retailer industry and a workshop presenter for the ECEDC's Small Business Development Center (SBDC), said

a program like this is something he's been hoping for to help entrepreneurs like the ones he worked with.

"This is the kind of program I have only wished for over the past few years," said Bernstein. "This is really aimed at startups. They've got a lot of challenges, and they need support. They have a lot of obstacles to overturn."

Bernstein will be helping the entrepreneurs hurdle the initial business obstacles in the first two LEAP workshops, "Optimizing Your Start-Up: Simple Steps to Starting Your Small Business" and "Business Plans That Get Results."

"I learned a lot of things. I also made a lot of mistakes along the way," added Bernstein. "I kind of feel like it's my obligation to be able to pass both the positives and the negatives along so people can be more successful."

Applications for LEAP are available until July 30. However, the program will run until 2026, focusing on long-term efforts to help entrepreneurs, the business community and the city bounce back from COVID-19.

"This will benefit the businesses, but in the end, it will also benefit the city because we want the city to become a destination," added Arapostathis. "We want people to come here, live here, shop here. It's mutually beneficial for both groups."

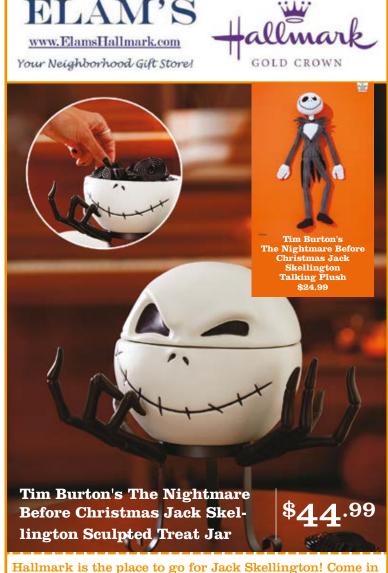

LMC: What are some of the highlights of the event for attendees to look forward to this year?

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# Preventing the next school shooting

**DA Notes** 



Over the last 20 years, what once was the safest place for our children – school – has turned into a place of constant worry and questionable security.

In the face of overwhelming grief over the tremendous loss of life at Robb Elementary School in Uvalde, Texas, it feels like we have arrived at a time where school shootings and mass killings are the norm.

With school and public venue safety at the top of our minds, I want to remind San Diegans of the efforts the District Attorney's Office has undertaken to prioritize school safety and to emphasize the critical role the public plays in preventing school shootings.

In 2018, San Diego County established a School Threats Protocol, which guides how school, law enforcement and prosecutors respond to school threats. The protocol was updated in 2021 with the help of many agencies. It may be the first of its kind protocol with all 42 school districts in the county participating with the goal

of preventing would-be school shooters before they act.

Of course, the protocol is not foolproof, but at its heart it relies on the following:

- Never ignore a threat of harm, no matter the form.
- Every threat is taken seriously, with evidenced-based guidelines for investigation and resolution of the threat.

Taking threats seriously is supported by statistics.

- 93% of school shooters make plans to carry out their attack and
- 80% of them tell at least one person
- 60% tell at least two people. With these odds, it's important for the public to know that you play a vital role in helping prevent school shootings by reporting suspected behavior or threats.

For anyone who thinks it's funny to cause alarm and fear by posting a threat online or calling one into a school, these incidents go beyond a prank: they carry serious legal consequences, such as jail time.

Making criminal threats is a felony crime even if there was no intent to carry out the threat; threatening words with the intent to cause fear and which reasonably cause someone to

feel fear are sufficient for a felony charge. Juveniles can face jail time, or other consequences such as having their access to social media taken away by the court. It's important to keep in mind however, that the juvenile justice system is meant to rehabilitate youthful offenders, not punish them. In instances where we can help them get on the right track with rehabilitation, mental health services and restorative justice methods, that is our first choice.

In the last 16 months, our office received 43 school threats cases to review for formal charges, of which 10 cases have been filed in juvenile court. Our message is clear: every school threat is being fully investigated and every suspect will be held accountable.

Here are some of the factors the DA's Office and law enforcement consider, to confirm the credibility of a threat once the suspect has been identified:

- Investigate their background, including whether the person made prior threats
- Look at open-source intelligence such as social media posts
- Check to see if they have registered guns, have made recent ammunition purchases or have access to guns

- Check on whether there has been contact with terrorist organizations
- Determine whether they have had psychiatric holds or other mental health red flags
- Research whether the person has had a recent traumatic event or grievance with a particular school or person associated with a school

Even though we have a way to measure successful prosecution, it's not as easy to measure successful intervention, but preventing even one death or one school shooting is our duty. The best prevention for a school shooting is bystander intervention. We use public tips to investigate and interrupt violence. It's everyone's responsibility to report threats. You can also report anonymously at StudentsSpeakingOut.org.

As your District Attorney, I'm committed to increasing communication and accessibility between the DA's Office and the public. I hope these consumer and public safety tips have been helpful.

We were able to purchase almost 200 dinners from local restaurants when indoor dining was shut down and raise enough money with our live stream programming to support the park.

Local realtor Steve Rotsart, Steel Canyon Athletic Director Charles Tyler, and I were able to pull off an entertaining program with the right amount of comedy to bring smiles during a time we all needed to laugh a bit. My husband reached out to one of the bands he plays in and he donated the musical entertainment for the evening. It is definitely a wonderful neighborhood event and often the one time a year you see all your neighbors, but I have watched the news of this one-ofa-kind evening and event location spread and we now have people come from up north and even other states.

**Powers:** At this moment we have five VIP sponsor tables left, starting at \$2,500, early-bird general admission starts at only \$65 per ticket. We are still accepting new volunteers and donations for the auction. 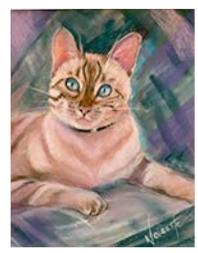

"Sushi is all about passion," said 20-year veteran sushi chef and Konnichiwa Sushi & Bar manager Juan Cabrera. "Passion for the fish, passion for the freshest food, passion for the sauces, and passion for creating art. I tell my crew, that you have to have a passion for what you do, be it greeting the customer, serving them, or making perfect sushi rolls, ramen or yakisoba."

When Cabrera took over the La Mesa restaurant, he set about changing everything about the place, from the menu to the staff.

"I always go to other restaurants and analyze what they do. I want every customer greeted immediately upon arrival. I want them to feel comfortable and at home. I want attentive and friendly wait staff who anticipate the diners' needs," Cabrera said.

Cabrera has worked with many sushi masters and studied ramen-making in Japan.

"I call our sushi American sushi. In Japan, they only use a couple of types of fish, and a couple of sauces and they don't do rolls. Here, we have many types of fish we use and many sauces. When I make a sauce I know exactly what sushi roll it's going to enhance," Cabrera said.

Diner Debbie Dietrich said, "The pizza sushi roll has layers and layers of flavor and texture. Nice body and chewiness to the rice, creamy and warm. Mildly spicy jalapeno washed over my palate for yet another layer. After I swallowed it the flavors continued to evolve in my mouth, making me want to have another bite. Just lean back in your chair and enjoy the bite." What better of a compliment can a chef get than that?

The sushi menu is extensive with around 25 choices. Each roll is a work of art. For non-sushi lovers, you can enjoy bowls such as a tempura chicken bowl or a beef bowl or beef, chicken, or shrimp yakisoba. For the gluten-free

Salt & Straw Ice Cream Cookbook by Tyler Mal gives 50 different recipes on unique flavors.

Mal gives clear instructions on how creating a base ice cream allows one to incorporate all kinds of different flavors. The author also encourages the reader

on how to create your own flavor or recreate a flavor you may have been hunting for. Equally refreshing, Aguas Frescas and Paletas by Ericka Sanchez offers up traditional and refreshing Mexican drinks and frozen treats. If you are a fan of horchata and lime or want something more exotic like hibiscus and orange you will be in for a treat. These recipes tend to have less

sugar than what is found in grocery stores and all are alcohol-free.

I suppose we can't survive on snacks alone all summer. How about we go straight from the freezer to plate in a short amount of time? We can just skip the stove altogether.

Bruce Weinstein has figured out a way to eliminate standing over any kind of heating element with his book From Freezer to Instant Pot. There are over 75 recipes in which you go from the freezer, lock the lid, and in just a bit of time you're ready to eat. A similar title, From Freezer to Cooker, by Polly Connor, expands on this concept to include all slow and pressure cookers.

Connor offers lots of tips on how to tackle each device with frozen foods.

Luckily, we live in a part of the country where grilling can be done all year

The Best Grilling Book Ever Written by Two Idiots by Ryan Fey and Mark Anderson ensures "If we can grill it, you can grill it." One of the authors' goals of this book is to show readers how everything can be made on a grill. Another simple grilling book, which also includes cheat sheets, is *Easy BBQ*: Simple, Flavorful Recipes for Home Grilling by Glenn Connaughton. This book keeps the ingredients simple, but flavorful, and preparation time is down to a minimum.

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# To Airbnb or not to Airbnb, that is the question

In 2011, I purchased my La Mesa home that is still my primary residence.

Downstairs featured a neglected studio apartment with a kitchenette and full bath. Initially, I used it for storage but decided to rent it. Fair market rent would have been \$800 per month.

My son, Mack, suggested I place the apartment on, Airbnb, a company I had not heard of at the time. Mack and his girlfriend were traipsing around Europe and couldn't afford hotels and didn't want to stay in hostels, so they couch-surfed on the cheap by booking through this new home-sharing concept company, Airbnb. They loved staying in people's homes and the locals loved hosting them.

Hosting temporary guests instead of dealing with locked-in tenants plus the flexibility of accepting bookings from one night to one year appealed to me, so I placed the apartment on Airbnb. com, 30-day minimum, for the ridiculous rental price of \$1,600 per month and was instantly booked for over a year. To this day, the apartment has never been vacant.

This discovery was so remarkable and profitable, I began advising my real estate clients to seek out properties that had, "Airbnb potential." Airbnb potential can include an attached or detached guest house; studio over garage; basement or garage converted to living space; and/or a bedroom, preferably one with its own private entry/exit.

Almost all Airbnb hosts provide the essentials: fully furnished, clean premises, linens and towels, kitchen and laundry appliances, cooking utensils, flatware, Internet/Wi-Fi, TV, shampoo, conditioner, body wash, and paper products.

What elevates the experience all around - making the guests happier and the hosts more income - are the hosts providing privacy, style pizazz, designated parking spot and designated outdoor patio space. The designated parking space gives the guest parking convenience and security while courteously freeing up street parking for the neighbors.

One of my La Mesa clients took my Airbnb advice to heart and then some.

She added a detached studio (Accessory Dwelling Unit/"ADU") to her La Mesa property. She provides all the essentials plus the designated parking space; private patio space and she hired an interior designer/colorist to create a beautiful space. This under-500 s.f. studio earns her nearly \$4,000 per month. Her property is not in La Mesa Village or Mount Helix, just a regular La Mesa neighborhood.

Therein lies the dream and nightmare of Airbnb: substantial

passive income for property owners but disappearing inventory and high rents for regular renters and, sometimes, huge nuisances for neighborhoods.

Airbnb "Party Houses" seem to cause the most acrimony between homeowners who live in their homes and homeowners who have turned their homes into motels.

To mitigate high rents and party houses, governments around the world are introducing and implementing regulations in an effort to balance homeowners' rights to freely rent their homes with homeowners' rights to live in peace.

These regulations include limiting the number of Airbnb properties in a city, the number of days a property can be Airbnb rented in a year, creating no-Airbnb zones, and often requiring owner occupancy for Airbnb properties.

If a homebuyer is purchasing a property with the intent of Airbnb-ing some or all of it, he or she would be wise to study the Airbnb regulations specific to that address.

La Mesa does not have Airbnb rules and their ADU ordinances are more lenient than California's. There are no parking requirements except to replace existing parking if removed to build an ADU and there are no owner-occupancy requirements. There are over 1,000 Airbnbs in La Mesa.

Best Airbnb Tips for neighborhood harmony:

- Owner occupancy is best. **Guests behave better when the** hosts are on premises.
- Small is good. Studios and one-bedroom units rarely become party houses.

• Create a designated parking space. Guests usurping neighborhood street parking foments hostilities.

## Provide house rules to all guests and make sure they adhere to those rules.

The income earned by renting a room, guest house, converted garage, ADUs, etc. has been life-changing for millions of people. Many homeowners are able to stay in their homes because Airbnb income subsidizes their mortgages.

Because of Sacramento's 2021 relaxation of ADU rules and regulations and the high income generated by regular rentals and Airbnbs, ADUs have exploded in California. Homes with ADUs are in high demand by buyers, substantially increasing the value of homes.

With an average sold price per square foot in La Mesa nearing \$600 and the cost to build an ADU around \$400 per square foot (with no land purchase costs), it makes fiscal sense to add an ADU.

The popularity of ADUs is so high, the SDMLS – San Diego's Multiple Listing Service implemented a new ADU category this year and is now a permanent part of San Diego listings.

I am currently building an ADU in my La Mesa backyard for the purpose of Airbnb-ing it. I have had great Airbnb success for over a decade with multiple properties and no neighbor issues and am happy to advise home buyers and home owners. Call, text or email me anytime.
