Palm Street Ventures LLC apartment complex plans in La Mesa await verdict

Apartment complex plans near the village in downtown La Mesa are in limbo as the City Council faces the decision to ratify them, but some residents are concerned about the current designs.

The plans for an apartment complex on the 0.49-acre lot (where the former historic Randall Lamb building once sat) located at the southeast corner of Palm Avenue and Allison Avenue include a 5-story building with 64 units, 8 of which would be affordable, low-income units. There would also be 29 off-street

parking spaces on the ground floor, and various landscape and hardscape improvements, according to a report presented to the Planning Board.

Joel Christman, a resident of La Mesa since 1996, said he was shocked when he first heard about the plans.

"Normally, when a project like that is done, they notify residents close to the project so the residents can go and speak at the meeting when it's up for approval," Christman said. "I'm not aware of that happening with residents."

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
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La Mesa Village Farmers' Market's inverted style brings new energy

La Mesa Boulevard loses all semblance of a street every Friday afternoon from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m.

Cars clear the parking spots to make way for the La Mesa Village Farmers' Market, an event that has been a crucial part of the La Mesa community for 29 years. The street, located between Palm Avenue and 4th Street in the town's central business district, hosts 62 vendors, each of which sell a variety of produce, clothing, artwork and food.

According to Michelle Huey, the La Mesa Village Association (LMVA) Chair, approximately five markets out of the 30 in San Diego County are located on a city street in the main business district. The La Mesa Village Farmers' Market is one of them.

"La Mesa is very different in what it has to offer because it's in the heart of a village. We have businesses, shops, restaurants, bars and services," said Huey. "You can go every Friday and have a different experience."

The market adopted a whole new look in July of 2022. Unlike a traditional farmers' market, the vendors line up in the middle of the street and face outwards. Customers walk along the outside so they can peruse both the

vendors and the surrounding businesses.

This inverted market style transformed the atmosphere of La Mesa ever since it was implemented by the new managers, Shane Ray and Robyn Guy, in July.

"One of the harder challenges that we took on was totally flipping this market," said Ray. "But we liked the idea of putting the vendors closer together, facing the businesses, so that way you get this really unique shopping experience."

Ray and Guy began managing the La Mesa Village Farmers' Market 17 weeks ago. Before that,

they assisted at the Hillcrest market for three years and Ray was a vendor himself for 10 years prior. When they started at La Mesa, the market had 30 vendors. It is currently maxed out to 62.

Ray said that he would estimate 2,000 to 3,000 people frequent the La Mesa market on a given Friday. The recent success comes from many working parts — the LMVA's desire to create a cohesive environment for the community, the newly increased presence of social media platforms and the draw for unique vendors.

"I like to get vendors that other markets don't really have yet," said Ray. "I like the idea of being the foundation from which a lot of these vendors can grow their business."

One of these vendors, Earth and Vine, owned by Kathi and Nathan Ponce, engraves artwork and personalized pictures onto wood. Curbside Eatery & Drinkery, located on La Mesa Boulevard, uses personalized coasters from Earth and Vine for their restaurant.

The general manager and owner of Curbside Eatery & Drinkery, Brenda Leek, also requested a wooden plaque from the vendor for their signature cocktail, The Rose — a drink name inspired by her mom.

Leek said she is a huge supporter of all the vendors and local businesses. As an owner of a restaurant located on a street dedicated to a farmers' market every Friday afternoon, she said that the exposure that the market gives to the village overall, far outweighs the inconvenience of the street getting closed down for a few hours.

"I think that the farmers' market has done a great job accommodating the merchants. I love the inversion," said Leek.

Kasandra Marzec, the manager of Sara's Selections, echoed that response. Kasandra and her mother Sara run their boutique together. She said that business is normally consistent, but the farmers market attracts a whole new vibe.

Karen Kirkpatrick and her daughter Sophia Burroughs started Eureka Bath Works, a vendor that sells homemade soaps, lotions and bath bombs.

"It's a nice source of some revenue, but the community has been the best part for us," said Kirkpatrick.

Vendors like Smit Farms, Da Le Ranch, Wise Granola, Vegan Stops, and Haworth Fish

There are a wide variety of people to say hi to and items to choose from when attending the La Mesa Farmers' Market.

Company are just a few of the 62 options that the La Mesa Village Farmers' Market has to offer.

Lights have already been strung up down La Mesa Boulevard and LMVA will host Holiday in the Village on Dec. 3rd from 12 to 9 p.m. with craft vendors, holiday food and caroling.

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San Diego County participates in statewide United Against Hate Week campaign

This month San Diego County was one of many regions of California participating in the statewide United Against Hate Week campaign, an anti-hate awareness effort to call for local civic action to stop the hate and biases that pose a dangerous threat to the safety and civility of neighborhoods, towns, and cities.

Unfortunately, hate crimes have increased across our nation, state, and region. By learning about hate crimes and how to stand against them and report them, we can make everyone safer.

For those who don't already know, prosecuting and preventing hate crimes is a priority for me as District Attorney. In recent years, we've tripled the number of hate crimes prosecutions, sending an unwavering message that hate crimes will not be tolerated. Last year alone, we prosecuted 30 hate crimes cases, up from 21 in 2020.

We recognize the distinctive fear and stress suffered by victims of hate crimes, including the potential for reprisal, escalation of violence, and the far-reaching negative

consequences that hate crimes have on our community.

A hate incident is an act, which is bias-motivated, but does not rise to the level of a hate crime.

For example, if someone uses a racial slur against another it probably isn't a hate crime, rather a hate incident. It's important to understand the difference between an act that is understandably upsetting, and an act motivated by hate or bias that is a crime.

A hate crime is against an individual or property that is substantially motivated by bias against the victim's:

- Race/ethnicity/nationality
- Religion
- Sexual orientation
- Gender
- Disability
- Victim's association with any above group

In 2020, I set up an online reporting form and hotline on our public website where anyone can report a suspected hate crime they witnessed in San Diego County. The tool was partly in response to reports of hate-related incidents aimed at the Asian community across the nation in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic. The online reporting tool, email and phone number are available for reporting of any type of suspected hate crime.

We know that people often don't report hate crimes because of fear or shame, and we wanted to provide a direct avenue to encourage victims or witnesses to hate crimes to report. People can and should continue to report hate crimes to their local police departments and Sheriff's Department. This additional reporting mechanism will act as a safety net and help ensure reports are reviewed and shared by law enforcement.

If you have been a victim of hate crime, here are tips on what to do:

- If you are seriously injured, call 911 or get to the hospital immediately.
- Whether or not you are injured, report the crime.
- To help yourself, it is important to do at least some of the following:
- See a doctor to treat and document even minor physical injuries.
- Take pictures of any physical injuries or damages to property, even if police already did so.
- If the crime is vandalism, let the police see and photograph the damage before you clean and/or repair.
- If possible, get witnesses' names, addresses and telephone numbers.
- Write down as many facts about the incident as you can remember.

- Seek a therapist to assist with the emotional aspects of the attack.
- Learn the names of the police officers and prosecutors working on the case and keep in touch with them.
- Get copies of police reports and check them for accuracy.
- Attend necessary court hearings, whether you are subpoenaed, including arraignment, bail review and sentencing.
- If possible, make a statement in court to the judge about threats, direct or indirect, and possible fears.

As your District Attorney, I'm committed to increasing communication and accessibility between the DA's Office and the public.

Willy Naylor, currently a resident of Encinitas but previously a resident of La Mesa for 40 years, owns rental properties in the same area as these prospective plans. Naylor said he also was unaware.

"I heard it never hit the street. It never went on any docket; it never was anywhere to be found. And it had to have been," he said. "If I lived right across the street from there, I would've been one the first people to get a letter saying this is what we're doing and we never received it. That's the scary part about it. This thing went through and nothing was ever said."

And it was not only residents who were surprised. Laura Lothian, a current La Mesa City Council Member, said "The only question I'm trying to ask is why doesn't anyone know about this project? No one knew this was coming. If you wanted to dig for it, you could find it but that's not the way city government should work."

However, these plans have been under consideration for 10 months, including review by the Design Review Board and the Planning Commission, according to statements received from the City's Community Development Department via Carlo Tomaino, the Assistant City Manager. The plans have been updated online on the Active Developments Project website and an interactive map which contains the project's renderings.

Stated in a report to the La Mesa Planning Commission, "The project design was reviewed and approved with conditions by the Design Review Board on June 13, 2022."

The next step in the approval process required ratification by the City Council. Therefore, the plans were on the City Council's agenda on Oct. 11 under the consent calendar. However, a decision was not made on that date.

"The City Council was not required to act at this meeting and chose to defer its decision regarding the project design to provide the developer with an additional opportunity to consider public feedback received during the meeting," the City's Community Development Department said.

Individuals of the public spoke during the City Council meetings about this development on Oct. 11 and Nov. 8, respectively. Some of the concerns voiced included traffic flow and compliance with the Downtown Specific Plan which has been in effect since 1990.

In regard to parking and traffic flow, the plans are utilizing the CD (Downtown Commercial) zoning designation and the City's Afforable Homes Bonus Program. According to a statement from the City's Community Development Department, the Affordable Home Bonus Program implements the State's Density Bonus Law, allowing reductions to parking. The State Density Bonus Law has been around since 1979 but amendments went into effect Jan. 1, 2022, according to the California Legislation Information website.

"Developments proposed under State Density Bonus Law are eligible for a parking ratio of 0.5 parking spaces per unit," the Community Development Department said. "The typical requirement would be 1.5 parking spaces per unit. The project is eligible for this reduction because the site is located less than one-half mile of a major transit stop and the project exceeds an affordability rate of 11 percent very-low income."

The developer, Palm Street Ventures LLC, said they've worked with the city to ensure traffic flow concerns are addressed.

"We have worked closely with the City to plan a development that does not disrupt the flow of the village area," said Brain Garmo, Palm Street Ventures LLC partner. "We also have worked to ensure parking and traffic will not be an issue by conducting individual parking studies by engineers and working with reports by the City's own Parking Commission. All have indicated that this project will not have a negative impact."

However, the other issue that has surfaced is the designed look and size of the complex. "Currently, the renderings show a modern and asymmetrical building with a flat roof and a variety of wall projections and recesses, according to a report submitted to the Planning Commission by an associate planner."

"I was really shocked that there would be that type of a building put in the downtown La Mesa village area," Christman said. "I think a smaller project could be done with a design that matches La Mesa craftsman style or other styles from that era that you see in a lot of the homes in downtown La Mesa."

Individuals like Christman, Naylor and Lothian said that these plans are not consistent with the Downtown Specific Plan which outlines a series of planning objectives to maintain the image of Downtown La Mesa.

According to the Community Development Department, the developer has requested a waiver that would allow an increased building height to 56 feet and five stories. This waiver, if approved, would override height restrictions cited in the Zone CD designation and the Downtown Village Specific Plan.

Despite the requested waiver, the Community Development Department said the plans are still consistent with the Downtown Specific Plan.

"The Downtown Village Specific Plan encourages and emphasizes residential uses in this part of the community," according to the Community Development Department. "The Downtown Specific Plan encourages and allows for residential development in this area. The applicant consulted the Specific Plan when designing the project and the Specific Plan was the primary guide for staff review of the project."

Lothian said this plan was not intended to be voted on at the Nov. 22 City Council meeting. She said she predicts it will be on the agenda at the Dec. 13 meeting.

To stay up to date on these plans, the Community Development Department recommends visiting the Active Development Projects website and the interactive map. Residents can also sign up to receive alerts regarding agendas for any of the City's boards and commissions, including the Design Review Board and Planning Commission, through the City website.

Duke's Old Fashioned Onion Burgers in La Mesa: Suddenly there's a new love of burgers

Frank Schulz, a San Diego native and owner of Duke's Old Fashioned Onion Burgers in La Mesa, spent the bulk of his career in the food industry, both in Oklahoma and Southern California. After returning from Oklahoma, the Patrick Henry High School graduate brought with him the onion burger.

"I didn't invent onion burgers, I just brought them to San Diego. I always enjoyed going to the town of El Reno, Oklahoma, where I'd eat the famous original onion burger at Sid's Diner. I also loved eating at Tucker's Onion Burgers in Oklahoma City," Schulz said.

What is the onion burger?

"It's a relic from the Dust Bowl days of the 1930s. Plagued with severe drought, dust storms, and food shortages, people would make onion burgers to make them look bigger. Basically, it's onions cooked on a grill with a burger on top. The onions add a level of depth to the flavor," Schulz remarked.

He started doing some popup restaurants to see if there was a market for a burger joint and found that people were suddenly having a new love of burgers. "I wanted to have a burger restaurant, casual, yet not fast food.

"We use Angus beef, which makes all the difference. It's never frozen. We make everything

fresh, in-house except for our buns and ice cream. We make our dressings, chili, sauces, and over a hundred pounds of pickles every week. And the pickles really make our burgers. They add a great zing to every bite," Schulz said.

Burgers come in single, double, or triple patties and are cooked to order, allowing guests to customize toppings including cheese, tomatoes, lettuce, and house-made pickles. For the gluten-sensitive crowd Duke's offers lettuce wraps instead of a bun.

Duke's fries are made from fresh-cut potatoes that are double-fried. It makes the fries crispy on the outside and soft on the inside. On the menu are a variety of specialty fries such as steak and blue cheese or bacon cheese fries.

For a limited time only they're offering "The Bartlesville" which has a base of French fries, topped by a burger, and smothered in brown gravy. Coming soon is the "Okie Burger", which is the same as The Bartlesville except with a creamy gravy. Another great special is the

Hot Honey Butter Chicken Sandwich, a hand-breaded chicken breast topped with hot honey butter and pickles.

"We got voted 2nd best burger, which still irritates me," Schulz said. "We had been open for 2 months and didn't even know they were judging us. We want to be #1." This calls for a rematch.

Homes for sale with the right pool surface with more value

Several years ago, I sold a La Mesa pool with a house attached to it.

With the touch of a button, rainforest waterfalls cascaded from a pedestrian bridge that spanned one end of the pool to the other. Swimmers enjoyed cocktails from the swim-up bar or sipped their drinks from patio tables on concrete islands in the pool. Additionally, there were caves, a 70' water slide, and a Tiki Hut right out of Gilligan's Island. The pool was so Wow, the property received thousands of views and saves on Zillow. Airbnb guests were paying \$1000 per night to stay at the property and this was six years ago.

I sold the property for about \$1M. At the time, homes in the neighborhood were selling in the \$400ks at the low end and \$700ks at the high end. Without the pool, the home, which was dated and in need of some repair, would have probably sold in the \$600ks.

So, do pools add value? They sure can if done right.

Almost all of the most spectacular homes I have sold had pools to match. There are neighborhoods in San Diego County where having a pool is practically required. A Rancho Santa Fe agent once told me, "There is no such thing as a home in Rancho Santa Fe without a pool. It just isn't done."

She was barely exaggerating.

Of the 192 detached homes sold in the last year in Rancho Santa Fe, 163 had swimming pools or 85%. Contrast that with La Mesa where of the 556 detached homes sold in the last year, 114 of them had swimming pools, or 20%.

Unless one is a general contractor, it is never a good idea to undertake a large, expensive house project like building a swimming pool with the goal of selling vour home. Often the time and investment do not translate to increased net proceeds. Building an in-ground swimming pool is very expensive. Google says a pool in San Diego can be built for as little as \$17,500. Two swimming pool contractors I spoke with laughed out

loud at that figure. One pool company said costs to build an in-ground swimming pool start at around \$50k-\$60k, the other contractor quoted starting price at \$100k.

Time is also a consideration.

From concept to your first cannonball in the deep end can take up to one year, so if you want to throw a pool party this 4th of July, you are already behind schedule. This time of year, when the weather is cool, is the best time to build a pool. Once it is 100 degrees outside, pool contractors get very busy. Construction will take anywhere from 90-180 days.

Lastly, taste is subjective.

That volcano you're dying to place in the middle of your pool will be an expense the future buyer will pay to have it removed (true story of a home I sold in Rolling Hills Ranch).

Based on my 20+ years of selling San Diego County real estate, if you're going to build a swimming pool, do it for your enjoyment but if you think you may sell your home one day, keep these tips in mind for better resale value:

- 1. Make sure to have maximum privacy. Buyers always scope neighbors' windows to see if they have views of the pool. If neighbors can see into the pool, plant bamboo or palms for a natural barrier or build a high fence.
- 2. Keep proportion in mind. A pool that takes up the entire backyard turns
- 3. Build the pool fairly close to the house. Buyers do not want to take a zipline or gondola to get to the pool.
- 4. Match the style of the pool to the style of the house. Vintage homes should have vintage-style pools. Conversely, modern homes should have modern pools.
- 5. Consider adding a spa and outdoor kitchen and lounge. Make the pool area an outdoor, California lifestyle.
- 6. Solar panels are a great way to heat pools and add months of swimming fun.

7. Factor in the purpose of the pool: exercise? laps? volleyball? kiddie play? resort aesthetics?

8. Keep in mind a rectangle pool

might be the least expensive to build but also the least energy efficient. Water flows better and more efficiently with kidney-shaped pools or pools with curves.

9. Study finishes. That bright blue Crest toothpaste color pool has a white finish and screams 1970s. Darker finishes seem to please buyers more.

1. Build the pool too close to the house, no one wants to walk through sliders and step directly into the pool. Build at least 15'-20' from the house.

- 2. Build the pool in the front yard.
- 3. Think above-ground pools will add value to your property, they don't.
- 4. Cut corners using materials that won't last long or wear well. Avoid vinyl pools.
- 5. Choose weird colors or bizarre designs or crazy tiles.
- 6. Add a diving board unless you want to pay extra for home insurance. Many insurance companies won't cover homes with diving boards.

7. DIY. Get the proper permits (usually a 30-day process) and hire a licensed, reputable pool company with lots of good reviews. Happy splashing!
