## La Mesa resident electrifies home, saving money and the planet

With global carbon emissions on the rise, one La Mesa resident has taken a new approach to providing electricity to her home.

Buildings are responsible for nearly one third of energy-related CO2 emissions in the United States, making decarbonization a necessary step to combating climate change. Wendy Mihalic, a longtime La Mesa resident, has done one of the most important factors of decarbonization: electrification.

"Building electrification just means swapping out gas

appliances for electric appliances. It's as simple as that," Mihalic

She first learned about electrification when she joined the San Diego 350 group as a volunteer.

The nonprofit, which aims to prevent the worst impacts of climate change through education and outreach, was looking for solutions to greenhouse gas emissions others had put in place. In doing this research, they found that cities in Northern California were considering electrifying buildings.

"Buildings can emit up to a quarter of the greenhouse gas emissions in the state," Mihalic explained. "So, we at San Diego 350 were looking at what our northern brethren were doing and saying, hey, we should be doing that all across the state."

Mihalic began incorporating decarbonizing her home in 2015 when the family stopped using their gas clothes dryer. Then, in 2020, they took the next step toward electrification when their water heater needed to be replaced. They hired a local company that could do plumbing and HVAC services, leading them to



# Award-winning La Mesa musician, husband and father dies at 40

For the last two years, Dustin Lothspeich put his songwriting prowess toward producing a stream of ditties to entertain his son Harrison. There was a "hello" song at the hospital, a hand washing song, and diaper change song. The goofy songs might surprise some of his fans who knew Lothspeich as the lyricist behind the romantic ballads and upbeat breakup songs of local band Old Tiger.

"He would make up a million little songs. There were songs for everything... He was always making stuff up, but we were just giggling about it," said his widow Jen Lothspeich. "He wasn't afraid to look silly in front of me to make me laugh, too."

With his unexpected death at age 40 of natural causes on March 23, 2023 in his La Mesa home, the life of a prodigious local musician—and dedicated husband and father—ended.

The guitarist and vocalist performed with bands including Boy King, Chess Wars, Diamond Lakes and Tusk in addition to a career as a music journalist and blogger.

"Dustin was obviously hugely talented as a performer, but he also put a lot of time and heart into nurturing the San Diego music

scene. He wrote interviews and reviews, he hosted podcasts, and he was a loud supporter of his favorite local bands," said former bandmate Megan Liscomb. "He will be sorely missed by many bandmates and the musicians who came into his orbit."

Lothspeich co-founded San Diego's longest running beer podcast, "Beer Night in San Diego," in which he highlighted the talents of local brewers and musicians. He wrote for SoundDiego, copyedited for several community newspapers, spent years booking talent for the Merrow, and most recently

worked at South Park's Vinyl Junkies Record Shop.

"Dustin had a wealth of musical knowledge and regularly suggested new and inspiring bands to listen to," said Nate Joyner, a coworker at Vinyl Junkies. "Dustin's habitual good mood, sense of humor, and laugh were contagious."

Jen Lothspeich noted that the local music scene can often be petty and competitive, so many people wanted to work with Lothspeich because he was so kind. Liscomb explained that on the night she met Dustin, both of their bands were playing the same show. "I was immediately struck by how warm and friendly he was — he even sent over a note before the show to say he'd listened to our music and was looking forward to playing together. Not a lot of people in the music scene take the time to do things like that so it stood out," she said.

While Lothspiech has played a variety of roles in the local music scene, he is most well known for his band Old Tiger which performed from 2009 to 2015 and won a San Diego Music Award for best pop album with "Love Have Mercy." Among the many fans of the album, the song "Free," caught the ear of a local music blogger then named Ien Van Tieghem. The two became fast friends with a shared interest

in music and married in 2016. In 2020, Jen gave birth to Harrison Atlas— Harrison after George Harrison and Atlas because Lothspeich knew his son would be the center of his world.

"Dustin was talented and was loved and appreciated by people people we'll never know, people we'll never even know the names of or who they are... He touched so many people with his music," said his wife Jen.

Lothspeich was born in Arizona to Mary Kendall and Alan Lothspeich in 1982. While his public career means he is most known for his musical and writing talents, he also excels at drawing. In a childhood spent moving around, he fastidiously drew sneakers he was not able to own. As an adult, he settled in San Diego and began the sneaker collection he spent his childhood dreaming about.

Before his death, he shared with his wife that he wanted to buy the rapper Action Bronson's collaboration with New Balance 990v6 sneakers.

"He said 'I should get these New Balance shoes! They're like dad shoes' and all this stuff," said Jen. "He even turned a sneaker thing into like a dad shoe thing."

The vintage-looking orange and blue sneakers released the day after Lothspiech's death. Jen bought their son Harrison colorful sneakers in his honor.

"Watching [Dustin] be a daddy was the most amazing experience that I'll probably ever have... He

was so good at it," Jen explained through tears.

While Lothspeich did not always plan on having kids, his kind and protective nature extended to his friends and band mates. Liscomb said when she tweeted about being a Dickensian orphan staring through the window of Taco Bell, Lothspeich immediately sent her money to buy food. Another friend, Frank Seeley, said that not only would Lothspeich be there for people in hard times without judgment, he was also generous in celebration.

"When I got a new job not long before we lost Dustin, he sent me a celebratory gift card and checked in with me every day asking how it was going," Seeley said. "Dustin was such a caring soul... a gentle giant."

Lothspeich is survived by his wife Jen and son Harrison Atlas, mother Mary, father Alan, brothers Danny, David, and Ray as well as friends, family and fans.

His death has left Jen and Harrison in a dire financial situation. Those wanting to honor Lothspeich's legacy can donate to gofund.me/80a14985.

In addition, local bands including Oh Spirit, The Strawberry Moons, Gelly Duvall and Dead Feather Moon will be performing in a benefit concert at the Casbah on May 21. Doors open at 6:30 p.m.

## GHS staff, students have built rapport, school spirit for many decades

Senior Stephen Abkin reflects, "I went into the match confident, knowing that we could do well as we had the experience from playing all season-long against robust teams. However, it is difficult to

## Proposed La Mesa battery storage facility producing some negative feedback

A proposed battery storage facility on a vacant La Mesa lot is getting some negative feedback.

If the project goes through, the site would store renewable energy to back the grid that falls under the management of the California Independent System Operator.

The 8,000-square-foot vacant lot at 8135 El Paso Street is surrounded by a strip mall on one side and residences on the other.

When asked to comment on the matter, La Mesa City Community Development Department staff noted, "The project is currently under review by staff for a Site Development Plan and Urban Design Review. Once the project is determined to be complete, the project will be scheduled for design review by the Design Review Board, and the Site Development will be posted to the City Webpage for the "Notice of Decision" at: cityoflamesa.us/1672/Projects-Under-Review. The Notice of Decision will be posted for five calendar days for public review and comment. A determination will be made after the review period ends, and can be appealed to the Planning Commission within 10 days after the determination. Since the project has not been determined to be complete, the project has not been scheduled for any postings or meetings at this time."

According to staff, "The City of La Mesa has received feedback about the project proposal from residents. Some residents have voiced their concerns for the project and others are reaching out to gain a better understanding of the project proposal."

### **SOME RESIDENTS SURPRISED BY PROPOSAL**

Some residents in the area noted they were more than a little surprised by this proposal.

Amy Reichert lives .2 miles from the proposed facility and said she was not happy with the plans.

"The City of La Mesa and the private corporation behind the proposed battery storage unit blindsided us completely," Reichert stated. "One morning, as I walked past the vacant lot at 8135 El Paso, I noticed a

small public notice that offered no other details except that the city planned to vacate the land. Curiosity led me to reach out to the city engineer, who confirmed my concern for my neighborhood: the land was slated for a battery storage facility. I asked to see the plans, but was directed to the planning department."

As Reichert went on to note, "When I called the planning department, I was informed that the plans were not available online or by email due to some vague legal reasons, and that I would have to make an appointment to see them. So I took time off from my full-time job to view the plans in person, and what I saw left me shocked and appalled."

According to Reichert, the proposed facility is just a stone's throw away from a residential neighborhood and is expected to produce an unbearable 75 decibels of noise. "That's equivalent to the sound of a busy highway, and no amount if sound walls can contain it." Reichert believes the noise pollution from this facility will be heard for miles around, wreaking havoc on the lives of La Mesa residents.

"By springing this project on us with no notice or transparency, the City of La Mesa and the private corporation behind it have shown a complete disregard for the well-being and quality of life of the people who call this area home. We will not stand idly by and let them bulldoze over our community's health and safety for the sake of their profit margins."

## **CONCERNS FOR LOCAL CUSTOMERS AND TENANTS IN ONE NEARBY SHOPPING** CENTER

Andrew Goria is an electrical engineer and part owner of a family-owned strip mall building in the area.

"My parents bought the small shopping center at 6062 Lake Murray Boulevard 15 years ago and we care about the neighborhood and our tenants, they are good people. We are concerned about a batter storage facility impacting our local customers and impacting our tenants and, their ability to do business. We are also concerned about safety hazards."

As Goria sees it, the proposed battery facility noise pollution will affect La Mesa locals experience at the shopping center.

"Tenants are all small businesses that need to be supported to thrive, not placed in situations where it is more challenging to attract customers," Goria commented. "These small businesses such as restaurants, lounges, salon, and gym, customers to these types of businesses expect a non noise polluted atmosphere. Very likely locals will choose to shop elsewhere to avoid the industrial facility noise. This may cause our small business tenants to have rent payment challenge in the short term, or even experience failure."

At the end of the day, Goria believes the battery facility will impact the property's value in a negative manner.

"Rent command, property value, tenant business selection will be affected," Goria stated. "Building structures may need to be retrofitted to block noise they weren't designed to be nearby. Lastly, insurance rates will likely increase if still offered."

Gisele Abou Chacra is another resident like Reichert within very close distance of the proposed battery storage facility. Chacra, who has lived in the area for more than three decades, resides just feet from the proposed facility.

"Just a few steps from my backyard," Chacra remarked. "I am concerned about the fire risk and I have lived in my house for 35 years," Chacra noted.

Chacra made a statement to La Mesa City Council in late February. Among her comments

"I am worried because I fear we are on the first irreversible step in a utility style battery project that could have serious environmental & quality of life impacts on the surrounding community and neighborhood. I have to wonder if this project was reviewed and studied pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act by the City of La Mesa and/or any other agency. Where is the record of the permits issued? Where are the environmental impact reports? How was this qualified as a community commercial development when

its function seems so different from that? After all, this isn't a restaurant, small gym or clothing store. It's an electric power storage & generation facility."

For resident Justine Mancuso, she said her residence will be directly impacted, given it overlooks the now vacant property.

"As a La Mesa resident for 25 years and a homeowner for 19, I am disappointed in the city's lack of transparency with project development," Mancuso stated. "With this particular project, we have little to no information on its impact on our our health and safety."

La Mesa resident John Maxwell noted, "We used to protect communities. Despite local interests, international climate policies are being implemented in our neighborhoods. Counter to their claims to provide a clean environment, activist politicians and corporations are establishing infrastructure such as this battery storage facility without regard to the safety concerns of the residents of our community."

### **COMPANY LEADING** PROPOSED PROJECT SAYS IT HAS OVERALL SUPPORT FROM RESIDENTS

James Beach, managing partner at EnerSmart in Solana Beach, the company leading the proposed project, said, "We have received support from all residents and businesses in the area thus far, other than one of four homeowners who are adjacent to the site, and one other neighbor/activist who lives about 1,000 feet away."

According to Beach, the company has reached out to both (as well as the other homeowners) to provide them with the facts about the project, the lack of emissions, noise and fire control solutions, and the aesthetic measures EnerSmart is taking to make sure the project looks attractive from both the street and from their backyards.

"Our goals are to make sure they understand the actual facts about the project, and to address any concerns they might have," Beach continued.

When asked about any timetable to begin construction, Beach said June was the expected date and completion of the project was targeted for Q1 of 2024.





## The magic of Mid-Century Moderns around La Mesa and Mt. Helix

## **Real Estate Update**

By LAURA LOTHIAN



In October, 2021, I listed a classic Mid-Century Modern and wrote, "The GPS will say Mount Helix, La Mesa, but your eyes will say Old Las Palmas, Palm Springs! Built in 1958, this architectural beauty delivers quintessential Mid-Century Modern lines, walls of glass & vaulted ceilings... Create your own modern-day "rat pack" parties..."

The house was built in 1958 and looked like the kind of property Ol Blue Eyes threw parties in Palm Springs but here it was on Butterfly Lane in Mount Helix.

The home was under 2,400 sq. ft.; comparable sales supported a list price of about \$1.2M. Knowing how desirable true Mid-Century Moderns are and how hot the market was, the sellers and I opted to list the house for \$1.4M.

Over 200 people came to the twohour Open House. At one point, in the middle of a crowd in the dining area, a large man placed his knuckles on the table, looked me in the eyes, and in a booming voice said, "I will offer 1.6 Million Dollars, Shut this down!"

Of course, I couldn't shut the Open House down but I was excited my clients would be fetching such a handsome price for their property. The house received a stack of offers and ended up selling for \$1.8M. To this day, it is the highest-selling home, under 2500 sq. ft., in Mount Helix's history.

What drove this frenzy? Yes, the market was hot. And, yes, my marketing was superb. But the style of the house was the clincher. People covet true Mid-Century Moderns.

Because of the popularity of Mid-Century Moderns, some Realtors will make a mistake - hopefully unintentionally - of calling any home built in the 1950s or 1960s, a Mid-Century Modern. This is not correct. Many houses from the 1950s and 60s, such as ranches. bungalows, Cape Cods, Neo-Colonial, Neo-Victorian, and Neo Mediterraneans can be called Mid-Centuries but not Mid-Century Moderns.

What makes an authentic Mid-Century Modern?

Well, they need to be from the middle of the century, so built in the 1950s and

1960s. The style is modern/contemporary with floor-to-ceiling walls of glass embracing outdoor light and views; vaulted or high ceilings; clean, simple lines; also slanted and geometrical lines; exposed ceilings and beams; often the roofs can be flat. Most are single or split-level.

Local famous Mid-Century Modern architects include Lloyd Ruocco (famous enough to have a style named after him), Robert Mosher, and William Krisel. 
