Last year, after four years of planning and coordinating and sweat-equity, this dream became a reality with the opening of Firestation Innovation Cowork in the College Area Business District's office.

College Area neighborhoods have a plethora of home-based businesses and remote workers and now the word is evidently getting out about the College Area's first co-working space. The name came from the previous life of the building as it served as San Diego's Fire Station #10 from 1934 through 1977. The large, open-desk co-working area is where the firetruck was housed.

Today, the space offers a professional space to work away from home, work or school. Amenities included are variable height sit/stand desks with ergonomic chairs, hi-speed WIFI, climate control, a small conference space for one-on-one meetings or calls, a snack & drink filled kitchen and lockers for securing personal items while you work.

Navajo Community Planners unanimously say no to All Peoples Church project



On Monday, Aug. 21, the Navajo Community Planners held a special meeting specifically to hear a presentation on the proposed All Peoples Church which would be built on the east side of College Avenue between I-8 and the Chevron service station. After a presentation and lengthy discussion including public input, NCPI unanimously voted against the project.

In addition to the close proximity of the project to the homes on Marne Avenue, there is strong opposition to the additional traffic, not only from the Sunday services but additional traffic in general

including a new traffic signal at the project front and center. The the main entrance to All Peoples Church on College Avenue.

The next step for the All Peoples Church will be a presentation to the City of San Diego's Planning Commission possibly by the end of September before it goes on the docket for a vote by the City Council.

It is great to know the County of San Diego certified the land for the new 25,000 square foot San Carlos Library.

The parking lot at the corner of Jackson Drive and Golfcrest Drive is now free of contamination that was present following the closure of the ARCO service station back in the early 1990's. The Friends of Del Cerro (FODC) publicly thank Councilmember Raul Campillo for his strong support for the new library and helping to keep

City's Library staff, the Library Foundation and the Friends of the San Carlos Library will be working together to secure the funding for the library.

One of the primary projects mentioned by the residents of Del Cerro is the condition of our "Front Porch", which is College Avenue from I -8 to Del Cerro Blvd. and beyond.

Any upgrade to our Front Porch will be impacted by the proposed new signaled intersection if the All Peoples Church project is approved by the city.

The FODC formed an exploratory committee to determine what the All Peoples Church was proposing for the College Avenue median because several hundred feet of the median would be impacted with a required deceleration left turn lane for southbound traffic turning into the church property. The FODC committee informally met with All Peoples Church staff and their design team.

Before anything further is discussed we are waiting to see if the All Peoples Church is approved by the City of San Diego.

Regardless of the project's outcome, upgrading our 60-year-old Front Porch is going to require input from Del Cerro residents. You will be asked for your suggestions and recommendations. We obviously must keep in mind the cost of an upgrade to the Front Porch and funding sources.

Jackie O'Connor, president of the FODC is continuing to submit concerns to the City of San Diego's through the city's "Get It Done" on behalf of the Del Cerro area.

These include Faded Red Curbs and Street Signs, Damaged Guardrails, Dead Trees in the median, Dense Dead Vegetation on City Property, Palm Trees growing in the public right of way, Adjusting Street Lights, and adding a Bench adjacent to the playground at Princess Del Cerro Park.

San Carlos Area Council to welcome state assemblyman to September meeting



I am very excited to introduce the speaker for our Sept. 20 meeting: California State Assemblyman for District 78, Christopher Ward.

Prior to his election to the assembly, he served as a member of the San Diego City Council, representing the Third Council District. Assemblyman Ward earned a Bachelor of Arts degree at Johns Hopkins University and a Master in Public Policy and Urban Planning at the Harvard Kennedy School.

He worked as an environmental planner, working with local government to develop land use plans and conduct environmental review, and as a researcher at the Ludwig Cancer Research at the University of California, San Diego. He served as the chief of staff to State Senator Marty Block. He is an active member[3] of the San Diego chapter of the Truman National Security Project.

As a City Councilmember, Ward worked to identify measures that will significantly reduce San Diego's overall homeless population, which included three temporary shelters to house 700 individuals, an additional storage

facility to serve 500 clients, and a proposed centralized homeless navigation center.

In July 2017, the City Council unanimously approved an Equal Pay Ordinance that was proposed by Ward, that requires companies that do business with the city to pay their employees equally regardless of gender or race. Ward was involved in gun violence reduction legislation that was signed into law in 2022 that enables lawsuits against gun manufacturers and retailers for negligence. He authored another bill that was signed into law in 2022 that changes procedures for altering gender and sex identifiers on government documents.

ESCAPING THE WRATH OF TROPICAL STORM HILARY

Account for the physical needs of each family member and plan so everyone can navigate safely. Plan where you will gather when the emergency happens.

Taking steps to prepare your family and home ahead of a disaster will improve your chances of success when it's time to act.

Keeping a healthy relationship between members of the public and police

On Nov. 3, 2020 the citizens of San Diego passed Measure B, enacted City Charter Section 42.1, and created the Commission on Police Practices (CPP).

On Nov. 19, 2022 the City Council passed an ordinance that activated the Commission. Recently the Mayor hired the Commission's senior administrative officers and the City Council appointed the 25 Commissioners who will do the day-to-day work of investigations and reports. Now the CPP is ready to go.

The Commission on Police Practices replaces the Community Review Board on Police Practices, an agency that was limited in its powers and could only review the internal investigations of the independent investigations that are supported by the power of subpoena and the ability to take oral and documentary evidence under oath.

The purpose of the Commission on Police Practices is to scrutinize interactions between members of the public and the police.

The CPP must investigate all deaths occurring while a person is in police custody, all deaths resulting from interaction with a police officer, and all police officer related shootings. The CPP may investigate complaints about all other interactions between members of the public and the police.

In those matters where the CPP may investigate priority is given to complaints of police use of force that results in great bodily injury, dishonesty relative to investigating or prosecution of a crime, investigation of misconduct by a police officer, and a pattern of misconduct by a police officer. The of Police. The CPP may make reports and recommendations on police policies and procedures that will reach the Mayor and the City Council. All reports and recommendations will be placed in the public domain. It will be up to the public to ensure that the

recommendations are followed.

The day-to-day operations of the Commission on Police Practices have yet to evolve and will only be fully defined after the 25 new Commissioners are trained and are presented with their first events and complaints. The

investigations will be supported by a cadre professional investigative staff who will have the benefit of the subpoena power of the CPP.

Law enforcement is an essential component of our society.




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Patrick Henry football: Growing dreams and community

In recognition of our 75th Anniversary (1948-2023), our AE History/Anniversary Committee is helping to create opportunities

for residents to celebrate together and learn more about the history of our neighborhood.

In mid-September we have a fantastic "tiki" garden party and home tour scheduled. The theme of the event is inspired by some of the architectural detail on one of our very special mid-century modern homes. According to the current owners, "it's a custom ranch design with a low hip roof line and exaggerated overhangs to shorten direct sunlight and minimize rain directly to the windows. Roof dormers on the home have an Asian or South Pacific influence, which was popular here in San Diego from 1955 thru 1965."

This spectacular home was designed by noted San Diego modernist architect, Richard George Wheeler.

Wheeler was the son of another prominent San Diego architect, William Henry Wheeler, and the father of James Wheeler, also an architect, in his own right. In fact, James Wheeler will be a special guest at the home tour party and will share about his father's life and the legacy he left in Alvarado Estates when he designed this featured home and at least two others.

Later in September, another history event is planned to showcase a short movie that a resident made about the beginnings of Alvarado Estates and the subsequent decades.

It cleverly tells the story of the neighborhood through old photographs, newspaper clippings, aerial images, and video footage of both bygone days and contemporary experiences. Moviemaker Eric Poliak says it's a work in progress, as he intends to add more footage as homeowners share about their interesting homes and the lives of those who have resided in Alvarado Estates during its 75 year history.

MESA COLONY

The Harriet Tubman Village Charter School "Modernization Master Plan" was revealed to the Mesa Colony Community Group during its August neighborhood meeting.

Now that the children have gone back to school, Mesa Colony has shifted its attention to the only school within its boundaries, Harriet Tubman Village Charter School. At our meeting this week, we were able to enjoy a wonderful presentation by, Principal Ryan Woodard and Lisa LaGrone, Community Schools Coordinator, about the upcoming changes planned for the school campus.

The school has had a long history in our neighborhood and the 4 acre site is about to undergo yet another transformation.

It was one of the first schools in the area in 1891 and was named "La Mesa School" after La Mesa Colony, a subdivision east of San Diego City proper. By 1911, the school was redesigned and enlarged by architect Irving Gill. The new school became "La Mesa Heights," to reflect the new name of the community. Two more name changes came with the addition of more buildings and soon, in 1993, John Muir Elementary School became the school that we know today as Harriet Tubman Village Charter School.

So what started as a small rural school in the late 1800's, has become a fantastic K-8 charter

school that has an enrollment of well over 400 students.

Plans to expand and help the school meet today's standards were started in earnest in Jan. 2015. The master plan was named the,"The Whole School Modernization Project." In March of 2015, it was decided that input from the surrounding community, the school staff and San Diego Unified School District Administration was the best way to get everyone involved. By March 2016, after much consideration by staff and community, the plan was complete. But there was more work to be done. In 2017. the school's new Principal, Ryan Woodard, as well as it's staff and administration, worked hard to bring the school into "good standing" with the San Diego Unified School District. Two short years later, in 2019, the master plan was approved and in 2022 over 40 million dollars was awarded for the "Modernization Master Plan."

This plan really is a collaborative effort and addresses things like traffic flow, maintaining the historical buildings on site with interior renovations only, keeping the newly constructed joint use

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


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San Carlos LL 8/10's made 2023 season quite a hit

With the recently concluded Little League World Series championship in Williamsport, Pa., there has been a lot of attention towards youth baseball of late.

While El Segundo (Calif.) was winning the LLWSC on the East Coast, another team of young ballplayers also had their time in the spotlight on the other side of the country.

The San Carlos LL 8/10's made it to the recent Southern California state championship game where they fell to Golden Hill. A second loss in the tourney eliminated the local team. In 2023, 443 All-Star

teams throughout Southern California took part in the 8-10 Division (All the boys selected to the San Carlos team were 10 except for one nine-year-old).

Despite not winning the gold, these young athletes accomplished something they can cherish for many years to come.

For starters, they were the first-ever team from San Carlos to have advanced to the state title game.

According to San Carlos Manager Brett Ludwick, the team's willingness to work hard with absolutely no expectations is one of the things to make them stand out.

"It was clear early on that these kids all love baseball and playing together," Ludwick commented. "They played each game as if it were a new season, never focusing on their record or the past. I would never tell anyone that we had the most talent or most experience but instead, the most passion to play together day after day. If you are able to keep kids this age engaged after playing baseball every day for two months, there is something pretty special happening."

As serious as the focus may be on playing and winning, this group of youngsters also have a lighter side to them.

In San Carlos, there is an all-Star toilet bowl, a good luck charm if you will, that gets handed down to the incoming 10u All-Star team each year from the previous year's All-Star team, according to Ludwick.

"It carries a lot of tradition and it's an honor to have," Ludwick remarked. "The toilet is painted green and yellow, San Carlos colors, and all the kids sign it. It goes to all the games and I would say it's similar to the Stanley Cup but much grimier and weirder. The toilet was stolen out of my truck during a team dinner and created a huge buzz in the community. Turns out, our crosstown rivals had stolen it and were holding it. Everybody knew about it and it actually made for good folklore. We were reaching out pleading to get it back before a big sectional game and it turned up on the pitching mound of our Minors field the day before the game unharmed. We were able to get our good luck charm back and it worked - we won sectionals and

"One thing that made this team so special is that we all played so well together," Ludwick said. "It was so fun to break our Little League records and finish as runner-ups in the state championship. 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Interest rates are the elephant in the room in the housing market



When it comes to the housing market, the elephant in the room is interest rates.

Interest rates are a function of the real rate (1% base) plus the expected inflation (3%) plus risk factors, credit score adjustments, etc.

Over the last couple of years we have obviously experienced inflation but the equation factors in "expected" inflation and the thinking has been that the recent inflation was temporary and that expected inflation over the next couple of years would be lower, maybe 2% to 3% going forward. This has kept mortgage rates in the 5% to 6% range recently.

Unfortunately over the last month or so, the thinking has changed, and economists are believing that expected inflation over the coming years will remain elevated.

This, among other factors, has recently pushed mortgage rates into the 6% to 8% range and that clearly is starting to have an impact on the housing market. Inventory remains ridiculously low as people don't want to sell their property and give up their 3% interest rate from a few years back.

Also, homes are becoming less affordable as payments rise with interest rates.

On a 30-year, \$800,000 mortgage, the monthly payment at 6% is \$4,796 and at 8% it's \$5,870. So we have two competing forces: low inventory keeps home prices higher and rising interest rates pushes prices lower.

The result is that the median home price countywide is flat with some areas experiencing a slight increase and other areas with a light decrease. This condition is also making it difficult for first time buyers to enter the market, growing families to move up to a larger home, and empty nesters to downsize.

Another issue currently at hand is up in Sacramento. ACA 13 is an assembly bill to change the state Constitution.

The California Association of Realtors has been sending out "alerts" to myself and the other Realtors to review ACA 13 and to call their state representative to try and stop it, so I wanted to bring it to your attention. It's a bill that would

weaken the ability of citizens to put certain propositions on the ballot, and make it easier for Sacramento to raise taxes, among other things. The Realtor Association is of the opinion that ACA 13 would eventually lead to a reduction or a complete elimination of the protections of Prop13, the iconic proposition that limits property tax increases in California. Feel free to research ACA 13 yourself.

Over the past 40 years, the courts have slowly eroded Prop 13 and ACA 13 could lead to eliminating Prop 13 altogether. But if property taxes are eventually based on market value and the rate of taxation rises from the current 1% base, the cost of homeownership would greatly rise, forcing many to have to sell. Just something to think about.
