La Mesa Branch Library renovation plans get another reading towards expansion

By JESSICA MILLS

Circulating over 60,000 titles each month, the La Mesa Branch Library, located at 8074 Allison Ave., is one of the top library branches in the San Diego Library

Around 17 years ago, the library was torn down for a new police department and the city promised to build a new 20,000 square foot library. A 10,000 square foot building was built temporarily and due to a funding issue with the city, the library still occupies the space.

According to La Mesa Mayor Mark Arapostathis, in November 2021, the City Council directed library staff to form a Task Force to research expansion options for the branch. The task force contracted with a consultant to conduct a Library Needs and Feasibility Study. That study can be found at: https://pub-lamesa.escribemeetings.com/filestream. ashx?DocumentId=10557.

Mayor Arapostathis detailed the study's findings.

"66% of La Mesa residents have a need to access free reading or entertainment materials and 71% use books provided by the La Mesa Branch Library," Arapostathis said.

"The top four most important library amenities/facilities to households are: access to free reading or entertainment materials, children's reading and event area, public Wi-Fi and indoor event space."

Based on these findings, three renovation plans were presented to the City Council.


Option one recommended a vertical expansion — adding a

second floor with additional community spaces, staff areas, study rooms and a patio. Pros: building on existing space, the U.S. Postal Service Office would maintain its office, additional community spaces and areas for nondisruptive social events. Cons: elevator and stairs are required, ceiling on the first floor would be compressed to accommodate for the second story and framing may require updates. Estimated cost: \$7,285,15.

Option two is a horizontal expansion and converts the USPS office into community spaces, staff area, study rooms and a patio. Pros: least costly option, additional space is not needed, all functions remain on one floor, additional community areas and separated areas for social events. Cons: lobby and bathrooms would be relocated to accommodate the community room, extra changes may be necessary to support the expansion and the USPS will need to be moved. Estimated cost: \$5,878,57.

Option three involves a new building on an existing civic center lot, adjacent to the current library. The current library building would be repurposed for the city center. Pros: new building would connect public transportation to the civic center, community rooms have controlled access and acoustic separation from the main library, additional buildings could be built on top of the library, the current library building remains to be utilized and construction above the library could be a funding source. Cons: most costly option and funding would need to be sourced. Estimated cost: \$13,842,645.

The city council voted unanimously to go forward with option two, the horizontal expansion.



After-School Tutorial begins this week which provides an opportunity for our students to work with their teachers to get any extra support needed to start the school year off on the right foot.



"Our goal is to compete for the Grossmont Hills League championship and return to the Division I CIF playoffs," Potter remarked.


• On the gridiron, the Helix **football** team came into this week with a record of 5-0 and a number three ranking in San Diego for head coach Damaja Jones.

Coming out led to unconditional love and support from family and friends



I never thought that I would

I have known I liked boys and girls ever since I was little, but speaking that into existence seemed forbidden.

That changed recently when I came out on social media while simultaneously announcing that I am my school's Gender-Sexuality Alliance club's new secretary.

The post was uploaded and I was met with surprise and

I felt overwhelmed with my own anxiety and fear. When this went public, I knew I could be met with the disgust and homophobia of others. I have always surrounded myself with people full of love and tolerance, but there are always going to be people with prejudice in their hearts, either using other people's identities as the butt of their jokes or treating them with genuine hatred and disgust.

The mixed emotions gave me whiplash.

I felt tired, proud, and confused. I was afraid of looking too straight to be considered gay and being met with malice from preconceived notions of who I am. I am privileged.

Through the mixed emotions and anxiety I have been met with unconditional love and support from family and friends. Being in this position, I could only imagine how difficult this process would be for my peers whose only support comes from school provided resources.

We live in an age where sexuality and the protection of our community's youth has become

politicized. It is no longer just a question of who a person is attracted to or who a person identifies as. We are moving backwards.

On Aug. 14, 2023, the Grossmont Union High School district voted to terminate the long-existing contract with the mental health service San Diego Youth Services. This program provided for all students and had programs specifically geared towards LGBTQ youth.

These programs included services such as gender affirming care, drug and alcohol abuse resources, and community building. Queer youth have higher suicide rates. These services save lives.

Community members initiated the dissolution of this contract when they spoke against SDYS, describing them as having "creepy agendas" being pushed upon students.

Never once has a "creepy agenda" been pushed upon me, even as a gay student. These services have simply been available for the students who want to use them with parent

GUHSD board members agreed with these misinformed community members, letting their own personal bias lessen their compassion for these children depending on the important resources that have been revoked. Church and state are no longer separate. These board members are violating students' constitutional rights by allowing their own beliefs to obstruct their ability to adequately provide for their community.

They describe wanting to move to a service that better represents "East County values" even after cries of protest from the GUHSD community.

The new program, Wellness Together, does not provide specific services for LGBTQ+ youth.

This is unacceptable, considering queer children need specialized care due to higher rates of suicide and mental illness.

Not providing adequate care is inherently hateful, abusive, and directly contributes to higher suicide rates.

La Mesa Branch Library Branch Manager Cassie Koldewyn expressed her support of the library's renovation decision.

"The La Mesa Branch supports the goals of the City of La Mesa by participating in community events, promoting City services and partnering on programs. An expanded library space would help enhance those efforts by providing quiet meeting spaces, a dedicated and enclosed location for large-scale programs and increased access to reading, viewing and listening materials."

However, Friends of the Library President and Library Task Force member John Schmitz stated his support for the third option.

"The building the library currently occupies wasn't designed as a library," Schmitz said. "If we started from scratch, the amenities could be tailored directly to the library's needs. The biggest needs are a community room space that allows for programs that might otherwise be disruptive, a children's area and study rooms. Having the ability for an individual or a small group to do something without being disturbing to others or others disturbing them seems to be a nice feature."

Even as we work to serve every person with whom we make contact, we understand that help remains out of reach for many others.

We know there are people experiencing abuse in every community across San Diego, but not every community has easy access to transportation, and not every victim can take time away from work. That is why we have launched the mobile clinics of Your Safe Place. Our dedicated staff is fanning out across the City to provide support to those who need it where they need it in their own neighborhoods.

Bringing justice and compassion to those who have experienced betrayal, abuse, and violence is some of the most rewarding work we do.

If you work with a community organization or neighborhood group, we invite you to partner with us. We are actively seeking safe spaces in every community to increase access to our services. This is your opportunity to bring hope and healing to neighbors, colleagues, friends, and family.

When community organizations and neighborhood institutions contact the Your Safe Place mobile unit, we work with them to find a convenient time for our team to visit their facilities. Together, we help spread the word about the availability of our services in a manner that is geared toward that community's comfort level. Later, we schedule appointments with those who need the support.

Our mobile clinics can help the members of your community with free support services to anyone who has experienced

domestic violence, sexual assault, sex trafficking, family violence, or elder abuse. The support may include safety planning, legal help, restraining orders, immigration services, housing support and protection from gun violence. 



Homecoming has evolved over time at Grossmont High School

The halftime festivities included performances by the Royal Blue Regiment and by dance students. Fireworks followed the announcement of the 2023 Royalty Court: Cody Bigley, Ellie Dilgard, Molly Blakeley, Faythe Jordan, Queen Dahlia Blake, King Tony Canepa, Joey Clark, Brandon Hermosillo, Elias Burlaza, and Mylie Weston.

After the weekend, senior Alex Banman exclaimed, "This was my favorite homecoming of my 4 years at GHS! It was awesome! Friday started at 6 a.m. with the KUSI Alarm Clock Pep Rally, then a school-wide assembly, and finished with fireworks at the halftime show! The Saturday evening dance was a blast!"

For 102 years, at Homecoming, students and staff have created memorable ways to commemorate the words, "It's Great to Be Young and a Foothiller."

Real Estate Update

Several players stood in the parking lot stunned and demoralized at losing an activity that brought sunshine, health, fun, camaraderie, and fitness.

I started playing in 2018 and in one year, I dropped from Size 14 to Size 8. Not only was I hooked on the socializing and fun of the sport, but it was how I successfully lost weight and kept it off.

"What the hell are we going to do now?" we asked each other. All public courts were closed, not just Collier.

I suddenly remembered an odd-looking court I had seen at a client's Mount Helix house. It looked like a tennis court for preschoolers. When I asked her what it was, she replied, "A pickleball court." It was 2010 and I had never heard of pickleball, so her response had not registered. But it did now.

I contacted her and asked if my friends and I could play on her court and she enthusiastically said yes! No one we knew had a pickleball court at their house so for the next two years, her house was our nerve center. Thanks, Claire!

Now I know at least a dozen people with pickleball courts at their homes. Some have created

rudimentary pickleball courts on their driveways with portable nets and chalk and some have gone deep like the one pictured below in Granite Hills with 360-degree mountain views, outdoor kitchen/ bar & vanishing edge pool.

Is a pickleball court going to

be part of your home plans?

In the last few years, the sport has exploded. According to a report by the Association of Pickleball Professionals, more than 36.5 million people played pickleball from August 2021 to August 2022.

It's enjoyed by people of all ages with 18 – 34-year-olds making the largest age bracket. With its popularity growing and public parks overflowing with players - which means waiting for games - many homeowners are building pickleball courts on their properties.

Yahoo News reports there are now more calls to add pickleball courts to homes than pools and decks. Architectural Digest calls pickleball courts "Real Estate's Hot New Thing."

A big yard is not needed. Playing lines measure 20 feet by 44 feet but a total playing surface of 30 feet by 60 feet is the minimum size recommended.

Court materials are the same as tennis courts, asphalt, and concrete, with a perimeter fence needed to contain errant balls. To avoid direct sun in players' eyes, if possible, build in a north-south direction.

The cost to build a pickleball court starts at around \$40,000, once built, upkeep is low. Popular, fun, healthy, and great at family and friendship bonding, is there a downside to owning a private pickleball court? Unfortunately, there can be.

The paddle hitting the hard, plastic ball creates an unmistakable popping sound that players love but neighbors can hate. Pickleball noise measures about 70 decibels 100 feet away from the court. A normal residential area averages roughly 40 to 55 decibels. While 70 isn't dangerous, it can be annoying.

For those wanting to build their own courts, consider the following:

- 1. Hire a professional court builder. There are many in San Diego County.
- 2. Contact your city to see if permits are needed.
- 3. Once built, play at courteous times.
- 4. The social aspect is a big draw but no need for blasting music and excessive hooting, hollering, and swearing.
- 5. Invite your neighbors. Teach them to play if they never have.
- 6. A couple of hours daily is plenty of time to play. Don't have so many players that games go on all day.
- 7. Don't be overly generous loaning the court to friends, guests, or paying strangers (Swimply/Airbnb) when you're not there. This prolongs the hours neighbors have to deal with the noise.
- 8. Mitigate the sound with noise abatement screens, acoustic baffles, sound barriers, trees and vegetation.
- 9. Stay out of the kitchen (inside joke)!

Mt. Helix Toastmasters seeking to add new members

Mt. Helix Toastmasters, an 85-year-old club in La Mesa looking for new members, is inviting the public to visit or interact with it online at its weekly meetings.

The group, founded in 1938, meets Wednesdays from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. at La Mesa VFW Post 1774 at 8118 University Ave.

Formed when most clubs were allmale, Mt. Helix is one of only two such Toastmaster clubs remaining among the more than 120 co-ed clubs region wide. Mt. Helix welcomes female speakers and visitors, acting as a gateway to introduce them to the organization and help them find a club just right for them.

Founded in 1924, Toastmasters International, now headquartered in Englewood, Colo., is a nonprofit that builds confidence and teaches public speaking skills through a network with approximately 270,000 members in more than 14,200 clubs in 148 countries. Members prepare and deliver speeches, respond to impromptu questions, and give and receive constructive feedback. Toastmasters empowers members to meet personal and professional communication goals.

La Mesa dentist Larry Pawl, a Mt. Helix member for 28 years, said public speaking is important because it gets your thoughts across. "As a dentist I need to tell people what I think is in their best interest, and before Toastmasters I couldn't do that," he said. "Now I have the ability to get my thoughts across. Toastmasters has allowed me to build rapport, talk to people like they want to be talked to, and my productivity has been on a steady rise since I joined."

Retired Navy Lt. Cmdr. Scott Montgomery, a 20-year Mt. Helixian, remains a club member because "I wanted to make a positive impact on the world and one of the best ways to do that is through public speaking. Mt. Helix is a venue where one can make mistakes in a friendly environment and improve. It is also an excellent way to learn to lead a meeting. I wish I'd joined at an earlier age."

Bill Buzzell, who's been club president numerous times, said the group helped him overcome a disability. "What Mt. Helix helped me with the most was my stuttering problem," he said. "When I was younger I stuttered terribly. But it wasn't until I first came to Toastmasters that I was actually able to beat that stuttering demon once and for all. If it had not been for that, I would not have been as successful as I've been in my career. And I give all the props to Mt. Helix and all the guys in the club."

Mt. Helix also welcomes, and has benefited, English-asa-second-language members, like Mason Mirlay, an Iranian-American who joined the club about two years ago. "It (club) has improved my speaking skills and given me confidence to speak impromptly, both professionally and personally," he said.

John Flaherty, a 15-year member, joined Mt. Helix to advance his career. He said the club has helped him do exactly that. "It has taught me the dynamics of how to run an effective meeting," he concluded adding, "Toastmasters gives you the confidence to speak in large groups and helps make the butterflies go away. It teaches you how to be comfortable (even) when you're uncomfortable."
