PHHS seniors, teachers preparing for graduation on June 14

Cap and gown orders begin to roll in, the last school-spirit event brings students together and exam stress begins to build. These collective final moments are solidified for seniors, but plans after graduation remain a question mark for some in the dwindling weeks of senior year.

Whether it's a four-year university looming ahead, community college classes starting over summer or a nine-to-five job requiring commute time and a suit, the future is coming fast for the Patrick Henry High School class of 2023. And this graduation comes after significant setbacks, according to principal Michelle Irwin.

OVERCOMING BARRIERS AS STUDENTS

"Our graduates have a lot of experience of 'pivoting' and being flexible," Irwin said. "This class had to pivot their freshmen year and 'pause' their high school experience due to the pandemic. This class was required to figure out a 'plan B' and learn in a variety of ways."

Emily Moy, PHHS Engineering Academy Facilitator, shared how the COVID-19 pandemic and college applications, specifically, presented challenging situations for students.

"Since the pandemic and the elimination of SAT scores from many college applications, we have noticed that admission to four-year universities, particularly Cal State and UC schools, has become (even more) highly competitive," Moy said. "I'd say the biggest concern facing our graduates is gaining admittance to a university and then figuring out how to pay for their degree."

Despite these challenges, graduating seniors like Abbie Darling, Hudson Lane, Anna Brew and Franco Cachay said the preparation at PHHS has set them up for what's next.

Darling plans on attending San Diego State University and majoring in environmental sciences and psychology. Lane also intends on attending SDSU and majoring in political science. Cachay plans to attend the University of Southern California to study on a pre-law track with a philosophy, politics, and law (PPL) degree and an undecided



ALLIED GARDENS OFF-LEASH DOG PARK

I know how important City parks are to the communities of District 7. I am proud to announce that funding for an off-leash dog park at the Allied Gardens Community Park is included in the FY24 Budget. Installation is slated for later this summer. In addition, I continue to advocate for upgrades to District 7 playgrounds, rec centers, pools, and youth sports fields in this budget.

GRAFFITI REMOVAL IN DEL CERRO

Graffiti can be a blight on our beautiful community, so it is important to report unwanted graffiti when we see it. A neighbor of mine informed me of several offensive graffiti markings on rocks in an open space along Pasatiempo Avenue. I reported this to the appropriate City department who removed the graffiti very quickly.

If you see graffiti in our community, report it through the City's Get it Done app, then inform our office, and we will ensure that City crews address it as quickly as possible.

POTHOLE REPAIRS ON NAVAJO ROAD AND COLLEGE AVENUE

Clogged drainage areas can be dangerous and cause major damage to properties if not taken care of. I was recently alerted by a resident that there was overgrown vegetation in a drainage culvert near Navajo Road, causing water from the recent rains to fill the nearby properties.

Thank you to the staff of the City's Stormwater Division for clearing out the vegetation and sediment from the drainage culverts to ensure no severe damage was done to the homes in the area (see photos above).



Equity missing when it comes to College-Rolando Library

In the community

Mayor Gloria and Council President Elo-Rivera:

I have listened to the two of you preach equity for all San Diegans in your campaigns and since you took office.

Yet when it comes to the College-Rolando Library, equity is noticeably absent. You both appear to be looking the other way while the developers of 6650 Montezuma Road are getting zoning concessions (residential units) to which they are not legally entitled (the CPIOZ allows only hotel rooms) and you appear to be asking nothing for the Library in return.

The C-R Library has the 6th largest patron population in the City and the fourth lowest household median income. Sixty-two percent of its patrons are minorities. Other libraries our size have 80 library-exclusive parking spaces, but we have only 28 - 35% of what we should have! Yes, it was poor planning by your predecessors, but pointing fingers doesn't solve the problem.

You have the opportunity to give the C-R Library fair and equitable treatment NOW by getting the owners/developers of 6650 Montezuma Road to grant an easement for at least 32 permanent, exclusive library parking spaces. (That would only get us to 60 spaces or 75% of what we should have!)

Scripps Ranch is currently getting 80 additional parking spaces. Mission Hills has 80 underground spaces. Where is the equity in treating the College-Rolando Library like an unwanted stepchild? How is this consistent with your campaign promises and regular pronouncements to treat all San Diegans equitably? Why do these communities deserve dedicated parking for their libraries when the College-Rolando Library does not? Is it because its patrons are 62% minorities or have among the lowest household incomes in the City? How do you justify leaving this particular library with 35% of the dedicated parking spaces it should have based on its size? This neither looks nor feels like equity to the College-Rolando community.

Sean, your idea to create timed parking on Reservoir Drive and Mohawk Street is not a solution and it definitely does not represent equity versus all the other libraries that have exclusive, on-site parking. Those spaces are essentially always in use by the community because they are needed. Further, Reservoir Drive is on a steep grade and if the spaces were available, getting to the library from there would be challenging for the handicapped, elderly and families with young children. Just getting out of a car on that slope can be challenging.

What the College-Rolando Library needs and deserves is 80 parking spaces for the exclusive use of library patrons. It has survived with about 60 spaces and that is what the community is asking for. This is despite the fact that equity would prescribe the C-R Library have the 80 spaces it deserves based on its size.

Please consider using the zoning leverage you have with the developers at 6650 Montezuma Road to get the College-Rolando Library the easement for permanent, exclusive parking spaces that equity demands. The City has something the developers want, perhaps an easement for access as well as zoning concessions. Please use this to correct the mistakes of past administrations and provide permanent, dedicated parking to the C-R Library.

Thank you for your consideration.

Stalking is all too common; reporting isn't



Aided by technologies that make it easy to track victims online and in real life, stalking is a growing and often deadly crime that largely targets young people.

Thirty years ago, the term "stalker" was hardly known. Today, more than 1 million victims are stalked every year, most of them women and most of them under 25. Their stalkers are usually someone they know – an ex-boyfriend, a date, or someone at work – and 80 to 90 percent of stalkers are male.

Parents need to be especially vigilant. Children may not recognize the point when a romantic interest in them becomes an obsession or an unrequited crush leads to a desire to control and harm.

Stalking can occur in many ways, but here are some commonly identified tactics:

- Following and watching the victim:
- Showing up uninvited in places such as the victim's home, workplace, or school;
- Repeatedly seeking information from friends and family;
- Sneaking into the victim's home or car to scare the victim or let the victim know he'd been there;
- Making repeated phone calls, including hang-ups and voice messages; and
- Sending unwanted texts, emails, social media messages, cards, letters, flowers, or

Advances in technology are adding more tools to a stalker's toolbox.

Stalkers use social media profiles to monitor the habits, preferences, and likely whereabouts of their victims. They use hidden cameras and recorders to spy on victims and the Internet to post threats or virtually harass them. Global positioning system (GPS) technology allows stalkers to track a victim's location. Small GPS devices, like Apple AirTags, can be dropped into a purse or a car window.

My office prosecuted one stalker who'd attached a GPS device to the bottom of his victim's car. He was caught on a home surveillance camera as he checked on the device while the car sat in the victim's driveway.

In another case, the victim got aggressive and threatening texts from her ex, including photos of her damaged car with messages like "this is just the start."

As with many stalking victims, she changed her phone number. The stalker, consistently persistent, found her new number and contacted her 400 times in one day, threatening violence against her, her son, and her ex-husband.

When a restraining order failed to stop the conduct, my Office filed a criminal complaint alleging stalking, annoying or harassing communications, and vandalism. The defendant pleaded guilty to the stalking charge. He was sentenced to 60 days in jail, three years of probation, and a 52-week counseling class, and is the subject of a 10-year Criminal Protective Order.

In 1991, California became the first state to make stalking illegal, though the law primarily referred to obsessively pursuing celebrities. It was later expanded, and today, every state has stalking

Stalking may be charged as a felony or a misdemeanor, depending on the facts. My office handles misdemeanors. and we take all such incidents seriously. We recognize that victims can experience psychological distress, including post-traumatic stress and an increase in suicidal thoughts.

Before we can prosecute, however, we must hear from the victim. Most stalking incidents are not reported out of fear, embarrassment, or a failure to recognize that the behavior is a crime.

If you are a victim or hear about repeated incidents of stalking behavior, please report it to the police. They can investigate, identify the stalker, and take steps to keep you safe. This could include seeking restraining orders, arresting the stalker, or adding patrols to your home or workplace. In some cases, police officers may recommend counseling or other support services to help the victim.

As with any behavior where someone tries to assert power over you, being stalked is a terrifying experience that can take a huge emotional toll – or prove lethal. Calling 911 is not an overreaction.

In addition, my office's Your Safe Place – A Family Justice Center offers a safe, supportive environment for victims of stalkers who also experience domestic violence, family violence, or sexual assault.


Houston. The team placed fourth in their division which was comprised of 78 teams from around the world.





minor. Brew intends on attending the University of California Berkeley, majoring in conservation at the Rausser College of Natural Resources.

These college acceptances required significant time and commitment, and often came with more questions than answers, according to Cachay.

"As with anything, navigating in the dark is difficult, impossible, even," Cachay said. "Even from my first years at Henry, I have always had so many questions about higher education, career pathways, and how to prepare for 'life' altogether. As a first-generation student, my parents knew very little to nothing about such processes. PHHS provided the system — the community — that allowed me to feel heard and valued in such a position, and work alongside my peers (and with help of staff) to learn inside and outside the classroom, to learn these skills, and to feel confident in my abilities."

Likewise, Darling said reconciling with unexpected barriers was a challenge. Darling had goals of attending a "prestigious" college, a top choice being the University of Washington. However, after some rejections and a celebrated acceptance to the University of Washington, Darling realized the significant costs would not make the University of Washington a viable option.

"I worked really hard in high school for the main purpose of going to a 'prestigious' college, just to be denied from most of them. It was a tough blow that made me question where I went wrong. I stayed up until 3 a.m. every night studying and therefore wasn't able to prioritize family and friends, and it felt like it was all for nothing" Darling said. "My point is that it's really frustrating to work hard just for something that you can't control (acceptances and tuition costs) to get in the way. Never in a million years did I think that I would end up here, but here I am nevertheless."

STRIKING A BALANCE OF **WORK AND LIFE**

While these dreams for college were a driving force in high school, Darling said that the community connections made through clubs, sports and ASB retain a significant importance

as lessons in self-confidence and persistence.

EDUCATION

"While my high school courses have provided a strong educational base, the relationships I have built with both my teachers and peers have made me feel confident that I will do good in years to come," Darling said. "It's great to learn about subjects of interest, but it only takes you so far. These relationships have made me a kinder, more persistent, patient, and organized person, which I think are a few essential traits."

Irwin said becoming a balanced student is part of what she hopes students will learn and take away from PHHS.

"We often speak about schoollife balance," Irwin said. "We encourage our students to engage in activities beyond academics so they can have that balance."

For Lane, balance was a lesson he learned as a student-class president and ASB president.

"In the beginning it was a struggle to find a balance," Lane said. "Being the ASB president currently, and the class president for the previous three years, it has given me one of the most valuable experiences that I believe you can

get from high school. For me, it wasn't just a class, it's a family. I have developed many valuable leadership skills and real-world business experience from all the events that our ASB puts on/sponsors throughout the school year."

And, within classes, Lane said branching out and trying something new in academics allowed him to find an activity that helped alleviate stress.

"My junior year of high school was jam-packed with AP classes, and, in my years prior, I had never taken an art class," Lane said. "This year I took ceramics, and it was mind altering in that it helped reduce my stress and allowed me to get a deeper understanding of myself."

Moy said she's seen students becoming more vocal and intentional with their mental health as they internalize and navigate difficult situations.

"I've noticed that in the past few years, students have been more mindful of how society's greater problems affect themselves, their families and their physical and mental health," Moy said.

What's on the menu?

Ron Abbo comes from a family of entrepreneurs. He and his brothers own in different combinations of partnership three restaurants in Mission Valley.

"Some people say that since I'm not Mexican I can't make good

food," Abbo remarked. "But I say, my chefs are of Mexican descent and they're the ones cooking."

The name Crack Taco comes from a partner, Peter Najjar, in this business who also owns Seaside Market in Cardiff-by-the-Sea. If you haven't heard of this market, it's a popular specialty market by the Cardiff Kook. Outside the store is a BBQ tent featuring "Cardiff Crack" which

is their Burgundy Pepper Tri-Tip that is tender and flavorful. It's so popular it has its own Facebook page.

"We pick up our Tri-Tip from Seaside Market daily, marinate it here on-site and cook it in an oven and sear it fresh. It's not barbecued." Abbo said.

"All of our food is freshly made. Even our tortillas. They're pressed and cooked to order. We make our own guacamole and salsas also."

Their birria tacos are incredibly tasty and served with a dipping sauce. Birria, which historically was goat meat, nowadays is typically a beef that is stewed. Traditionally the meat is marinated in an adobo sauce that generally includes vinegar, dried chiles, garlic and other spices before being stewed. Served in a fresh tortilla topped with cilantro and onion, it's a perfect choice for a lunch taco.

"Our most popular items are, of course, the crack taco, but the Al Pastor Taco, and the IPA battered fish taco are also well-loved," Abbo said.

The menu is extensive and will keep you coming back over and over to taste their plates.






